

### MANUSCRIPTS GRANT PROJECT

Under the guidance of Bill Marshall, Head of Special Collections and Archives, and Claire McCann, in her capacity as Manuscripts Librarian, much progress has been made since Special Collections received its initial one-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education Title II-C program in the fall of 1985. The awarding of additional funds amounting to \$153,302 for the second year of the grant has enabled us to continue our cataloging with conversion of our records into machinereadable form as well as providing the support necessary to expand our preservation activities. scope of our project includes entering Kentuckiana manu-scripts into OCLC's online bibliographic database and downloading this information into LS2000, the libraries' local system, and to the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives' disk. Christie Robinson is responsible for entering the records into the database, utilizing the Kentucky Guide Project worksheets which are refined and expanded to be suitable for our purposes. The bibliographic form of cataloging follows the MARC Archives and Manuscripts

Control format. Currently, more than 600 records have

been completed.

We are also working in concert with Mary Samples and her staff at KDLA to preserve our Kentuckiana manuscripts by deacidification and encapsulation. Those items requiring mending and/or cleaning are handled as needed. A grant-funded Poly-Weld Encapsulator enables the staff to expedite the tedious hand procedure of sandwiching a document in mylar. Jill Buckland coordinates the preservation portion of the grant.

Another aspect of the grant is the compilation and dissemination of a guide to selected holdings which is being developed by Jeanne Trimble. Not only will we be able to provide online access to our Kentuckiana manuscripts, but the guide should be a handy reference tool to our major collections. (Submitted by Claire McCann)

# PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION IN LIBRARIES

The Greater Cincinnati Library Consortium is sponsoring a one-day workshop with the aforementioned title at Raymond Walters College in Cincinnati on Thursday, April 9. It is designed to provide an overview of the concepts and skills that contribute to effective personnel administration. They have lined up four outstanding speakers. Don J. Cosgrove, Professor of Psychology at Xavier University will address interviewing and assessing

candidates. Rebecca Sturm, Head of Public Services at Northern Kentucky University, will discuss personnel evaluation methods and guidelines. David R. Martz, formerly of University of Michigan and Bowling Green State University Libraries, and Vicki Young, Head of Reader Services at Xavier, will give a presentation of employee orientation and training. The keynote speaker is Herbert S. White, Dean of the School of Library and Information Science at Indiana University.
