# Claiborne was 'a man with unbelievable character'

Hall of Fame coach dies of heart attack: Jerry Claiborne, the last coach to guide UK's football team to a bowl win, dead at 72 from heart attack

The Wildcats finished below 500 in four of Claiborne's last five seasons but went 6-5 in his final campaign in 1989. Claiborne stepped down as Kentucky coach after eight seasons with a 41-68-record. Claiborne retired in 1989 as the 21st winningest coach in college football history, with a career record of 179-1228.

He and his wife, Faye, lived in Lexington for the next seven years, before moving to Bowling Green in 1996, Jonathan Claiborne said. Claiborne struggled with Alzheimer's disease in recent years, but still took an inter-est in the football program. ### Gore issues Medicare plan

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Issuing a 74-page Medicare manifesto, Democrat Al Gore today promised Floridas seniors that he will not push them into HMOs. He said GOP rival George W. Bush's drug plan "could run seniors through welfare offices" and would "violate their sense of dignity." Bush denies the characterization. The Republican nominee proposes to phase in his drug plan, relying for the first four years on grants to states.

### Cheney promotes tax cuts in Ohio

STREETSBORO, Ohio — During his trip to tornado-ruined Ohio yesterday. Dick Cheney stopped at a steel plant to tell employees the federal budget surplus was "created by the American worker" and should be returned to them through tax cuts. The Republican vice presidential candidate told workers at Cleveland Steel Container Corp. they could get as much as \$1,600 a year in tax relief under his running mate George W. Bush's plan, but might get nothing under the Democratic proposal.

### Sex offender escapes San Quentin

SAN QUENTIN, Calif.—A convicted sex of-fender escaped from San Quentin State Prison before dawn yesterday, apparently using a blan-ket and gloves to scale a fence topped with razor wire, authorities said. Eduardo Mariscal, 31, was housed in a medium-security dormitory-style cellblock. bunking with hundreds of other in-mates, when somehow he managed to walk out of the building unnoticed, a prison spokesman said. About 200 feet away, near a perimeter fence that is 14 feet high and topped with razor wire, au-thorities found a pair of gloves and a blanket.

### European trains, Planes disrupted

PARIS — Strikes disrupted regional rail traf-fic in France, canceled flights in Belgium, and caused long lines to form at gas stations across Greece yesterday. Despite a month of protests against the high cost of fuel in Europe, none of the strikes were directed solely against fuel prices. French commuters and travelers faced disruptions at the start of a week of train, metro and bus strikes by transport workers pressing for pay increases, more jobs and progress on im-plementing a 35-hour work week.





### Bans on free speech outside set area unconstitutional

From your story on Thurs. Sept. 20 by Ashley York, describing UK's suppression of the Leftist Student Union's free speech, Dean of Students Victor Hazard believes free speech can be restricted to a small "designated area" of campus. He is mistaken.

The Supreme Court has declared that public property which has as a principal purpose the free exchange of ideas, and which has historically been used to communicate thoughts between citizens,

historically been used to commu-nicate thoughts between citizens, is considered a "public forum."

Courts have declared a university

Courts have declared a university campus is the quintessential "marketplace of ideas." In a public forum, speech regulations must pass "strict scrutiny." UK's absolute ban on student speech across most of campus can not possibly pass that scrutiny. "Regardless, even if the rest of the UK campus were not a public forum, speech restrictions on government property must still be "reasonable." The Supreme Court has declared a ban on the peaceful distribution of flyers (such as the Leftist Student Union was doing) and treasonable on other span of the peaceful court of the public (See ISKCON v. Lee, 506 US. 672 (1992) and Lee v. ISKCON, 505 US. 873 (1992).

Thus, UK's current free speech policy is blatantly unconstitutional. I urse Dean Hazard to chanse

the policy before UK suffers a cost-ly and embarrassing lawsuit, which seems inevitable under the current policy.

# **Early September snowfall** plagues parts of Wyoming



# Milosevic leads Yugoslav election

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Refusing to concede defeat despite calls from home and abroad, Slobodan Milosevic's alles claimed Monday that the president was ahead in vote counting from the weekend election.

They admitted, however, that he could face his main challenger in a rund? They admitted the selection of the selection, when an estimated 74 percent of the country's 7.6 million voters cast ballots for president, parlament and local officials.

Opposition candidate Vojislav Kostunica claimed victory and demanded that the State Election Commission release the official count. "This is the dawn of our freedom," Kostunica said early Monday as Yugoslavians poured onto the streets of Belgrade and other cities.

early Monday as Yugoslavians poured onto the streets of Belgrade and other cities.

The European Union endorsed Kostunica's call and said any attempt by Milosevic to claim victory would be "fraudulent."

Milosevic's coalition insisted Monday that the president was ahead but without enough to avoid a runoff with Kostunica on Oct. 8.

At a news conference clearly aimed at bolstering morale among the president's shocked and demoralized followers, Gorica Gajevic, Milosevic's party general secretary, said that with 37 percent of the ballots counted, Milosevic was leading with 45 percent compared to Kostunica's 40.

"This result gives us optimism that

we can win in the first round," Gajevic said.
Appearing at the same news conference, Ljubisa Ristic, a neo-communist ally of Milosevic, indicated there would be a runoff in the presidential ballot.
"At this moment, the sample is too small for us to say, as we would like to, that our candidate won in the first round." Ristic said, He also conceded an overwhelming defeat of Milosevic's coalition in municipal elections, but claimed that the left-wing parties will have a majority in the federal parliament.

The claims went against forecasts by the rival parties. Kostunica's Democratic Opposition of Serbia party insisted the 56-year-old law professor had won an absolute majority, defeating Milosevic but usuccessful presidential candidate, said Kostunica was leading Milosevic by 35.5 percent to 37.9 percent with 20 percent of the votes counted.


