

Bluegrass Fairness Chapter Richmond Fairness Ordinance

Exciting things are happening in Richmond, Kentucky these days. In the past few months, a new Kentucky Fairness Chapter, the Gray Dove Chapter, has been formed in Richmond and Madison county. The newly elected co-chairs are Scotty Saltsman and Angela Aaron who are hard at work with Richmond volunteers and supporters in proposing a fairness ordinance for the City of Richmond.

By next year, we hope Richmond will join Louisville - Jefferson Co., Lexington, and Covington in having an ordinance that will ban discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodation on the basis of a person's sexual orientation or gender identification.

Staff members of Kentucky Fairness Alliance, particularly Matt Nicholson, and members of the Bluegrass Steering Committee, have been actively working with the Gray Dove Chapter in conducting a voter identification survey to identify supporters in Richmond for the ordinance. This project entails going to door to door and asking registered voters whether they would support such an ordinance. So far over 250 supporters have been identified, and several have expressed interest in donating time and money.

Everyone came away from the walk feeling energized and excited about the prospects of passing an ordinance in Richmond. On the rare occasion when there was a negative reaction from a person being surveyed, the conversation was always pleasant and sometimes even funny, which only shows that a lot of the opposition to a fairness ordinance is based more on ignorance than bigotry.

Thanks to Charlotte Wood, Barbara Scherer, Sue Strong and many, many others for coming out and helping with this project.

A special thanks needs to be extended to the Kentuckians for the Commonwealth (KFTC) who have been actively helping in the voter id survey, which includes a question to determine the level of support for a progress income tax reform in Kentucky. If nothing else, this project is demonstrating in a very real way the positive benefits of "networking" with supportive organizations

The long term goal is for Gray Dove to identify 3,000 Fairness supporters, so there is still a lot of work to do. The last walk for this year is scheduled for October 18, and we are hoping to turn out 75 and 100 "walkers" for this event. We will start at 9 am at the Unitarian Universalist Church, 209 Saint George Street Richmond, KY. You can get there by taking the second Richmond Exit (Exit 87), turn left, go the the 4th light, turn left and go about a block and half (the church is on the right).

Gay Spirituality: Icons 2 By Rev. Ken Waibel

In the GLBT life, as in any group, there are common experiences that help to define its Spirituality. Collectively the experiences become a foundation, or Spirituality, that can better define the attitudes, hopes and dreams of the group. Although some of the individual experiences may be common to other groups collectively they begin to define Spirituality. The first icon, discussed last month, is a Lack of Adult Models of Love.

The second "icon" or common experience of GLBT persons that begins to define its Spirituality is the experience of being in Exile. I believe it can be said that all GLBT persons experience this icon in one capacity or another. For some the exile is actual or external: being literally "kicked out" of their churches, "cast away" from their families, shunned by society, and ignored by their, so called, friends. For other GLBT persons the experience of Exile is prophesied or internal: having seen what has been expressed in the media or having heard the horror stories the GLBT person anticipates the same experience for

him or herself and therefore lives in fear and dread of what may happen.

Society has been basically cruel to the GLBT person. Even so called "enlightened" persons will verbally accept that gay people have a right to exist and perhaps even right to civil protection BUT "don't tell me my child is gay" or "don't expect me to accept their lifestyle". The deep-rooted prejudice against GLBT persons that is present in our culture produces an exile from the mainstream life of that culture for the GLBT person – real or imagined.

This experience or feeling of being in Exile has obvious negative connotations for the psyche of the GLBT person. The primary emotion that surfaces from the experience of being in exile is that of loneliness. For most of us the experience of being GLBT first surfaces as something that is only happening to "me." In our early development as children we hear the prejudicial jokes or comments made by parents, friends and preachers and since we probably do not yet know anyone else who has the same questions or inclinations we feel isolated and alone. Add to this the extreme fear that comes from potential or real exile and the feelings of loneliness

increases to the point of being dangerous resulting in depression and possibly even suicidal thoughts. Extreme loneliness, left unchecked, is deadly to the psyche and can be deadly to the body.

On the positive side of this experience IF the experience of being in Exile is recognized and the emotions of loneliness are dealt with the movement that occurs within the psyche may be the first steps toward a unity or connectedness with God. The human person is a social creature at its very core. We do not like being alone. If we are made to feel alone we turn inside ourselves to find company. The nonhealthy person will become bitter and self-contained. The healthy person will eventually find within the God who is waiting there to affirm the person's dignity and self worth. Exile can lead to internal unity with God.

The True Meaning of Halloween By Iggie

The ancient pagan world counted nights rather than days. Their days began at sundown. All their festivals (Sabbats) were celebrated on the eve, the night before. Samhain (pronounced sow-een) means "Summer End" and is called Halloween today. This day is also know as Nov. Eve. Feast of the Dead, Feast of Apples, Hallows and All Hallows Eve. It marks the end of the Celtic year.

The New Year began with sunset on Oct. 31 and was celebrated on that night or

on the first full moon in Scorpio. Samhain celibates the end of the God-ruled summer and marks the beginning of the Goddess-ruled winter and is also the beginning of cider season. Samhaim is ruled by the crone aspect of the triple and celebrated at this Goddess and is considered an excellent time of divinations.

Samhain was said to be a Druidic Deity, the god of death, and the guardian of the other world gate. The Samhaim ritual is known as Ancestor Night or Feast of the Dead, a time when the veil between the worlds (i.e. this world and the after life) is the thinnest. Feasts are held in remembrance of the dead ancestor (like our Memorial Day) and as an affirmation of continuing life. Places are set for the ancestors and treats are set out to welcome the wee folks. In Ireland, the wee folk are very active just before Samhain and will bless your home for a small portion of your harvest. The custom of Trick-or-Treat very likely came form this.

Smahaim marks the final harvest of the year. It was believed that any harvest left in

the fields at sundown on Oct. 31 was taken by the Phookas, baneful faeries who render it unfit to eat or even poisonous.

Apples, harvested at this time of year, are a part of many customs. People placed apples representing love and life on the graves of loved ones, made cider, and buried apples in the hard-packed earth to "feed" the passed ones on their journey.

Samhain is the beginning of the dark half of the year, a time for settling problems, throwing out old ideas and coming to terms with one phenomenon of life over which we have no control-Death. It includes the ritual mating the God Dagda and Goddess Morrigan. This mating is to

> insure the arrival of new life in spring. Wiccans say a temporary farewell to the god. He isn't wrapped in eternal darkness, but readies himself to be reborn of the Goddess at Yule, a time of holy birth in many traditions.

sunset in honor of the Gods and Goddesses and to guide the souls of the dead home to their kin. If you can't go to a bonfire, a candle placed in the window is said to guide the ancestors to the land of eternal summer.

According to legend, lighting a new orange-colored candle at midnight on Samhain and allowing it to burn until sunrise will bring one good luck. Bad luck will befall those who bake bread on the day or journey after sunset.

Marked as a time of sacrifice, animals were slaughtered to ensure food throughout the depths of winter. The God identified with animals fell as well to ensure their continuing existence.

The pagan Scots and Irish were known ...continued on next page for giving obligation libation to the their faery folk during their rituals. A libation of milk on a stone in Scotland was called Leac na Gruagich (roughly Milk to the hairy ones) and was a traditional must on Samhain Night. To forget this minor ritual was to risk finding you prized sheep dog or your entire herd dead and rotted in the morning.

The custom of Jack-a-Lanterns also came for the Celts. They believed carrying a hallowed out turnip, carved with a scare face and lighted with a candle, would scare away evil spirits.

So, this Halloween, if you see someone in the grave yard putting apples on graves, it may be me remembering passed loved ones. I wish you a good Samhaim and a Happy Halloween. Remember, Halloween has nothing to do with evil, it is another seasonal holiday celebrated in various ways throughout the world. Blessed Be, Iggie.

Commitment and Same-sex Couples Sherry Rostosky and Ellen Riggle

Over the past four years, we and our colleagues have conducted research on relationship commitment in same-sex couples. This study is important because most studies conducted on commitment in couples has assumed that couples are heterosexual. In this ground-breaking study, ninety local same-sex couples agreed to take part in interviews, guided conversations, and surveys. These couples shared with us their definitions of commitment and the factors that enhance or impede that commitment. Thanks to these couples' generosity, we now have some results to share with the community.

Relationship researchers agree that most couples (mostly based on heterosexual but including some studies of same-sex couples) define commitment in terms of investments, costs, and rewards. That is, when a couple decides that they want their relationship to continue into the future, they base that decision on a process that involves weighing the pros and cons of being in the relationship and on the resources (such as time, money, and energy) that they have "invested" in the relationship. While this general process seems to also occur in same-sex couple relationships, we discovered some unique features of commitment for same-sex couples.

First, same-sex couples recognize the importance of talking about issues in their relationships and invest time and effort into that process. The importance of communication in same-sex couples is viewed as a personal relationship value and as an important "investment" in the future of the relationship. Second, couples recognize that one of the "costs" of being in a same-sex relationship is legal inequality and social stigma. To deal with the lack of the

right to legal marriage and the resulting disadvantages and vulnerability, some couples execute legal documents (such as wills and powers of attorney for finances or health care) as an "investment" that protects the relationship against future crises.

Same-sex couples also face social stigma, associated with their relationship status and their sexual orientation, from family, co-workers, and society-at-large. While some couples see this as a cost of being committed to the relationship, others see it as an opportunity to make an investment in the future of the relationship by coming out as a couple. Disclosure of the relationship to others may mean coming out to friends and family members, taking one's partner to a work function, or holding hands in the mall. Each behavior is a public acknowledgment of the relationship and serves as an important indicator of commitment to many couple members.

Finally, for the couples in our study, an important marker of commitment in the relationship was the decision about whether or not to be monogamous in the relationship. Although not all couples decide to be monogamous, the decision process itself and the willingness to talk about the boundaries of sexual activity is important to couples. Many see this discussion as one of the "turning points" toward establishing a committed relationship.

These factors and their important contributions to the definition of commitment by same-sex couples illustrate the resilience of same-sex couples in their efforts to cope with relationship challenges. While we all absorb relationship 'rules' about female/male couple relationships that are based on available cultural and parental models, same-sex couples must create new scripts and forge new relationship 'rules' and practices that affirm and strengthen their commitment.
