


I trust my remarks are proper understood & my feelings duly appreciated

My very dear Brother.

As I die - Dec. 29th 1848

I receive your kind & affectionate letter of
the 1st inst. and would have answered sooner, save for the almost
daily expectation of seeing you at my house - The weather for the
last several weeks has been intensely cold - so much so, that I
imagine the Rivers are blocked up with ice and steamboat
navigation impracticable; & for a time may be disappointed in your
anticipated visit - Hence to day, although not very well, I have
concluded to write to you - My better half and Am. Maria
have gone to town for the 2nd or 3rd time for the purpose of
making preparations for Spec's approaching marriage - I would have
gone myself but was under promise to meet several gentlemen
at home, to day, concerning the hiring of Negroes - You no doubt
have heard that, that Spec on the 8th day of January, married the
youngest daughter of James Matson of Bon Bon Long - He
has only two children (daughter) and both to be named the
same wedding - the elder to a Mr. Burbridge of Scote -
great preparation is making on both sides of the house - Matson
is quite wealthy, and Sarah, in behalf of Spec, is desirous
to be out done - I have to buy my first wedding stockings or
tickle, to be paid for afterwards - and here an infar to a Son
wife cost me \$600. or more - It is true that spring bottom Mahogany
chairs - pier Table looking glasses - Purflely carpeting (\$100) - Mante
or hamments - room papering &c may be considered as indispensable &
