## A New Constitution For SGA

(Editor's note: Norma Weatherspoon, mem-er of the committee which drafted the new-ionstitution for the Student Government As-ociation, explains here the workings of the new-golation. Miss Weatherspoon points out the laces in which the new Constitution differs rom the old.)

its history. You, the students, are accepting or
rejecting the document which is to regulate student affairs on this campus. You are adopting
or relaxing to adopt a constitution, the constituation of the Student Government association
of the University of Kentucky.

Actual changes are most apparent in the provisions for officers and members of the Assembly.

Under the old document, a president, a men's vice-president, and a women's vice-president formed the executive branch. A candidate for these positions was required to have a University standing of at least 18, to be a second semester sophomore with a year's residence at the University, to be among the higher 50 percent on a preliminary examination testing leadership apaitude, knowledge of the University, and knowledge of parliamentary procedure. No provision was made in the Constitution itself for either vice-president to succeed when a vacancy occurred in the presidency.

Simplifying the executive division, the new

Simplifying the executive division, the new document provides for a president and a vice-president, who shall serve when the president is unable to assume his duties. To become a candidate, a student must have a 1.3 scholastic standing, must have had two quarters of residence at the University, and must file a statement of his candidacy with the registrar seven days before the election.

Non voting members of the Assembly include the presidents and secretaries of the Upion Board and the House Presidents' Council of Women Students, heads of all administrative departments created by the Assembly, and three faculty members selected by the University Fac-
