

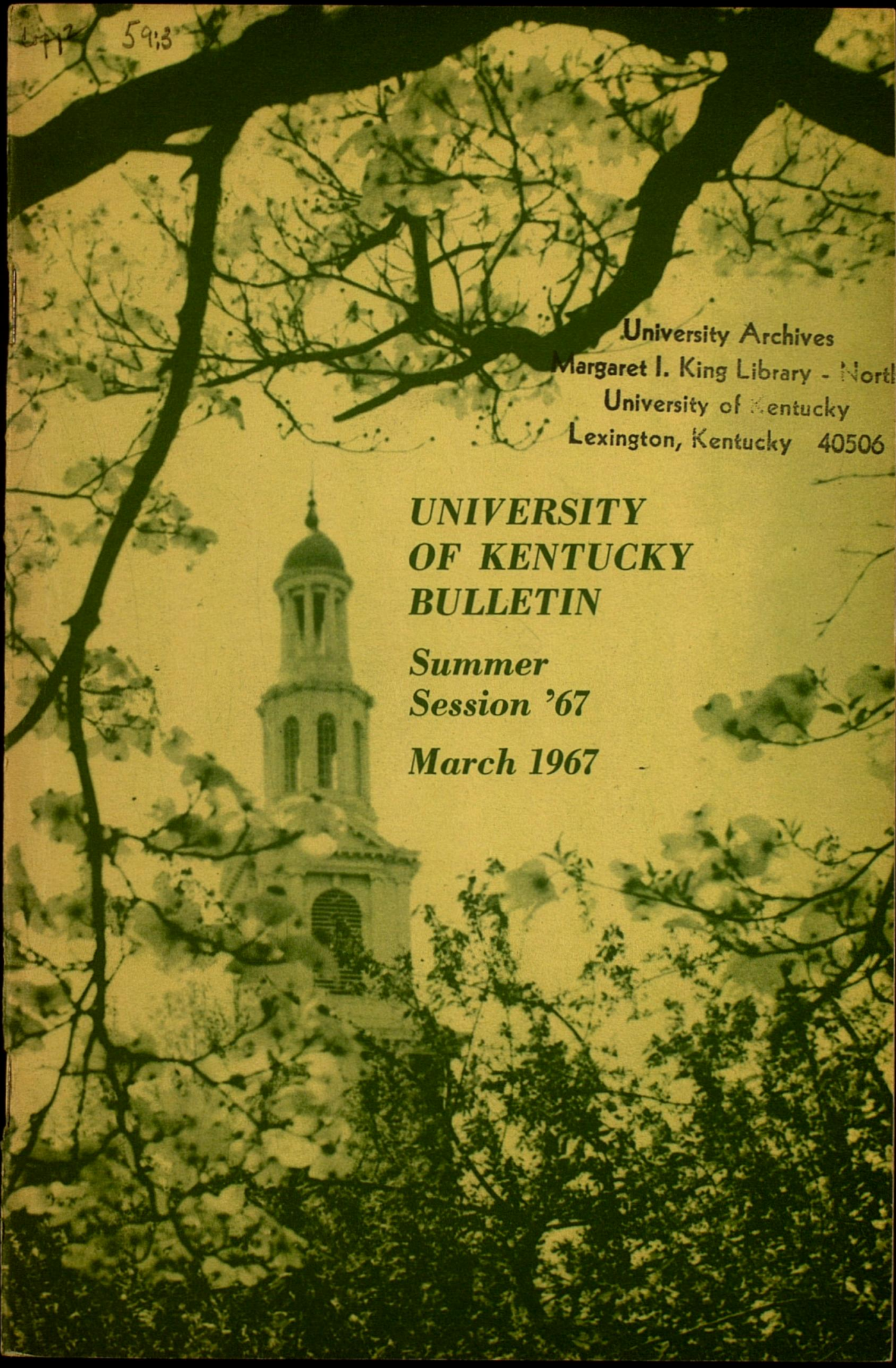

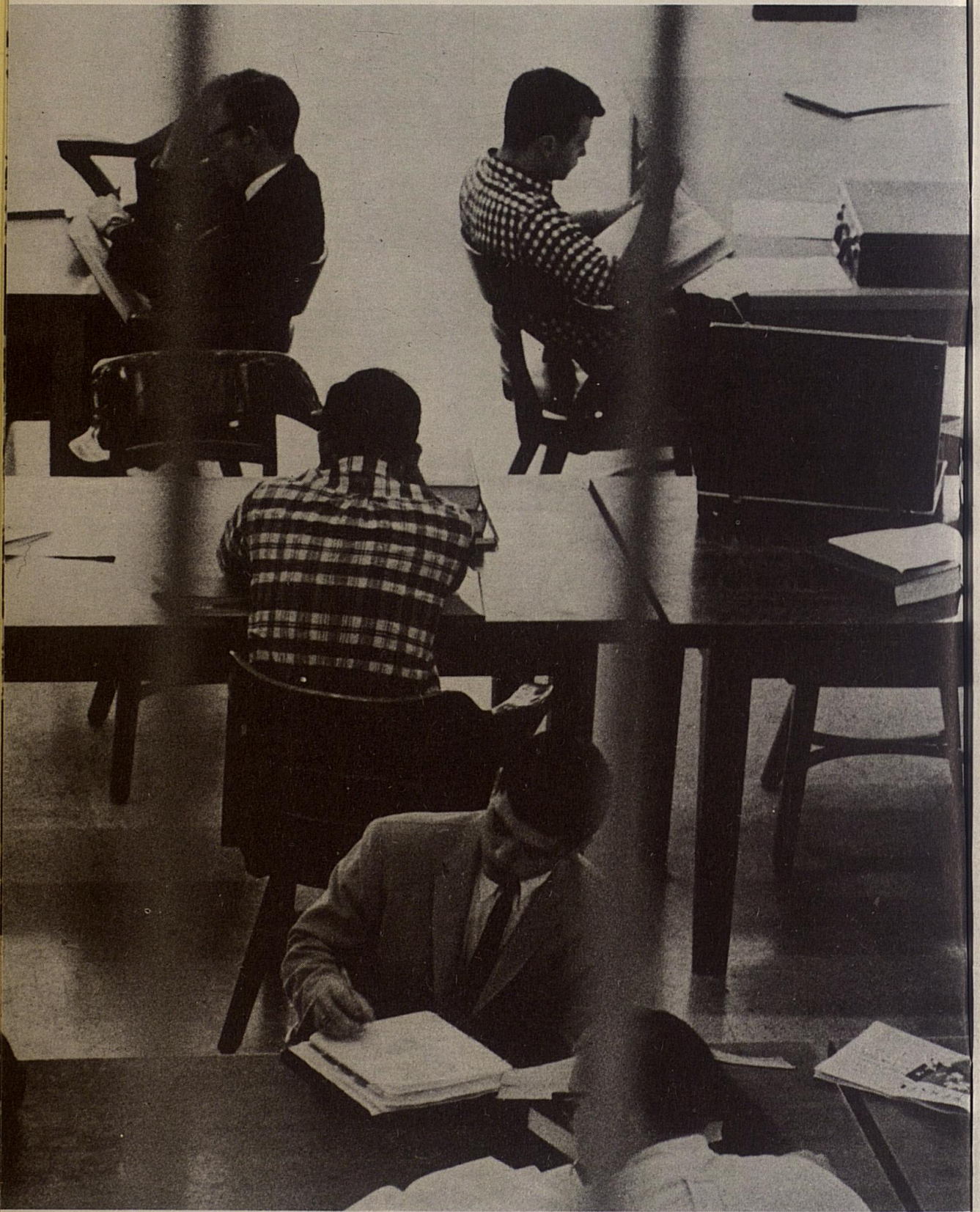

Curricula

The University of Kentucky, a land-grant institution, will offer eight weeks of regular summer session work and post-session courses. Courses will be offered in eight colleges—Arts and Sciences, Agriculture and Home Economics, Engineering, Law, Education, Commerce, Pharmacy, and Medicine—and in the Graduate School and the School of Architecture.

Over and above its program of liberal education, the University Summer Session provides numerous opportunities for persons to prepare for specific occupations. The opportunities are in a number of fields such as: Journalism, Medical Technology, Pre-Medicine, Pre-Dentistry, Pre-Pharmacy, Music, Library Science, Public Service, Art, Geography, Geology, Microbiology, Psychology, Radio, Television, Films, Social Work, Sociology; Agriculture in its various phases, Pre-Forestry, Pre-Veterinary, Home Economics; Engineering—Agricultural, Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Mechanical, and Mining and Metallurgical; Law; Elementary and High School Teaching, Educational Administration and Supervision and Secretarial Work; General Business, Banking and Finance, Personnel Management, Marketing, Accounting, Business Administration, and Industrial Administration.

Credit Hours

Nine semester hours are considered the normal load for undergraduates. For graduate students, the normal load is six hours; the maximum is nine. Graduate students who earn six or more graduate credits and who remain in residence throughout the Summer Session are assigned nine weeks of residence. University students may be confident of acceptance of credits at full value by other colleges and universities. Moreover, U.K. credits always meet the tests for employment, whether by government agencies, by corporations, or by private companies, regardless of the field. This is a very important consideration. In certain categories of employment, students and graduates of land-grant universities have a distinct advantage over other students and graduates.

Fees

For the Summer Session, the full-time fee for all Kentucky students will be \$80. For out-of-state students, the fee will be \$220. The hourly fee for part-time undergraduate students will be \$14 per credit hour for Kentucky residents, and \$37 per credit hour for out-of-state students. The hourly fee for part-time graduate students will be \$17 per credit hour for Kentucky residents, and \$46 per credit hour for out-of-state students.

Admission

Undergraduate applicants for admission should write to the Dean of Admissions for application forms, stating whether they wish admission to the freshman class or advanced standing. Applications and transcripts of credit should be filed 30 days in advance with the Office of the Dean of Admissions. Students entering with advanced standing should present transcripts from each institution they have attended. High school graduates are invited to

start their college careers in the Summer Session. Special courses are planned for entering freshmen and special attention will be given to them to the end that their collegiate careers will be richer, more profitable, more economical, and more meaningful.

Graduate applicants for admission should write to the Graduate School Office for application forms. Applications and transcripts of credits should be filed 30 days in advance with the Graduate School Office.

Living Accommodations

Room applications for single men and women should be made to the University Housing Office, Room 130, Student Center. Rental for a room in the residence halls is \$100 for the Summer Session. Costs of housing during short courses depend on the number of nights in residence.

Furnished efficiency and one-bedroom family housing units are available in Shawneetown at \$80 and \$95 per month. A limited number of two-bedroom apartments are available at \$105 per month. Applications for family accommodations should be made as early as possible to the University Housing Office.

The Student Center cafeteria and University grills will be in operation during the Summer Session.

Cultural and Recreational Resources

The University of Kentucky is located in the center of the Bluegrass Region, an area of scenic beauty and historic interest. Many of the famous horse-farms, some more than a thousand acres, are in this rich region. During the Summer Session, tours are conducted to many of these farms, including Elmen-dorf, Calumet, and Castleton. Ashland (home of Henry Clay), General John Hunt Morgan's residence, the home of Mary Todd (wife of Abraham Lincoln), and Keeneland Race Track are points of historic interest which may be visited. Out-of-town trips are often scheduled to view the outdoor dramatic presentations of "Home Is The Hunter" (Harrodsburg, Ky.) and "The Stephen Foster Story" (Bardstown, Ky.). Lectures and concerts by specialists and visiting professors are presented by the various departments within the University Community. The Department of Theatre Arts will sponsor its third season of Summer Stock Theatre in cooperation with local and professional artists. The recreational and lounge facilities in the Student center are frequented by all summer students, as well as the planned programs of folk dancing, watermelon feasts, jam sessions, and weekly film series.

Health Service

The services of the University Health Service are available to all full-time students who have filed a Health Report Form. Part-time students may apply for these services by submitting a Health Report form and paying the activities fee. The eligibility of part-time students to receive this service will be determined by the Health Service.

COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

- 001-099 — No credit and/or non-degree courses
- 100-199 — Open to freshmen; gives undergraduate credit only
- 200-299 — Prerequisite sophomore classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 300-399 — Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate credit only
- 400-499 — Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit for non-majors
- 500-599 — Prerequisite junior classification; gives undergraduate and graduate credit
- 600-799 — Open only to graduate students
- 800-999 — Open only to professional students in professional colleges except by permission of college dean

1. Freshmen may be admitted to courses numbered between 200 and 499, and sophomores to courses numbered between 300 and 499, upon approval of the instructor and the dean of the student's college. Such approval shall be limited to students who have demonstrated superior ability or preparation.

2. Seniors with superior ability or preparation may be admitted to courses numbered between 600 and 799 upon approval by the instructor, the dean of the student's college and the dean of the graduate school.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

*Outline of Requirements for Students Majoring in Departments of the College of Arts and Sciences

LOWER DIVISION

- A. English Composition, 6 credits
- B. Each student must take a total of six of the Areas in the General Studies Component. These must include Areas II, III, IV, and V, except that students taking Mathematics in Area I may omit either II or III. Every student graduating from the College of Arts and Sciences must take one course in some laboratory science.
Take special care to note that in several of the Areas the requirements can only be met by taking two courses in sequences and cannot be met by single courses selected from different sequences.
- C. A student who elects Area II must complete a sequence in physics or chemistry if he has not submitted a high school unit in physics or chemistry.
- D. *Foreign Language*: A student may satisfy the General Studies requirement in foreign language by passing the fourth semester course in one language or by demonstrating equivalent competence by examination. In the case of a student who wishes to continue the language begun in high school, the course level at which he will enroll will be determined by a placement test to be administered to all such students. In most instances the student will be required to begin at the level indicated. A student who has credit for three units of a foreign language in high school may not take the first year of that language in college for degree credit. A student who has completed two units of a foreign language in high school may not take the first semester of that language for degree credit.

UPPER DIVISION

Specific requirements may be obtained from the student's major department office. *Plan cards* outlining the upper division work and approved by the student's advisor should be on file in the office of the Associate Dean for Instruction at the beginning of the junior year.

Total number of credits required for graduation: 128 exclusive of physical education service courses.

* These requirements apply to students who entered the University for the first time during and after the 1966 Fall Semester.

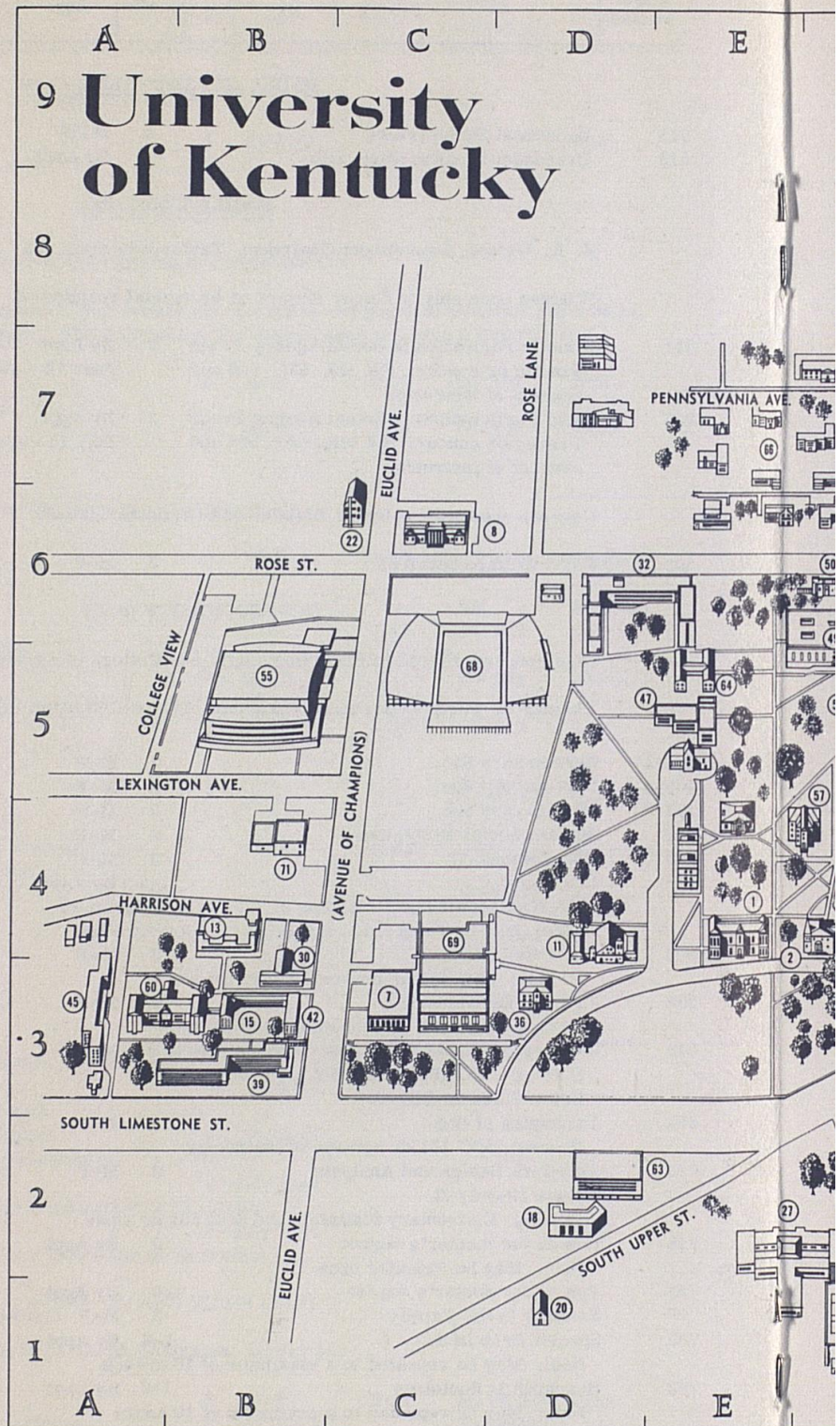

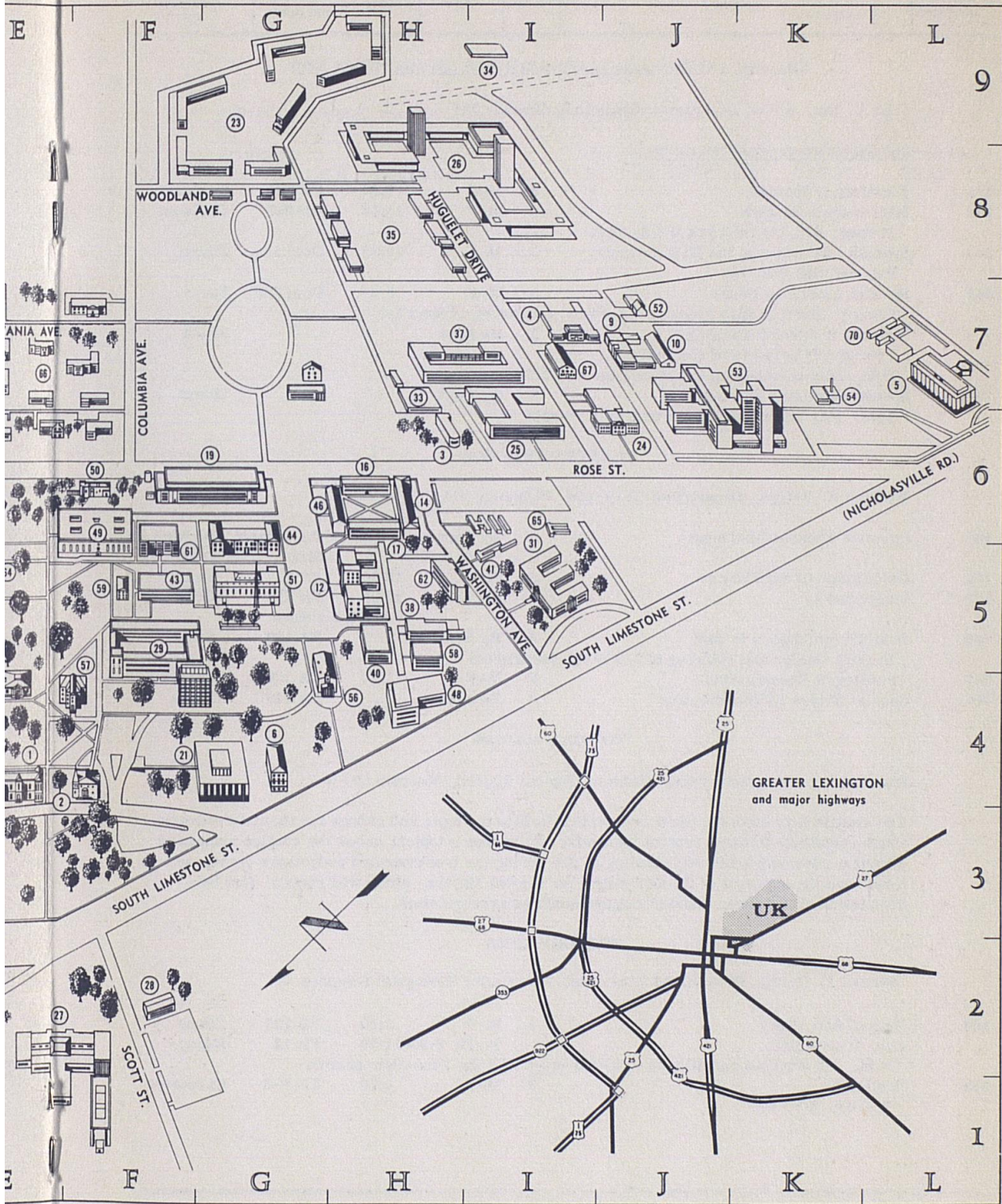

ACADEMIC PROBATION, DROPPING FOR LOW SCHOLARSHIP, READMISSION

Effective For All Students

Undergraduate Colleges:

The following students shall be placed on academic probation:

1. The student who, during either of his first two semesters, fails to attain a grade point average of 2.0;
2. The student who, at the end of his third semester or any subsequent semester or term, fails to have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0;
3. The student who is readmitted after being dropped from the University for academic reasons.

A student on academic probation shall be removed from probation at the end of a semester or term if he has achieved a grade point average of 2.0 and has a cumulative grade point average of 2.0.

A student who, during his first semester, demonstrates that he cannot or will not do satisfactory work may be dropped upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which he has been registered.

The following students shall be dropped from the University:

1. The student who, after his first two semesters, has failed to achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for at least one of the semesters;
2. The student who, after his first three semesters, has failed to achieve a grade point average of 2.0 for at least two of the semesters;
3. The student on academic probation because of a low cumulative grade point average who fails to attain a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 after one semester on probation.

A student who has been dropped shall normally be readmitted only after two semesters have passed and after he has presented evidence to indicate that he can and will do satisfactory work if readmitted. He shall, however, have the right to appeal for waiving the two semester requirement on the grounds of exceptional hardship.

If a student is readmitted, he shall be required to achieve a minimum grade point average of 2.0 for the first semester after readmission; a minimum grade point average of 2.5 for the second semester after readmission or a cumulative minimum average of 2.0 by the end of the second semester; and a minimum cumulative average of 2.0 by the end of the third semester. Failure to attain any of these requirements will result in his being dropped from the University.

Professional Colleges:

Pharmacy.

Definition: Pharmacy standing is the over-all grade point average for all professional and non-professional work accomplished subsequent to admission to the Professional Curriculum.

1. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 2.0 at the end of any semester shall be dropped from the University or placed on academic probation.

2. Any student who fails to achieve a pharmacy standing of 1.5 at the end of any semester shall have his record reviewed by the College of Pharmacy faculty and may be dropped from the University without a preliminary probationary semester.
3. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, fails to have achieved a semester standing of 2.0 at the end of this semester shall be dropped from the University.
4. Any student who, at the end of his first probationary semester, achieves a 2.0 standing for that semester but fails to bring his pharmacy standing up to 2.0 will be continued on probation or be dropped from the University.
5. Any student who, at the end of his second consecutive probationary semester, fails to have achieved a 2.0 pharmacy standing shall be dropped from the University.
6. A student who has been dropped for academic deficiency may be re-admitted on probation according to University regulations except that his academic requirements will be those outlined in items 3, 4, and 5 above.
7. Any student who, regardless of pharmacy standing, fails to have achieved a 2.0 standing for two consecutive semesters may be placed on probation.

Law. Students beginning the study of Law after August 29, 1965 must achieve a cumulative numerical grade average of 60 at the end of the first two semesters and must maintain a cumulative average of 60 at the end of each semester thereafter. A student failing to meet this academic requirement will be dropped from the University for poor scholarship. After the first semester and regardless of the cumulative average, any student will be dropped for poor scholarship who fails to achieve a numerical grade average of at least 56 in any particular semester, or who receives a grade of less than 50 in two or more courses in any one semester.

A student who has been dropped from the College will not be recommended by the Dean for readmission to the College of Law until he has remained out of the College for a semester and a Summer Session and has received favorable consideration by the Law Faculty of a written petition stating good reasons why he can do satisfactory academic work.

All Undergraduate and Professional Colleges:

The dean of each college shall submit to the Office of the Registrar a complete list of students placed upon academic probation or dropped from the University within two weeks after the dean has received the grade reports from the Registrar at the close of the semester or term.

A student who is on academic probation may not be employed by any department or college of the University. This shall not prevent any department or college from establishing higher standards for student employment.

A student who is on academic probation shall not be allowed:

1. To serve as an officer or committee member in any campus organization;
2. To participate in any University extra-curricular activity or in the activity of any University organization if the participation involves the expenditure of an appreciable amount of time.

At any time the dean of a college in which a student is enrolled may declare the student ineligible because of failure in current class work; at any time the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men may declare a student ineligible

whose participation in an activity is judged to be detrimental to the student, the organization, or the University.

Students shall be removed from probation only on the basis of residence work at the University of Kentucky. Usually part-time work shall not be considered unless the student has been placed on probation because of unsatisfactory performance as a part-time student.

Readmission of a student who has been dropped from the University shall be upon recommendation of the dean of the college in which the student is to be registered.

A student who has been dropped a second time shall not be readmitted to the University except in unusual circumstances and then only upon recommendation of his dean and the approval of the University Senate Council.

Each student shall be presented with a copy of the rules that deal with probation, dropping for low scholarship and readmission. He shall be responsible for being familiar with these rules and with their relationship to his situation.

The probation rules shall be effective for all students.
