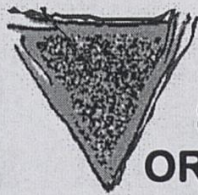

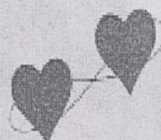
Bluegrass Women's Network

HIV Testing

On Thursday, Dec. 4 there will be free anonymous HIV testing at the Pride Center between 6 pm and 8pm. The oraquick mouth swab technique will be used. This test gives a result in about twenty minutes. If the test is reactive, blood sample will be taken. The results are back in two weeks for the confirmatory blood tests.

Testing will be available at the Pride Center on the first Thursday of each month on an ongoing basis. Another time for testing at the Pride Center will be established if needed.

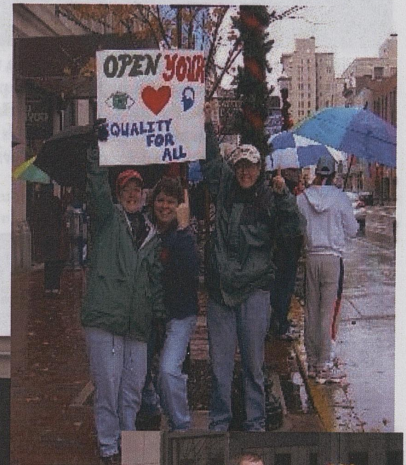
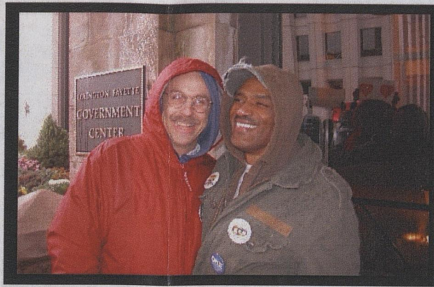

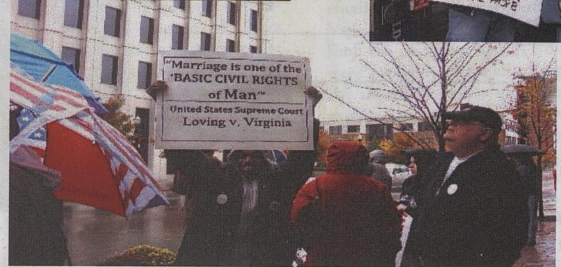

Loving vs. Virginia was a Supreme Court case involving an inter-racial couple that had been arrested in Virginia and charged with illegally co-habiting. Inter-racial marriage was illegal in Virginia and ten other states. The Lovings had been married outside of Virginia. The Supreme Court ruled in their favor, stating that "Marriage is one of the basic civil rights of man." This 1962 decision made the laws in all ten states unconstitutional. **Now its our turn!**

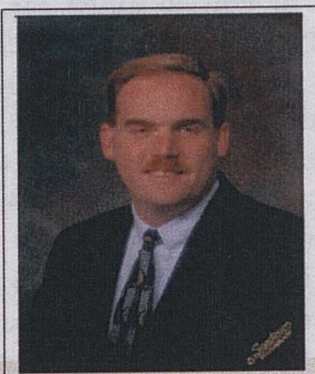

LexFair Recaps the Election

The people at Lexington Fairness are very excited about the results of the November election. Nationally we elected our first black president, Barack Obama, who is a democrat with a tendency toward working with GLBT equality. The vice-president elect, Joe Biden, even went on record as supporting civil unions.

Locally, we rejoiced as well. Former Senator Ernesto Scorsone easily won his bid for district judge. Openly gay for years now, Scorsone has served the LGBT community in many capacities, and we look forward to his continuing his commitment to excellent work and a fair shake in his new position.

In District 3, Diane Lawless won the city council seat. Lawless has been an out-and-about lesbian for 30 years and has advocated for AIDS causes, domestic violence issues, and GLBT equality. Her name stands at the forefront of people who have never tired and never rested in the pursuit of GLBT equality. Her opponent, Eric Thomason, is a 27-year-old gay man. Currently, he is working with historic preservation, but he looks forward in becoming more involved in LGBT issues. While he did not win the race, we look for him to make a huge difference in the future.

Also, LGBT straight-allies Kathy Stein and Kelly Flynn both won their respective races. Stein shifted from her high-profile position in Kentucky's House of Representatives to a seat in the Senate. Flynn then handily swept to victory in a bid for Stein's old House seat. Both of these troopers have shown a deep commitment to pro-Fairness issues. We embrace them both in their new positions and feel confident that they will work diligently toward a fair Kentucky for all.

The LGBT community suffered one stunning defeat in the election. Califor-

nia's Proposition 8 passed, which banned same-sex marriage. The nation's GLBT people, who often look to California as a progressive leader, sat back in shock and frustration and asked themselves, "Where do we go from here?"

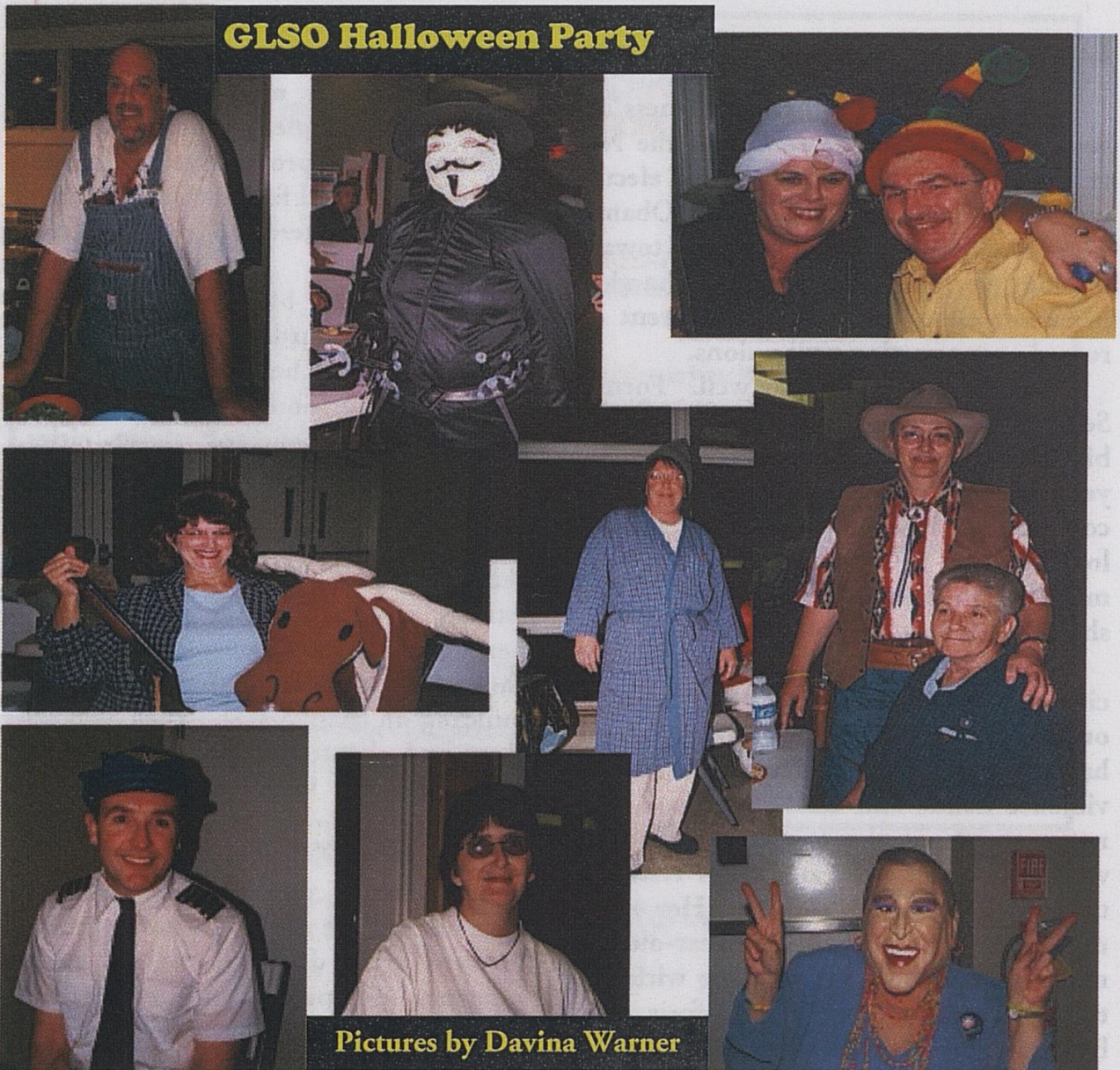
Despite the blow, GLBT people spoke up. Saturday, Nov. 15 cities across the nation held a protest in defiance of Proposition 8. Our very own Lexington was one of those cities. Chris Stapel joined the national effort and organized Lexington's protest, which was a massive success. Even though the weather was horrendous (strong winds, freezing temperatures, heavy rain), well over 100 people showed up in front of the LFUCG city building on Main Street. They held big signs and chanted. The protest ended with speeches from different people including our new council person Diane Lawless.

Obviously, the fight for Fairness goes on, and we must continue pushing forward every day, but we did make progress. Gay people came out in large numbers to cast their votes and use their voice. The election results look positive. Now lets work with our new electees toward a Fair Kentucky.
