GASTIES NIGHT



One World Film Festival

The One World Film Festival will be showing eight films in March on five nights. The first one, *Golden Threads*, will be shown on Saturday March 4 7 pm at the Central Library Theater, downtown. The film explores the work of Christine Burton who founded Golden Threads, an international network for midlife and elder lesbians.

In addition to this film, we will show a short documentary made by teenagers participating in the Appalachian Media Institute summer program. Their film, *Through Their Eyes: Stories of Gays and Lesbians in the Mountains*, is a brave and powerful film. When you listen to these out men and women living in rural Kentucky, you will be encouraged to take your next step out. Two of the young film makers will be joining us for discussion and I would like to give them a big Thank you.

On Tuesday, March 7 at 7 pm we will show Earth, directed by Deepa Mehta. This film has received international critical acclaim and is the second of Mehta's trilogy Fire, Earth, and Water (yet to be made). Earth takes place in 1947 when India and Pakistan were partitioned resulting in violence between the Hindus, Muslims and Sikhs. Ms. Mehta says of her work "We hoped to understand why war is waged and why friends turn enemies, and why battles are invariable fought on women's bodies." English subtitles. Followed by a reception.

On Thursday, March 16 at 7:15 pm, The City, (La Ciudad) film debut of writer/director David Riker. This independent film has won a number of awards including the Open Palm Award, from the Independent Gotham Awards. Riker worked for years within the Hispanic communities of New York City, developing relationships, seeking out nonprofessional actors, and learning about the cultures. "The Puppeteer," one of the four stories that make up this film, tells the story of an immigrant who draws from his childhood memories of puppetering in order to survive. The puppets were made for the film by Hispanic immigrants, who were learning this traditional art form in order to preserve an important aspect of their culture. This film portrays the loneliness, economic hardship, educational needs, and hope within immigrant life; issues relevant to all American immigrants throughout our history. Spanish and English,

On Saturday, March 18 at 2 pm we will show the classic 1972 film **Sounder**, Martin Ritt, director. **Sounder** stars Cicely Tyson and Paul Winfield, both of whom were nominated for academy awards for their performances. This film

portrays the struggles of a black sharecropping family in Louisiana during the depression. The racism of the era is the background to this warm and uplifting story. **Sounder** received Academy Award nominations for Best Actor, Best Actress, Best Screenplay and Best Picture. There will be a reception following the film.

On Tuesday, March 21, three short Jewish films will be shown. At 7:15 Mike DeWitt's Delta Jews profiles Jewish communities in the Mississippi Delta. This documentary follows generations of Jews who settled and raised families within the Southern culture of Mississippi. Issues of assimilation, intermarriage, anti-Semitism, and racism are explored. At 8:15, The Golem (of L.A.), a live action short subject that won the CINE Gold Eagle award. Ed Asner stars as Rabbi Lowenstein who struggles to save L.A.'s oldest remaining synagogue. In desperation, he calls upon the aid of the supernatural, the "Golem," a figure from tradition Jewish tales. At 8:45, Miriam's Daughters Celebrate documents the celebration of two rituals, a Passover Seder and a baby-girl naming ceremony, by a group of Jewish feminists including Bella Abzug, Gloria Steinem, and Letty Cottin Pogrebin. This women have modified and created rituals over time to honor women's lives within the Jewish tradition. There will be a reception after the film.

In April, Diversity Films will be showing a number of documentaries by Lucy Massie Phenix, a Lesbian film maker who's has won a variety of awards. GLSO will help sponsor *Word Is Out*, the first coming out documentary made. We are looking for volunteers, financial sponsors and contributors to enable us to bring Lucy and her films to Lexington. U.S. Congressman Jerrold Nadler (D-N.Y.) introduced a bill that would allow a gay and lesbian citizens to sponsor their foreign national partners for immigration into the United States.
 President Clinton called Republican National Committee chairman Jim Nicholson a gay basher when speaking to a group of trial lawyers at a Dallas fundraiser.
 About 5,000 people took part in a march from downtown Tucson to the University of Arizona campus to protest the stabbing of a gay man.
 The Football Association (Soccer) of the United Kingdom joined forces with gay rights advocates there to help fight homophobia in soccer and to help soccer players come out.

JOURNAL OF SEXUAL HEALING

For the last 4 or 5 months, I've been thinking about writing something for the Journal of Sexual Healing articles written by my partner, Kelly O'Ferrell. Of course, the usual reasons have been going on in my mind and body to keep me from writing sooner - FEAR, INSECURITY, VULNERABILITY, and PRIDE.

But, I decided that I wanted my love and commitment to Kelly to become stronger than my life long feelings of inadequacy. I am so proud of Kelly for writing these articles even though sometimes I can feel myself becoming flushed and wanting to turn red when she is reading it to me. These reactions of mine have nothing to do with her and everything to do with certain ideas taught to me by my family of origin.

You see, I am an incest survivor and, needless to say, I have carried around shame and self-loathing that started in my family a long time before I was born. I lived in a fog of drugs and alcohol and wallowed in self-pity. Rage and depression were the clothes I put on every morning and every night I walked willingly back into a self-imposed jail cell. Fortunately, I believe that I experienced divine3 intervention in my miserable existence and over the past 11 years have been given the opportunity to shed my pain and replace it with love and as much forgivness as I am capable.

This brings me to my partner Kelly. My beautiful partner. Now, I'm not going to lie to you. In the past 6 years we've been together, we've had our share of conflicts over money, household chores, jobs, family and, you guessed it, SEX.

Sex, that part of a human being's life that is fraught with parental misconceptions and societies unrealistic expectations that are rooted mostly in ego and myth.

Unfortunately, for me, sex was a power that loomed large in my mind. It had to be in my distorted thinking process because my body was completely shut down. Even now, it is still partially paralyzed. Sex was about power, control and love. (Now there's 3 ideas that, combined together, form a picture of mental health.)

I used to operate out of many faulty belief systems when it came to sex - like sex equals love, sex equals self-worth, sex is only about bringing the other person to orgasm (God forbid anyone touch me. If they did, I just did what many other women do faked it), sex equals an intimate relationship, everybody is having sex everyday (at least 5 or 6 orgasms), all lesbians like oral sex, you can't say no to sex, you lie and say you like everything the other person is doing whether you do or not, and unfortunately, the list can go on ad infinitum.

This is part of the person that Kelly chose to be with, and I am so grateful. From the first time I met Kelly, looked into her beautiful, sexy, brown eyes and shook her hand, I felt warmth and an energy that I have felt ever since. I couldn't be blessed with a better partner.

When it comes to sex, I have been angry at her, blamed her, felt self-pity, tried to manipulate her, pouted, retaliated, and contemplated having an affair. All because I wasn't getting my way.

All my reactions to her have really been reactions to all my old ideas about sex and sexuality. I knew this and knew I needed to do more work in this area. Apparently, getting sober and 5 years of on and off therapy were just a beginning in this wonderful process.

For a long time, I wanted kelly to think it was her fault, her issues. I might not have come right out and said that, but I wanted her to think that so that I wouldn't have to do the work. I didn't want her to hurt, I just didn't want to hurt either. I was finally able to come to terms with some of the old ideas I shared about.

I do know today, that sex does not equal love. The love I have for Kelly is much deeper than any sexual act. I know sex is not about power or control but about being vulnerable - like lying next to each other naked and touching each other (not the genitals) and being willing to communicate likes and dislikes. I know that my self-worth is about character and how I treat others and myself, and that an orgasm is a small part of a great, wonderful and broad process of experiencing one's sexuality.

I know that I have more than one valuable and intimate relationship in my life and that Kelly can't meet all my needs. I know that it is perfectly acceptable to set boundaries and say not. I can say it and hear it with love.

I know that there are many lesbians that do not care for oral sex and that, sometimes, I am one of them. And most of all, I know that I never want Kelly or myself to do anything that we don't want to do just to satisfy the other's physical desires.

I owe much of my growth to my partner who has been patient, honest and loving. She has been the mirror I so desperately needed to look into.

I am very content and happy in my relationship today. We have mutual trust, respect and admiration for each other's talents and limitations and, the neatest part of it is, that it has nothing to do with how much sex we have or don't have.

I love you, Kelly, for allowing yourself to be who you are and passing that gift on to me. I used to dream of finding a soulmate, but now I have moved on to other dreams.

Census 2000

Within the next few months every household 'should' be receiving a census form. I emphasize the word should because I have never received or completed a form, and I am not sure what years I was counted. When I was younger, the head of the house did the paperwork and there wasn't always room on the form for all the children. By the time I was head of the house, my mind was on extended vacation around the Milky Way and the census wasn't a part of the adventure.

I am grounded now and this family will be counted in this census. According to the information sheet, a short form or a long form will be mailed or hand delivered to every address. The forms have questions about who lives in the dwelling, the type of dwelling, your name, phone number, sex, age and date of birth (just in case the math tripped you up), are you Spanish/Hispanic/Latino, and what is your race.

Each question may answered by marking the appropriate box, and this includes the sex question. You won't be getting more sex, but rather you choose whether you are male or female. If you are both, or neither, or unsure, then call 1-800-YYXX-XYZZ. This toll free number is given at the bottom of the first page. Once you make the call, the voice on the other end will let you know which is your box.

When you get to the question on race, there are more choices. For the first time you will get to decide who you are, because the Census Bureau has been made aware that there are people of more than one

race. If the selection of answers does not define you, then you will be allowed to write in your answer. This is not a joke; you really do get to decide your race.

It will be interesting to see what the Census Bureau does with this particular data; at last report, it was still being debated how best to interpret and analyze the anticipated answers. The coding of the data will have an impact on federal funding and research, so stay tuned for the outcome.

Another change in the forms is the options for non-related others who live under your roof. The choices are roomer/border, housemate/roommate, unmarried partner, foster child, or other non-relative. There is not a space to write in an answer and that is a shame because there is so much more to non-relative living arrangements.

An example is this true to life family: "My nephew, who was my niece, was a surrogate mother a few years ago and gave birth to a child whose divorced biological parents have granted custody of the child to my partner and me." Is the child a relative?

Some people would say count the child as a relative and skip the rest of the story. Others would say count the child as a non-relative because the begetting and the begotten don't add up. The unsure person should probably dial that 1-800 number and get help from the voice. Also, depending on which partner's name appears first on the form, there could be another twist to the whole matter. The very first name on the form is the central figure that determines the relationship of all others in the house; how are you

related to Person #1?

So, if the family above allows the co-renter (we will call her June) to put her name first, then the couple and the child will be listed on the census form as June's housemates. Of course June may like it that her name is on top, but putting June first equates to the invisibility of the couple's relationship to each other and to the child.

If a partner's name is first, then a more precise picture will be presented: the other person is a nonmarried partner, the child is (or is not) theirs, and June is a housemate. June may not like being further down the list, but she can get her own place and wait another 10 years if she wants to be Person #1. If you want your relationship included in the census, then keep the form out of June's hands.

Should you get the short form, there are about six questions per person. The long form has over 50 questions per person with inquiries about education, ancestry, ability to speak English, disabilities, income, how do you get to work, who rides to work with you, what time do you leave for work, and much more. If you have ever applied for welfare, then this form may seem familiar; some of the questions seek the same type of information that determines whether a family is eligible for assistance.

In fact, welfare is one of the many programs influenced by the census. The government (federal and local) and community organizations use the data to determine funding, implementation, and evaluation of programs, services, construction, business, etc. The data is also used to determine the number of seats each state continued on the next page

has in the House of Representatives and the seats in the state Legislature.

The census form is not tailored for every aspect of all peoples' lives. Completing and returning the form can make a difference for the community with which you identify. Changes will only take place if the Census Bureau is made aware that changes are needed.

Soulforce Press Release James Lawson, Dr. King's "Soul Mate in Nonviolence" Heads Clergy Protest of Anti-Homosexual Rhetoric

The hero of THE CHILDREN, David Halberstam's prize-winning history of the civil rights movement, is convinced that seeking justice for sexual minorities is "the next civil rights frontier." The Rev. "Jim Lawson's lifetime experience as a civil rights activist, his commitment to Gandhi's 'soul force,' his gifts as speaker and teacher, his connections with other justice and peace movements around the globe, and his deeply held faith that our Creator seeks justice for all could renew and redirect our entire GLBT movement," states White, Co-Chair of Soulforce.

Dr. Lawson explained why he's leading dozens of interfaith clergy in the anti-homosexual protesting rhetoric of Pat Robertson's 700 Club, seen three times daily on the Fox Family Channel. "For eighteen months Fox executives have refused to meet with us," Lawson said. "It's too bad. We're only trying to help them understand why their 'family channel' is no longer safe for America's families. (Robertson's "rhetoric of intolerance" is featured three hours daily) We aren't trying to embarrass or censor Fox Family or Mr. Robertson. We just want them to hear the truth, that homosexuals are God's children, too. Mr. Robertson's anti-homosexual campaign is not only untrue, it leads to discrimination, suffering, and even death."

Dr. Lawson is convinced that "Mr. Robertson uses anti-homosexual rhetoric to raise money and mobilize volunteers. He misquotes the Bible to support his false and divisive views. It's nothing new. Southern preachers like Robertson were misusing the Bible to demean and demonize black Americans in the 1960s just like they're misusing the Bible to demean and demonize gay Americans today."
