

At the College of Kentucky Sept. 21-1906.

The faculty met in its first meeting for the collegiate year at 3³⁰ P.M. in the president's office, those present being Pres. Patterson, Profos W. K. Patterson, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Mackenzie, Norwood, Burtt, White, Wilson, Tuttle, Embrod, Row and Frankel.

The minutes of the meeting of June 4th were read, and approved.

The following was offered by Maj. Burtt.

Resolution and seconded by Prof. Miller; —

regarding Honor system among students Resolved that when a student answers a question addressed by any officer of the institution, and when he attaches his name in writing to any paper submitted by him in examinations or reports, such answer and such signature shall be accepted as prima facie evidence that his answer and assent is made upon his honor.

Resolved secunda that the foregoing resolution be submitted to the student body and their cooperation requested to the end that a wholesome sense of honor be stimulated and encouraged among the student body.

The resolution was adopted by an Ayes and No vote as follows.

Prof. Row informed the faculty that Prof. B.C.E. deg. Brooks had reported that Messrs E. B. Stiles and E. B. Stiles W. C. Kelly had submitted their graduating theses and completed all work required for the B. C. E. degree.

On motion of Prof. Pence seconded by C.W. Mathews, it was ordered that the faculty recommends to the Board of Trustees that Messrs. Stiles and Kelly be granted the degree of B. C. E.

Prof. Norwood offered the following resolution which being duly seconded was carried.

Resolved, that the following rule shall be posted in conspicuous places in the Union and offices on the third floor of the Natural Science building:-

"Smoking in rooms on this floor is positively prohibited by order of the faculty."

Prof. Miller called attention to the "one year rule" in athletics, adopted by his faculty last Winter, and stated that since in his judgment the enforcement of this rule without the cooperation of other colleges could only result disastrously to our college athletics, he felt that he must decline to become a member of the athletic committee as had been proposed, and thought that some one in sympathy with the rule should be sent in his place.

Prof. Mackenzie, seconded by Prof. Miller, moved that ^{none of} inasmuch as those colleges with which our teams are likely to play match games have seen fit to adopt what is known as the one year rule, we suspend the operation of this rule as adopted by resolution in December last.

The motion was lost because of no quorum voting. Upon motion of Prof. Norwood, it was ordered that the vote just passed be reconsidered.

Upon a second vote the motion was again declared lost, not having received a majority of the votes of members present.

After some further discussion of the subject the following, offered by Maj. Burt and seconded by Prof. Anderson was carried.

Resolved, that so much of the eligibility rules adopted last December, - as requires residence in the college one academic year, be suspended for one year.

The faculty met at 3.30 P.M. in the president's room, those present being Pres. Patterson, professors J. G. White, Neveer, Patterson, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pearce, W. White, Wilson, Truett, Lumbrod, Rose and Frankel.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Upon motion, the consideration of the letter of Dr. R.S. Hart of Pisgah, deferred from the last meeting, was taken up.

On motion of C.W. Mathews, seconded by Prof. Queen, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved that while the faculty regrets the inconvenience caused to anyone by the opening of college exercises at eight o'clock, it is deemed inexpedient at this time to change the hour of convening, owing to difficulties in adjusting the schedule of studies and military drill to the later hour, and also because the later hour would result in deferring the day's program, which in the past has caused a corresponding inconvenience to others living in the country, on account of the lateness of the hour when they could reach home.
