"We're really excited about UK students having the chance to be on Road Rules, and we hope that they (the students) submit some good ideas."

Rows and rows of books could be seen lined up yesterday at the English Graduate Student Organization's fall book sale, which runs through today.

"We've got everything from the dime-store novel to the heaviest of critical theory," said Jason McEntee, president of the organization.

The books for the sale were donated from UK faculty and students, student organizations such as the Turkish Student Union, and businesses such as the UK Press, McEntee said.

Students can find a number of bargains at the sale. For instance, brand new books from the UK Press were being offered at a quarter or less of their original cost.

"The majority of our customers are students, and students don't have much money, so we try to keep our prices down," McEntee said.

The book sale, which McEntee said has been going on for "4 or 5 years," gained a new addition this year. Copies of Limestone, a literary magazine produced by UK's English department, is also available for sale.

While there is a rather large selection, not every author is represented at the book sale. Ed Blum, a history graduate student, came looking for works by

India, Ghana, Turkey, Singapore, Malaysia and England — a few countries that are united under a common bond, a constitution of sorts. This bond is created by the United Nations.

"The United Nations will play an increasingly large role in the coming millennium," said Cynthia Irvin, political science professor. "Its role will become more complex, more contentant and more necessary."

Haunted house based on trilogy

Dante's "Divine Comedy" finds a new audience this Halloween

The White Oak Pond Church in Richmond added a unique twist to the haunted house theme this year.

The "Divine Comedy," written by Dante Alighieri, is the blueprint for their haunted house, which takes visitors through Hell, Purgatory and Heaven just like Dante's 14th century trilogy.

A different version of the classic theatre

The Black Box challenges thespian norms

While large productions at UK are performed in the Briggs Theatre or the Guignol Theatre in the Fine Arts Building, a small group of actors may be rehearsing on a completely different kind of stage, UK's Black Box Theatre.

"You can communicate with the audience, which motivates you to do your best. It's an adrenaline rush," says Courtney Stoll, an undeclared sophomore who appeared in last year's original stage production of *Bound*.

The Black Box Theatre allows for such interaction with the audience because of its

unique design. There is no stage, but rather a room containing only four black walls, a few black curtains, and chairs that can be arranged to the director's preference.

The simplicity of the room allows the director to arrange the audience and the actors in any configuration they wish, Stoll said. For example, in *Bound*, half the audience was on one side of the room in chairs, while half sat on cushions on the other side of the room.

The theatre was recently renamed the Lucille Little Theatre, a tribute to the first actress to perform in the Guignol Theatre when it opened more than fifty years ago.

Between two and six plays are performed in the Black Box

Theatre per year, said Nyalls Hartman, theater professor and head of productions in the Black Box Theatre.

While some plays performed there are classic works, the majority are contemporary or original productions.

The theatre's second play, which is currently in production, is *Strange Games*, written by Dave Morrison, a theater graduate student, and directed by Shannon Christy, another theater graduate student.

While auditions are open to all UK students, Hartman said that the Black Box Theatre especially offers theater majors a chance to work with material not as similar to what they are studying in class, Hartman said.

"It is an excellent opportunity for the theater students to experiment with other art forms," he said.

Taliban urged to expel bin Laden

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Madeleine Albright offered Afghanistan's Taliban ruling army a chance for normal relations if it expels suspected terrorism kingpin Osama bin Laden. The United States suspects the Saudi multimillionaire masterminded the U.S. embassy bombings in Kenya and Tanzania. The Taliban has said it tried bin Laden in an Islamic court and found him innocent. But one incentive for the Taliban to submit to American demands is that the U.N. Security Council has threatened to impose sanctions on the militia — including a freeze on assets overseas — if bin Laden is not expelled by Nov. 14.

Buchanan bolts GOP for Reform

FALLS CHURCH, Va. — Hours after billionaire Donald Trump joined the New York arm of the Reform Party, Republican presidential candidate Pat Buchanan bolted the GOP to mount his own third-party campaign. Trump will decide early next year whether to challenge Buchanan for the Reform nomination in 2000. Buchanan, whose insurgent campaigns hobbled GOP front-runners in 1992 and 1996, failed for eight months to break out of second-tier status in the Republican presidential field. Though low in polls and money, Buchanan is considered a threat by Republicans because of his anti-abortion conservatism.

Israelis open safe passage route

EREZ CROSSING, Gaza Strip — Hundreds of eager Palestinians shouldering duffel bags and suitcases traveled 29 miles across Israel yesterday, inaugurating a "safe passage" that for the first time links the areas under their control and takes them a step closer to statehood. In all, some 132,000 Palestinians are so far eligible to use the route but most are workers and business people who had been granted permission to enter Israel in the past.

Clinton challenges medicine makers

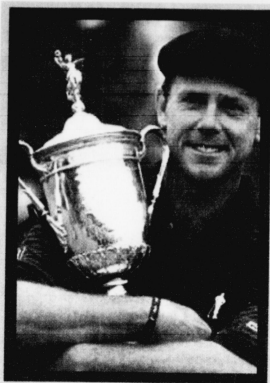
WASHINGTON — President Clinton ordered a federal study of drug costs, saying American senior citizens shouldn't be forced to travel to places like Canada to buy medicine at lower prices. Clinton directed that the study, which will look at different prices for the most commonly used drugs, be completed within 90 days. It also will examine drug spending by people of different ages and incomes. Clinton said that 13 million older Americans have no prescription drug coverage and millions more have inadequate coverage.



BUSTED: Actor Matthew McConaughey was arrested in Austin, Texas, early Monday for drug-related offenses, a sheriff's department official said. McConaughey, 29, was arrested for possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia but had not yet been formally charged, said Curtis Weeks, a Travis County sheriff's department spokesman.

"I don't apologize," Gray said yesterday. "I stand by it and I think it was absolutely a proper line of questioning."



Payne Stewart dies in crash

MINA, S.D. — A Learjet carrying golf champion Payne Stewart and four other people crashed in a grassy field this afternoon after flying uncontrolled for hours. Everyone on the twin-engine plane was killed. The Lear 35, which took off from Orlando, may have suffered a pressurization failure during its scheduled flight to Dallas, government officials said.

No loans for student drug offenders

WASHINGTON — Students convicted of drug offenses will lose eligibility for federal college tuition aid programs under new Education Department regulations. Penalties under the rules that take effect July 1 will range from a yearlong suspension to permanent denial of financial aid. However, the rule will not apply to juvenile records or proceedings. A recent survey indicated that drug use among young adults aged 18 to 25 has risen in the last five years, with 16.1 percent saying they were current users of an illegal drug.

Dell passes Compaq in U.S. PC sales

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Dell Computer Corp. easily surpassed rival Compaq Computer Corp. in U.S. personal computer sales last quarter — the first time Dell has held such a commanding lead over its rival. Dell sold nearly 2 million PCs from July through September, grabbing a 17.1 percent share of the U.S. market, according to the research firm Dataquest. Compaq sold 1.78 million computers, giving it a 15.3 percent share of the market.

dents tend to know more about the U.N.'s role, they are not familiar with the several organizations under the UN and what their functions are.

"There's ... not much awareness on campus," Manohar said.

Students need to know about the UN for more reasons than just getting ready for that class in current world history, said UK law professor John Rogers, who will also be speaking.

"The U.N. affects students

indirectly. It affects international relations and then it affects the US, which in turn affects Kentucky, and then it affects us (the UK community)," Rogers said.

For students whose hometowns are thousands of miles away, the impact of the UN is felt a little greater. The U.N. represents the potential for states to resolve potentially catastrophic situations by means of a limited use of military, Irvin said.

This has lately been a help in countries such as East Timor and Chechnya.

"The UN is vital because it provides the only legal basis for the armed enforcement action," Rodgers said.

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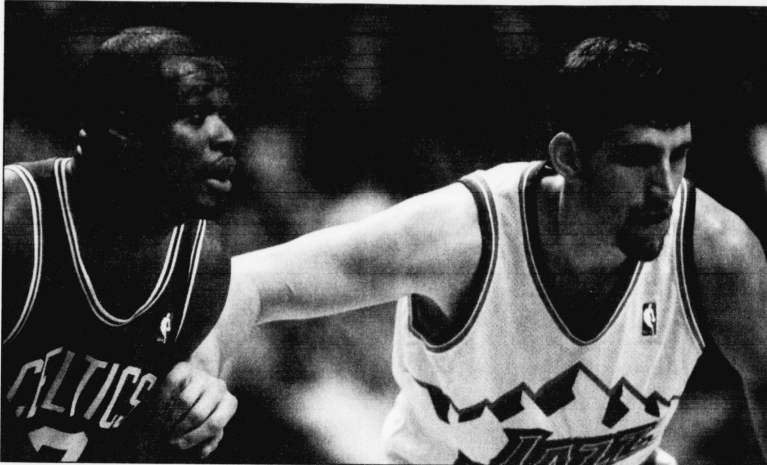

Padgett adjusting to NBA

Former Wildcat star and Utah Jazz rookie has gone from Karl Malone fan to Malone teammate

The Utah Jazz have been one of the most successful teams in the NBA in recent years. John Stockton and Karl Malone are future Hall of Famers and Jeff Hornacek is a former All-star, but when the Jazz players stepped off their team bus in Lexington, Kentucky, native Scott Padgett was the first player noticed.

"We had an NBA All-star (Stockton) and Jeff Hornacek, one of the best shooters in the game, and this little old lady noticed me," Padgett said of the Jazz arrival. Malone was unable to suit up in Saturday's NBA exhibition game between the Jazz and the Boston Celtics because of back pains, and John Stockton played unusually poorly with six turnovers. Despite a lackluster performance by Utah's stars, Lexington fans had five other reasons to enjoy the game.

Not only was it Padgett's return to Rupp Arena, but Wayne Turner was there with the Celtics, although he did not play because of a sore elbow. Former UK coach Rick Pitino returned as coach of the Celtics with forwards Antoine Walker and Walter McCarty.

Former Cats look back

What a season it was: Pitino, Walker and McCarty reflect back on the 1996 championship season at UK

Long ago. And, seemingly, so far away. Former Wildcats Rick Pitino, Walter McCarty, Antoine Walker, Wayne Turner and Scott Padgett returned to Rupp Arena for a preseason tilt between the Boston Celtics and the Utah Jazz Saturday night. Padgett's Jazz were victorious, ruining the homecoming for the prodigal sons in green and their coach.

The loss was just another reminder of the harsh reality of the NBA for Boston players who once called Rupp Arena home. The memories of past glory, however, endure.

For Pitino, McCarty and Walker, the 1996 NCAA title remains a point of great pride.

The former UK players and coach were reunited for the second time this season. The Jazz and Celtics played Wednesday in Nashville. Even though they were former teammates, McCarty and Walker gave the Jazz rookie a hard time.

"Toine was talking trash in Nashville, but I just reminded him about his foul shooting from last year," said Padgett.

Padgett said he had fun and is enjoying his rookie season with the Jazz, though far. He especially enjoys playing with future Hall of Famers, such as Malone and Stockton.

"Outside of Michael Jordan, Karl Malone was my favorite player growing up. I thought he was a hard worker, but I had no idea just how hard he worked until I played with him," said Padgett.

"It's not because our games are alike," Padgett joked.

Padgett won't be asking for Malone's autograph anytime soon, although he might be carrying Malone's luggage.

Padgett said, "If you are in awe of someone you aren't going to be able to compete." Padgett still maintains his respect for Malone, however. "(I do) whatever he asks," Padgett said regarding being a

rookie.

Padgett said he wasn't nervous about the game, but was nervous about addressing the crowd before the game. He thanked the fans for their support on behalf of the Jazz and the entire NBA.

"It's not something I was looking forward to, but no one else wanted to do it," said Padgett.

The crowd was mostly bipartisan, but Padgett thought the fans started to lean toward the Jazz as the game progressed.

"I thought they were cheering more for us, because in the last minute of the game there was a North Carolina guy (Pete Chilcutt) that hit a three and they cheered for him. I never thought I'd see that," said Padgett.

Jazz Coach Jerry Sloan said Padgett is doing well and wasn't disappointed with his play. Padgett scored five points and four rebounds on two of four from the field and one of two for three-point field goals in Utah's 93-92 win.

Sloan said, "He's got a terrific body for this game."

Padgett said the toughest thing for him is getting relaxed and getting used to the Utah altitude. He also said he got off to a slow start because of a brief vacation.

"When I first came to camp I had just got married, so I took some time off," said Padgett.

Altogether, Padgett said he is comfortable with the Jazz and is looking forward to adding to the success that the Jazz has had in the past.

challenges - he has taken some heat for being a cry-baby in the big leagues.

"1996 was a special year for me individually," Walker said. "A lot of good things happened for me as a person. It's always good to reflect back on that, to see how everyone has progressed since then. We had a lot of pros, a lot of guys who are in the NBA right now."

In this, his fourth year in the league, Walker is hardly a candidate for the NBA pension roll anytime soon. In his mind, however, his college recollections are like those fuzzy childhood memories - treasured reminders of a bygone era, of a simpler time.

"It seems like a very long time ago," Walker said. "I'm into my NBA thing right now, so a lot of that has faded away. But those are good memories, and I'm going to cherish them for the rest of my life."

1996 may not seem like a very long time ago. However, in basketball terms - for these three men - it may as well have been a lifetime ago.

Last week's abortion bill

Last week, the U.S. Senate voted 51-47 in support of Roe v. Wade, the 1973 Supreme Court ruling that abortion is a constitutionally protected procedure when it is necessary to protect the woman's life or health.

The non-binding vote occurred while the Senate debated a bill (S-1692) making it a federal crime for doctors to perform "partial-birth" abortions. The procedure is only allowed under the bill to save the mother's life.

Kentucky's Senators Jim Bunning and Mitch McConnell, both of whom are Republicans, voted in favor of making "partial-birth" abortions a federal crime and against support of Roe v. Wade.

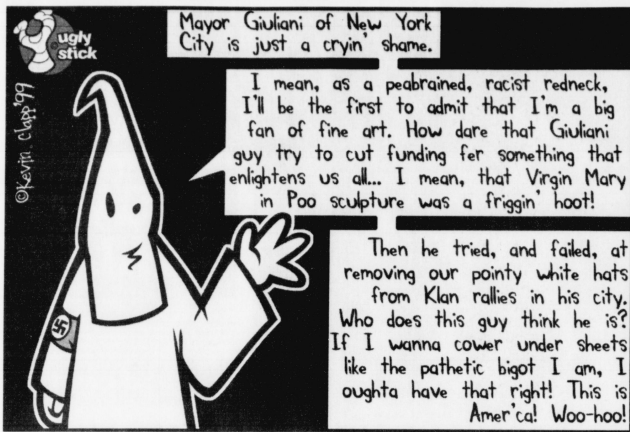

Red light means stop

Fatalities from running red lights may lead to intersection cameras.

Motorists who run red lights are responsible for an estimated 260,000 crashes each year. About 750 of those are fatal. In an attempt to curb these numbers, a movement is growing to have cameras installed in Lexington's intersections as early as next year. Using the set-up which is currently used in 10 states, these cameras will be connected to the traffic signal and triggered by any vehicle passing through the intersection above a pre-set minimum speed and specified time after the signal has turned red. A picture of the car's license plate will be taken, and a ticket will be mailed to the motorist's home. Although the idea is well-intentioned, this is a step in the wrong direction.

We all know that when some Lexingtonians get behind the wheel, they leave their driving smarts and common sense at home. In fact, over the past five years, close 110 fatal crashes have occurred in Lexington — nine due to someone running a red light. Of course, these numbers are too high — anything higher than zero is too high. Something needs to be done to better this situation. Installing cameras in public places is not the answer. It is a slippery slope — once certain aspects of our lives are publicized, where will it end?

A more palatable solution to the problem would be to lengthen the time delay between a light turning red at an intersection and the light turning green on the crossing street. An even better solution is if each one of us who drives fully realizes the tremendous undertaking it is to do so and what can go wrong when we are careless. Lexington drivers, please, for the safety of yourselves and your neighbors, drive safely.

Tuition hike is student sensible

My fellow students, much has been made of this tuition increase. I wanted to take a few moments to explain my actions, and why I believe those actions are in the best interest of both the University and you, the students.

First and foremost, at the September 21, 1999, Board of Trustees meeting, I like always, had the students' best interest at heart. In preparation for the meeting, I sat down and spoke with the vice president of Management and Budget — the person who developed the present tuition schedule. After our meeting, I discussed the pros and cons of a tuition increase with both graduate and undergraduate students.

When they expressed concern about raising tuition and what benefits the increase would bring, I shared with them the following information I learned from doing research of how UK has improved over the past five years and how the extra money from the tuition increase will be used.

"The extra cash will be spread out to enhance all programs on campus."

"Research and development support has increased from \$124.8 million during 1996-97 to \$161.4 million during 1997-98."

"The amount of merit scholarship money has increased from \$2.9 million in 1992 to \$5.4 million in 1997."

"The University is attracting a better student than the national average. The average high school GPA of the UK freshman class was 3.45, compared to the national average of 3.16."

"The percentage of resident African-American undergraduates has increased: 1996-97 at 5.8 percent, 1997-98 at 6.0 percent, 1998-99 at 6.3 percent."

As you can see, the University has made many improvements over the past few years. While these improvements might not be apparent in our daily walk to class, these are the types of improvements that will help UK become a top 20 public research institution of which we all can be proud. Raising the tuition is part of this process.

If you remember, two years ago there was a state-mandated 22.1 percent tuition increase. There was a student-led protest. I was one of the first students out at that rally, speaking out because the increase was not only too much money, but also because it came all at once. If increases need to be made, then I believe it is better to increase the tuition in small amounts spread out over a period of time. This year's increase amounts to less than \$100 a semester for Kentucky residents.

In researching this topic I also looked at tuition increases at other schools. In July 1999, the University of Wisconsin-Madison tuition was raised by 9.6 percent for in-state undergraduate students and 12.7 percent for out-of-state undergraduates. The Iowa Board of Regents is preparing to vote on a 6.9 percent tuition increase for its university students.

In short, if the University of Kentucky is truly "America's Next Great University," I genuinely believe that a tuition increase at this time is in the best interest of UK and the students. With the extra money, improvements can continue to be made, and therefore our degrees will be worth that much more in the workplace.

As alumni, we will be proud to say we graduated from UK — an institution known for its sports and academic excellence.

There should be a course at UK entitled, "Walk in my shoes" and then, just maybe, there would be more understanding and respect.

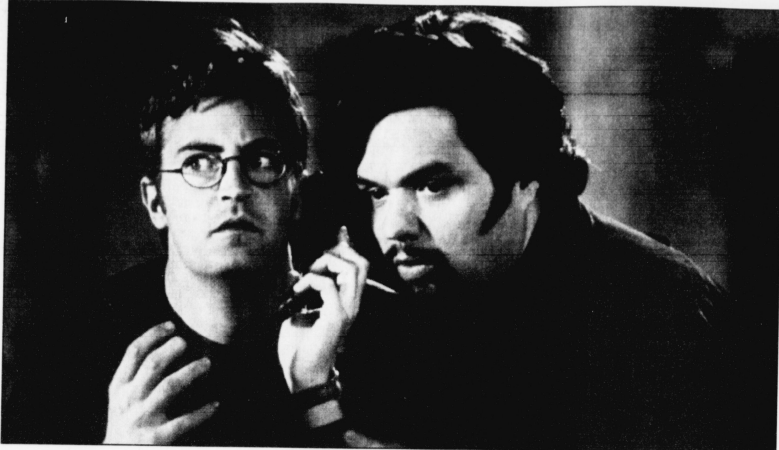
A positive path begins when we respect life. The quality of all our lives could be improved with truth about all things.
