"The Professionals" have handled things superbly. Walker, after a psychological thrashing from Pitino, has shrugged off an ambush of pressure and raised his game to yet another level. He's reguende his form in the paint, dominating the post.

"We know it's now or never," Walker said. "We can't have another down game."

The Cats are the odds-on favorite to win the national title. The top seed in the Midwest, UK faces a potential meeting with either Wake Forest or Louisville if the Cats defeat Ulah on Thursday in Minneapolis. A meeting with U of L, of course, would be the greatest storyline. The already-fabled rivalry would add a tremendous chapter to an important game.

Storylines aside, UK is worried only about itself. A deep bench, balanced scoring and pinpoint shooting have been the hallmark of this team all year. Now, the Cass must continue what has brought them to this point.





Donald Shoup, 18, of Ormond Beach, stopped a police officer in his hometown early yesterday and told him he was wanted in the slaving of 19-year-old Mark Fyke, of Belleview, Ontario, police said.

Shoup was being held without bond in Daytona Beach. He lives in a public housing complex about.

in a public housing complex about 10 miles away from the crime scene, police said. Police also

Fyke was shot once in the head about Friday night while talking to his mother from a pay phone outside his beachside motel.

Yesterday, about 300 students and local residents gathered under a hot sun for a memorial service sponsored by the Campus Crusade for Christ, an international college organization that was holding its annual conference here.

"We hope to bring some sense to a senseless act," said conference coordinator Bob Londres.

"She asked that we pray for her family and pray for God to bring an end to this senseless violence."
Mark, the oldest of three children, was an easygoing, gentle teen-ager who loved the Toronto Blue Jays and the Maple Leafs, Mrs. Fykes said.
"He was really looking forward to this trip. He paid for it himself with the money he earned from McDonald's," she told Canadian Press in an interview Saturday.
"He was a great son," she added, her voice breaking. "I just think God only takes the good ones."

Daytona Beach Mayor Bud Asher said he was not aware of a student being robbed or killed in his 42 years in the area. "We still like to think this is the sefect place in America." he said

Stardust material similar to Earth's

LOS ANGELES — Stardust from outside our solar system contains some of the same compounds found in common air pollutants, mothballs and charred meat, according to a new study.

In the first laboratory measurements of stardust, researchers found that stardust molecules trapped inside meteorites contained polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, the same class of carbon compounds produced by diesel exhaust, forest fires and volcanie eruptions.

Among specific carbon molecules that rode to Earth inside meteorites were naphthallene, the chemical in mothballs, and pyrene, a cancer-causing chemical found in charred meat, the study found.

ton.

Scientists long believed that their telescopes were picking up chemical signatures resembling PAH compounds in the space between stars. The latest results confirmed those observations.

The stardust particles contained isotopes — or slight molecular variations — of carbon compounds in the Earth's atmosphere, the study found.

The particles were expelled by stars and trapped in the meteorites some 4.5 billion years ago, said Richard N. Zare, a Stanford chemistry professor who led the team that identified the stardust components.

By analyzing the particles, "you're in some sense getting your hands on a star," he said.

Researchers at Washington University, led by physics professor Robert M. Walker, extracted microscopic grains of graphite from four meteorites. Of 124 grains examined, 89, or 70 percent, showed appreciable concentrations of PAHs, the scientists said. The research was funded by NASA.

Vendors stuck with loads of useless merchandise

NEW ORLEANS — The thousands of UK faithful who flocked to the Big Easy for the Southeastern Conference Tournament weren't the only group of people put out by the Wildcats' loss in the finals to Mississippi

State.

When the Cats went down for the first time since November, T-shirt vendors and other souvenir peddlers were stuck holding preprinted merchandise declaring UK champion of the 1996 SEC Tour-

champion of the 1996 SEC, 1 our-nament.

One vendor, Marshall Well-born, makes a living selling shirts and other items at sporting events across the country. Wellborn, who is based out of Atlanta, said Whoops is a sure moneymaker.

'I follow Kentucky basketball everywhere,' said Wellborn, who started selling UK merchandies at the 1992 SEC Tournament in Birmingham, Ala. 'I knew once they got that No. 1 ranking, (this tourney) was going to be a big deal.'

deal."
Two hours after the SEC championship game ended, Wellborn was still selling shirts on the third floor of the Hyatt Regency Hotel adjacent to the Superdome.
Wellborn ordered 800 of the short-sleeve cotton tees, which

read "Kentucky Wildcats, Champions 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996." He sold 300 of the shirts at \$15 before the game. Following the UK loss the price of the tees dropped to just \$2 — the shirts cost about \$5 to make.

For fans wishing to buy the bogus shirts in bulk, Wellborn offered a deal — three tees for \$5.

Despite UK's unlikely loss, Wellborn stands to profit from his pregame sales.

The load of shirts cost him about \$2.400, but the 300 garments sold before tip-off netted him a quick \$4.500.



NEW ORLEANS — The Louisiana Superdome, one of the largest domes in the world, was the site of UK's 81-78 loss in the 1993 Final Four. Critics point ed to a slowed Wildeat three-point attack, due mainly to pure aesthetics.

The Superdome, which held over 60,000 for the Final Four, revamped its layout, limiting seating to around 25,000.

Instead of open areas under each basket, risers were placed behind the goals. This gave a better background for shooting, supposedly making baskets easier to come by.




















Parents look to balance school, kids

The Late Daniel Rudd, a leader in the black Catholic Press, who was born a slave in Bardstown.

American Catholic Tribune and helped establish the Catholic Press Association and the Afro-American Press Association.

• William E. Summers III of Louisville, a leader in the broadcast industry and the first black in the United States to manage a radio station.

He began his career with The Louisville Defender newspaper, became a sports announcer for WLOU radio in Louisville, and bought the station in 1971.


