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## Home owner says he's not moving

### University must buy professor's house to build new library

UK administrators announced plans Friday to build the proposed new central and life sciences library on a 30-acre tract of land near Clifton Circle. But one resident who lives on the site says the University should find another place for the building.

The University currently owns all of the designated property except for the residence of 88-year-old James Edney, who vowed yesterday not to give up his home for the \$58 million library project.

"They're going to have to mark off some other place because I'm not going to sell — period," said Edney, a retired UK biological sciences professor. "They've got plenty of places around here to build a library. They don't need this place. We've been here since 1964."

Edney's home, located at 419 Clifton Ave., is one of five structures the University plans to demolish to make room for the 387,000 square foot library.

However, Edney said he recently spoke to UK officials about the plans to build the library near his home. "We had a University representative over about two or three weeks ago. And I just told the gentleman that I wasn't going to sell."

UK officials have not been in touch with him about the library site since that meeting, he said.

"Must be a clerical error or something," Edney's daughter, Francis Gertrude, said with a sarcastic grin.

Edney, a frail man with thin, white hair and cloudy blue eyes, said he will not change his mind.

Aside from having "a case of shingles," he said he is in good health and plans to be alive long enough to view the finished library from his front porch.

"From an economic point of view, why change?" Edney said leaning on a couch pillow, his daughter standing firm behind him. "The location is good from the standpoint of the closeness of hospitals, drug stores and grocery stores."

Donald Clapp, UK vice president for administration, said negotiations with Edney have been fruitful, and he said he believes Edney eventually will decide to sell the property to the University.

"I've gotten the impression from our previous discussions that he was willing to sell, and I'll leave it at that," Clapp said.

As a state agency, the University has the right of eminent domain.

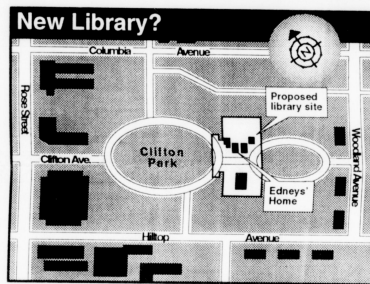

The seldom-used measure allows the University to go to court and present a reason why obtaining the property is necessary. If imminent domain were granted, the court would put a price on the property which the University would have to pay.

Clapp said the exact location of the library was not a University decision.

"The siting of the library itself was based on the judgment of the consulting firm," he said. The firm is Hardy Holzman Pfeiffer Associates of New York.

The area marked for construction is on the high ground in between the two grassy circles which Clif-

## Anti-racism event marred by violence

BERLIN — A call to arms against racist violence inspired 350,000 people to rally in the capital yesterday. But the day was spoiled by radical leftists who threw rocks and eggs at Chancellor Helmut Kohl and President Richard von Weizsäcker.

The biggest demonstration since Germany unity two years ago was largely peaceful until Germany's top leaders joined the masses who marched from opposite sides of the city and converged for a huge rally in east Berlin's Lustgarten plaza.

As the nation watched on television, a dozen police with shields and a pair of aides with umbrellas protected Weizsäcker from a flurry of objects hurled by leftist radicals as he spoke to the vast sea of people.

Earlier, police had to whisk Kohl out of one of the marches when he was greeted by insults and boos, and eggs and stones flew from the crowd. Neither leader appeared to have been struck.

The disruptions were another embarrassment for a government so rattled by a frightening surge in attacks on foreigners and Jewish monuments that it had to urge its people into the streets to denounce it.

"I think it is tragic that the situation is so bad that we have to go into the streets," said east Berliner Doris Schmidt, 48, wearing a picture of famed Holocaust victim Anne Frank pinned to her jacket. "I think

## Jones' performance 'fair,' according to poll

FRANKFORT, Ky. — After nearly a year in office, Gov. Breton Jones' job performance was rated fair by close to half of those surveyed in a poll.

The statewide survey of 602 likely voters showed that 45.5 percent rated Jones' performance as fair. Another 38 percent said they

thought the governor is doing a better-than-average job. That broke down to 32.7 percent considering his performance good and 5 percent excellent.

Almost 9 percent rated his performance as poor.

The poll was conducted Oct. 27-29 and has a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points. It was sponsored by the Lexington Herald-Leader, the Messenger-Inquirer in

Owensboro, WHAS-TV in Louisville, WCPO-TV in Cincinnati, The Daily Independent in Ashland and The Gleamer in Henderson.

The questions about Jones were included in a poll that gauged support for presidential candidates among Kentucky residents who were likely to vote. Therefore, the poll might not reflect the thinking of other residents, those not registered to vote.

Jones' performance was rated on par with his predecessor, Wallace Wilkinson, by 49 percent of those surveyed. Thirty-five percent said Jones was better than Wilkinson and 6 percent said he was worse. Jones, who took office Dec. 10, 1991, had no comment on the poll results.

His press secretary, Frank Ash-

## 2 small fires at Holmes extinguished Friday night

Residents of Holmes Hall on North Campus were summoned out of their dormitory twice last week by separate fires, the second of which may have been intentionally set, officials said.

The first fire alarm sounded at about 10:30 p.m. Thursday because of a small fire caused by hot cigarettes in a fourth-floor garbage disposal room. The second alarm came about 3:30 a.m. Friday in response to a fire in a garbage room on the third floor.

Danny Graves, Holmes Hall director, said that he is not ruling out the possibility of arson, though there is no proof that someone set the second fire with the intent to do harm. He called the incident "suspicious."

"It's a shame something like this has to happen," Graves said. "We're just going to rely on our residents to help out on this. If

### Local band Olympuz Monz mixes psychedelic, industrial music

With all kinds of music being aimed at people today, it's hard to find something new and different. The stacks and racks are filled with Pink Floyd rip offs and Madonna wannabes. Any yokel who dons a Garth 10 gallon thinks he can strum a six-string to the applause of the nation. Well, here's something fresh.

Down at Cut Corner Records and



Bear's Wax Records, you'll find a new tape on commission by two local artists. Shawn Wilhoite and Mike Mossey are two Lexington recording artists who have just released their second album.

Under the name Olympuz Monz, the two have recorded *Food for Fiji* and their latest, *Blastocyst*. This album is what Shawn, also known as "Turkie," calls "psyche-

delic industrial."

"It's psychedelic because it's meditational. It's like a hymn to the mind. And it's industrial because it uses the newest technology to get the desired sound."

"Olympuz Monz" is taken from the name of the crater on Mars the size of Texas. "This means we're composing the unknown, but the reachable for the listener."

A blastocyst is a human fetus in its fifth day of existence, Wilhoite said. "This is to signify the first experience of becoming, which is what life constantly does."

Much more experimental than *Blastocyst* was *Food for Fiji*, the

duo's first effort. *Blastocyst* seems to move through the moods of a day, taking the listener from the jumps and prickles of small revelations to the sinking humdrum of monotony.

"We're using new ways to achieve old effects," Mossey said. "But we're constantly improving quality and trying to move toward large scale orchestration. All the music has this theme of alien identity."

Wilhoite wants to concentrate on orchestration and a little mainstream guitar. He is influenced by David Gilmour of Pink Floyd and Michael Hedges, a new age guitar-

ist. And he is even considering film scores, as well as another collaborative with Mossey.

A hymn fades up with a dominant sound over its far off voice, calling "mother nature." This begins the second side. Then the music slides into an oriental feel, demonstrating another concept.

Then some screeching drones, like windshield wipers, come in and slow down. They die out as subtly as side one had begun. The cycle

completes itself. Looking at the vast choice of music today, one has to decide on music that is new and innovative and trying to say something. If you're lucky enough to find it, Olympuz Monz demonstrates the new and the pioneering. New times demand new voices.

What's so cool is that the music is closer than you might think to you. It's all happening right here in Lexington! There's gold in them thar hills!

### Knopfler jams with 10-year-old guitar prodigy

SYDNEY, Australia — With a painful battle against leukemia behind him, 10-year-old Nathan Cavaleri has every right to wring the blues from his electric guitar.

But the diminutive star says life hasn't been all that bad, and it's getting better all the time.

Nathan performed at the 1991 Australian Music Awards, opened for two of Australia's biggest acts

during a recent tour and jammed with idol Mark Knopfler of Dire Straits twice. His yet-untitled debut album, including six original songs, is scheduled for release in March 1993.

More importantly, the cancer has been in remission two years, and doctors say there's only a 10 percent chance of recurrence.

"It was a bit of bad luck," Nathan said with a wisdom far beyond his years. "Now I'm happy and healthy. My wishes are over."

"I think it's just something I've

got," Nathan said. "I just close my eyes and I play and everything I feel goes into my guitar."

The Starlight Foundation, a group that grants wishes to seriously ill children, arranged a meeting with Knopfler.

Knopfler told Nathan, then 7, as

the two played together in London. "You'll have to get your own band. I know you'll be the leader because you've got a very strong will, like me when I was young."

By the time Nathan met Knopfler again last year, he could wind his way through the intricacies of Dire Straits' "Sultans of Swing."

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# Taylor's football career may be over

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Lawrence Taylor's stellar career with the New York Giants appears over.

The perennial All-Pro linebacker and NFL career leader in sacks completely ruptured his right Achilles' tendon in the third quarter of Sunday's 27-7 victory over the Green Bay Packers. The recovery period for such an injury is about four months.

Taylor announced earlier this year that he was retiring at the end of the season. He left Giants Stadium before the end of the game wearing a cast.

"It was a complete tear," team physician Dr. Russell Warren said. "We'll perform the surgery early this week."

"I would expect a full recovery in the type of athletic injury. It shouldn't be the reason he does not come back."

Taylor was carted off the field with L1-L4 left in the third quarter. He blocked a pass by Green Bay's

Brett Favre and did not get off the turf. Players gathered around Taylor, then he was taken away, to chants of "L1" from the crowd.

"He was in a lot of pain," defensive lineman Leonard Marshall said. "He was screaming and complaining and worried about his leg." Taylor, playing his 12th season with the Giants, had two tackles, two assists, one sack and blocked two passes against Green Bay.

Taylor was an All-Pro for his first 10 seasons in the NFL. He did not make the team last year for the first time in his career.

Giants coach Ray Handley said Taylor "was disappointed he won't be able to play golf on Tuesday." "I lost sight of Lawrence (on the

play). It looked like he was in traffic and I don't know if anybody fell on him.

"He was in a lot of pain. Initially, I heard when Carl (Banks) came off the field, he mentioned what he thought the injury was, or what Lawrence diagnosed himself."

Dr. Warren said it was the first time in the last 10 years that a Giants player had suffered a torn Achilles' tendon.

He added that the artificial turf had nothing to do with the injury. Former Giants coach Bill Parcells, now an announcer on NBC-TV, said "in deference to all the great players I have coached, I would have to say that Lawrence Taylor is the greatest."

# Bowden might not protect Sabo

CINCINNATI — Cincinnati Reds general manager Jim Bowden will not say whether former All-Star third baseman Chris Sabo is on the team's list of 15 protected players for baseball's expansion draft Nov. 17.

But Bowden makes it clear that he considers Sabo potentially very valuable to the Reds.

"When Chris Sabo is healthy, he is one of the best third basemen in baseball," Bowden said. "He's a 25-home run, 80-RBI guy who gives you 100 percent. Those are tough players to just come up with."

The Reds sent their 15-man protected list to Major League Baseball on Friday. The Cincinnati Enquirer reported Sunday All teams must have their lists in by Tuesday. Those lists will not be made public. The expansion draft for the National League's two newest teams, the Florida Marlins and Colorado Rockies, is Nov. 17.

The new teams will select from

among the non-protected players of American and National League teams. The three-round draft is to give each of the expansion teams 36 players. After each round, existing teams can protect more of their unprotected players.

There has been speculation that the Reds would leave Sabo unprotected because of his \$3 million salary and the bad ankle that hampered him most of 1992 after he will also be a free agent after the 1993 season. It has also been speculated that the Reds may leave starting pitcher Tom Browning unprotected.

He carries a \$3 million salary and wrecked a knee in a home plate collision that sidelined him at mid-season. Browning underwent reconstructive surgery on the knee. Bowden has gotten off to a running start after being promoted last month to general manager from director of player development, succeeding Bob Quinn. Bowden helped select Tony Perez as manager to replace the departed Lou Piniella.

Then, Bowden worked two deals

with the New York Yankees. He traded outfielder Paul O'Neill and minor-league first baseman Joe DeBerry for outfielder Roberto Kelly. Last week, the Reds bought left-hander Greg Cadaret from New York to bolster the bullpen.

The Reds reportedly have been shopping lefty reliever Norm Charlton. That would leave right-hander Rob Dibble as the team's lone closer.

The Reds are interested in a proven, 100-RBI performer for the middle of their batting order. Bowden is leaving the door open for more trades to improve his ball club, but would not describe his talks with other teams.

"We aren't allowed to talk specific names until after the draft, but there has already been some general discussion," he said.

Those reportedly left off the Reds' list of protected players include left-hander Chris Hammond, a starter who was erratic in 1992, and Bobby Ayala and Mo Santoro, who have pitched mostly in Cincinnati's farm system but have had brief stints with the Reds.

# Piniella may get Mariners job

SEATTLE — Lou Piniella's tempestuous managerial style helped produce winners in New York and Cincinnati. Now, he apparently will be asked to produce a winner in Seattle.

Piniella, 49, is expected to be named manager of the Seattle Mariners as early as today, according to published reports. The Seattle Post-Intelligencer reported Saturday that Piniella had accepted a three-year offer with an option for a fourth year. Piniella could not be reached

for comment Sunday. There was no answer at his Allendale, N.J., home.

Mariners officials, including general manager Woody Woodward, president Chuck Armstrong and chief executive officer John Ellis, also could not be reached for comment. Piniella could come with most of a ready-made coaching staff: Jackie Moore, Stan Williams, Sam Perlozzo and John McLaren, who worked for Piniella in Cincinnati, are all available.

Piniella left Cincinnati last month after failing to reach agreement with owner Marge Schott on a new contract.

someone did do it, we would hope the students would report it."

Maj. Terry Chrisman, whose Fire Department No. 6 on South Limestone Street responded to the alarms, said he, too, is unsure about the second fire.

"When we had the first one, we thought it was started by hot cigarette butts. A few hours later we had another incident just like it, so right now we don't know."

Chrisman said arson specialists

are looking into the incident.

Capt. Lucian Anderson, a fire investigator for the Lexington Fayette Urban County Fire Department, said if someone started the fire and was caught, the person could be found guilty of first degree arson, which carries a penalty of 20 years to life in prison.

The reason for the stiff penalty, he said, is because there were people occupying the building when the fires were set, thus increasing the risk of physical harm.

ley, said Jones prefers to leave it to others to evaluate his job performance.

Ashley said the poll "should be very gratifying to the governor," especially considering tight money in state government.

"This poll comes at the end of the year in which the governor inherited an almost \$400 million revenue shortfall," Ashley said. "He had to

deal with it by budget reductions across the board.

"Obviously that didn't make a lot of people feel good, but he had no alternative. Who knows what his ratings would be if he had a \$100 million surplus?"

Lindsay Back, a government professor at Morehead State University, said he was not surprised by the poll results.

"But I would have thought more than 5 percent would have given him an 'excellent,'" Back said. "That shows most people tend to like how he has handled his job but

they are somewhat cautious to overly praise him."

Back attributes Jones' good grades to his "taking on initiatives that he has promised, especially tackling health care."

"People seem more concerned in issues like that and the economy than some of the controversies that have popped up," Back said.

Controversies in Jones' first year in office include his raising money to pay off his \$1.76 million debt from his 1987 campaign, naming his chief fund-raiser, Jack Hall, to be a special adviser, and first approving a 5 percent pay increase for state officials then quashing it.

ton Avenue runs around. Aesthetically the site is ideal for a library, said Paul Willis, UK director of libraries.

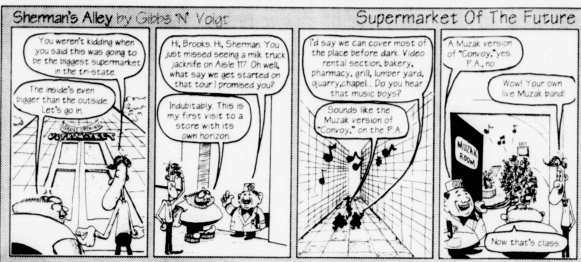
"The nice thing about putting the library between those two is that there will be an open space," he said.

Willis also said planners conducted core drilling and studies of pedestrian traffic when considering the library site.

All of the land surrounding the site ultimately will be used for other University projects, he said.

"The University had two things going at the same time. Future plans call for new academic buildings around the library," Willis said.

Construction of the new library is set to begin in the spring of 1994.



However, Willis would not say when the five structures on the site will be demolished.

Willis said he is not sure whether other residents who will be affected by construction have been notified of the decision to build the library on Clifton Avenue.

"I hope so," he said.


