Kentucky Senators Failing LesBiGay Community

The recent debate over President Clinton's decision to lift the ban on homosexuals in the military led to a Senate vote over a compromise that will allow for a six month period to consider the proposed change. The Feb. 4th vote ended with a 62 to 37 passage. Kentucky Senator Wendell Ford (D) voted for the bill while Kentucky's other Senator, Mitch McConnell (R) voted against the bill. Senator Ford, who received considerable support locally from lesBigay Democratic volunteers in his November reelection, responded in a recent letter to Editor Jeff Jones as follows: "In all honesty, I must tell you that I remain firm in my stance against lifting the ban. However, I am willing to take the time to thoroughly review the issue and listen to the opposing view."



The group contributed to the national movement to lift the ban on gays and lesbians in the military by distributing hundreds of fliers at the Bar Complex, Joe's, Alfalfa's, Crossings, the Unitarian Universalist Church, and the University of Kentucky campus featuring the telephone numbers of the White House, Sen. Ford, and Rep. Baesler. Remember that the religious right has mobilized to keep the ban from being lifted by inundating lawmakers with phone calls and letters, so it is vital that we let them know that we are a real political force as well by calling the numbers on the flyers.

A lively full house enjoyed the Valentine's Day Dessert Social at Alfalfa's hosted by Fairness to raise funds and awareness. The crowd was treated to sinful sweets and passionate poetry by volunteers from Fairness. Look for information tables for Fairness at the upcoming concert by Heather Bishop and the play "Sisters." Be sure to stop in and say hi, and see how you can get involved.

Lack of direction is often a problem of new organizations, so at the general meeting on February 8th, the campaign elected a nine-member steering committee to guide them in the early stages of growth. The group will have their first meeting on March 8th and will report their results at the general meeting on Monday, March 22 at 7:30 at Alfalfa's. We will also be hearing reports from Tomi Ross, Brad Garrett, and Laura Kaplan, who attended a conference on creating change in Los Angeles recently. The community is encouraged to attend the general meeting and get involved in creating change at a grass roots level. Why? Because this community is our community!

Colorado continues to feel the fury of a nationwide boycott of the state over Amendment 2, which bans civil rights based on sexual orientation. The American Mathematical Society and several other large conventions have pulled out of Denver and other Colorado cities. To show their support for a repeal of Amendment 2, the town of Telluride passed a sexual orienation clause for their town fully knowing that Amendment 2 makes such clauses illegal. There has also been an enormous increase in reports of harassment and violence to Denver's Gay and Lesbian Community Center's Anti-Violence Project. The Denver Police Department, however, says they have seen no increase in reported attacks. The GLCC says that 75% of their callers say they will or would not report their attacks to the police. Right-wing, fundamentalist Christian groups have targeted 13 states including Ohio and Idaho for initiatives similar to Colorado's Amendment 2.

EKU Groups Makes Some Changes

Eastern Kentucky University's lesBigay support group has undergone a re-structuring. The group has now changed its name from GLSSO to GUESS (Gays United in Education, Service and Support). Also, GUESS will now hold two monthly meetings that are primarily aimed at homo/bisexuals and are not publically announced. Every other meeting will be "open" and announced to the general public as a forum. For example, the March 3 meeting is an open forum on "Alternative Lifestyles." The March 29 forum will focus on "Discrimination, Prejudice and Hate Crimes." For more information, contact Laurie Davison at (606) 623-6844.

NEWS SHORTS



WASHINGTON, DC: AIDS Free America has begun to issue certificates stating that doctors, dentists, restaurant workers or anyone with a doctor's note declaring her/his HIV- status is HIV Negative. This business is making money issuing certificates based on unsubstantiated documentation where a person might well not yet show a positive reaction to an HIV test. AIDS services are warning people against this scam.

DALLAS: A Texas Appellate Court upheld a lower court decision that Texas' same sex only sodomy law violated the state constitution in a case involving a lesbian denied employment by the Dallas' police department. The sodomy law is still legal in Texas but is currently before the Texas Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, DC: President Clinton has said that he will lift the ban on HIV+ immigrants and visitors to the U.S. This ban was the cause for the move of last year's international AIDS conference from Boston to Amsterdam at considerable loss to Boston businesses.

ISRAEL: Under pressure from international outrage, the Israeli government has backed away from its new policy of denying entry to any immigrant who is HIV+. The government now exempts Soviet emigres and Ethiopian Falasha Jews. There is speculation that this law may violate a section of the Israeli constitution providing for the return of any Jew who so wishes to Israel.

WASHINGTON, DC: San Francisco City Council Member, Roberta Achtenburg, has been appointed by President Clinton to become Assistant Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Achtenburg is the highest placed openly lesbian woman to hold office in the U.S.

MIAMI: Attorney General appointee Reno publically stated that she is "just an old maid who likes guys." During her recent reelection campaign as Dade County District Attorney, Reno was publically outed by gay radicals. At that time, she did not publically acknowledge nor deny that she was bisexual or a lesbian.

NORTH CAROLINA: ACT-UP Triangle in Raleigh won its case against the NC Commission for Health Services to have anonymous testing re-instated in all 100 county health departments. Since 1991, anonymous testing was limited to 17 health departments after a political campaign by right-wing conservatives to limit testing sites.

MADISON, WI: The US Postal Service has chosen Madison resident, Jean Anne Hlavecek's design for the first AIDS awareness stamp. 12 other countries have already issued such a stamp.

CAMBRIDGE, MA: Kenneth Reeves, the mayor of Cambridge, has come out as the first openly gay, black mayor in the US.

Parent Tales: Adoption Options

International adoption elicits three words from almost any attorney: money, time and heartbreak. Ann and I considered adopting out of Brazil because it was the least expensive: a \$5000 "donation" to the orphanage and approximately \$8000 in legal/translating fees. So our initial cost was about \$13,000. But, the time involved also included cost.

My friend Chris went through with it, so let me tell you her story: Chris flew to South America and made the arrangements to adopt her daughter. She knew which child was to be hers on the trip but could not take her home. Rather, the child went into "foster care" (which Chris paid for) while the six months of paperwork slowly churned away. Those six months of wondering what kind of care her daughter was receiving were Once the paperwork was agonizing. completed, Chris had to fly back to Brazil and live there for six weeks while the adoption was finalized. Her daughter was able to live with her but not only was this costly but an extremely difficult way to start off your parenting: in a foreign country with a 9 month old!

Our other friends who attempted to adopt out of India faced an even more tragic time. For two years they waited to bring home the little boy whose picture was taped to their refrigerator. But when they finally flew to India, they were shocked to find him profoundly retarded. It was a horrible decision for them: to leave behind a child they knew they could not provide for but had already given their hearts.

One local attorney suggested that


international adoption might be easier through church missionaries or by being stationed overseas in the armed services. And in fact, this is how many of the Romanian child adoptions were arranged recently.

These situations are the downside. The other side is Chris who now has a beautiful 2 year old. Two other friends have also adopted two baby girls with not as much hassle but greater cost from Chile.



Homo Holidays: International

This article continues information on lesBigay travel destinations as provided partially by the International Gay Travel Association 1-(800) 448-8550 to find locally affiliate agencies. Several areas have lured American

lesBigays for years:

1. London was the #1 travel destination for lesBigay travelers in 1990 according to the IGTA. The city hosts a rich history as well as several gay districts including Earl's Court and the trendy West End. As one friend has said: "with a great club scene, fabulous theater AND tons of antiques, it's a queen's dream!" Of course, they already have a real one.

2. The Napoleonic Code was one of the first law codes to de-criminalize homosex and Paris's culture and social/legal tolerance has attracted gays for centuries. Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Tolkas, Josephine Baker and many others did and continue to find both haven and heaven here. The food is also supposed to be kinda good.

3. Mexico's traditional tourist sites also lure a hefty number of "family" members to Acapulco, Cancun, Mazatlan and Guadalajara. Guadalajara, however, was to host the International Gay and Lesbian Association's meeting but local authorities were so against it that they closed all the city's gay bars for awhile. So, you might want to skip Guadalajara and also Mexico City where there has been a rash of brutal murders aimed at local gay activists. Stay to the beaches.

4. Amsterdam and the Netherlands pride themselves on its tradition of tolerance. As such, 17 cities in the country have legalized gay marriages. Besides the more high brow attractions such as Rembrandt and tulips, the city and nearby Rotterdam have a thriving sex industry and drug trade. As anywhere, AIDS is a very real threat.

5. Thailand's #1 source of foreign revenue is tourism and studies find that at least 20% of that is sex tourism. This is not lost on the US government which managed to have layovers for returning Persian Gulf vets in Bangkok. Besides the brothels and bars, Thailand offers a beautiful country with great beaches at Phukot and a Buddhist society surprisingly free of homophobia. In fact, bisexuality is considered common in the country although there is family pressure to eventually marry (a la heterosexual)

6. Berlin was the early center of gay studies and activism at the turn of the century. Nazi purges led to concentration camps where the pink triangle marking male homosexuals led to the adoption of this international symbol. The black triangle for lesbians also came out of the Holocaust. Again today, Berlin is a thriving gay cultural center. Be sure to see the recent memorial to gay and lesbian Holocaust victims placed on the Berlin Wall. Other German cities such as Hamburg also have large gay communities where large ads for gay "sex clubs" are

common in the city's subways.

7. Lesbos, a Greek island in the Aegean Sea, has become a summer mecca for lesbians seeking the homeland of Sappho and wanting to mix with the Lesbian (capital L) natives of the island. There is relatively little attesting to Sappho on the island other than a large summer encampment of women. Nearby Mykonos attracts more gay male visitors.

8. Rio de Janeiro's beautiful beaches, Carnival, and people attract many tourists of all sexual orientations. Brazil and Rio have, however, recently suffered a sharp rise in murders of gays with foreigners especially targeted

by the homophobes.

9. Toronto has been called "New York run by the Swiss" for its cosmopolitan life in a clean, ethnically integrated city. Yonge St. is the center of the gay district with a neighboring "Lesbian Quarter" with many lesbian residences.

10. Australia is reputed to have more homosexuals per capita than any other country. Such a statistic is dubious but Australia's urban areas and beaches sport a large gay culture. Only Tasmania has a sodomy law and several Aussie states have gay rights laws. Sydney, Melbourne, the northeastern "Gold Coast" beaches and Brisbane, the capital of quaintly named "Queensland", are the centers of gay life in Australia. Sydney's Oxford Street is the Castro District of Australia.

Just Who Calls: The GLSO Gayline The GLSO Gayline is the first contact point with our community for many people. Whether it is the lesbian or gay traveler calling from a local hotel for information on events or a frightened soul just coming out, this valuable service is often the safest, most efficient and in some cases, only, connection with the many groups of people making up Lexington's lesBigay community. Many of you reading this have probably called this number at some time to find information that has led you to various groups and new friends. Yet, this vital service is little recognized and something of a mystery to many lesBigay central Kentuckians.

The Gayline is an all-volunteer service. When not actively operated by a volunteer, a voicemail directory provides information on many of the services in our area. Unfortunately, changes to this messaging system requires a 2-3 hour re-taping of the ENTIRE message. So, it is necessary to staff the line to provide updated information as well as a friendly voice to welcome people

into our community.

Volunteers begin by attending the monthly Phoneline meeting on the first Monday of each month. After training with an experienced volunteer while actually staffing the line, a volunteer is ready for callers. Many callers, however, have some vague idea of some "GLSO Central" atop some office building downtown. In truth, calls are forwarded from the voicemail system to the volunteer's home or office for the 8pm to 11pm shifts on Wed., Thurs., Fri., and Sundays. Staffers may choose to volunteer for as little as once a month. At this time, all the volunteers are male and there is a desperate need for women volunteers. Many lesbians and bisexual women call who are just coming out and although our male staffers are quite friendly, a woman's voice would be a valuable addition to serving our community.

Many cities the size of Lexington or larger do not have such hotlines. In fact, Louisville's phoneline recently shut down for awhile from a lack of money and volunteers. The GLSO Gayline costs over \$130 per month and is paid entirely by donations, GLSO News ads and memberships. Your money is

But, let's say you do volunteer. Just what kind of calls can you expect? Well, some nights you may receive no calls at all and can spend the evening kicked back watching Star Trek. But, a volunteer usually can expect around 5 calls per night. Not surprisingly, many are calls from people seeking information on bars and gay/lesbian nightlife. Many people new to the community may also call seeking to know about the various organizations here or perhaps wanting referrals to gay-positive lawyers, counselors or doctors. The calls that perhaps most make this phoneline so important are the women and men (young and old) who are just coming out and make that first step of calling the Gayline. Just the knowledge that Lexington supports such a wide variety of groups catering to the diversity of lesBigay people can empower these callers and make them feel less isolated and alone.

March Is Women's History Month

Many risks and contradictions come with naming March "Women's History Month." A single, special month devoted to the historical importance of women might tempt the uncritical thinker to see women's history as a small and separate contribution to the mainstream — or, to use George Ella Lyon's term — the menstream of "history." separate women's history month parallels the menstream academic attempt to segregate women's importance as historical actors to the "womanly" aspects of society like family. sexuality, homelife or religion. A separate women's history month might reinforce in the menstream a belief in the marginal importance of women in history.

Despite these risks, a separate women's history month and a separate women's history are necessary, at least for now. Things have been out of balance for so long that some forceful remediation is indispensable. Women's history shares, along with the risks of affirmative action, the thing that gives it the potential to work: the simple presence of diversity subverts institutional structures based on exclusion. Historians of women are uncovering through their work the inconsistencies and partial truths of menstream history that have long justified political and social injustices. history has gone beyond the initial stage of adding women to history and now empowers the critical thinker to trace power relations through the very historical contradictions that gender analysis uncovers. The "addition" of women to traditional history has destabilized the tired old stories of Man's epic past. It has partaken of a social democratic levelling in history, where workers, children, slaves, and owners are recognized as equally related in the real world and ranked only by

coercive force.

The contemporary affirmation of women's agency and importance in history has decentered Man in a way that parallels the social conditions of our times. Alongside historians of women, everyday women struggle to find the balance in our personal lives between our victimization under gendered oppression and the freedom and empowerment that inheres in the dailiness of our lives. We seek healing and empowerment through recovering and reclaiming our personal and family histories. We seek the histories of our mothers and sisters, even as we look toward the futures of our daughters and selves. History has yielded our lives, and that makes the past immensely important. The devotion of the month of March to recognize and honor the history of women is a rich, mixed, complex and compelling part of our times.


