Coalition: No to FL

Demonstration nets about 100 signatures from faculty, students against UK joining organization

The UK Coalition Against

The UK Coalition Against Sweatshops staged a protest yesterday against the UK administration's intention to sign on with the Fair Labor Association.

"Hey, hey, ho, ho, sweatshop labor has got to go." the dozen or so protesters shouted as they stood atop the rock wall behind the Student Center carrying signs that read "Sweatshops Make Me Mad" and "Sweatshops Are Bad for People."

The group estimated they

The group estimated they gathered at least 100 signatures from students and faculty during the protest and information distribution effort, which lasted an hour and a half.

"We're saying 'don't sign on (until ... everyone has had meaningful participation," said Trevor Sanders, a French and history junior.

History and sociology sophomore Luke Boyett participated in a teleconference Tuesday in which the organization United Students Against Sweatshops unsuccessfully attempted to persuade Nike to disclose the locations of the factories where it makes University apparel.

"The pressure that Nike has."

"The pressure that Nike has put upon universities to join the FLA is another example of the fox guarding the henhouse," Boyett said after the conference.

"It wants universities to entrust their monitoring to auditing firms that are accountable primarily to the corporations that hire them, not the university."

Sanders said the coalition members fear UK administrators

might decide to join the labor as-sociation during finals week or over the summer, without allow-ing for an open discussion about the issue with students and facul-ty members.

The coalition's campaign is as much about making sure students have a voice as it is about the sweatshops themselves, he said.



U.S. will accept Kosovo refugees

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration yesterday decided to allow Kosovo refugees to come to the United States for shelter rather than sending them to the U.S. military base in Guantanamo, Cuba. A White House official said details of the plan were not yet final but that rather than try to house as many as 20,000 refugees at any one site, relocation experts would place them with family members already living in America and with volunteers. The decision, which was announced by Vice President Al Gore in a speech at Ellis Island, was in part an effort to relieve pressures on Macedonia, a neighbor of Kosovo.

rearro jets hit Belgrade buildings

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — With NATO missiles striking Belgrade by night and day, the first batch of Apache attack helicopters touched down in Albania yesterday as the Western allies intensified their air campaigm against Yugoslavia. The arrival of the long-awaited U.S. anti-tank helicopters represents a significant boost in NATO's capability to destroy tanks and troops of Yugoslav forces blamed for atrocities



Stocks end up; Dow gains 132.87

NEW YORK — IBM's first-quarter earnings jumped 42 percent to \$1.47 billion as software and service revenues surged, easily surpassing Wall Street projections. In the three months ended March 31, IBM earned \$1.55 a share. While IBM officials credited software and service revenue for 60 percent of their gross profit, the computer giant's report showed revenue strength across the board and throughout the world.

Court takes up disabled care suit

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court justices worried aloud yesterday that mentally disabled people might be "abandoned on the streets" if an anti-bias law is judged to give them a broad right to live in home-like settings rather than state hospitals. The court was considering a Georgia case in which two women sued the state to get out of a mental hospital. The court is to decide by late June whether the Americans with Disabilities Act and a related regulation require community placement of the mentally disabled whenever appropriate.

IBM earnings jump 42 percent

NEW YORK — Stock prices posted strong gains yesterday as investors, reacting to encouraging earnings reports, returned to the Internet and pharmaceutical issues. The Dow Industriators loss 262 ft ot close at 10,561,42. On the NYSE, advancers led decliners 1,946-1,117. The NASDAQ was up 78,65 at 2,486.29.

Warming might spur El Niño

NEW YORK — Conditions like El Niño might settle in almost permanently if global warming gets bade arough, making climate disruptions such as droughts or excessive winter rain essentially the norm, a computer study sugests. That might happen around the year 2050 if nothing is done to control emissions of heat-trapping gases, said a researcher at the Max Planck Institute for Meteorology in Hamburg, Germany. El Niño is a phenomenon involving surface warming of the Pacific Ocean.

Knicks fire team president

PURCHASE, N.Y. — New York Knicks president and general manager Ernie Grunfeld took the fall yesterday for his team's poor season when he was reassigned within the organization and stripped of his power. The Knicks (21:21) are in danger of missing the playoffs for the first time in more than a decade.


The former Hardee's, reduced to a gravel lot for most of this semester, will soon be replaced by two new store fronts.



Tennis teams to roll in SEC

Middle of the pack: UK's men's and women's teams seeded sixth for tournament

Many of the top college tennis teams in the country will show their talents starting today in what may prove the premier conference tournament for both men and women: the Southeastern Conference.

Both the UK men and women play at 2 p.m. today, the men against Arkansas in Linder Stadium in Gainesville, Fla., the women against Auburn in W.T. Robinson Stadium at LSU.

Eight SEC men's and women's teams are ranked in the top 20, and the "middle-of-the-road" women's teams face stiff competition from the top three seeds in the tournament. Florida, Georgia and Ole Miss all hold 92 SEC records or better.

"Every team," UK senior Massoumeh Emmin said, "is going to have to give 100 percent and really scrap to win."

Especially if they want to beat Florida.

The Lady Gators post an unblemished regular-season record (24-40) for the fourthstraight year and are the top-ranked team in the country.

Florida enters the tournament for the fifth-straight year as the No. 1 seed and is aiming for its 17th conference title in 20 years of women's SEC tennis.

Third-ranked Georgia, the last conference team to beat Florida enters with the



No. 2 seed after going 20-2 and 10-1 in the SEC during the season.

The other two squads with first-round byes are Ole Miss and South Carolina, with the Rebels posting a 9-2 conference record and looking like the hottest team heading into the tournament. They're eighth in the nation and have won five straight and nine of the straight and him of the straight and hi

On the men's side, Ole Miss, Florida and Georgia also hold the top three spots, in that order. LSU, seeded fourth, earned the other first-round bye The UK men earned the same seed as their female counterparts (6) and finished the season with nearly the same record, 14-8 and 6-5 in the SEC.

The Rebels and the Gators hold identi-cal 17-4, 9-2 SEC records, with Ole Miss win-ning the regular-season bout. But Florida hosts the men's tournament and is 12-1 on its home court this year.
