Fire scorches dorm's decorations

Up in flames: Blanding Tower blaze burns campus with second arson case in 3 months

An act of arson prompted the evacuation of Blanding Tower early Friday morning. UK Fire Marshal Garry Beach said no one was hurt in the second arson case in three months on South Campus. Two bulletin boards, decorations on three residence hall doors and one trash can were set on fire. The fire was reported to Beach's office at 5 a.m. Friday. Sarah Jones, a communication freshman, said she smelled smoke in her 13th floor room

when the fire alarm went off.

"They burned the Valentine balloons on our door, she said.

Other floor residents alsomelied smoke, but Lindsey French, an undeclared freshmether, with all of the smoke, the sprinklers never went off." French said.

Some students thought it was another flase alarm.

"I was mad when the alarm went off. I thought it was a prank," said Jennifer Pinnick, a pre-plarmacy freshman.

delivered his inaugural address, where he challenged students to start dreaming big.

Trio says stunt not 'Jackass' reenactment

Differing views: Police report said students involved were copying popular MTV show, but pranksters said the idea came from friends

The three UK students arrested Thursday night by UK Police following a simulated kidnapping prank say that their activities had nothing to do with the MTV show "Jackass"

"I'd never seen the show," said Skirfido Mendez, an undeclared freshman, who was charged with disorderly conduct. Robert Wiggington, an art studio sophomore, and Aaron Cox, an undeclared freshman, were also charged with disorderly conduct, a misdemeanor. Mendez said that he got the idea from several of his friends who had pulled a similar prank nearly two years ago.

Yet, according to the police report, the students told the of-

ficers that they were reenacting a prank they had seen on "Jackass."

Cox said that he did mention to one of the officers that he had seen something similar on TV, but the reason that Cox and his friends pulled this prank had nothing to do with the show, he explained.

"We were bored," Cox said.
Mendez suggested the fake kidnapping, which the three later enacted on Complex Drive at around 12-45 Thursday night.

Wiggington and Mendez pretended to assault Cox and place him in the trunk of a gray fland.




"It was an amazing experience for the students and everyone involved," McCorvey said. "It plan to do it every two or three years."



Students should curb credit card use

As the nation frets over financial woes, college students have their own share of problems.

Thanks to credit card companies' ever-increasing marketing schemes, credit has be-

come easily attainable to college students. Credit card representatives swarm college campuses, and student applications flood mailboxes. Even at local bookstores, flyers

campuses, and student applications flood mailboxes. Even at local bookstores, flyers and applications are slipped into bags on book-buying days.
But unless these practices are curbed, college-aged credit junkies will create a society of dysfunctional money managers.

It's no secret that credit card companies aggressively target young people. And it's working, too. According to the Fannie Mae Foundation, 78 percent of college students own credit cards. That's up from 87 percent in 1998.

Ironically, students are profitable customers for credit card companies. Without full-time jobs, students rack up credit card debts with no means of paying them off. High interest rates on unpaid balances create higher profits. So, in this case, poorer customers equal lucrative customers.

But the consequences are weighty. And the statistics are shocking. Fannie Mae reports that the average credit card debt of college students is nearly \$3,000 — not to mention another \$12,000 in student loans. And nearly 10 percent of college-age credit card holders have more than \$7,000 of debt on their cards. Credit has become a crutch for students to live beyond their means. students to live beyond their means

The idea of "scrimping and saving" has become a foreign concepts. And delayed gratification has lost its meaning.

Apparently, the only solution is to join the credit card club. They say prevention is the best medicine. So credit card companies should ease up on college students.






