The Air Pair is taking their high-flying act to the NBA. Former Wildcats Ron Mercer and Derek Anderson brought UK's first round pick total to six UK's first round pick total to six in the past four years when they were selected by the Boston Celtics and Cleveland Cavaliers respectively in last night's NBA draft in Charlotte, N.C. New Boston Celtics and for-mer UK coach Rick Pitino

proved once again he is the master of deception by making everyone believe he wouldn't select Ron Mercer with either of his two first round selections and

selections and doing just that.
Pitino snatched Mercer with his second pick - the sixth overall - after taking guard Chauncey Billups with the third overall pick.

Underage drinkers beware

Driving under influence could cost license for six months

Underage drinking in college as common as thoroughbreds

in the Bluegrass.
But, underage students who have had even one drink might

think twice before getting in behind the wheel of a car.

A statute, commonly known as "Zero Tolerance," passed last year allows law enforcement to strip licenses away from anyone under 21 years of age driving with alcohol in their system.

Specifically, underage people with .02 percent or more alcohol in their bloodstream caught driving can lose their license for up to six months.

The legal definition of intoxication for people of age is .10 percent.

"It is becoming neccessary to take steps earlier and earlier."

Jack Miller, director of prosecution for the Fayette County Attorney's Office, said that after the period without their license, the violations comes off the

the period without their license, the violation comes off the records of underage offenders. Miller said it would always look like it was their first dri-ving under the influence offense.

Tresine Tatum, a 20-year-old biology junior, said, "(Zero tol-

erance) would be more outrageous if someone were over 21, but it is illegal to drink underage, so it seems fair."

On the other hand, Brandee Brown, a biotechnology senior, said she thought the penalty for underage people who drink and drive should be the same as that for people over 21.

The state statute says legally drunk people caught drinking and driving are to be fined between \$200 and \$500 and jailed between two and 30 days for their DUI offense.





Undergrad research gets boost from gift

\$1.1 million gift kicks off new program

Wendy Warren eases her hand behind a Louisiana craw-fish, a six-inch miniature lobster

fish, a six-inch miniature lobster with open pinchers.
This summer, Warren is working with the twitching muscles of the crawfish, recording the electrical impulses that make muscles move this way or that. In other words—neurophysiology.
Without funding for her undergraduate research, Warren could be easing her spatula behind a greasy burger, a quarter.

could be easing her spatula behind a greasy burger, a quar-ter-pound slab of cow with cholesterol.

Warren, a biology senior, is a recipient of the new UK Fund of Academic Excellence, a program started in January that raises pri-vate funds for undergraduate

research.

The fund was established to assist in UK's pursuit to become a top-20 research institution and to work aside the S4 million given by the Kentucky General Assembly to match UK funds.

According to the National Science Foundation, UK currently ranks 66th in research.

"It's good to have funding because otherwise (we'd) be working instead of doing this," Warren said.

Thursday, for example, she

was peering through a micro-scope at muscles of a tail peeled from a crawfish. The white stringy fibers looked more like snot than the organs that get the crustaceans from here to there. The same day in a building across campus, UK administra-tors gathered at a press confer-ence to announce a \$1.1 million gift to the UK School of Biologi-cal Sciences, making it possible for undergraduate students such as Warren to do research. as Warren to do research.

"This enterprise, we hope will span every college at the university," UK President Charles Wethington said. "To reach the goals we've all set, private funding is essential."

Gertrude Flora Ribble, a 1926 UK alumna and former science teacher, who died in 1996, left

the money to the school in the form of two endowments.

One is for graduate and undergraduate student scholarships. The other is for student enrichment such as research.

Robin Cooper, the assistant

professor in biological sciences helping with Warren's research, said, "There's a lot of money out there—rarely for undergradu-

undergraduate research helps give students practical experience in the laboratory, putting into practice what they learn in the classroom, Warren said.

"It means getting to do more independent research and incorporating things we learned to do," she said.

Other biology students participating include Marvin Ruffner, neurophysiology — Oscar Crawford, gel electrophoresis; Jerry Makin, nerve induction of gene expression; Misha Rhodes, sex specific markers in plants; and Elizabeth Otte, protein interaction.

One major reason for the implementation of a new career

center, is that the existing center is not handicapped accessible.

Sharon Childs, vice president of the career center, is concerned with the existing center's inaccessibility to the universities esti-mated 550-600 disabled stu-

"(Currently), accommodate students by bring-ing our services to them, but is not as adequable. It would be fairer (to the students) to have an accessible facility."

Planning for a

new career cen-ter has been an issue on the budget agenda for a time. long Edward Carter, vice pres-ident of management and budget said, "Building a new center has been a priority for quite some time." Upgrades need to be made, because the cur-rent facility is inadequate, he

ter is expected to be compatible with facilities at country's benchmark uni versities. Childs cites small, crowded facilities and

a lack of areas for students to speak with job recruiters as set-backs that can be remedied when the new center is completed. Childs also hopes the

center will attract more students to explore the many resources

available at the center.
"During the fall and spring we would like to see more (students visiting the facili-ty)," she said. "I think (the new

ty)," she said. "I think (the new center) will give us a better opportunity to serve students."
Angela Clouse, a biology junior, thinks a new center will greatly benefit all students.
"There are so many great services the center has to offer, but it is really too small to be accommodating," she said. "Having a larger center will give more students." larger center will give more stu-dents a chance to utilize the

Childs encourages students to stop by and check out the many services available to students at services available to students at the existing center. There are several computers, a resource library and a network of career counselors all available to UK students and alumni. The com-puters are equipped with data-bases that can make career planning, occupational information, and job vacancies easily accessi-

Career counselors are available to help students with interviewing skills, resume writing, and job placement. Individual orientation sessions can be set up to introduce students to the facilities by calling the information line at 257-2746.



Title IX states that "no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving.

tion program or activity receiv-ing federal assistance ..."

Before the law passed in 1972, girls made up just less than 18 percent of varsity high school

athletes. Now they make up almost 40 percent.

Increased opportunity for collegiate scholarships in athletics for women play a major role in encouraging girls to play sports. With the professional women's basketball, even more women will chose to become athletes.

This law has made its biggest impact on the sports world, but its reach goes much further.

its reach goes much further.
Colleges are now striving to
keep the number of female athletes proportional to the number
of women on campus. While this has meant a decline in the number of men getting scholarships, the impact on gender equity can-not be overlooked.

The administrative glass-ceiling is also being shattered by this

far-reaching law.
Title IX is leveling the playing field of life, not just sports.

And it's scope also encompass-

es men.






