
Fraternity gives \$4,000 for research on cancer

\$4,000 for cancer research this weekend by running a football 100 miles to Cincinnati. Fraternity member Scott Griffin received the football from UK chapter President Mat Arnold to launch the non-stop relay in the freezing weather 4:20 pm. Friday. UK police provided an escort and a van to transport fraternity members, and several supporting vehicles followed the runners all the way up Route 25 to Nipper Stadium, where the last runner arrived with the UK-Cincinnati game ball around 11 an. Saturday. The money was raised by collecting pledges and auctioning a football autographed by UK coach Bill Curry, said Chip Crawford, chairman of the event. Crawford said. 28 UK students teamed up with Fiji members at the Leading cause of death in America. "Practically everyone has been cunched by this tragic disease." Crawford said. "This year, about 1,30,000 people will be diagnosed as having cancer. Over half will die within the next year — that is a rate of about 1,400 people a day."

The fund-rasing project had special significance for two members of the UK fraternity because their fathers currently are battling cancer, he added.

Conservative pundit calls for legalization

Nationally renowned conservative William F. Buckley Jr. told a
Lexington audience Thursday night
the federal government should legalize the sale of all drugs to anyone 21 or older.

The drugs should be available exclusively through federal government agencies at the lowest possible
cost to make black-market saise
unprofitable, Buckley said in a
speech at the Lexington Horse Center.

Any profits from the sale of these

speech at the Lexington Horse Center.

Any profits from the sale of these
drugs at the federal level should
then go to drug education programs,
said Buckley, best known for
founding the right-wing magazine
"National Review" and for hosting
the PBS show "Fring Line."

Buckley also commented on trecent presidential election, openly
criticizing President-elect Clinton
and claiming that President Bush
lost because he was a "victim of the
business cycle."

Buckley said Bush's mistake in
what he called a theatrical reelection campaign was that he attacked
Clinton's ability rather than proving
his own to voters.

Bush's relentless attacks on Clinton further alienated voters, who were starting to lean toward Clinton, he said. Bush's image as a pa-

umnist blasted Clinton and running mate Al Gore for changing their positions from anti-abortion to abortion rights to fit the mold of the Democratic Party.

Buckley

Buckley said that politicians who say they are personally against abortion but believe it is the deci-sion of the woman are more afraid to run the risk of losing than they are committed to define personal

The speech was the first in ries spoech was the first in a series sponsored by WUKY-FM and WKYT-TV. The series also will feature ABC newsman Sam Donaldson on Jan. 19 and political satirist Mark Russell on March 11.

\$101,000 grant to fund equine disease research

A \$101,000 grant has been awarded to UK researcher John F. Timoney to develop more effective vaccines against equine streptococeal disease.

Streptococci cause serious respiratory- and reproductive-tract diseases in horses and are the most important bacterial equine diseases, said Timoney, Keeneland professor of infectious diseases at UK.

His laboratory recently discovered the DNA sequence of a protein gene of a streptococci that evades the immune system response in horses.

With information on how this protein is put together, Timoney and his staff will seek out unknown variables in similar proteins to develop an understanding of their molecular structures.

This understanding may reveal how the proteins resist horses' immune systems, leading to development of more effective synthetic vaccines.

The grant is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Engineering society formed

The first plodge ceremony was held Friday for UK's new Order of the Engineer, a student engineering society sponsored by the Accrediting Board for Engineering and Technology.

Professional engineers and students within one year of graduating were invited to take the pledge, which reads in part, "When needed, my skill knowledge shall be given without reservation for the public good."

The Order of the Engineer has no membership dues or meetings. Rather, members are bound together by their common oath and purpose, said David Blythe, a retired engineering dean and professor.

"The goal is to reinforce their professional ethics as they go out into jobs," he said, "The oath reminds students to think about the consequences of their designs and actions on the environment and other peonle."

Supermarkets donate money to library campaign

Foodtown Supermarkets donated \$1,500 to the Commonwealth Library Book Fund during halftime of the UK-Vanderbill game Nov. 7.

The fund, which will be used to purchase materials for UK's proposed central library, receives \$1 from the National Endowment for the Humanities for every \$3 collected from private donors.

Foodtown is donating \$100 for each sack made by UK football players this season.

"We believe that academics and athletics work together to make UK a great University, and this program reflects our support of both," said Bob Slone, Foodtown president.

UK editor wins national noetry award

Leff Worley, associate editor of UK's "Odyssey" magazine on research, has won the national Still Waters Press Fourth-Annual Winter Poetry Competition.

Worley wrote the winning collection of poems, tilted "Natural Selections," in collaboration with Lance Olsen, associate professor of English at the University of Idaho and a former assistant professor of English at UK.

The collection, which focuses on animal life, exhibits an "exquisite empathy with the animal world...
and the sense of the human struggle with inevitabilities of life on earth," said Shirley Warren, editor of
Still Waters Press in Galloway Township, N.J.
Worley, whose poetry has appeared in dozens of publications, earned his bachelor's degree in English
and master's in fine arts in creative writing from Wichita State University.

He has won many poetry awards, including a \$20,000 fellowship in creative writing for 1991 from the
National Endowment for the Arts.

It has been a while since this band has penetrated the ears of America with its brand of pop rock. Over the past four years, Bon Jovi had, for all intents and purposes, disbanded.

A few members embarked on solo careers, while the others apparently sat at home (probably because Bon Jovi is the only band that will hire them).

After reveling in their new experiences, the band members transmitted their ideas into Keep the Faith, the group's first album since 1988's multiplatium New Jersey.

The main problem is that if this album is a culmination of Bon Jovi's efforts and works, then, well, hat's pretty sad. Although the cover of the album doesn't have a "Parental Advisory — Explicit Lyries" sticker, it should at least feature a label inscribed "Caution — May Induce Vorniting."

Change seems to be the primary theme of this album. However, the most prominent change seems to be lead singer Jon Bon Jovi's transformation into an unnatural merging of Bono and John Mellencamp.

In fact, on the song "In These Arms," JBJ can be heard crooning in what sounds like a bad imitation of U2's frontman. You almost expect him to launch into the chorus of "With or Without You."





Reflections on last year's gubernatorial race

Stove Top Stuffing, Brereton Jones and Larry Hopkins

FRANKFORT, Ky. — A spokesman for Republican gubernatorial candidate Larry Hopkins yesterday alleged that a recent Berecton Jones and misleadingly claims that a Larry Hopkins commercial falsely implies that a Jones TV spot has wrongly accused Hopkins of running deceit, and adversements about Jones negative anti-Hopkins spots.

The recent furor comes in the wake of Hopkins' statement on Monday that, if elected, he personally will tear down every abortion clinic in Kentucky with his bare hands. In a clarifying statement reclased later, a Hopkins spokesman noted that the congressman "was merely being hypothetical."

When pressed for an explanation of that statement, another Hopkins spokesman explained in another clarifying statement that any assumption that Hopkins would ever be governor was merely hypothetical.

The spokesman went on to say that any loony Hopkins remark uttered in the past six months could



therefore be chalked up as "hypo

At a Brereton Jones campaign ap-pearance a few hours later, the Democratic nominee reiterated that he was "personally firmly anti-pro-life-choice."

he was "personally firmly anti-pride-choice."

Given the Hopkins camp's need to correct the candidate's occasional gaffes, the campaign announced today that every Hopkins' appearance would feature a squad of spokesmen on stage alongside the candidate. By doing this, the campaign announced, one or more of the spokesman could clarify each confusing Hopkins remark just after it tumbles out of his mouth.

"We hope," the spokesmen announced in unison, "to eliminate the period of confusion that follows Congressman Hopkins' public statements."

In response to the new Hopkins

In response to the new Hopkins plan, top officials of the Jones campaign announced that the lieutenant governor's statements are so mind-numbingly vague that confusion and shock virtually are impossible. Therefore, there is no talk at the present time of adopting the Hop-

kins plan.

"When you announce you're in favor of the flag, apple pie or puppies," a Jones staffer explained, "who's going to be confused?" The anonymous staffer went on to praise the lieutenant governor's escaled "wersatility for vaguestility for organizatility for organizatility for organizatility for organization of complex issues on which Jones has been completely hazy and unclear. When Jones learned of this new Hopkins slogan, which will be seen on road signs and sung in new TV spots by "Mr. Dead," a badly charred palomino, he noted that Hopkins' negative campaign tactics were an insult to the process. "When you're a check-bouncing, union-busting do-nothing." Jones said, "all you can do is engage in name-calling, which is a sure sign of desperating the sign of the president Dan Quayle is scheduled to visit the Commonwealth of Hopkins campaign official explained that Quayle's presence on the campaign trail is designed to make Hopkins seem much more intelligent by comparison.



come to the University knowing something of how to get along in an multicultural setting.

"There isn't a black person in this country who doesn't live in an integrated world," he said. "The same thing cannot be said for whites."

The process toward voluntary inhistorically slow. The The process toward voluntary in-tegration is historically slow. The leaders of the individual greek groups on both sides say they are willing to work with members of the other group, but with a few ex-ceptions they seem to be waiting for someone else to make the first move.

Like groups of teenagers standing on opposite sides of a juniorhigh gym, each waits for the other to do the asking, while the dance floor remains largely empty.

To understand the lack of contact, it's important to look at the differences in the histories, practices and philosophies of the two systems. The white fraternities belong to the National Interfraternity to cuncil, the white sororities to the National Panthellenic Council and the black organizations to the Nathe black organizations to the Na-tional Pan-Hellenic Council.

The black fraternities and sororithe black fraterintes and solorities, particularly on a predominantly white campus like UK, have fewer members. Of the eight NPHC groups only one, Kappa Alpha Psi social fraternity, has its own house. Membership to these

groups averages about 10 per chap-ter.

Among the white organizations, all but three have houses and membership averages about 93 per chapter (113 for sororities, 72 for fraternities).

Traternities)

The disparity in numbers is one hindrance to groups from the different organizations teaming up.

"The lack of numbers is always a problem for the historically black greek groups," Associate Dean of Students Victor Hazard said. It may make projects or joint activities more difficult to coordinate, but "that still should not release predominantly white (grock) groups from continuing to ask."

The process by which the organizations admit new members is different as is the overall (cours of the

zations admit new members is dif-ferent, as is the overall focus of the two.

two.
"Their philosophies are indeed different," Hazard said. "Predominantly white greek groups evolved for social outlets." However, all greek organizations perform some type of philambropy. All the black organizations, from their founding, Hazard said, have been focused on community service, particularly community service, particularly service geared toward the black

community.

These and other differences among the systems have left UK's greeks with a governing body that is diverse mostly on paper. Representatives from the black groups are hard to find at IFC or Panhellenic meetings.

Kappa Alpha Psi President Scott Mason said the reason is simple.

"A lot of the things that IFC and

He added that the NPHC groups feel excluded because very few of the topics that pertain to us are ever discussed or brought up."

Outgoing IFC President Jeremy Bates said the council would be glad to address their needs, but "they've never come to the meet-ings consistently to consistently voice their concerns."

Alpha Kappa Alpha President Kim Mayo was also critical of the current system for governing the greeks, calling it "ineffective."

greeks, calling it "ineffective."
"It's been working for them, but
it's not doing a thing for us." She
said the University needs to better
serve the needs of black fratemities
and soronties so that their represen-tatives don't find themselves "sitting in a meeting for two hours
violding your thumbs wishing you
were home taking a nap."

outgoing Panhellenic President Valerie Shimfessel said she under-stood that the NPHC groups had different agendas, but "we're not aware of what they need." She said it was hard to accommodate groups whose "voices aren't concerned un-til after the fact."

Hemenway said opening commu-nication is vital to the cause of bringing the two systems together.

"I think it's important for there to be a dialogue, a continuing dia-logue between all the elements of the greek system," he said. "Obvi-ously, the dialogue depends on the students taking the initiative."

see. "I thought he was getting ready to hit me or something."

Mason said he resents any implication that violence was inevitable. "Does it always have to be a fight?" he asked. "Just because I'm black, does that mean I can't handle this in a constructive manner? Does there always have to be a fight?"

There was no fight. Mason took the matter to the Office of the Dean of Students.
"It was never, ever an issue of discipline," said Victor Hazard, associate dean of students, who oversees disciplinary actions. "Everyone is entitled to their own opinion."

The First Amendment protects the right to freedom of speech, he said. But he advised the two fraterity presidents that "the way you fight that type of free speech is with free speech."

Out of the mediations between the two came the presentation of the video. "True Colors" to a greek audience on Oct. 19.

The video follows two men —
one black, one white, each dressed
almost exactly alike. The men enter
stores and a hidden camera records
how differently they are treated by
store personnel.

Mason estimated about 70 people

attended the event, and he said, "I felt pretty good about it overall." Still, he said it doesn't erase the poster's image from his mind. "It's like having someone walk up to you and for no reason at all just smack you in the face." Shortly after the incident, he said, Van Arsdale called him.

Mason said Van Arsdale told him the poster wasn't intended to be of-fensive. "'It's just a joke. It was humor. It's funny.'" Leech said his fraternity brother probably thought of it as one of those "things that are funny in closed company — things that white people joke about."

Asked if he thought incoming pledges would harbor racism, Leech said, "There's no way to

"That issue just isn't brought up when they're coming through," he

Van Arsdale denied the conversa-tion took place, saying Mason hung up on him as soon as he identified himself. Beyond that, he declined to present his side of the story.

"I don't want to comment," he said. "I'd rather just let it die."


