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



First, Second Decided In SEC, Rest Up For Grabs

The Southeastern Conference race is history, as far as the regular season cham-pionship is concerned, but the tightest race in almost 40 years winds to a climactic close this weekend as far as league tournament

seedings are concerned.

With just two games remaining in the regular conference season, only the top two seeds have been settled with Alabama owning the regular season title and Florida en-

joying second place.

No other position has been nailed down Example. Kentucky and Georgia, currently tied for third place at 9-7, could finish as high as their current standing or as low as seventh place. Ole Miss is currently 7th, but could go as high as a tie for fourth place. Mississippi State, figured a dead last since preseason, could discover itself out of the cellar if it could pull back-to-back upsets at LSU and Vanderbilt.

So, if you're making plans to attend the So, it you're making plans to attend the SEC Tournament next week in Atlanta and you'd like to know which team is playing at what time, well, you can only count on Alabama and Florida playing the night session on Friday. The rest is grab bag.

There is a ray of suggestion which says that both Kentucky and Georgia will be playing in the Friday afternoon session since they both are assured of finishing somewhere from third place to sixth place in the final

Before we get too involved in this mess, let us remind you the tournament will be staged Thursday thru Sunday, not Wednesday thru Saturday as in the past. The four clubs with the poorest SEC records will square off on Thursday evening with No. 7 going against No. 10 and No. 8 taking on No. 9.

Taking the current standings into account,

you could have some great arch-rivals going at it with Ole Miss tackling Mississippi State and Vanderbilt trying to shake an 0-2 collar against the Tennessee Vols.

The winners would advance to the Friday night session against Alabama and Florida. respectively

The earlier session on Friday afternoon would have the No. 3 team going against No. 6 and No. 4 taking on No. 5. There is absolutely no way of predicting the outcome of

is mess with two games remaining.

UK and Georgia are tied and meet on Wednesday in Athens. A Kentucky upset win would go a long ways toward UK bolstering its hold on third place and the 'Cats could lock it up by beating Ole Miss in the SEC regular season finale at Rupp Arena on Saturday

But a Georgia win on Wednesday would give Hugh Durham's Dogs a shot at a similar feat if the Dogs could beat Tennessee in

Knoxville Saturday.

Then there are LSU, Auburn and even Ole Miss at 7-9. Any of the three could finish 9-9 with a pair of wins. You can rest assured the final seedings won't be complete until the LSU-Auburn battle is settled late next Sunday.

Sure, sure there's no way of knowing who Kentucky will play in the first round next week, but it's fun just to speculate and our

prediction is that Kentucky will have to meet prediction is that kenducky will have to flect the survivor of a three-way tie for No. 6 in-volving Auburn, LSU and Ole Miss. And in our opinion, it'll be LSU. And speaking of LSU, well, what about

game Saturday?

Disgusting, you say?

Well, you can imagine how the Wildcats must feel after blowing an early nine-point lead and the offense going completely AWOL in the last 25 minutes.

The 65-52 defeat left the 'Cats winless in

their two meetings with the LSU Tigers who just might not crack the .500 mark in the SEC

Said LSU guard Anthony Wilson after the game, "It's a payback for the first three (losses) last year. I love it. Things even out."

Wilson was refering to the Tigers' three straight losses before upseting the 'Cats in the finals of the NCAA Southeast Regional in

Kentucky's shot at getting even, if it hap-pens this season, will probably happen in Atlanta next week.

There's going to be some very interesting decisions by the NCAA basketball selection committee Sunday in Shawnee Mission, Kan., and the at-large invitations will be as

controversial as ever this time around.

I can't help remembering proponents claim a few years ago that if the tournament could be expanded to 64 teams, there would never be another complaint about a deserving team not getting an invitation.

As the ole saying goes, "you ain't heard

True, there probably won't be a deserving team left out of the tourney field. The only problem is that numerous undeserving teams

Odds are that numerous teams with double digit losses will be asked to partake in the NCAA event, including several highly-visible schools with a great deal of hoop tradition Several which come to mind immediately

with their losses in parentheses, are the likes of LSU (12), Louisville (12), Ohio State (9 with four games left), Michigan (9 with four games left) and UAB (10). And that's not counting the likes of Kentucky (8), Georgia (9), and Georgia Tech (8), which still have at least two or more regular season games and a conference post season tournament.

The big question is how good must a record

be before a team gets an invitation? The same question made the rounds a couple years ago when UK was issued an invitation to the big show with a 16-12 record after losing to Florida in the quarterfinal round of the SEC tournament before losing to Auburn 43-42 in the semis.

Kentucky was picked and Florida, which had beaten UK two of three times that season, was left to the NIT. Florida was 18-11 and cried "foul play" to anyone who would listen. Few did

The Gators went to the NIT and were promptly sent home by Southwestern Louisiana

Meanwhile, Kentucky thanks its lucky stars for the invitation and then made the selec-

tion committee look like prophets

Obviously hoping to quiet the critics, the NCAA committee sent the Wildcats to the Far West ice country of Utah, matched the Big Blue as heavy underdogs against first Washington and then UNLV. Any team who fruits of victory

Kentucky, unknowling playing its final games under the leadership of Joe B. Hall, upset Washington 66-58 in the final game of the legendary Marv Harshman, who had earlier announced he would retire following the 1985 season.

With a chib loaded with underclassmen the Wildcats played like veterans for a second straight game as juniors Kenny Walker and Roger Harden led the way, while sophomore Winston Bennett and a couple of streaky Winston Bennet and a double of steady freshmen—Richard Madison and Cedric Jenkins—contributed big roles with UK shocking the Running Rebels 64-61.
Hall's swan song came in Denver, Colo., where the Wildcats' Cinderella season meted

in the snow as powerful St. John's won 86-70. UK was unable to cope with Chris Mullin & Co., after All-American Kenny Walker left

with an eye injury Making a short point long, Kentucky vin-dicated its selection and illustrated why records alone should not be the only criteria for determining the tourney's 64 invitations

That season, Kentucky was rebuilding after the Final Four the previous season in Seattle. And because of a rugged pre conference schedule, the 'Cats lost to Purdue, SMU, Indiana and Louisville, with on-

SMU being played at home. Still, UK got its act together, beat such national powers as Kansas and North Carolina State and received the invitation. Having Kenny Walker on the club didn't hurt the 'Cats

All this brings us to this year. Notice the similarities?

After the great season a year ago, Kentucky has struggled with its young team, yet has won some important games against Navy, league champion Alabama twice, Louisville and played Indiana down to the wire.

ombine that with the fact that Kentucky is Kentucky and that one of the nation's premier freshmen is Rex Chapman and you have three pretty good reasons why the NCAA doesn't want the Wildcats playing in that other tournament, better known as the National Invitational Tournament.

Those three reasons are why Kentucky will get an NCAA invitation, even if the Wildcats should lose two of three this week and in the first round of the SEC Tournament. Then, again, the NCAA could make a liar

When the SEC Tournament rolls around next week, the Atlanta scene will be buzz-ing with the gossip which usually goes handin-hand with such sporting events

The topics?

(A) The status of Tennessee coach Don DeVoe who received a vote of confidence from UT athletics director Doug Dickey shortly after the Vols were beaten twice by

Ole Miss in less than a week. After losing to Mississippi State in Starkville last Saturday, Don may need another vote of confidence to be back next winter. No one wil admit it, but the pressure is coming from the thought of filling its new 25,000-seat arena much as DeVoe's dwindling won-loss

(B) The status of Auburn coach Sonny Smith who was expected to have his Tigers fighting for the SEC title this season, or at least second place with Florida. Star Gerald White missed some critical action early, but Auburn has experienced its usual on-again off-again attitude and AU's current 7-9 SEC mark has fueled rumors that Smith will take the dual post of athletics director and head coach at East Carolina at the season's end. Sonny played hardball with the football-oriented AU administration twice and won both games. The third time he might not be so fortunate. ECU looks more and more

(C) The status of Vanderbilt coach C.M. Newton who was hospitalized in the middle of the season. His Commodores got off to a blazing 9-1 start before collapsing inside the SEC and faces a possibility of landing in the cellar with Mississippi State. And all this despite beating both Indiana and Notre Dame this season. This is C.M.'s sixth season in Music City and the banjo pickers could be getting restless. After compiling back-to-back winners his first two years, Newton's clubs have suffered three straight losing marks and the Commodores are courting the .500 mark at 14-13. The gentleman's gentleman is in no immediate danger of losing his job because it's impossible for anyone to dislike C.M. However, those close to C.M. are concerned about his health and it could be nearing the time for the likeable Newton to return to administrative duties, outside the rigors of recruiting and travel. Only time will tell.


(D) Is Dr. Harvey Schiller here to stay in the Southeastern Conference or is the new

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'87 Football Recruits: Only Time Will Tell

Sharpless Says Check Back In Four Years

Opinions. Like the nose on your face, everybody has one

They can be helpful or they can be truly inaccurate and not to mention have no meaning of any kind. So when someone tells me that Kentucky suffered a horrible recruiting class, that UK's program will take a nose dive because Frank Jacobs, Jeff Ellis and Eddie Thomas are going elsewhere, and that the Wildcats are headed nowhere I say, "Ask me the same question in a couple of years, or at some other stop down the road."

Incidentally, my suggestion to you is to contact Kentucky assistant Rod Sharpless and see what he has to say.

"People always are looking at recruiting services," said Sharpless last week. "It might say that Notre Dame had a great year or Pitt or Florida had a great year. That's true on paper—we all have great years. . . potentially. But the final analysis is in four or five years. (We look at) what has that class contributed to that program?

"If we didn't have confidence in the players we recruited we wouldn't have given them a scholarship."

A strong foundation is what keeps a program going. It's the recruiting class which continuously fuels the program. And while an incoming class may be valued at a premium, what's important in the end is how much mileage a coaching staff can get out of a

"On paper we feel comfortable with the size, weight, strength and their accomplishments in high school," added Sharpless. "We don't know (how good they are) yet. We won't know until we get them here and line them up against some of the players already ere and see how they'll progress in four or five years from now.
"Of course, I can say they look great on paper. But how many aper football players have won football games?"

Overall, would you consider UK's newest group good but not

"Check with me in about four years from today, Nick and I'll give you an answer," Sharpless replied.

Onward to next season and what lies ahead.

Sharpless, supervisor at the defensive tackle station, believes the Kentucky program is gradually building and building its way up-ward. What the Wildcat coaching staff is looking for in the long

in is experience and continuity.

Hoping that a couple of freshmen can come in and add a couple of Ws is a nice thought, but not likely. With each season Sharpless believes UK's program is building a stronger foundation. Every player on last year's roster could be listed as a Claiborne recruit. The Big Blue pyramid, although slowly being developed, is being

Looking at the season-ending depth chart you'll see plenty of first-year and redshirt freshmen performers as third-, fourth- and even fifth-stringers. Players like Randy Holleran, Donnie Gardner, Carlos Phillips, Chuck Broughton, Darren Billberry and others, however, will soon get their chance to show why they were recruited by UK. It may be next season, or the following season. We'll just have to

Development takes time. Mark Higgs, Dee Smith or Joe Worley were able to leap from the high school level and into the SEC without landing on their derriers. Despite what you may have heard

in the past, though, not all kittens land on their feet.

"Our number one concern was strengthening up the position at tight end," Sharpless said. "Injuries last year (Matt Lucas and Joe Curry) kinda weakened the position. We had to put some young and inexperienced players in. Of course, we like to bring the younger

and inexperienced players in. Of course, we like to thing he young-players in gradually and eventually give them a chance when they're feeling comfortable of playing an SEC schedule."

If you check out the nation's best programs you'll find that many teams mainly rely on experience as their forte. At Kentucky, where football is not as popular as it is in Tuscaloosa, Baton Rouge, Gainesville, Athens, Auburn, or Knoxville, Claiborne has started many young men who might not have been ready for a first-team

Having a defensive and offensive unit dominated with mostly fiveyear players is what Kentucky is striving for. Sharpless says that's

the goal for UK's football program.
"If you can bring a class in, say in '87, and keep that class intact

for four or five years," Sharpless said, "then it's going to build and enhance your program. Sometimes you have to break those units

enhance your program. Sometimes you have to break those units down and put the players where you need help immediately.
"As long as you can keep a class intact...it improves your program for potential growth and development."

Slowly but surely the UK program is building. And with its recent off-the-field achievements—leading the SEC for the third straight season in regards to academic all-conference candidates, and adding a new training facility—more and more outstanding prospects will consider the 'Cats their No. 1 choice.

The only problem slowing Kentucky down is that the Wildcats are a member of the SEC, are tably the nation's finest gridiron con-

Sharpless: 'Paper Players Don't Cut It'

25-29-2, they may never again experience a season like the 9-3 campaign in 1984. You see, while UK is making gains, so are the SEC's

The early reports are in and Florida, Georgia and Tennessee had what many experts consider banner recruiting years. The bottom line? Claiborne and his staff are making progress but so are their foes, which makes the current task at hand a very difficult one.

You might not have known this but right now the Kentucky players

You might not have known this but inglit now the Kentucky players are about to enter the "second quarter."

"We have what we call the 'four quarters,' "Sharpless indicated about the 'Cats' year-round schedule. "Our winter program is our first quarter, the spring is our second quarter. Of course, the summer is our third quarter and the fourth is the fall."

Spring practice is just around the corner. On March 25, Kentucky will begin its spring session and work toward the annual Blue-White agency at Compronwealth Stadium (April 25).

"We feel that in spring practice everybody has to earn a position," he said. "We want it to be competitive and we want to put the best 11 guys on offense and defense on the field.

"If you can have a positive experience from winter to spring to summer then it's also going to carry over to *that* fourth quarter, the quarter which people evaluate. They're not evaluated from January to August, they're evaluated on Saturdays at 4:05—if we were relief."

As far as going into spring with a different approach, Sharpless said the team objectives will remain the same as they have in the

"We're going into the spring with the same objective—trying to find where our best football players are and getting them into posi-



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Rocky Ride

Long Kentucky Cold Spell, Poor Shooting And Repeat Performance From LSU's Wilson Allow Tigers To Claim 65-52 Win, Series Sweep

For Eddie Sutton and his Kentucky basketball team, the plane ride from Lexington to Baton Rouge was rough and tumble as inclimate weather conditions caused turbulance for nearly the entire three and a half hour flight.

Maybe it was a bad omen. Because after the Wildcats touched down safely in Bayou Country, the rocky road continued as Dale Brown's Tigers handed them a 65-52 setback, throwing Kentucky back into a two-way tie with Georgia for third place in the Southeastern Conference

standings.

It might have been wet and rainy outside Assembly Center Saturday afternoon, but inside the building it was a drought that led to Kentucky's undoing. UK could manage just eight points during a 14-minute stretch that started late in the first half and lasted until early in the second period, and that allowed LSU to post the win and sweep the

It was a game that Kentucky would have liked to have won, not only to avenge its worst loss in 30 years—a 76-41 shellacking at the hands of LSU earlier this season at Rupp Arena—but to solidify its hold on third place in the conference standings and bolster its chances of earning an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament

Chapman Spurs Early Rally That Puts 'Cats Out In Front

After the homestanding Tigers jumped out in front 12-7, freshman guard Rex Chapman keyed a 14-0 Kentucky outburst that staked his team to a comfortable nine-point advantage with 7:52 remaining in the half. Chapman started the run with a four-footer and a layup, and after a pair of buckets by Richard Madison and Rob Lock, he connected on a couple of long research bombe. Lock and advantage with a couple of the property of the pr nected on a couple of long range bombs. Lock ended the surge with a free throw to

That's when LSU put together a streak of its own. Dale Brown assigned Bernard Woodside to cover Chapman, and he shut down UK's leading scorer from the field for the rest of the half. Meanwhile, the Tigers outscored Kentucky 21-8 over the game's next

14:10 to take a 33-29 lead that they would not relinquish.

Sutton said the long dry spell put his team in a hole it couldn't dig itself out of.

"I felt like it was probably our offense, not so much just (Woodside's defense) on Chapman, but overall our offense just being stagnant," Sutton said. "I think with about chapman, our overall our offense just being stagnant. Sutton said. "I think with about four minutes to go until halftime we had that seven-point lead (23-16), and then we went eight minutes into the second half I think with six points or eight points, I'm not sure. So during that 12-minute period we really let that game slip away. And it was really more offensively—poor execution on our part—than defense on their part."

In Second Half, Cold Spell, Nikita Wilson Doom Kentucky

From that point on LSU extended the lead, thanks in part to poor shooting by UK and the outstanding play of Tiger center Nikita Wilson. Kentucky would connect on just eight of 25 field goal attempts for 37 percent in the second period, while LSU was hitting a nifty 13 of 23 for a 56.5 clip over the same stretch.

"We did a horrible job in the second half on Nikita Wilson, in pivot play," Sutton said. "But he did the same thing to us up in Lexington. He's a great player."

In defense of Lock, who was responsible for trying to defend Wilson, the big redhead got into foul trouble in the second half and could do little but stand and watch the LSU captain score. LSU's senior center made seven of his 10 field goal tries and scored 16 points in the second period.

"I couldn't do anything really aggressive," Lock said. "He started scoring and I couldn't do anything about it."



Chapman—Kid Enjoys Playing Game

'Cat Staff Keeping An Eye On Recruits

No matter what he does, the spotlight stays on Rex

Chapman.

Last year the Owensboro Apollo standout played in front of capacity crowds almost every game. His shooting, ball-handling and all-around ability made his exploits legendary from Ashland to Paducah in the Bluegrass

College coaches all across the land came to Owensboro to

see the kid play. Few, if any, left Owensboro disappointed. Kentucky finally managed to persuade Chapman to become a Wildcat. However, that only generated more ex-



citement and interest in the youngster. No matter what he did, someone noticed

This season he been on the cover of a basketball yearbook and Sports Illustrated.

TV analysts and college basketball writers have been recording his exploits all season and have billed him as one of the game's next stars

Even a superstar like Pete Rose of the Cincinnati Reds

noticed Chapman's play.

"I'm going to ask (UK coach Eddie) Sutton if he will let Rex play first base for me this summer," said Rose recently

on a visit to Lexington. "Chapman is a tremendous athlete. I like a guy like that

"Maybe the baseball would look like a basketball to him. It did to me for about 20 years. Chapman has to be the same way in basketball. The basket must look four-foot wide the way he shoots. He's a great player."

No one who has seen Chapman play would argue with Rose. The kid is a natural.

"I knew Rex Chapman was a great player the first day he walked on the practice floor," said Sutton.

Chapman, though, didn't want to be the center of attention this year. He's a nice, sensitive youngster that worries about what his teammates think of him.

"I think Rex went out of his way to avoid any attention to prevent any resentment towards him," said Gene Abell, sports editor of The Messenger-Inquirer in Owensboro.

When rumors of players being jealous of Chapman surfaced, no one was more upset than the Owensboro freshman. The players denied that any jealousy existed but still the rumors spread quicker than a Kentucky fast break. Finally, Chapman decided to settle the issue. After the UK-Mississippi State game he took it upon himself to explain

Okt-mississippi state game ne took it upon nimself to explain that teammates had not been keeping the ball from him or trying to hurt his game.

"If anybody had asked me I could have told you that the rumors weren't true," said Chapman. "But nobody every asked me and I certainly would have noticed if something was going on

It took guts, and class, to do something like that. How many 18-year-old kids could stare into the TV lights, microphones and notebooks of the Kentucky media and address such a controversial issue.

Chapman did it without blinking an eye because he didn't want his teammates having to deal with the rumors any

Unfortunately, Chapman can't turn the spotlight off himself that easily because of the way he plays. He has a knack for playing his best in the clutch as he did against Tennessee when his last-minute heroics allowed UK to pull out an overtime win.

Chapman, though, has learned to handle the expectations others have for him. He's a gifted athlete on the court but he's just as smooth off the floor.

The kid is destined for greatness but that doesn't mean he

should be asked to produce miracles like he did against Tennessee every game. He even has room to improve his

defense and rebounding, just like most freshmen do.

All Chapman wants is to be part of a winning team. He doesn't need the fan or media attention to enjoy basketball, "I just like playing basketball," said Chapman. "I enjoy the game. I don't pay attention to the fans or media. You can't do that and be successful.

"I just try to satisfy myself and my teammates. If I do that, I'm happy."

Too bad everyone else won't let life stay that simple for a kid who just enjoys playing a game.

UK COACHES are trying to monitor the progress of the six

high school basketball players they signed in November.
"We don't see them as much as if they had not signed but we keep an eye on their progress," said UK assistant coach James Dickey. "We keep in touch and talk to their coaches."
Dickey saw 6-11 LeRon Ellis play last month and was im-

pressed by the future Wildcat. 'He's gotten better since the season started," said Dickey

"Just getting to play and gaining experience has helped him.
"He's more aggressive now and for a big guy he really runs the floor well. He attacks the glass (backboard) and

goes after every rebound. That is something any coach likes The UK assistant has been able to see 6-7 Deron Feldhaus of Mason County several times recently. He said, "Deron has gotten bigger and stronger. He's been shooting the ball

'When Deron gets here he is going to have to learn to play facing the basket. He has to play with his back to the basket now because that is where his team needs him. But he's a good shooter and good rebounder. He won't have a lot of trouble making the transition to forward here."

Kentucky is now starting to target its recruiting on high

school juniors.

"You make your best evaluations in the summer, though," said Dickey. "The summer camps give you a chance to see the best players going against other great players. Plus your entire staff can watch the player and evaluate him. That's when key recruiting decisions are made."

THE NEW NCAA limit of 25 football scholarships per year could help Kentucky. Or at least that's why assistant coach Jake Hallum thinks.

"It will help us because we seldom sign over 25 kids in a ear," said Hallum. "We also don't believe in running kids off that don't work out like some places do. If we make a mistake recruiting a kid, we live with it as long as he is not a

Back To The Future — 1978-79 Revisited?

Striking Resemblance Between '79, '87 'Cats

A month ago, when Kentucky was returning from Oxford, Miss., with an II-6 overall record, a 4-5 SEC mark and faced the possibility of staying home when the NCAA tournament tipped off in March, I couldn't help but think of how much Eddie Sutton's current ballclub paralleled the 1978-79 Wildcat squad, the last UK team that failed

earn a berth in college basketball's big shindig.

At that point in the season, the resemblance was striking. But as I sat and witnessed the final minutes of the miraculous, last-second rally against Tennessee on Feb. 11—which was almost a carbon copy of Kentucky's stunning come-from-behind victory

over Kansas early in the 1978-79 season—I was nearly convinced I had been caught in a time warp and transported back in time. As I walked through the Rupp Arena parking lot following the postgame ess conference that night, I could almost hear a familiar voice

"Do-do-do-do do-do-do-do-this is Rod Serling," it said "Tonight we bring you the story of a sports columnist who went to a ballgame one night and was mysteriously taken back eight years

into the past, when he entered the. . Twilight Zone."

Now maybe I have been watching too much late night television lately, I don't know, but you have to admit, there are a lot of similarities between the two teams.

To refresh your memory, let's take a look back at the 779 team and compare it with the current version of Wildcats.

History Repeating Itself? You Decide

For starters, the '79 team was short on experience, having been decimated by graduation losses. Four battle-tested veterans from the '78 championship season—primarily inside power players Mike Phillips, Rick Robey, James Lee, along with silky forward Jack Givens—had used up their eligibility at Kentucky and made their way into the NBA, leaving sophomore Freddie Cowan, junior LaVon Williams and freshman Chuck Verderber to hold down the fort. Cowan was the tallest and most effective of the three, but at 6-8 he was unable to mix it up with the big boys on the schedule, guys like Bobby Cattage of Auburn, Reggie Johnson of Tennessee, Reggie King of Alabama and Rickey Brown of Mississippi State.

As a result, the inside game suffered, and coach Joe Hall was forced to abandon the power game he loved so much in favor of a perimeter attack. Hall had to rework his offense around guards Kyle Macy, Dwight Anderson, Truman Claytor and Jay Shidler, and all four responded by placing in the top six on the club in point production. But when you make a living on the perimeter, there are gonna be times when you die from it as well. The outside game wasn't always clicking on all cylinders, and inconsistency was the

Sound familiar? It should.

Anybody who even has a passing interest in this year's Kentucky earn can tell you that. The 'Cats advanced to within an eyelash of the Final Four a year ago, and senior Kenny Walker was largely responsible for that. With Walker playing for pay with the New York Knicks to start the season, forwards Winston Bennett and Cedric Jenkins, along with center Rob Lock, were expected to make things happen in the middle. But as has been well-chronicled, Bennett was lost for the year with a knee injury, and due to a stress fracture in his foot, Jenkins has spent the majority of the season on the bench as well, leaving Lock, Irv Thomas and Richard Madison along the front line. Each of the three has turned in the best season of their careers to this point, but hardly enough to keep pace with people like Indiana's Dean Garrett and Daryl Thomas, Aubum's Jeff Moore, Alabama's Derrick McKey, LSU's Nikita Wilson and Navy's David Robinson

Sutton's guard corps of James Blackmon, Rex Chapman and Ed Davender has played admirably, But the inconsistency, the "ups and downs" as Sutton likes to call them, have still been there. It's tough to win on a day-in, day-out basis when you're launching 20-footers

to win on a day-in, day-out obass when you re fauncing 20-rooters and your opponents are getting layups and follow shots.

UK assistant coach Dwane Casey, who is Kentucky's only link between the two seasons, having been a senior co-captain of the te "70 team, says that those two similarities—inexperience and lack of an established inside game—are what make the two squads so

much alike

Names Have Changed, Performance Is Same

"There's a lot of similarities between the two seasons because we were a real young basketball club that year ('79), we'd lost all of the seniors, much like we lost in Roger (Harden) and Kenny last year," Casey said. "And you had a lot of inexperienced starters coming back, as far as playing time is concerned. So that's the basic similarity between the two seasons.
"That year we didn't have a dominant inside player, exactly like this year. We relied a lot on quickness and perimeter play with Dwight Anderson, Kyle Macy and Jay Shidler, similar to the way we are now with James Blackmon, Ed Davender and Rex Chapman."

Because of the the inexperience and the lack of inside strength. neither team was expected to set the world on fire when the preseason forecasts came out. But the '79 team played Indiana tough in Bloomington and upset Kansas and Notre Dame on the way to a 5-2 preconference record. This year, Kentucky gave the Hoosiers all they wanted on the road and then totally destroyed defending national champion Louisville in a mild upset, fashioning a 6-1 mark

prior to league play.

But when the SEC games started, it was a different story. In '79, the 'Cats won just one of their first six games against league competition, two of the setbacks coming in Rupp Arena. This year, UK limped out to a 1-3 start in the conference, a lso suffering two losses

at home.

"(In '79) once we got in the conference everybody started exploiting our inside game," Casey said. "Much like this year everybody started to take advantage of it."

So midway through the season, neither team looked as though

it would make much noise. Three weeks into January, the '79 team stood at 6-7, few people gave them a realistic chance of extending

their season into postseason play and people were wondering aloud whether or not this would be the first UK team to post a losing record since 1926-27. Fans looked at the great recruiting class—Sam Bowie, Derrick Hord, Dirk Minniefield, Charles Hurt and Tom Heitz—and started making preparations for the '80 season. Many of the same fears were brought out again this season. When the 'Cats were blown out by 35 points, at home against LSU on Jan. 18, Kentucky owned a record of 9-5. Rumors ran rampant that there was dissention on the team. Folks said the team was a bunch of quitters, that it didn't have a prayer of playing beyond the SEC

of quitters, that it didn't have a prayer of playing beyond the SEC tournament. And once again an outstanding crop of high school talent—Eric Manuel, LeRon Ellis, Johnny Pittman, Deron Feldhaus, Sean Sutton and Jonathon Davis—was signed, causing everyone to look to the future.

Our Story Could Have Happy Ending, Though

UK fans, take heart. Our little story does take a turn for the bet ter. This cloud does have a silver lining. Inexperienced players have a way of maturing. And weak inside players, if they work hard, do tend to improve. And those are the most pleasant similarities between the two ballclubs.

Anderson put things together in '79 and led the club in scoring for the second half of the season. And after a shaky start, Cowan, Williams and Verderber came on strong at the end of the year. The

Similipart test up-'86 Bat Cats in batting average (,364), runs scored (60), hits (79), doubles (19), stolen bases (28), total bases (132) and on-base percentage (440). Shumpert was named all-SEC and all-South District for his 1986 per formance. He also could be penciled in shortstop, where he was a starter for the USA

team this past summer.
"Because of his experience and range as an infielder, Terry could very well be used as a shortstop this year," said the UK head

Probably the toughest battle for a starting position is at third base. John Marshall, a junior, returns from last year and offers experience as well as a good glove. Darin Rieman, a freshman from Fairfield, Ohio, is a strong hitter and is capable of batting in the middle of the lineup.

Both players should see considerable amounts of playing time.

Holy Toledo! Milo Goes One-On-One

Holy Toledo:
Sports fans around Chicago, Atlanta and Houston have associated those two words with the one and only Milo Hamilton for the past 30 years.

Millions of other satellite dish viewers around the world have joined in on the Hamiltion mania during the past decade, but University of Kentucky Wildcat fans this winter have received their first full dose of *Holy Toledo* as Hamilton has joined Rob Bromley on the UK Television Network.

Prior to the season, Host Communications (which has live television rights to selected December games and replay rights to non-televised SEC games) made several changes on the network.

First, the network added Hamilton as the play-by-play announcer with Bro ed to the color analyst position. Bob Domine, who previously handled color with Bromley doing the play-by-play, moved to the stands for periodic fan comments and interviews during breaks in action, etc.

during breaks in action, etc.

The changes were big news, news enough to call a full-scale press conference to introduce Hamilton to the local media.

The three-man crew didn't fare so well and Domine was eliminated from the telecasting crew early in the season. Those close to HC said the idea was good but that Domine

orewearly in the season. Those close to the said the fact was good or dark with didn't handle the chores well.

Others insist the idea was to oust Domine all along. The theory continues that if the idea was so great and Domine so bad, why wasn't Domine replaced by another person instead of the position being abolished all together?

Host Communications president Jim Host said it had been a longtime ambition to

upgrade the Kentucky telecasts and that he knew of no better way than getting the very best involved in the telecasts.

Host readily admits that Hamilton is one of his longtime favorites, as far back as the days when Milo was doing radio play-by-play for a Big Ten Conference school. "I remember it very well," said Host, "a friend of mine and me were traveling from

a Kentucky game in Louisiana and we picked up this lowa game on radio. This fella had me excited about the game in no time at all. We couldn't stop talking about him.

His name was Milo Hamilton."

To say Milo has called more than a few games since his days of calling basketball games for his alma mater in Iowa City would be an understatement.

His radio(t) beat began back in 1950 and he's been at the mike ever since, everything from major college basketball to football, to NBA basketball, to major league baseball—

where he is recognized as one of the real stars of the business.

There have been stops in St. Louis, Chicago, Atlanta, Pittsburgh, and Houston along

And there have been some big moments, such as calling Ernie Banks' five grand slams in one season, Stan Musial's five home runs in a doubleheader, Roger Maris' 61st home run and the biggest moment of all, Hank Aaron's record-breaking 715th home run in 1974 which was broadcast around the world.

It all started innocently enough, a game here and a game there before it mushroomed to 100 games a season in the early 1950s.

Through his many years and stops in five major league cities, Milo's reputation is well-documented. He's innovative, outspoken, and yes, even controversial. He speaks his mind and thinks about it later

But more than anything else, Milo has become the epitomy of what a broadcaster should do before he goes on the air. There is not a better prepared announcer in the

All you have to do is visit his hotel room on the evening of a night game. It looks like a massive communications control center. Papers, charts, a wide assortment of pens and pencils are everywhere. He has enough background information on the teams and players to handle a five-hour rain delay, even for a basketball game if the Wildcats should ever decide to move to Commonwealth Stadium like the late Adolph Rupp did at ole

Stoll Field some 40 years ago.

The central theme for praise of Hamilton surrounds his attention to preparation, his enthusiasm for sports and his always exciting delivery to keep fans glued to the set. Holy Toledo



Hamilton Brings Big-Time Reputation To UK Telecasts

Born in Fairfield, Iowa and a graduate of the University of Iowa, the veteran sport-

Born in Pairried, Jowa and a graduate of the University of Iowa, the veteran sport-seaster and his wife Arlene live in Houston and have two children. His hobbies include bird dogs and birdhunting. He's also a Sherlock Holmes buff. A veteran of World War II, he served in the U.S. Navy with the SeaBees, which is where his broadcasting career all began with the Armed Forces Radio Service in Guam

Hamilton, who says he has always followed Kentucky basketball back to the days of the late Adolph Rupp, said when the opporunity to do Kentucky basketball came along, he jumped at it.

Hamilton squeezes every hour out of every day. In addition to his limited schedule of UK games, the popular radio/tv voice of the Houston Astros also does television games of the Southwest Conference and other events for the Home Sports Entertain-

ment regional cable group out of Texas.

Previous to his arrival in Houston, Milo was involved with the broadcast crews of

Previous to his arrival in Houston, Milo was involved with the broadcast crews of the Atlanta Braves, Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates, among others.

Prior to a recent Kentucky home game, Milo took time out to talk with *The Cats' Pause* about his first season with the Big Blue. Following are portions of that exclusive question and answer session with the nationally-acclaimed sportscaster:

TCP: Milo, how did you happen to find yourself doing color work on the University of Kentucky Television Network this season?

Milo Hamilton: It was sorta out of the blue. You remember Mike Storn? Well, he was the one who hired me for the Houston Astros job a couple years ago and he knew Jim Host. I didn't do basketball at all last year and Mike knew I wanted to get back

In it. So he called me one day last July and asked me how I would like to do 12 Kentucky basketball games on television. I said, "When do we get there?"

TCP: A man of your reputation, being nationally known, doing major league baseball and basketball and working with such superstations as WTBS in Atlanta and WGN in Chicago, why Kentucky basketball with your ule already so tight

Milo Hamilton: Anybody who's been around basketball just a little bit knows this is where it is. Maybe it's an over-simplification, but the Rupp Era, basketball in Kentucky is a religion with the people here. They really love their basketball here. I had done DePaul basketball before and they have a pretty good tradition and I did the Blue Demons for I6 years. They have a great program too, but I think just the magic, it (UK) had a ring to it, just being the television announcer for Kentucky basketball. That's

TCP: What makes college basketball different from other sports, particularly the pros?

Milo Hamilton: Having done professional basketball for a number of years also, the difference for me is, and it's not anybody's fault in the NBA, it's just a fact of life that cutterence for me is, and it's not anybody's fault in the NBA, it's just a fact of life that if you play that many games and everbody's over 6-7 and you're doing the traveling they're doing you're not going to see the great effort every night. That's not a knock on anybody. They don't sleep in a bed they fit in, they travel on the day of the game and it takes a while for the crowds to get into it in a lot of the arenas. If I were put in a position of rather doing college or pro basketball, I'd say college. I like the college atmosphere. I like the campus. I like the kids diving for balls knowing that it's still a game to them although some people might say it's a big business too, but it's still a game. TCP: Any preconceived ideas about Kentucky basketball prior to your first game this season?

Milo Hamilton: Not really. I had been doing this (basketball telecasts) a couple years, but I'll have to tell you I had a butterfly or two wondering what it was going to be like. In other words, I was going to be with a new coach, a new coaching staff, a new team, a new arena, a new audience. Plus, the opposition was Yugoslavia with all those names. I thought I was pretty ready to do the game until five o'clock and they came and said half the Yugoslavian team had been changed. So six of the twelve names were no longer pertinent and four of the six on the team had changed uniforms. All those firsts of that game, and I'll be the first to admit it, added up to some anxiety. Coming into a situa-tion where basketball is so reverred, not only by the fans but they're knowledgable fans

and I wanted to make sure I knew about these kids (UK). I had been to practice. I had talked to coach Sutton. I really didn't want to embarrass myself I guess is what it is. If you have got pride in your work, and I think I have that. I knew I was under a microscope and people were going to say 'Here's a new guy. No. 1, he's not from Ken-

microscope and people were going to say 'Here's a new guy. No. 1, he's not from Kentucky or what does he know about it?"

I think the thing that geared me to that was that at the press conference when they (Host Communications) flew me some of the questions the media asked me that day concerned how I knew anything about Kentucky. I'm not saying they were unfair questions, but I changed baseball teams two or three times. They change people. I felt that I've got to show them without being cocky about it, that I can learn about this team and I think it paid off because a lot of the people I talked to. Bob Hale (Channel 18 news anchor) and I worked together in Chicago at one time and we got together and talked. He said it was hard for people in his newsroom to believe that this guy (referring to Hamilton) had done only two or three Kentucky games because he sounds like he knows all about them, like he has been doing Kentucky forever. That was great for me to hear, but also backed up my feeling that I had done my homework.

TCP: What's been your feedback from fans, the daily mailbag?

Milo Hamilton: It's been very good. The best thing has been the people in the stands,

They holler at me, want to talk or shake hands. Their comments have been really good. Any broadcaster that says he doesn't like to hear good things is either lying to you or he's an idiot. And I don't want to be either one of them.

TCP: Having just about completed your first season on the UK team,

at are your thoughts on the Kentucky program?

Milo Hamilton: The arena, the tradition, the crowd and all the other things I've heard,

well, they've all come true. The people have been good to me. I'd heard a lot about coach Sutton from the people I'm associated with in Houston because coach Sutton was in the Southwest Conference. I've never been at a practice or asked him a question that he didn't do everything possible to let me know everything there is to know about this team. He has been open with me. The assistant coaches have gone out of their way to tell me about the opponents and what to look for. The acceptance by the administration and the fans has been great. But the best is how the players have reacted to me the way they did. They've just been tremendous. The other night, when I got back and I hadn't been here for a couple weeks, I got in for practice and about four of them walked over and said, "Hey, where have you been? It's good to see you." You can't buy that kind of friendship. In other words, they knew I hadn't been doing the games for a couple weeks. To take the time before they went out on the floor for practice to tell me that they missed me, well, that's something I'll always remember. This club is better than it was in the middle of December. Some clubs would have went in the tank, but not this one. And how about that comeback over Tennessee? I never experienced a comeback like that in my broadcasting career. It was, well, something you'll always remember no matter how long you're doing the game. This team has a lot of character, but a lotta credit has to go to Eddie Sutton for the leadership he is giving this team. They've been a lot of fun to be around.

TCP: You also do Southwest Conference basketball telecasts for Home Sports Entertainment. Compare the SWC with the SEC.

Milo Hamilton: It's a different kind of a league and it's a different kind of basketball

The crowds are more into it here, but that's Kentucky basketball.

TCP: You're obviously pleased with your first year at Kentucky. Do you plan on returning next season?

Milo Hamilton: If they want me, I'd sure like to come back.
TCP: Has Proposition 48 been good for college athletics?

Milo Hamilton: I think it has. We're now going back to the scholar athletes instead of meat factories. I know Eddie won't like this because he has some great people com-

Milo Says. . .

Two of the most colorful and controversial sportscasters over the past 30 years have been Milo Hamilton and Harry Carey of Chicago Cubs (and previously to that, St. Louis)

What sets these men apart from the rest of the announcing world is that they are the originals. They copy no one. They come at you with the high hard one as they say in baseball lingo. You either love 'em or hate 'em. Because they're so much alike, they are opposites

The closest thing the two men have in common is the word "Holy"—Harry ends his with "Cow" while Milo tags his with "Toledo". And like some of the great Americans of the past, they can boast of their feats simply because they know how to back up their

of the past, they can poast of their reats shippy occause they ship words with performance.

Recently, *TCP* sat down with Hamilton and he shared with us his thoughts on some of the top names in college and professional sports today:

Eddie Sutton—I've only been with him less than one season, but he's a heckuva coach. He is good for college basketball, and for Milo Hamilton he's great because he strokes me at least once a day. He's made me feel like I ought to be here doing the

Billy Packer—I like Billy Packer. He puts things in perspective without throwing himself in the limelight. I hear more basketball from him that I do the other so-called analysts who have tried to make themselves into circuses. He is still there as an intergal part because he has not made Billy Packer the dominant theme

Dick Enberg—Dick is probably the best all-around announcer if you want someone who can do a baseball game or a football game or a basketball game, or tennis or a horse race

Rob Bromley—Rob and I have gotten along famously and he's been a great help to me because flying in as I do, I don't get a chance to see all the games or hear all the games therefore I've got to pick his brain when I get here. He's been most cooperative and has been a good broadcast partner for me.

Al McGuire...Al is one of those guys who is entertaining. I think he shoots from the hip a little too often. If you went back and listen to some of the tapes from week to week and compare some of the things he says there are a few inconsistencies. I like his enthusiasm. I thought he was a fine coach because I used to see him a lot when I was doing DePaul and he was coach at Marquette. Those were great games. His role has been a good one and he's been good for the NBC games.

Dick Vitale -Well, Dick Vitale is certainly different. This won't happen so I guess Dick Vitale—Well, Dick Vitale is certainly different. This won't happen so I guess I can say it. I guess if he was working with me I'd have to lay a few ground rules down. I think if there's one thing I have learned over the years and I've had a chance to work with some good color people is that is good as that color person is, the guy in my chair or the Enberg chair or the Summerall chair still has to be in control. My philosophy with my color man has always been, 'Look, you're going to get a chance to talk. You're going to be as big a part of this broadcast as I am, but I've got to decide when.' One of my pet peeves is two announcers talking at the same time. Somebody has got to be the lead horse and if I were working with Vitale he'd have to find out that the play-by-play guy is the lead horse.

Harry Carey—Well, Harry is a different type in the fact that he forgot that there was a game. I had a chance to work with two Hall Of Fame broadcasters—Bob Elston and Jack Brickhouse. I grew up in Iowa listening to Elston so he was my mentor and then to later work with him, can you imagine that dream come true? He always said don't force that if the first was 'a game to day a way left by hear whether that if the same to day a way left by the hear with the first way.' then to later work with him, can you imagine that dream come true? He always said don't forget that if there wasn't a game today we wouldn't be here which I suppose is an over-generalization but it's true. If the game weren't being played we wouldn't need the broadcasters to even be on the scene. Also, don't ever give it your biggest moment in the first three innings because the game might be decided in the last inning. Brickhouse always had a saying that if the garbage men in Chicago go on strike next week and the broadcasters go on strike, 'Who do you think the public will miss the most?' And that is not in Carey's philosophy. In other words, I think he really believes that if there wasn't a game at Wrigley Field one day and he showed up in the booth, that there would be as many people in the stands to look up to see if he was there as if there were two teams on the field. That's a little more ego than I can take.

Vin Scully—Vin is a charming dedicated man made for his purpose. Some people

Vin Scully—Vin is a charming, dedicated man made for his purpose. Some people are born to do what they do and I guess he was born to be a baseball announcer and he does it with great taste and class. He is a joy to be around. You always feel like he is talking to me and with me, not down to me. And I think a man in his position, that says a lot.

Marty Brenneman—Marty, since he has already expressed an opinion in print and on broadcast that I am his role model, I must think a lot of him, right? He always says he listened to me as a little kid and I influenced him. That's kinda like me saying those things about Bob Elston. He is a dear friend and as he progresses, I enjoy his success

Al Michaels—Since, in the last few years that he's decided that he's not going to be Vince Scully Jr., he is becoming maybe a better broadcaster. He fell into a rut that a lot of young broadcasters do that were told that they sounded like somebody. I'm more worried about Michaels spreading himself a little thin right now. The Olympic hockey thing propelled him into the sphere that he might not have enjoyed otherwise. And I'm and his role in the total picture, I'm not sure he has grown with a lot of humility. That may be unfair because I'm not around him and maybe he's misquoted, but a lot of the things he's saying and the approach to some of the broadcasting he's doing now, I don't think he's endearing himself to some people. Having here proceeding the approach to some people. think he's endearing himself to some people. Having been propelled into a prominent role at ABC, I think he should have the good sense or the common sense to tell them "no" once in a while because I'm not always sure anymore that he's totally prepared and that's a tough thing to stay on top of.

Commodores Rocked By 'Reserve' Richard Madison's 19 Points, 'Cats' Hardy Defense And Poor Free Throw Shooting

Occupying a seat on the bench can be an inspiration. Just ask junior forward Richard

The 6-foot-7 Memphis native, who had started 18 of 22 contests this season, found himself out of a starting job last Thursday night against Vanderbilt. However, Madison contributed a career-high 19 points in a reserve role as UK racked up a 65-54 victory over Vandy at Rupp Arena

The win raises Kentucky's record to 16-7 and 9-6 in the SEC while the Commodores now stand at 14-13, 5-10.

Besides Irv Thomas starting in place of Madison, Paul Andrews drew a starting assign-

ment instead of senior James Blackmon.

"I knew I wasn't going to start tonight," said Madison, who grabbed 11 rebounds.

"But I also know I had to come in and play well, because Coach stressed that Vanderbilt had a great ballclub.

'Me and James talked about it before the game and we knew it wasn't a punishment to us. It (change in lineup) was because he thought two other players were playing harder at the time. . .we just came out and played as hard as we could."

Freshman guard Rex Chapman tied his teammate for game-high honors, knocking

down six field goals (one three-pointer) and six free throws. He also pulled down a career-high six boards while handing out six assists.

Kentucky's pressing defense in the first half rattled the visitors into submission. Plus, Vanderbilt's inability to connect from the charity line in the first half—nine of 17—dealt

At one time UK's defensive intensity was so cranked up that it took reserve Frank Kornet three times to get the ball inbounds without having it knocked out of play. Overall, Vandy committed nine first-half miscues.

"If we had hit our free throws in the first half," noted Newton afterwards, "we could have gone into halftime tied."

"The difference in the basketball game was our inability to convert free throws in the first half and our inability to get good shots down in the second half," the Vandy coach added. "From a defensive standpoint, we played well enough to win." Vanderbilt was led by Bobby Westbrooks' 12 tallies. While Westbrooks was Vandy's only scorer in double figures, guards Barry Booker and Kentucky native Barry Gobeen chipped in with price points each.

Sutton Purring After 'Cats' Defensive Effort

"In the first half, defensively that was one of the best 20 minute periods we had all season," echoed the feelings of Eddie Sutton. "For the game, I thought we did a good job on (Will) Perdue."

Indeed the 'Cats did. Perdue, who scored 20 points against UK earlier this season, hit on only four of 14 from the field for eight points. He did, however, pull down

a game-high 16 rebounds.

During the teams' first meeting, a game which UK won 71-65, center Rob Lock tried to front Vandy's seven-footer. This time around Lock played behind Perdue. The

different approach paid off as the 6-10 red head held his own.

But Lock had help as Madison, Thomas, Cedric Jenkins and even the perimeter players made life miserable for Perdue

"Kentucky played with a lot of defensive intensity," Newton said. "We didn't get the lob. Kentucky took that away from of us this time, which we expected."

UK led by 15 at halftime and stretched the lead to 21 when Davender laid the ball

, giving UK a 40-19 lead with 19:17 remaining in the contest.

Again, it was Vandy's poor free throw shooting that spoiled a possible comeback.

Still, Vanderbilt outscored UK 35-29 in the second half.

A three-point shot by Booker narrowed the Wildcat lead to 14, 46-32 (12:03). After

a basket by Madison, Perdue connected on a short hook with Mike Scott guilty of a foul. Perdue, however, missed the free throw.

It was time for both teams to trade offensive punches.

Vandy's missed opportunity opened the door for a Madison gliding jumper. Derrick

Wilcox, a product of Louisville PRP, canned a three-pointer. Vandy was now was within 13. Again, Madison countered with a basket, this time with a hook shot.

A three-point play by Chapman outdid a two-point bucket by Westbrooks and UK led 55-39 with 6:36 left. Another missed free throw, this time by Randy Neff, kept delaying any chance of a Vandy comeback.

Vanderbilt closed the gap to seven (61-54) with a little more than a minute remaining. Two free throws by Chapman, meanwhile, and a tip in by the youngster from Owensboro safely tucked this one away.

After the game Sutton was happy to notch his 48th victory as a Wildcat coach. But the UK coach was unhappy with his team's 25-of-64 performance from the field. "We're happy we won and believe me if someone would have said we would have won by 11, I would have thrown a victory celebration," Sutton said. "My biggest concern is our shot selection. At this point we should be doing a better job of selecting

our shots. And we do at times!

"We came out in the first half and really showed a lot of intensity on defense," said Andrews. "We really stopped what they were trying to do. We didn't allow them to get many second shots and I think that was the turning point in the game. "They weren't prepared for our pressure (defense) in the first half."

UK pulled down 16 defensive boards in the first half compared to eight offensive rebounds for the visitors. Kentucky outrebounded Vandy in the first 20 minutes, 24-19.

Each year college basketball seems obligated to give us one unsavory recruiting story as if to reinforce the notion that for every big-time schoolboy player there's a deal which must go down. In truth, after a decade and a half of watching and listening, I

Just about the time I'm ready to wave off all the doomsayers who suggest it's a cesspool, ong comes another eyebrow-raising story of how a particular athlete gets to a particular school.

UCLA affair. It began last fall when Higgins told his father Earl (who lives in Detroit) and half sister (who attends the University of Michigan) that he would play for the Wolverines next ye hin a few hours of that announcement he signed with the Bruins

The story didn't end here, however, as Higgins later said he'd been forced to sign the letter-of-intent with UCLA and asked to have the pact nullified. He alleged the pressure came from his mother and stepfather, with whom he lived in Los Angeles. Subsequently, he moved out of their home and now lives with his cousins Several questions remain unanswered.

Higgins' father agrees that his son signed with UCLA "under uress" and has contacted not only UCLA coach Walt Hazzard,

but the school's athletic director and chancellor as well. He has retained an attorney in hopes of freeing the youngster to move back East and play for Michigan.

ing in next year, but I think there ought to be a five-year program and that athletes don't play as a freshman. Let's face it, a lot of these kids have never been 50 miles from home before, except maybe to go to a state high school tournament. They've never been away from their folks except for maybe a weekend. They've never lived with anyone except their mother and father and maybe a brother and sister. If it's a big adjustment for the average student who simply goes to the university for an education, then what's it like for the athlete who has to go to practice and is constantly in the limelight like a Rex Chapman who is getting all the national recognition? And one other note, how can a football player be allowed to play an entire football season before he has a report card? We've got to get back to where we take care of a kid's mind as well as his body. All of them are not going to play in the NBA or the NFL. We're seeing more and more athletes becoming athletic bums after their collegiate days and they think they can hide behind the likes of

TCP: What do you think of the 45-second shot clock and the threepoint shot in college basketball?

Milo Hamilton: I like it a lot. I like to see the ball have to change hands. Nobody can sit on the ball anymore. It's made it a better game for the players, better for the coaches and I think it has made for more interest for the fans. The three-point shot? I get split right down the middle on the guys I talk to. The guys (coaches) who don't have three-point shooters don't like it. I would like to see it go back to a distance between the current line and the NBA line. That way you could have a natural progression. Let the current college line be used for high schools, a second one for college and then the NBA line. I know some people say it cheapens the game, but I think it has opened it up a little more. It has made it a better game down inside now. You don't have all that jarring around down in there. It's still a physical game. The shot adds excitement. It used to be that if you went into the last three minutes and a team had a 10-point lead, everybody would say this game is over. It's not that way anymore. A guy comes down and hits two of those threepointers and all of a sudden it's a four-point game. That isn't close enough to get serious, but the other team starts thinking about it. And that might force the other team into a mistake or two and then the team behind comes back and bangs in another one. Yes, it's been good.

TCP: What did the exposure of Superstations WTBS and WGN do for your career as a sportscaster?

Milo Hamilton: Obviously, they meant that a lot more people heard and saw me than what would have without the superstations. I had been in Chicago quite a while before I went to Atlanta. Before I mail this survey back to Mr. Steitz however, I would ke to know what you — fans, coaches, players, think. Too bad fr. Steitz doesn't have enough survey forms because — it eems to me — what you think is what ought to count most in rules making.

In a statewide survey I did recently on the three point shot, ne theme that came back was "The game ain't broke, so stop

Sutton Would Like To Move UK's Student Body Closer To Action; Says 'For Sure' Four SEC Clubs Will Make NCAAs

Hungry for UK tid-its? Well, here are some leftover goodies from Eddie Sutton's weekly press con-ference held last Tues-

day prior to the Vanderbilt-Kentucky contest.

Sudden impact: When Kentucky's Rex Chapman and Florida junior Vernon Maxwell accidentally collided, UK's freshman sensa-tion fell to the ground and remained there for more than five minutes. Chapman's injury cut on the forehead-required three stiches.

Asked what was going through his mind hen Chapman laid helplessly on the floor, Eddie Sutton responded by saying, "The first thing that always goes through any coach's mind, I would hope, was the fact that he was not injured seriously. It (Chapman and Maxwell's collision) was like a couple of billy goats getting after each other. It was a freak

"Maxwell came down and tried to make a move on Rex," Sutton said, remembering how the incident took place. "Rex held his ground. Then, Maxwell darted to the left and lost position of the ball—the ball went right. They collided head on. Maybe Maxwell has a harder head than Rex because he walked

away and Rex didn't.
"My concern, not only for our players but for their players as well, I hope no one ever gets hurt seriously in a ballgame.

Showin' your stuff: Next week (March 1) Kentucky's final regular season battle will be against Billy Tubb's Sooner gang. Right now, prior to the Wildcats' second fling with Vandy, UK appears to be in good position for deserving an NCAA at-large invite. But who knows what will happen, especially with Kentucky playing a difficult schedule at the end of the regular season.

Following the Ole Miss-UK ballgame (Feb. 28), Sutton's club will tangle with one of the nation's top clubs, Oklahoma. Being that the Rupp Arena contest will be nationally televised it's possible this game, depending on UK's record, could mean a lot toward the Wildcats getting an NCAA bid.

What do you think, coach?

"I don't think anyone at this point could predict the 64 teams. I think everything will come down to that last Sunday, when con-ference tournaments are being played and who wins. In the Southwest Conference, in all likelihood, there is only one team that deserves to get in the NCAA field and that's TCU. But, if by chance the University of Houston or someone else would happen to win the SWC (tourney) then the tournament committee is almost locked into inviting TCU as an at-large ballclub, because they have pro-

ved themselves.

"That's the way it is throughout the country. There's a chance that we may get five SEC teams in the tournament, depending on what happens.

"We've already proven ourselves that on a given day we're pretty good. The wins over Navy, at Alabama are probably more important than any of them. Louisville (a team UK beat) will probably win their tournament and be in the NCAA. Even though they've (Cardinals) struggled, it was a big win (UK winning, 85-51). Beating Florida (was important). I think every game is important. One year Kentucky got in with a 16-12 record. . hopefully we can get to Atlanta with at least

Winston, oh Winston, where have vou been?: Obviously, Kentucky would be different ballclub if Winston Bennett was in the lineup this season instead of recover-

"I told somebody on the plane back from Gainesville that if you put Winston Bennett in our lineup and I believe our record would be a little inforce. "We're still playing for this season and we'll think about next season as soon as this one

One player who visited the UK campus after the national signing date was defensive lineman Mark Moore of Charleston, WVa. Moore is a 6-4, 235-pound defensive tackle, and is considered one of the better prospects coming out of the state of West Virginia. Apparently, Moore is interested in Kentucky because West Virginia put too much pressure on him to sign. . UK senior defensive tackle John Shannon had the misfortune of showing his hand through the window of UK strength coach Pat Etcheberry's office door not long ago. The incident occurred during the 'Cats' winter workout period at the Shively Sports Center. Shannon became frustrated with himself after not being able to bench press 350 pounds on several attempts, a weight he had successfully lifted last season.

It appears former UK center Melvin Turpin might not be headed for the Los Angeles Lakers after all as the rumors have been reporting. But recently, the Lakers dealt big men Frank Brickowski and Petur Gudmondsson, along with a first-round draft pick, to the San Antonio Spurs for forward-center Mychal Thompson. With the trade, it looks as though Turpin will be with the Cavs for the remainder of the season.

"Duke, because they have lost a lot of people off their ballclub. Overall, I think the Big East has been a big surprise. We all knew that there would be some good teams but the balance of the Big East has been a surprise

Another bolt out of the blue has been the overall play of the Southeastern Conference. "The balance of the SEC, when you get by the first two teams (Alabama, Florida), has probably been a surprise," responded the UK coach.

Sutton went on to say that he thought the Southeastern Conference would have "for sure" four representatives in the NCAA tournament.

There's no place like home: With his second 18-game round-robin slate nearing an end, Sutton has made two stops each at almost all the SEC road sites.

Sutton said there was one obvious difference between the Rupp Arena crowd, which earlier in the season he referred to as a "country club setting," and some of his other road encounters in the league.

"What you see at Florida and a lot of the places down around the floor is that all the fans are student-body. There's a difference.
All the fans around Rupp Arena, for the most part down low are adult fans. I don't think anywhere in America can you expect adults to be quite as active or as enthusiastic as our wonderful students here at the University of Kentucky or any institution."

The UK coach went on to add, "Florida's students have you surrounded down there (O'Connell Center)."

In regards to Rupp Arena, he said, "I'm not sure if I have the ability in time to even change that. I think it would be very difficult to move someone out of their seat. They tell me here when divorce proceedings begin that one of the first things that they talk about, the attorneys do, is who gets the seats at Rupp

Arena. That's probably true.

"I think our fans are good, they're very good. Against Tennessee I thought they were the best; they helped us win that ballgame. They played their part of the Sixth Man. LSU is a tough place to play and so is Florida. Those might be the two toughest places."

Practice? What practice?: Kentucky's practice at the O'Connell Center the day before its meeting with UF was cancelled. UK was given a week or so notice before its trip to the Sunshine State, indicating the gym had already been reserved for another function. Thus, the Wildcats couldn't take a crack at the O'Connell goals until game day.

Farmer—Keeps Tide Intact

Did this have any adverse effects in regards to the 'Cats' 22-58—38.2 percent—shooting woes from the field?

"Oh, it was a factor," replied Sutton. "But our percentage was certainly lowered by us shooting so many three-point shots (making four of 14). Late in the game we kept coming down and shooting those three-point shots.

"Anytime you can't get into the arena and shoot it hurts you a little bit. Occasionally, Rupp Arena is scheduled for a concert and teams can't get in there. We'll always apologize; I'm sure coach (Joe) Hall and his staff through the years did the same thing.

"In answering your question, yes, I think it's important that you have that opportunity to shoot on the opposing team's floor."

Nashville star: Sutton believes that Vanderbilt center Will Perdue should be selected as the center on the all-conference team.

"He's the most improved player (in the SEC)," Sutton said. "I really believe he's a good player; he's smart."

With two weeks remaining in the regular season, Sutton would rate Alabama's Derrick McKey as the league's Player of the Year.

McKey or Perdue then I have to go with McKey. Perdue is certainly the best 'true' center. McKey can play center, which he has to many times, but he can also play forward.

"When you show me a center who has the best percentage shooting three-pointers (on 'Bama's team) then you have to believe that he's more than a center. And they have got a couple of guys that can knock it down in (Mark) Gottfried and (Jim) Farmer."

Sutton wouldn't name his entire all-SEC squad, because he wanted to wait until the completion of the regular season. He said the all-conference guard selections would be very difficult to make.

Ole Eddie's right!

Let's see, how 'bout these candidates to pick from: Tony White, Vernon Maxwell, Andrew Moten, Frank Ford, Ed Davender, Rex Chapman, Willie Anderson, Anthony Wilson and Terry Coner. Could you pick only two guards from this list?

"Last year our league was blessed with a lot of great forwards," Sutton noted. "This year we've got some sensational guards."

As far as even thinking about which guards should be selected, Sutton said, "That guy down at Tennessee (White) is not bad, I might start with him."

Areas of importance: UK's coach was asked what he looks for in an all-conference player. Here's his answer:
"First of all you have to look to see if he's

"First of all you have to look to see if he's a complete player," Sutton said. "Scoring averages are sometimes deceiving. When you let a guy shoot the ball 300 times and somebody else shoots it 200 times you're going to have more points.
"You have to look at the stats and also I

"You have to look at the stats and also I think it's important that the guy is a *team* player because basketball is a *team* game. Even though he might not score as many points as someone else you have to look and see what he does for the ballclub. Does he make them better? Does he allow his ballclub to be a winner?

"That's why I like Farmer—he makes Alabama a winner. He's the glue that puts it all together. They've got good players but I like Farmer.

"Also, I think that if it comes down between two guys and one guy has great character while the other guy may have had some problems, then I'll choose this guy (great character). Team play comes into this. Has he been a good student/athlete? Has he done the things his coaches have asked of him?"

"McKey's the best player in the league,"

said Sutton.

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Russell's Merideth To Guide Kentucky **Prep All-Star Team**

Russell High School's Marvin Merideth, dean of coaches in the 16th Region, has been named to coach the Kentucky Boys All-Stars in the 46th renewal of the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation's Kentucky-Indiana All-Star high school basketball series this summer, according to Kentucky Game Director George

Merideth, who had racked up a 608-188 record in 29 years as a head coach coming into this season, is the winningest coach ever into this season, is the winningset coactieved in the 16 Region. Among Merideth's accomplishments are three 16th Region championships (1967, '68, '72). His 1967 team holds the state record for scoring 100 points in six consectutive games. His teams at Russell have won 20 or more games on 21 different occasions. different occasions.

Merideth, who has averaged 20.9 wins per season, ranks fifth on the all-time win list in Kentucky high school basketball. He was honored by *Sports Illustrated* after winning his 600th game last season.

Merideth played basketball under the famed Cam Henderson at Marshall University and also ran track at MU.


He will lead an 11-member Kentucky All-Star team against Indiana on June 20 at Market Square Arena in Indianapolis and June 27 at Louisville's Freedom Hall.

The assistant coach for the Kentucky squad will be East Carter head coach Charles Baker, who directed his team to the school's first 16th Region championship last season.

Baker, a member of the Kentucky Lions Hall of Fame, carried a career record of 184-108 in 11 seasons into the current

Baker played college basketball at Rio Grande College in Ohio, and was *The* Ashland Daily Independent All-Area Coach of the Year last season. He has led his team to a runner-up finish in the region twice.

Kentucky's boys team swept Indiana last season behind the play of Mr. Basketball Rex Chapman of Owensboro Apollo. Indiana leads the series with Kentucky 47-30.

Madison Has Turned UK Baseball Around


Fans Come From Three States For Clinic

When Keith Madison returned to his native state over nine rears ago, the new University of Kentucky baseball coach had one purpose in mind.

"I wanted to renew interest in amateur baseball at the univer sity and around the city of Lexington," said Madison. "Amateur baseball wasn't too popular when I arrived."

As evidenced by the fact that on one of Madison's first days on the job, he received a memo from the ticket manager, which

s addressed to the Wildcats' previous coach. 'The memo said that no ticket takers would staff the baseball



games that spring," Madison explained. "Because we weren't taking in enough money to pay their salaries. That sort of fired

So much, in fact, that by that spring over 3,000 fans showed up for a UK game against the University of Georgia at Shively Field on the last day of the season.

"That shows you how fast it can be turned around," said

Madison Has Turned Bat 'Cat Program Around

Still, years later, the UK baseball program is overshadowed by football and basketball, the "major" sports on campus simply because they bring in more revenue to the athletic department. That leaves sports like baseball, tennis, swimming, field hockey, ice hockey, track and field, cross country and others out

But Madison hasn't let that stop him from building the baseball program up to a respectable level in the rugged Southeastern Conference. He came to Lexington from Mississip-

pi State, one of the best programs in the south, and knows what it takes to field good collegiate level teams.
"It's been a slow process," said Madison. "But recently I've seen a difference. We're getting better and better each season. And we're receiving more publicity from the media, particularly the television stations. In the past, we haven't had the consistent publicity we've needed to generate enough interest. But that seems to be changing now.'

Clinic Becoming More And More Popular

Besides the increased media coverage, another indication of further interest in the area is the increasing popularity of Madison's Kentucky Baseball Clinic. This year, close to 700 fans turned out at the Lexington Civic Center to receive instruction on how to fine-tune their games.

"It seems like the clinic is growing and growing every year," said Madison. "This year, we brought in a superstar, Steve Garvey, and that generated the additional publicity we needed to be successful. Garvey's presence made the people more

aware of what we're trying to accomplish here at UK, as well as

Madison says he started the clinic to bring more attention to the program, but also to spurn more interest in baseball as a

Sox last year; Doug Flynn, another Lexington native who won a gold-glove and played on the Cincinnati championship clubs in the mid-70s and Rob Murphy, the Reds' rookie sensation who is rated one of the National League's best young lefties.

Garvey A Hit At The Clinic

Of all the speakers, of course, Garvey was the most popular.

"There are three things I learned from my father and my coaches while I was growing up," he told the wide-eyec youngsters. "You've got to make a commitment to be the best that you can be. You've got to have a good attitude towards yourself and others. You've got to be dedicated enough to sacrifice all the long hours it takes to be a good baseball

Garvey added that in sports you constantly have to prove yourself, that what you've done in the past doesn't matter

The key is to maintain your aggressiveness and keep work ing hard, especially when you're in a slump," said Garvey. "Stay within yourself. The mental approach is more important than the physical approach."

In the background, Madison beamed.

"We'll try to have another clinic next winter with more bigname players and good college coaches," he said. "The clinic motivates coaches and players and gets them mentally prepared for the upcoming season, which is right around the corner. Plus, it's a good way for me to meet the high school coaches and players from around the state."

UK's season opens February 27 at West Florida in Pensacola. After three games there, it returns home for the opener against Indiana on March 3 at 2 p.m.

Good Weather Helps Team Ready For Season

"We're really excited about it," said Madison. "So far this year, we've had the best weather ever since I've been back in Kentucky. We've been outside every day since January 15, ex-

cept for four or five days."

Madison says the poorer weather conditions in March and early April doesn't help attendance that much, but when a nice day es come around the people usually show up.
"People will come out and see our games," said Madison

'Last fall, for example, we had over 2,000 fans show up at noon in the middle of the week to see us play the University of

With Flynn back in town on a permanent basis and beginning a summer league for high school youth this year, the future of amateur baseball looks good in Kentuck

'We're real happy with the way things are going," said Madison.

Six Years Ago

*Kentucky center Sam Bowie blocked a 10-foot baseline jumper by LSU's Howard Carter in the game's final seconds as the Wildcats downed the visiting Tigers 73-71 in classic confrontation viewed by a national TV audience and a Rupp Arena record crowd of 24,011. On paper, the game meant little since LSU had already wrapped up the SEC crown. But it was a pride contest for Kentucky as LSU was threatening to become the first club in 25 years to go through SEC play undefeated. The Tigers entered the game riding the nation's longest winning streak-26 games-and was ranked second in the country. The win gave Kentucky a 22-4 record for the year. UK also made ammends for an setback at Baton Rouge earlier in the year. With the help of a roaring crowd from beginning to end, Kentucky never trailed dur-ing the game. Carter's final miss was one of three chances LSU had to tie the score during the game. Four Wildcats-Bowie, Dirk Minniefield, Melvin Turpin and Chuck Verderber—scored II points each, and Tiger coach Dale Brown said that was the difference in the game. Carter finished with a game-high 24.

shots for a season-high shooting percentage of 69.2 percent, the Kentucky Wildcats were able to escape Starkville with a 78-74 win over a stubborn Mississippi State team. UK never trailed but State did manage to tie the score in the second half and forced the 'Cats to hit some key free throws down the stretch. Dirk Minniefield paced UK with 20 points, while Sam Bowie added 18 points and Charles Hurt pitched in with 16. Jeff Malone led State with

LSU had a chance to win the game in regulation but missed a last-second shot. UK then failed to score on the first possession of overtime and LSU went into a stall with 4:20 left. However, with :27 remaining in the game, a jump ball was called between Greg Cook and UK's Sam Bowie. UK controlled the ball and called for a timeout, where the drew up a play to set a double screen for Macy's game-winning shot. UK's Fred Cowan and LSU's Ethan Martin had exceptional games. Cowan hit 12 of 18 shots, scored 27 points and grabbed nine rebounds. Martin missed just three of 15 shots and scored 29 points. UK also got 16 points from Bowie

and 11 each from Macy and LaVon Williams.
*More than 8,000 fans, among them Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins and former Gov. Happy Chandler, were on hand at Memorial Coliseum to greet the UK basketball team after their 76-74 triumph over LSU which gave UK the SEC regular-season crown. Collins read a proclamation which declared Feb. 25 as "University of Kentucky Wildcat Day."


