

Turpin jury sequestered

After nearly 4½ hours of deliberation, the jury recommending sentences for Elizabeth Turpin and Karen Brown reached no decision last night and was sequestered for the evening. Court will reconvene at 10 this morning.

Both women could face the death penalty for their parts in the murder of UK graduate Michael Turpin, Elizabeth's husband. Brown and Turpin were convicted of murder in the case Thursday night.

According to instructions given to the jury yesterday, the jury can recommend sentences ranging from 20 years in prison to death for Brown and Turpin, depending on whether there were aggravating circumstances in the murder.

WASHINGTON — Americans are buckling up and di-eting more, but less than half the people exercise regularly, and many have problems with stress, concluded a new gov-ernment study released yesterday.

"There is evidence that seat belt use is increasing rap-idly," the National Center for Health Statistics said in the seath struk!

health study.

It found that the percentage of adults wearing seat belts most of the time increased from 30 percent in the first three months of 1985 to 41 percent over the last three

months.
"This no doubt reflects the impact of seat belt legislation in many states during 1985," said the report, based on a survey of 36,399 households last year. That finding contrasted with a preliminary report covering the first half of the year, which said only about one adult in three wears

Otherwise, the newly released year-end fir Otherwise, the newly released year-end findings were millar to those reported for the first half of 1985, includ-g concern about weight loss through dieting, failure of ost people to exercise and continued reduction in ciga-tes smoking. Half of the adults responding to the survey ported at least moderate stress in their lives.

Autoworker indicted as war criminal

JERUSALEM — Prosecutors formally charged retired U.S. autoworker John Demjanjuk yesterday with torturing prisoners at a Nazi death camp and operating gas chambers in which hundreds of thousands were killed.

The 26-page indictment accused him of "crimes of incomparable severity," including stabbing prisoners and tearing off pieces of their flesh, while serving as a guard at the Treblinka camp in German-occupied Poland during World War II. Conviction could bring the death penalty.

Demjanjuk, 66, was born in the Soviet Ukraine and worked at a plant in Cleveland. He was extradited from the United States in February, accused of being the sadistic guard Jewish prisoners called Ivan the Terrible.


