UK Sluggers To Meet Vols In Alumni Gym Thursday

Wildcats Draw First Blood At Expense Of Xavier Musketeers And Now Set Cap For Tennessee

In their second meet of the season, Kentucky's powerful boxing team will track punches with the University of Tennessee Volunteers next Thursday night in Alumni gym.

Final arrangements for the bouts were ironed out Monday by punch-smasher Frank Moseley and the fights will mark the Cats second start in intercollegiate competition.

Kentucky's initial start was taken from the Xavier Musketeers three weeks ago by a 6 1/2-11 1/2 margin.

The third test on the Wildcat list will send the leather pushers to Cincinnati January 22-23.

A trip to Washington, D. C., February 10, will pit the Blues against Columbus College. The final bouts of the year's menu will be with the West Virginia Mountaineers in Alumni gym February 14.

A number of the Kentucky boxers may participate in the annual South-eastern Conference tournament after the conclusion of the season.

In the Xavier brawl, the Blues swept through the first four fights before the Muskies broke the tie with a close decision in the 155-pound division.

The heavyweight struggle was voted a draw by the judges to conclude Xavier's scoring in the fight. T. J. Gragg put the Cats out in front with an easy victory in the 115-pound class.

Portis was rewarded Kentucky in the 165-pound and light-heavyweight bouts.
