

FRANKFORT — Student government presidents from four state universities say a tuition freeze is a good idea that will probably never be implemented.

Nobel Prize winner to speak today

Dr. Baruch S. Blumberg won the Nobel Prize in 1997 for discovering a virus that is far more common than AIDS, said Eileen VanShaik, a UK anthropology graduate student. But Hepatitis B, or serum hepati-tis, is not as serious as AIDS, Van-Shaik said.

Blumberg, who will speak at 3:30 p.m. today in 213 Lafferty Hall, helped develop a vaccine for the

virus. His lecture, "Medical Anthropology and Hepatitis Research," is part of the UK Ashland visiting professor series, VanShaik said.

Blumberg, director of the Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadel-phia, "has done important work on Hepatitis B that directly leads to its association with liver cancer," said VanShaik, an Ashland professor as-sistant.

said, "He's an appropriate speaker.
"He does a good job of bridging
the biological and social sciences,"

In his lectures, Blumberg considers a variety of areas related to bi-ological patterns, VanShaik said. She said Blumberg will examine "the cultural and behavioral aspects and how those interact with human piology."

During his visit to Kentucky, Blumberg will travel to Fort Knox, Morehead, Ashland and Somerset, where he will meet with medical and college communities, VanShaik said.

"We need to have reasonable in-surance rates," Blandford said.



EPA backs away on acid rain damage

WASHINGTON — A review by outside experts has led Environmental Protection Agency scientists to back away from their recent prediction that 300 lakes in the Northeast could become acidified in the next 50 years.

The review last week at the agency's laboratory in Corvallis, Ore., led to a consensus judgment that acid rain would not acidify "more than a few hundred" lakes in the Northeast, Courtney Riordan, director of EPA's acid rain research, said Wednesday.

And, he added, "you can't exclude zero" as the lowest possibility.

Lonetree named in additional charges

WASHINGTON — The Marine Corps has brought additional charges against Sgt. Clayton J. Lonettee, the first of two Marine security guards arrested on suspicion of spying wille working at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, Pentagon sources said yesterday.

The sources, who agreed to discuss the matter only if not identified, said the decision to add five additional charges to the 19 counts already pending had been prompted by the recent arrest of another guard, Cpl. Arnold Brace.

The sources declined to discuss the specific allegations underlying the new charges. But they said the charges in-cluded another count of espionage; two counts of conspira-cy to commit espionage, and two counts of "espionage-re-lated" general misconduct charges.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — An unmanned rocket that appeared to have been hit by lightning careened out of control yesterday and was destroyed by radio signal 51 seconds after it lifted off with an \$83 million military commu-

A NASA videotape clearly showed a lightning bolt de-scending from the vicinity of the Atlas-Centaur rocket, hid-den in clouds, and striking the launch pad about the time the vehicle exploded. Launch officials, however, said they did not want to speculate on what went wrong until they analyzed data

Flaming debris from the shattered rocket and payload plunged into the Atlantic Ocean about three miles off-shore. Coast Guard boats hurried to the scene to pick up

American says fellow hostage is dying

BEIRUT, Lebanon — American hostage Jesse Turner said on a videotape yesterday that fellow American captive Alann Steen is dying, and he urged the United States and Israel to accept the terms for Steen's release.

Their kidnappers, who said Monday that Steen was near death, want to trade him for 100 Arab prisoners held in Israel and demand that the United States persuade the Israelis. Both governments have refused the deal.

"You all know that our fellow Alann Steen is dying," Turner said in a five-minute videotape delivered to the offices of the leftist daily newspaper As-Safir in Moslem west Beirut.
