

Virginia Place lets single parents 'do it for themselves'

Helen Burg is a very busy woman, but not too busy to pause in the middle of a conversation and help a small child get a drink. For Burg, executive director of a one-parent fami-yfacility called Virginia Place, helping residents and their children is a daily chore. But it's a chore she

loves.

Burg and the residents celebrated the 10-year anniversary of Virginia Place at the complex Satur-

anniversary of Virginia Place at the complex Saturday.

"I can't fathom it," Burg said. "Time has passed so quickly."

Yirginia Place has 56 one-parent apartments. In addition to affordable housing, the program provides child care, health care and counseling.

The Virginia Place program is designed to help single parents become self-sufficient and obtain an education, Burg said.

Participants must be a high school graduate or have a G.E.D. certificate, be enrolled in college full-time, be a single parent with primary custody of children, have no more than two children ages 6-8, or an only child 6 months to 4 years old, be at least 18 years old, and be eligible for a Section 8 housing certificate.

"We provide certain services and support for the women and men here to do it for themselves," Burg said. "We due to it for them." It's wonderful if the person that is not it for them. For many residents it's their first time living on their own without the aid of parents or relatives. Some find it a difficult adjustment.

UK accounting senior Alicia Mapp and her son, Alexander, lived in an apartment before joining the program.

"Virginia Place is a nice place to live," Mapp said. "And the daycare... makes it nice not having to worry about your child."

Mapp said the program provides parenting classes, and the residents have their own council that meets once a month.

"Any single parent who would like to go back to school and thinks they can't should check into the program, will work for them."

For Donya Johnson, a pre-dental hygiene sophomore at Lexington Community College, and her daughter, Brianna, this is their first experience away from the watchful eye of Donya's parents.

"It's so peaceful," Johnson said. "I come and go when I want. I don't have to answer to my parents. I love it. It's just my place."



LOUISVILLE — How many times do people use their social security numbers to cash a check, register for college, apply for a credit card or rent a movie? How many times he people repeated it for verification?



Curry said nothing should be read into Couch's increased number of reps.
"Tim has gotten a lot of snaps all along," Curry said after practice, "but he did get more today."
In his weekly news conference earlier in the day, Curry said both will see game action against IU, as in the first two games of the season.

"Billy Jack and Tim will both play," Curry said. "We're just try and put the game, and we'll try and put the guy in the game that we think will give us the best chance to win.

"We feel like we have two good quarterbacks," he said. "It's always difficult to figure out how to play quarterbacks. We know we are lucky to have them, and we will have a plan as to how we are going to play them."

Before the loss at Cincinnati, Curry said UC's blitzing defense was one reason he wanted to keep Couch out of game action. But the coach said he's not going to be as reluctant to play the freshman against Indiana's blitzing defense.

"If he's in there," Curry said, "he's just going to have to handle it. I think it's an awful lot to ask,



So far this season, the middle blockers have been one of UK's only bright spots. On defense, Muzzey leads the Cats with 1.52 blocks per game. The sophomore form Smyrna, Tenn, also has been efficient on offense, hitting a respectable. 168 with 52 kills.

"Muzzey has proven that she can come

through and make the big play," Ralston-Flory said. "We need more consistency from her."

Outside hitter Gina Heustis has been effective as well. The senior from Louisville, Ky., has notched 114 kills and is hitting a deceptrelylow 158 while carrying an inordinate amount of the scoring burden.

Heustis alone gets nearly a quarter of the team's attack attempts.

A staggeringly young Marshall squad — it fields only one upperclassman — comes to Lexington with a 6-7 record, which does include a three-match winning streak. Its attack is led by sophomore hitter Alisha Bable, who leads MU with 190 kills.

The Herd's inexperience gives the Cats a good chance to get things moving in a positive direction.

Although a win over Marshall doesn't carry, the weight of a Southeastern Conference victory, the Cats will take what they can get.

The act, which comes just eight weeks before election day, declares marriage as the legal union between a man and a woman. Although it allows the states to decide if they wish to honor same-sex marriages, the federal government will not recognize them.

Without federal recognition, couples worth be able to file joint income taxes or apply for life insurance under married status. They also won't be entitled to federal benefits under married status, such as welfare or unemployment.

Chances are, a good number of states will side with the feds.

It would seem the way around this would be to get married in a state which recognizes same-sex marriages. But as soon as you move to a state with a different viewpoint on this sue, you are no longer considered married.

A big reason for passing the act was the inability of our legislators to separate church and state. Who is to say the definition of marriage is strictly between a man and a woman?

Then again, there wasn't a need to define it until a lawsuit was filed in Hawaii, after the state refused to grant marriage licenses for same-sey greenouis

sation.

There are already over 450 U.S. corporations that recognize "domestic partnerships," including the Walt Disney Company and Coors Brewing Company.

These companies are now offering partners of gay employees the same benefits as heterosexual spouses.

If these companies can recognize domestic partnerships, why can't the federal government recognize the same?







UK's Maxwell houses offer getaway from busy campus

One of UK's best-kept secrets cannot even be identified if you walk by it on the street.

An observant individual might notice the three old houses on East Maxwell surrounded by a low wrought-iron fence and connected by a brick walkway. But only when standing on the porch can one tell that the three large, elab-

"Its chief purpose and justifica-tion is to offer unusual deucational opportunities in an unusual for-mat," said Dr. Raymond Betts, director of the Gaines Center and the Gaines Fellowship Program. Of the three homes, all built in the 1870s, the middle house is the only one on the National Register of Historic Places. This means it still has all the original architec-ture, with renovations but no additions or replacements. The first floor, filled with antiques from the time period when the houses were built, cre-ates a pleasant, warm atmosphere for students and faculty to enjoy. It holds offices and gathering areas.

Although primarily used to host upper-level seminars, the houses sometimes hold recep-tions, interviews with faculty can-didates, special meetings and lec-tures. Some departments have held day-long retreats there, because it does not feel like part of campus.

Even though the center has done some advertising, and holds open houses for UK and the neighborhood, Betts said he does

neighborhood, betts said ne does not think many students are aware that these houses belong to UK. Therefore, a series of tours will be arranged in late October to familiarize any interested UK community members with an easi-ly missed piece of campus history.
