ACCESS TO LOCIS FOR UK/FACULTY/STAFF/STUDENTS

LOCIS, the Library of Congress Information System, will be available on the UK campus through May, 1990. The UK Libraries are participating in a pilot project to make this system available via remote electronic access outside of Washington, D.C., for the first time since its development. The system provides access, not only to all of the books, serials, manuscripts, maps, music, and AV materials available in the Library of Congress, but to all copyright registrations, LC's internal research referral files containing information on over 14,000 research organizations, the Congressional Research Service's (CRS) bill digest system for tracking historical and current legislation, and CRS's own list of sources used to write reports for Congressional offices and committees since 1976.

To gain access to this system, see your branch librarian or the staff members in either the Government Publications (GPD) or Reference Departs in King Library South. You may either have them do the search for you, do your own searching in the Search Room in the Reference Department, or register to be a remote user from your office or home.

To inquire about a training session, or to register to be a remote user, you may either call your branch librarian, Government Publications (7-3139), or Reference (7-1631), or, send an e-mail message to either govpub@ukcc (GPD) or refdesk@ukcc (Reference). You may use the UK network (ukcc) to access LOCIS or dial-in directly. Either method will require a personal computer and a modem. 
