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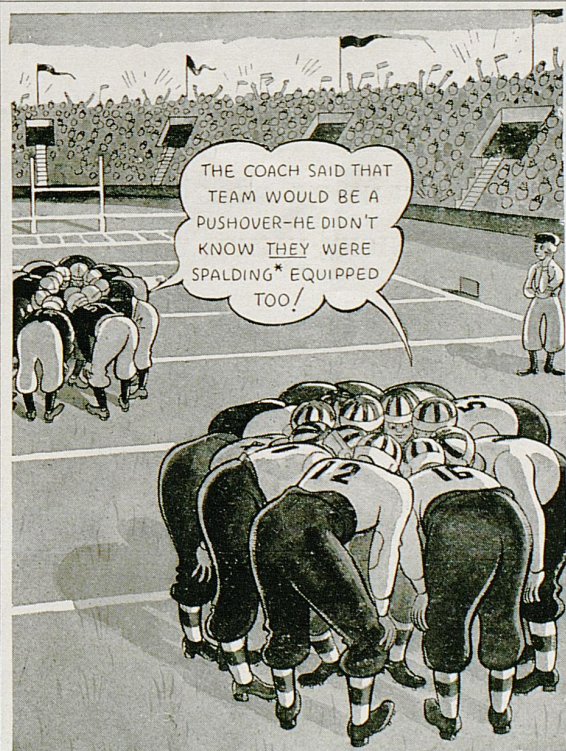

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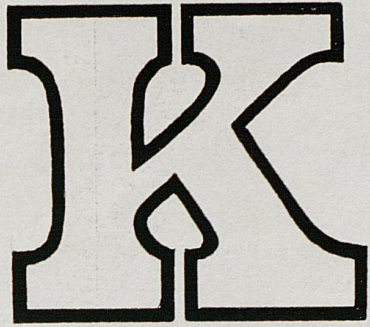

Head Coach Chester Allen Wynne

Star fullback and world's champion high hurdler at Notre Dame, maker of championship football teams at Creighton and later at Auburn, native of Kansas but adopted Kentuckian, attorney-at-law, close friend and favorite pupil of the late Knute Rockne, the man all Kentucky is banking on to lead the Wildcats eventually to Southern football supremacy.

That is Chet Wynne.

This mild mannered, cultured gentleman who once shared the National football limelight with George Gipp in Rockne's backfield of the early 1920's, is entering on his third season at Kentucky with ambitions of turning out a team that will make Kentuckians everywhere glow with pride.

When Wynne came to the Blue Grass he found football in a deplorable state. Hope had all but died. Victories had been scarce. Friends had turned away. There was muttering by fans whose enthusiasm had curdled. Alumni turned their heads.

But there were still loyal friends of the Blue and White. These stretched out their arms toward the South, where Chet Wynne had performed the miracle of creating a great football machine on the deep Alabama plains. He heard their call and left Auburn and his successes there to start building all over again at Kentucky.

It was a dreary struggle for the Chetter. Material was scarce. Spirit on the campus was at a low ebb. He was faced with the toughest assignment of his career. But the Chetter was undaunted.

With a dispirited squad, Wynne turned out a fighting team his first season at Kentucky. Teams that had been defeating the Wildcats handily found the going hard. Kentucky was beginning to win back its self-respect. The Wildcats showed improvement in breaking even in a ten-game schedule.

When the second Wynne season started last fall at Lexington hope had been born again. The material

was better but there was lack of reserves. The Wildcats were faced with a back-breaking schedule but, with Wynne at the helm they came through to win six of their ten games, showing gradual improvement. They were magnificent in defeat when they lost to Ohio State's great team by 19 to 6 at Columbus, and they won a world of respect in that game.

With two great stars, Bert Johnson, halfback, and Stanley Nevers, tackle, out because of injuries, the Kentuckians slumped after mid-season, but they came back to end the season in a blaze of glory in handing Tennessee a 27 to 0 defeat, the first Kentucky victory over the Volunteers in a decade and the worst beating taken by Tennessee in years. That victory did more to arouse enthusiasm at Kentucky than anything that had happened in a generation. It proved that those who believed in Wynne were not mistaken.

Wynne had given Kentucky the team it had hoped for — a team that fought from the first kick-off to the last whistle. It drove on the offense; it fought for every inch on defense. It was a TEAM.

Another year is at hand, and a new Kentucky spirit has been born to give encouragement to a Kentucky's own team. The dissatisfaction of the old days is gone; a new confidence

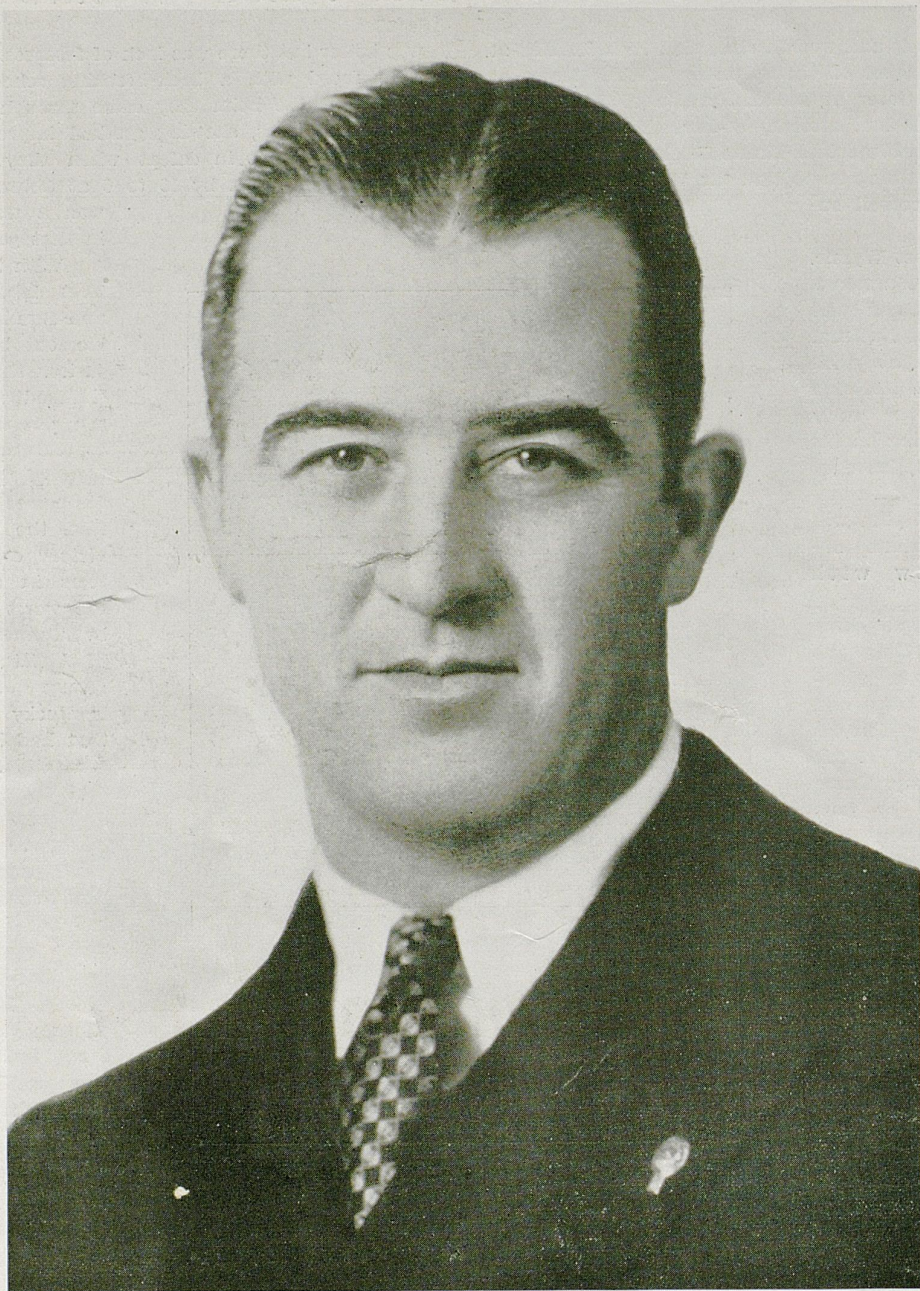
and a new esteem rule in its place. Win, lose or draw — Kentucky has done its best. That all-pervading spirit is the stuff from which tradition is built and is the foundation stone for greater and more glorious years to come.

Now the dark-eyed Wynne is facing another season with a high-spirited crew of hard-fighting Wildcats who believe they are as good as the best. They are eager for action, fearless, self-confident, superbly coached, capable. They are a tribute to the ability of Chet Wynne.

"Happy" Chandler -- Governor -- Athlete



His excellency, the Honorable Albert Benjamin Chandler, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, if he were not the chief executive of the State and if he were not a brilliant attorney, probably would be coaching athletics now.

In fact, the Governor, shortly after his graduation from Transylvania, went in for athletics in a big way, coaching football and basketball at Versailles High School and scouting football games for Centre College.

"Happy" Chandler was a versatile athlete at Transylvania during his undergraduate days in Lexington, playing on the football, basketball and baseball teams at Old Transy. He was tipped off to his first coaching job by S. A. "Daddy" Boles, graduate manager of athletics here, and shortly, was turning out winning teams at Versailles.

The Governor, after his graduation with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Transylvania, attended the Harvard Law School, then returned to his native State to complete his legal education at the University of Kentucky.

Since taking the Governor's chair, "Happy" has lost but few opportunities to watch Kentucky Wildcat teams in action. Last winter he was one of the most ardent fans at Wildcat basketball games here, and usually he can be seen occupying the Governor's Box in the stadium at Kentucky football games.

S. A. "DADDY" BOLES

GRADUATE MANAGER

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Ancient Friendly Enemies

When the University of Kentucky Wildcats and the Cadets of Virginia Military Institute meet this afternoon on Stoll Field it will be the fourteenth time they have tangled on the gridiron. Of the baker's dozen of games played, the Wildcats have won nine, while the Cadets have won four. Kentucky has managed to pile up 192 points against an even 100 by the Flying Squadron in their thirteen meetings.

The Kentucky-V. M. I. athletic rivalry dates back to the very dawn of Southern inter-collegiate football. In fact, V. M. I. was on Kentucky's very first schedule. That was in 1892 and the game was played at Lexington, Va., the home town of the Cadets. It was the first time the Kentucky football team ever played outside the borders of its own State.

Football had been introduced at Kentucky the year before when a make-shift team was organized on the university campus here for one game as a sort of experiment. Kentucky lost that game to Centre 6 to 0.

The following year a six-game schedule was mapped out for the Kentuckians and a coach—Jackie Thompson of Purdue—was engaged to teach the game to the Wildcats, although they were not called Wildcats in that remote day. Of the six games, Kentucky won two, tied one and lost three. The worst of these defeats came at the hands of V. M. I. The Cadets won it by 34 to 0. That, by the way, has been the worst defeat either has taken at the hands of the other since that day.

It was twenty years before these two teams met again. In 1912 V. M. I. visited Lexington, Ky., and defeated the home team by the most unusual score of 3 to 2. Most of the succeeding games between Kentucky and V. M. I. have been won by narrow scores.

They did not meet again until 1921, when the two elevens agreed to play at Louisville. Kentucky won this game by 14 to 7. From that time until the present, Wildcats and Cadets have met fairly regularly. They have played in four different cities in three States. For three years in a row—1925-6-7—they played at Charleston, W. Va. Since 1926 they have met seven times, either at Lexington, Va., or Lexington, Ky., and the Wildcats have won all these seven games in a row.

When this game with V. M. I. was scheduled it was not believed that Kentucky would be pressed to win. But what a change has taken place. Now the Cadets are ranked as top flight contenders for the Southern Conference championship. They proved their mettle last Saturday when they whipped a fighting University of South Carolina team by 24 to 7.

Before that game Kentucky was a big favorite to win. Now the two elevens are rated about on par, especially since Kentucky failed to show championship form in defeating Xavier by 21 to 0 last Friday night at Cincinnati.

It should be a whale of a ball game.

Kentucky's football team and its students welcome the Cadets to Lexington. We respect you and we anticipate a hard game from you of the Old Dominion State, mother of our own Kentucky.

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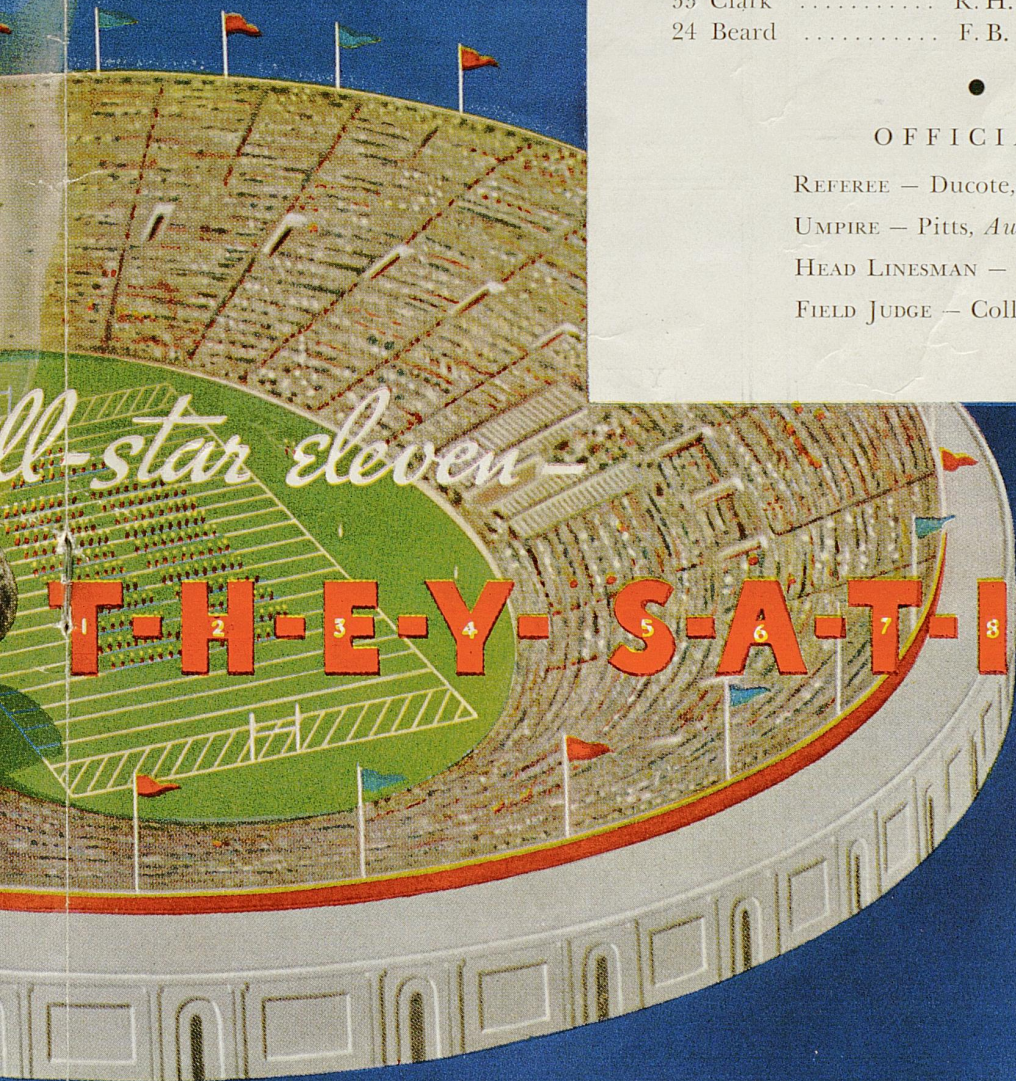

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Virginia Military Institute, which met the University of Kentucky in football this season for the fourteenth time, appeared on Kentucky's first football schedule back in 1892. The Wildcats and Cadets have met in four different cities and in three States. They have played each other at Lexington, Ky., Lexington, Va., Louisville, Ky., and Charleston, W. Va.

Tom Gorman, line football coach at the University of Kentucky, returned last summer to his alma mater, Notre Dame, where he completed work on his law degree. Gorman and his boss, Head Coach Chet Wynne, both are graduates in law from Notre Dame. Tom starred a few years ago as center on the Irish football team coached by Hunk Anderson.



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Night football games, while popular at Cincinnati, failed to appeal to fans in Lexington. Players find the ball hard to handle when slippery with dew. Fans have a hard time following the ball, especially on a punt or pass.

The University of Kentucky football team played its second annual game with Xavier University this fall at Cincinnati. Both have been night games. Kentucky won both, scoring twenty-one points in each. Xavier surprised Kentucky with a powerful running attack this year but was unable to make a touchdown.

Two of the youngest football fans in Lexington are Bert Johnson, Jr., less-than-a-year-old son of the University of Kentucky's star left halfback, and Chet Wynne, Jr., 2-year-old son of Kentucky's football coach and athletic director. Both expect to grow into football stars like their Dads.

Ashland, Ky., is represented on the starting University of Kentucky football team by three of its native sons. They are Bert Johnson, stalwart left halfback; Wendell Skaggs, tackle, and Homer Nicholas, guard.

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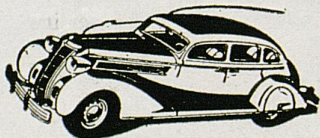
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LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY BASKETBALL TEAM IN 1935-36



For the first time in years, the University of Kentucky had absolutely no claim on the Southeastern Conference basketball title at the close of the 1935-36 season last spring. But still the season was considered quite successful as the Wildcats won 14 of their scheduled games and lost only four.

Coach Adolph Rupp had planned to build his team around a sophomore, the all-American center, Leroy Edwards, but had to change his plans when Edwards turned professional and remained at Indianapolis instead of continuing his education and his basketball at Kentucky.

Without Edwards, Coach Rupp was under a terrific handicap but he made the most of the material at hand and once more turned out a team that was a credit to the University.

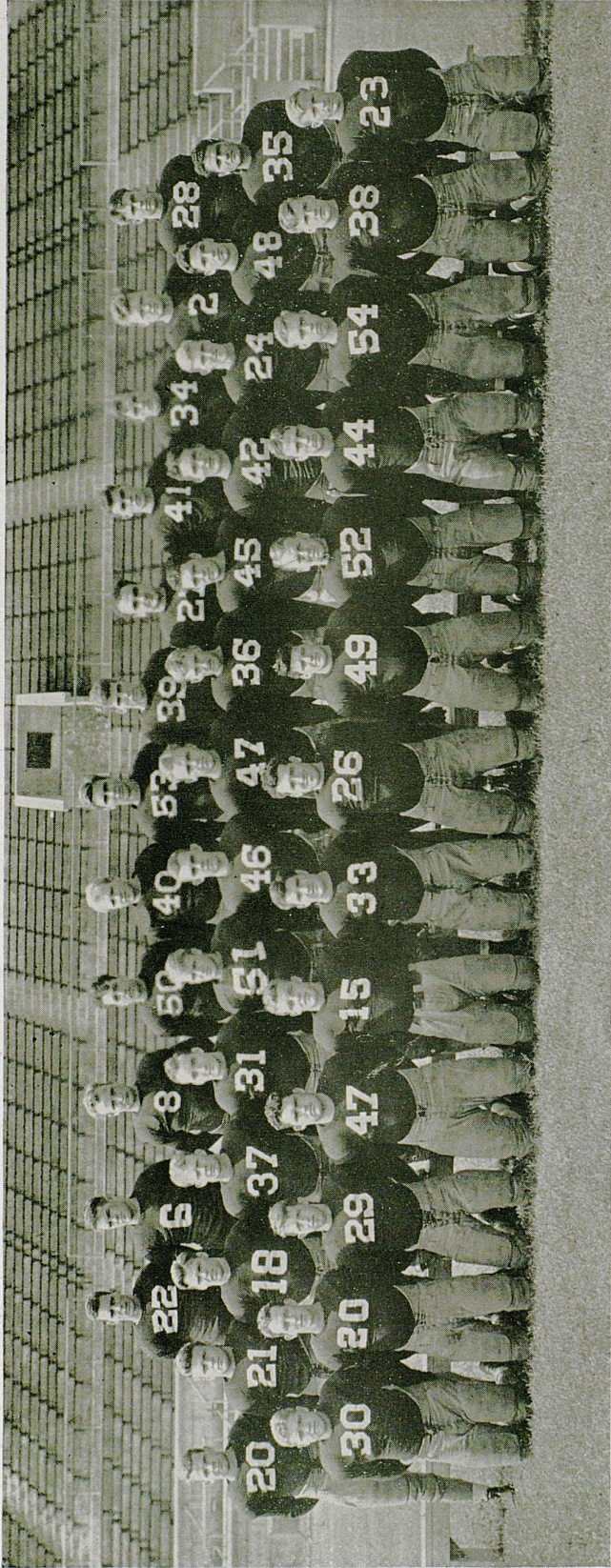
Possibly one of the most surprised basketball teams ever to trod a hardwood floor was the University of Pittsburgh Panthers here last January 8. Pitt took a Southern tour and dropped off in Lexington with the idea of giving the Wildcats a lesson in basketball. Imagine how those Panthers felt when, at the end of the half, Kentucky was leading by 22 to 2. The Panthers picked up a bit in the last half but the damage was done and Kentucky won by 35 to 17.

Once more the Wildcat basketball team displayed its strength against Alabama, which has been unable to whip Kentucky in basketball since Coach Rupp took over the reins here. Coach Hank Crisp's lanky lads fell by the close score of 32 to 30 at Tuscaloosa, and by 40 to 34 at Lexington.

Other high lights of the season were the Wildcat victories over the powerful Michigan State and Butler University quintets. The worst defeat suffered by a Wildcat basketball team in years was its loss to Notre Dame by 41 to 20. They will meet again at Louisville next spring and the Wildcats hope to achieve their revenge.

Southern basketball fans outside of Kentucky thought that the millenium was at hand during the past season when the Wildcats bowed to two Southern teams, Vanderbilt and Tennessee. The 'Cats, however, evened the count with these two opponents by also beating them.

Wildcat Football Squad of 1936

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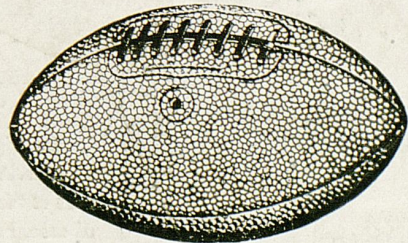
