'Marital rape' bill passed by House with amendment

FRANKFORT, Ky, — A "marital rape" bill to crase from Kentucky law a spouse's immunity from a rape charge was passed yesterday by the Kentucky House, but with an allegedly weakening amendment.

In its new form, the bill being sent to the Senate would forbid mentioning during a court case on child custody or visitation that a rape or sexual-abuse charge was pending against one of the spouses.

"People use child sexual abuse as a grounds to gain an advantage in custody," said Rep. Bobby Richardson, who proposed the amendment.

"Custody is one of the big issues, and people will do anything that they can to hurt the other party," said Richardson, D. Glasgow.

Although it makes no distinction between the sexes, the bill was intended to put married women on common legal ground with single women currently, married women can charge sexually abusive husbands with assault, but not rape.

The bill's primary sponsor, Rep. Marshall Long, objected in vain to Richardson's amendment, saying it created "a bill of rights for child abusers."

Other opponents said that, in an extreme case, an eyewitness to a hus-and's rape of his wife would be barred from testifying about it in a custo-

Other types and state of his wife would be barred from testifying about it in a detailed by hearing.

"This isn't going to stop mean divorces, but it's not going to (cause) more mean divorces," said Long, D-Shelbyville.

He said the law must be changed because rape by a spouse "is often more brutal and psychologically damaging than rape by a stranger—an act than tot only affects the individuals involved, but also the children."

SGA Senate resolutions address UK traffic

The Student Government Association Senate passed two resolutions at its Wednesday night meeting that would make crossing around campus safer for "the handicapped and elder." Sponsored by Senator at Large Mark Rucker, the first resolution "asks that the speed limits on the streets that surround the University of Kentucky be lowered from 35 mph to 25." The resolution asks for UK to make "the same proposite to the Lexington-Fayette Urban county Government."

The streets affected by the resolution would be Alumni Drive from South Limestone Street to Commonwealth Drive; Columbia Avenue from Rose to High streets; South Limestone from Maxwell to the Rose Street from Limestone junction; Rose Street from the South Limestone junction to Maxwell; and Woodland Avenue from Maxwell Street to Hilltop Drive; and University Drive from Hilltop Drive to Alumni Drive. Rucker said that Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler has placed him on a committee to study ways to improve traffic conditions along Euclid Avenue.



Author Kesey speaks at U of L

LOUISVII.LE, Ky, — The University of Louisville Arts and Sciences English and Language departments presented a lecture Wednesday, Feb. 21 by noted "beat writer" Ken Kesey, author of One Flew Over the Cuckoo' Nest and the subject of Tom Wolfe's Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test.

people in the lecture hall in the
U of L Humannites Building—
some were forced to sit on the
stage because of lack of space—
about the work that went into
producing Caverns, a novel writen by his graduate writing class
at the University of Oregon.

In his introduction, Ed
McClanahan, author of The Natward Man and a former UK professor, said: "I won't pretend to
understand the methods Ken used
to get that group to write a noveel all alone, together." But he
praised both Kesey and the
book.

Kesey said that he saw teachnig the class as a challenge, but

(teaching) my profession, I'm no fool,"

He said that creative writing teachers were usually "unpublished writers teaching unpublished writers how to teach other unpublished writers."

ers how to teach other unpublished writers."

Kesey said that he was intrigued, and a little worried, about the public's reaction to the book because "it was going to have to walk up there with its hat in its hand like any first novel."

Writing, Kesey said, was not "seeking solutions as much as seeking questions to try and find the magic."

the magic."

Kesey said that there is always a voice in a writer's head telling him that "in" he does something he will be rewarded. He described this authority as God, but he said that God could be anything or anyone that wants a writer to limit his artistic output to guidelines other than his own.

"The job of the writer in America is to say 'fuck you' to God," Kesey said. "Fuck you."

attempting to create their own mythology. Older rites of passage, such as hunting, that were relevant for other cultures will not do today, he said.
"That rite (hunting) is only important when you need that deer," Kesey said. "We can't make our own mythology, we need to discover it."

Kesey also said that the U.S. government's "war on drugs" was not about drug abuse but au-

"They want you to bow down o authority," Kesey said, "kindler, gentler means more risons and more prisoners."

He said that the problem is that the government says, "Just Say No or die' (to drong abusers) as if there was no possibility between the two. Cosaine doesn't do anything but make you want more cocaine. ... Nobody abuses peyote, peyote abuses you. "The gin and tonic I'm going to drink in 20 minutes," Kesey told the audience, "is going to be worse than the joint I'm going to smoke."



Sameena Parveen, 13, an eighth-grader at Kettering Middle School in Largo, Md., is intrigued with the underground railroad movement and the role of a virtual unknown, John Henry.

Although started in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson in recognition of the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, celebration of the special month gained momentum when King's birthday became a national holiday. Now, King's January birthday is used as the springboard into February's recognition of other black leaders during special school assemblies, field trips, classroom projects, book reports, skits and plays. "It's good there's a month to remember the accomplishments of the blacks," said Samcena, a native of India. "Some students don't seem to care, and some people dochange their attitudes (toward other races). I think most of the students only act like they really care and then quickly forget."

Bernadine Lyles of the Los Angeles Unified School District, the nation's second largest after New York, said many of the 646 schools start with the King holiday to go

into the programment of the cards.

"That holiday has created much more awareness," said Lyles, instructional adviser of the elementary level for the multicultural unit of the Office of Instruction. "Most students have some idea of the Civil Rights movement and its effect on African American history and culture."

San Francisco schools spokes-woman Madelaine Eaton said all of its 64,000 students participate in a Martin Luther King essay contest as part of Black History Month. The district, which is 20 percent black, also offers students and teachers an array of black American art and language resources but each school is left to develop its own particular programs.

In some other states, the teaching of black history is determined mainly by the size of the black student body and by teachers' inter-

ests.
At Community High School in Carbondale, Ill., English teacher Anna Jackson said there are no special assemblies for either King's birthday or Black History Month.

birthday or Black History Month.
"I really try to integrate black
history throughout the year" by incorporating the works of blacks and
other minorities in the classroom
assignments, said Jackson, one of
six minority teachers. About 30
percent of the 1,000 students at the
school are black or Asian.

"I would say that (the study of black history) has come slowly but we have tried to integrate it as much as possible." Kateri said. For others, the King holiday un-derscores the need to include other cultures in school curriculum and textbooks.

Clayborne Carson, a former civil rights activist who is editor of King's papers—a 15-year project that is expected to result in publication of 12 volumes of King's writings and speeches—said that in many schools the black history focus is merely token.

"It's like we created the occasion before we knew what we were going to do with it," said Carson, who is at American University this semester as a Visiting Landmarks Scholar in American History, "It's going to be a long process moving from tokenism to meaningful content. We've just begun that process."

Nannette McGee, consultant for

social studies education in the Georgia Department of Education, said that although textbooks have been written about blacks in Amer-ica, "It just seems that ... they be-came old and out of date and they were not used because of that." Social studies textbooks have not been undated in five years, she said.

social studies textbooks have not been updated in five years, she said. Murdell McFarlin of the Atlanta Public Schools agreed. "School officials aren't replacing the books right now because it's not the state-scheduled time, but they are supplementing them with essays and other information," McFarlin said.

"Rochester has taken a steep has many districts that I've seen. Not in intent but in actions," Swartz said. "What we are doing that's different is committing the resources and dollars. We are solidly on the cutting edge of movement in this

Jack Gaffney, social studies pro-gram coordinator for the San Diego Unified School District, said the district tries to incorporate "a strong multicultural strand" into the curriculum "all the way down through kindergarten."

"It's a matter of infusing things, where they would normally occur in history, in the curriculum to in-crease the depths of cultural stud-ies," Gaffney said.

Marlowe Teig, who for 22 years worked with a number of textbook publishers, said many schools are unable to puchase up-to-date text-books that reflect black history.

School and community officials also are not clear about what they want in the textbooks and fail to list the criteria, he said.

Developing textbooks that reflect the role of blacks and others in American society is more than "just mentioning all the leaders" or "taking a paragraph out and plug-ging another one in," he said.

"You have to be more reflective. Textbooks are not like USA Today. They don't line the garbage cans to-morrow. They are going to be around for years. They affect chil-dren's lives."

many things in nature.

"The Bible and it's track record has been upheld time and time again," he said.

Many notable scientists, such as Louis Pasteur, used the Bible as inspiration for their discoveries, Skjaertund said.

Evolution isn't a science, Skjaerlund said. "(Evolution) is a philosophy and the reason peo-ple adopt it, is because it's a re-bellion against God."

Evolution has influenced the way people approach today's problems, Skjaerlund said.

Issues such as abortion, sui-cide and racism are based on ev-olution's idea of survival of the fittest and superiority of one race over another, Skjærfund said. Even Karl Mar's ideas were accepted because Charles Der-win eliminated God from society with his evolution theory, Skjærfund said.


