Thursday is Armistice Day. On that day we will honor the ending of the World War. November 11, 1918, was probably a happy day. November 11, 1918, was probably a happy day. November 11, 1937, sees a part of the world again engaged in a war, another part framically "getting ready" and the rest sitting by, terrified. The realistic lover of peace is confused as he stands silently for two minutes at 11 o'clock on Armistice Day, 1937, brings many challenges to students. The last war taught us that war is largely a student matter. The student is the human material with which wars are won and lost. And, just as war is a student matter, so is the cause of peace. The student of today must be prepared to fight for peace, if there is to be any peace. To do this he must understand thoroughly those factors which oppose peace. He must understand that peace is not merely a personal artitude. Real peace has its foundations in economic and social factors, just as war. A realistic peace policy must be more unified and more aggressive than the war movement. A passive attitude is childish in comparison with Mussolini's cloquent praise of war and the grim actuality of his war practices. The peace lover has courage and daring as well as faith.

The ideal of peace is the ideal of freedom freedom and peace cannot be separated. Every intelligent person knows that the freedom of the world is in danger. The loss of freedom will become more than a danger; it will become a fact—unless there is a strong and courageous unity among the men and women who will not give in passively to oppression and war.

The student body must be the flesh and blood of the struggle for peace and freedom. Their faith and their strength are the essence of the ideal. Their faith is their ability to measure the demagogue's mask of justice. Their unceasing protest againgt this injustice is their strength.
