of the kind.

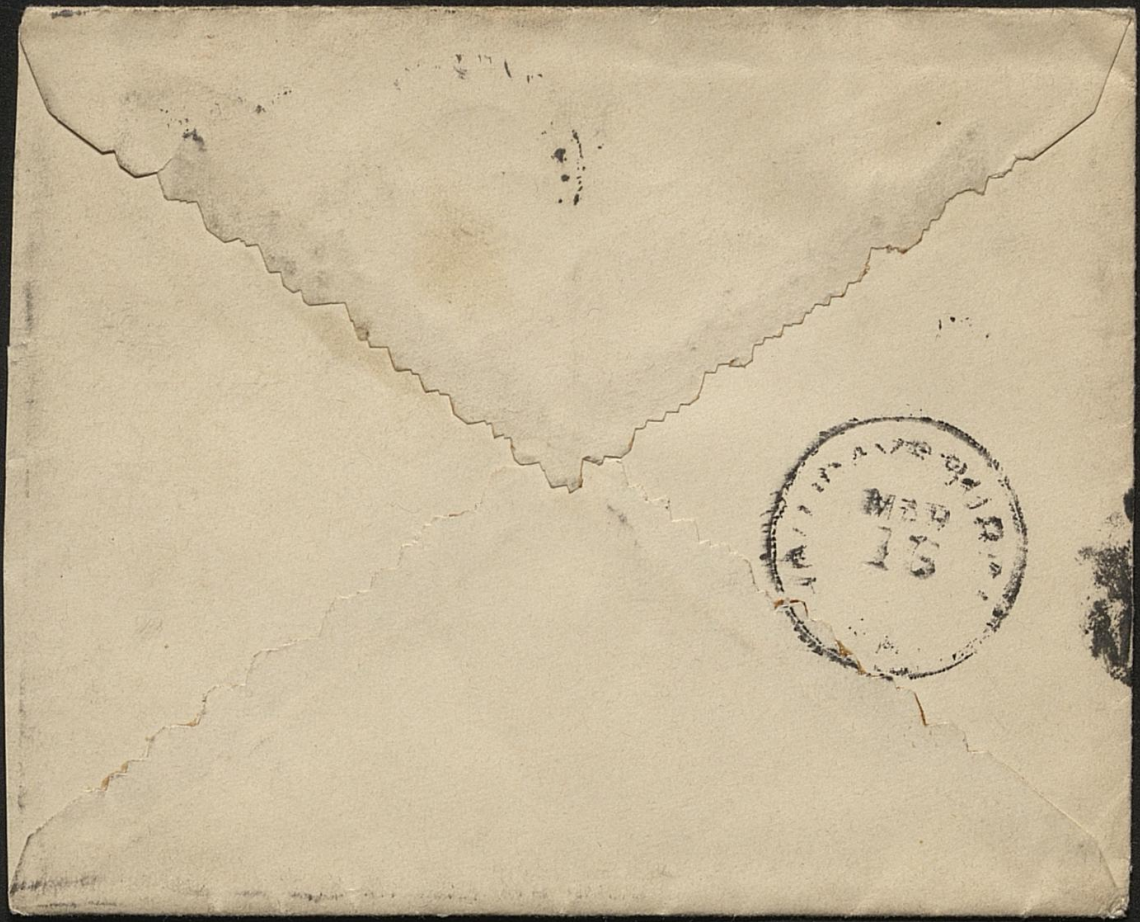
Received a letter from

Dear Ada

I know you will be disappointed when I say that it is impossible for me to visit you this summer. I am disappointed also as I had partly made up my mind I would go. But the expense is too great for me just now. I will still live in hope of visiting you some time

Did you have a pleasant time on the Fourth? I enjoyed myself thoroughly. A party of us (eleven in all) went with the Grace Baptist Church excursion to Cape May. The day was cool and pleasant, the bathing delightful and the ocean grand. We have a swimming tank here at the house. It is open about twice a week and how I do enjoy it. I am learning to swim.

You ask me when my birthday is. It was yesterday the 15th of Ju

ly. I was twenty seven years old and I do not feel a day older than twenty. Can you realize that we are so old? I can not. It seems but a short time since I was a little girl at Gettysburg. No one thinks I am nearly so old as that. Eddie's birthday was the 11th. All in July.

Yesterday I spent in West Chester with my friend (I might say sister) Anna Smedley. Our store closes at one on Saturday so we have
