## WOMYN'S MUSIC FESTIVALS

Every year there are several dozen womyn's music, comedy, and spirituality gatherings around the country. I was lucky enough to attend three last year, up from my usual one or two. If you have never been to one, you are truly missing some wonderful experiences.

Each festival has its own atmosphere, but from what I here women who attend any of them return home with increased positive feelings about being lesbians. There are usually workshops on a vast array of topics, live musical performances, great shopping, sometimes comedy, dance performances, dance lessons, spiritual rituals, political discussions, and more.

My personal favorite is the Michigan Festival which is the biggest and perhaps most famous. If you are concerned about the size, you might want to go for a few days rather than the whole week to try it out. If you want to start smaller and closer to home try the National Women's music Festival at the end of May, one of the oldest and the only indoor festival, or the Ohio Lesbian Festival near Columbus Ohio on Sept. 6th. This is a one day event which I will write more about later.

Here are some festivals and where to call for more information. All of these festivals are open to all women, most are predominately lesbian. If you will be traveling in other part of the U.S., you can call Mary (266-5904) for other listings. Note W's M Fes. stands for Women's Music Festival.

The concert includes the debut of "Crossing the Ohio", a stirring piece written by Brian Throckmorton which compares the struggle of gays and lesbians today with that of African Americans during the Civil War. Other numbers include "marry Us", from a piece commissioned by the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus; the traditional "We Shall Overcome", and also Throckmorton's arrangement of "The Star Spangled Banner" as sung for a recent Thoroughblades hockey game at Rupp Arena.

## OUT ON VIDEO

In a recent Entertainment Weekly article, I read that the introduction of a lesbian doctor on *ER* brings the 24th lesbigay character to prime time television. That isn't counting Ellen Morgan, the character played by Ellen DeGeneres who is scheduled to come out later this month.

But television isn't alone. More and more lesbigay characters are showing up on the big screen as well. You can find them in supporting roles like Charlane Woodard's lesbian FBI agent in *Eye for an Eye* or starring roles like Robin Williams' and Nathan Lane's middle-aged gay couple in *The Bird Cage*. And while the authenticity of these characters and what these movies say about lesbigays is debatable, I am happy to see more lesbigay images on film.

Of course, with more lesbigay characters on film comes the increase of lesbigay characters in your video store. Big studio films like *The Birdcage* can be found on the shelves of most video stores including supermarkets, and independent and foreign films are showing up at some stores.

Blockbuster (Richmond Rd. and Saron Dr. locations, Cut Corner (S. Limestone), Movie Warehouse and Video Hits (both on Tates Creek Dr.) are video stores where I have found a good selection of lesbigay films. The Richmond Road Blockbuster recently expanded its Alternative Film section, where newly released or re-released foreign and lesbigay films are displayed

In most cases lesbigay films are filed on the shelves alphabetically by category (drama, comedy, etc.). This is great because it doesn't segregate lesbigay films, but it can sure make it difficult for that shy, closeted queer to find lesbigay video. I used to spend hours

## HONORABLE DISCHARGE FOR GAY MARINE

RALEIGH, NC (AP)- A Marine who announced he was gay on national television the same day President Clinton announced his "Don't ask, don't tell" policy was given an honorable discharge and retirement benefits to settle his lawsuit over the rule. "I think what we have proved is that a Marine who happens to be gay can serve just as well as a Marine who's straight with no detriment to morale or lack of mission operation", said Sgt. Justin C. Elzie, a medical supply clerk at Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville.

Elzie, who received his walking papers Thursday, said he got a \$30,000 check as part of his retirement benefits. Elzie, 34, had already been accepted into an early retirement program when he declared on ABC's "World News Tonight" that he is gay. His announcement came on January 29, 1993, the same day that President Clinton agreed to the policy on gays in the military.

That February, the Marine Corps placed Elzie on standby reserve and tried to deny him early retirement and discharge him without benefits. He sued the military in September, 1993, and a month later, a federal judge ordered him placed back on active duty.

Elzie's lawyer, Christopher Sipes, said an honorable discharge after 15 years of service is part of last month's settlement of the lawsuit. "Everybody here is satisfied that the matter has been settled in a mutually agreeable manner that would avoid any further delay, expense, and inconvenience for any of the parties involved," said 1st Lt. Charles E. Campfield, a base spokesman. Campfield said the case was isolated. ¶

This is a Christian church, that by its own slogan is a "Church for all God's people." I think that this event is going to be the most fun show the Bar has seen in a long time. The music will be uplifting and the performers the most talented Lexington has to offer.

As for your worry about what

society thinks about such things: why in the world do you give a rats ass? I don't, and obviously neither does MCC. When you're in the right, you're in the right, and I'll be damned what someone else thinks. What the "Fundamentalists" and, apparently YOU need to realize is that God and Her Son, do NOT care if we are gay---and "being gay" IS being a drag queen, a leather queen, a dike on a bike or---just being an "ordinary" queer! Therefore, if they want to raise money being entertained at a drag show---HALLELUJAH!

However, I will say that some in our community, in my humble opinion, sometimes go too far in public displays and offend the prevailing mores. 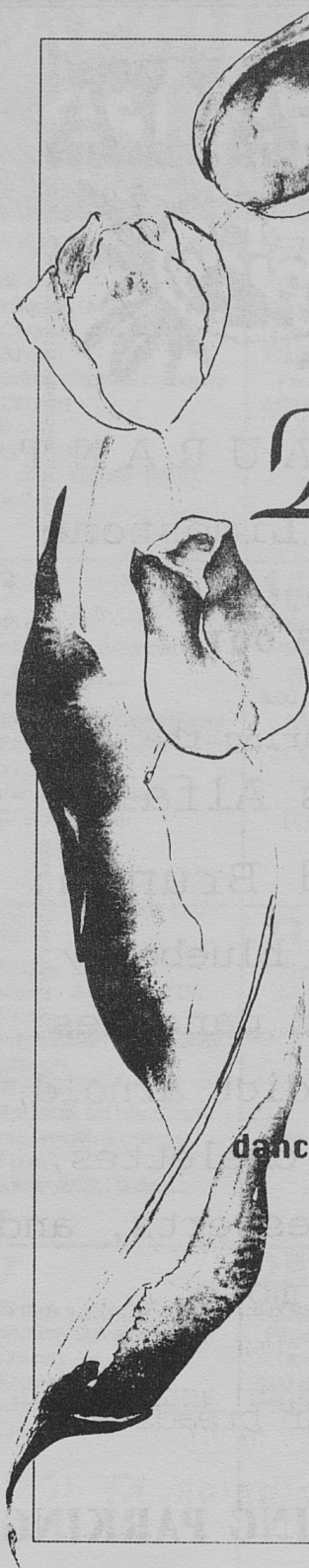

walking up and down aisles, reading the boxes of any film that had the remotest possibility of lesbigay content. Not anymore. Now, I work in a video store, where I can keep track of the latest lesbigay films coming to video. So, stay tuned to the GLSO News for my monthly reviews of lesbigay videos.

Furthermore, support stores that have lesbigay videos, and rent or purchase lesbigay titles. Video stores are like any other business : owners want to make a profit. If lesbigay videos don't make money---they wont carry them. So, get started this month by renting these titles:

**BOUND** A suspenseful drama about two women (Jennifer Tilly and Gena Gershon) who fall in love and plan to steal \$2 Million from the mob. The film is about the Mafia, so expect to see some graphic violence.

**THE CELLULOID CLOSE** An enlightening documentary which examines what movies (from Edison's experimental films to the present) have shown us about being gay.

**THE SUM OF US** An Australian film which tells the touching story of a father's relationship with his gay son. There's also a beautiful sub-plot about the son's lesbian grandmother.

## TROUBLE

Guests by Michael Dorris is a book recommended for ages 8 to 10 and one I recommend to you. It is the first time I have read such a explicit description of a transgendered character, Trouble, in a children's book. Guests is an ALA Notable Children's Book for 1995 and has also received positive reviews in several children's literature magazines.

The book's main character is Moss, a young Native American boy whose "coming of age" struggle is the focus of the story. Moss meets up with Trouble, a girl of his tribe who

he knows only slightly. Angry with his father, Moss recklessly decides to go into the forest for his "away time". Trouble follows his example, even though girls are not supposed to go through such a vision quest.

When they meet in the forest, Moss is amazed to find Trouble in boys clothing. As they talk, Trouble tells Moss the story of Mistake, her aunt who left the tribe years ago rather than settling down to the expected life of a married woman. This aunt was not called Running Woman and Trouble is thinking of following in her footsteps, as she does not feel that she can fit into the role of women in her tribe.

"I can't be the way they want." Trouble says in anguish. "You are who you are, and no one but you can tell you the truth about that," replies Moss. Moss suggests that other girls have been aloud to choose the role of a warrior, giving up their female role in favor of the male role.

In the one day that is covered in this book, Moss and Trouble help each other move toward adulthood. A Native American culture is respectfully represented in this book and the poetic language of the storytelling is particularly delightful. I was particularly impressed with the authors sensitivity to a transgendered character.

If you never read children's literature you are missing some fine books. Buy this one for a child you know. GLSO has ordered a few copies which will be available soon. Look for Guests to appear soon on some right wing banned books list

## FIREBRAND BOOKS NEEDS HELP.

Firebrand Books, an independent publisher of contemporary lesbian writers, is facing financial difficulties in the increasingly inhospitable climate of the corporatized publishing world. In a recent letter, publisher Nancy K. Bereano requests that Firebrand readers buy books and send donations to help Firebrand survive.

For the past twelve years, Firebrand has printed works by such influential writers as Dorothy Allison (*Bastard Out of Carolina*), Allison Bechdel (*Dykes To Watch Out For*), Leslie Feinberg (*Stone Butch Blues*), Minnie Bruce Pratt (*Crimes Against Nature, S/HE*) and Audre Lorde. It is a well respected publisher in the gay community having received ten Lambda Literary Awards since 1989.
