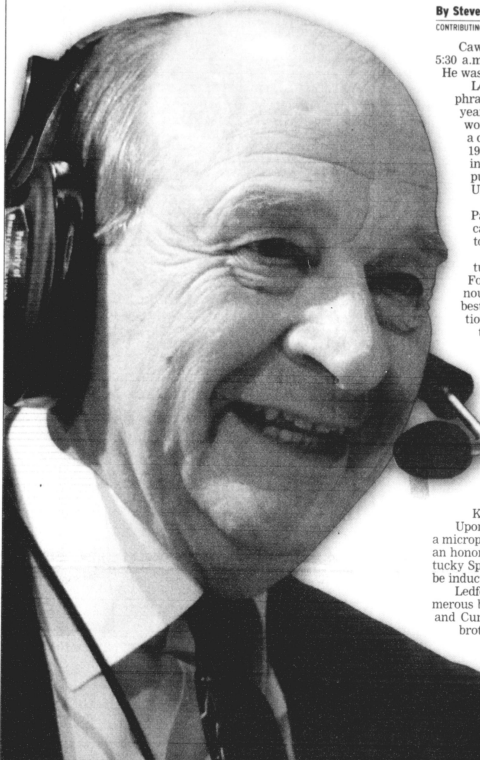

## An unforgettable voice

Breaking down the walls: For 39 years, Ledford told it like it was for UK football and basketball

Cawood Ledford, the legendary "Voice of the Wildcats," died at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday at Appalachian Regional Hospital in Harlan. He was 75.

Ledford had a career that spanned five decades. Known for such phrases as "Hello everybody, this is Cawood Ledford," he spent 39 years broadcasting UK football and basketball games. He began working for WLEX radio in 1953 broadcasting UK games without a color analyst. He went to work for WHAS Radio in Louisville in 1956, where he would spend 22 years. He returned to Lexington in 1978 and founded Cawood Ledford Productions. His company published "Cawood on the Cats," a weekly publication covering UK athletics.

His first broadcast was a UK football game in 1953 when Paul "Bear" Bryant still coached the team. His final broadcast came March 26, 1992, when Rick Pitino's "Unforgettables" lost to Duke in the East Regional Final of the NCAA tournament.

Ledford's reputation preceded him. He was honored as Kentucky Sportscaster of the year 22 times. He broadcast 17 Final Fours for the NCAA Radio Network, more than any other announcer in history. He was also named the best college basketball announcer in the nation four times, and the best in history by the Gannett News Service.

UK fans were not the only ones familiar with Ledford's voice. One of the most renowned horse racing broadcasters, he called the Kentucky Derby for 22 years. He won the Englehard Award, the highest honor given to thoroughbred racing broadcasters. He also received the "Silver Horseshoe" honor and the "Dean Eagle Award" for his coverage of the "Run for the Roses."

Though he was best known for calling basketball and football, Ledford called the World Series, the Masters golf tournament and heavyweight boxing, including coverage of Kentuckian Muhammad Ali.

Upon his retirement in 1992, UK retired his jersey, which depicted a microphone. He was the first non-player or non-coach to receive such an honor. Also in 1992, the Lexington Herald-Leader named him Kentucky Sportsman of the Year. He then became the fifth announcer to be inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994.

Ledford graduated from Centre College in 1949. The author of numerous books, he received honorary degrees from UK, Centre College and Cumberland College. He is survived by his wife, Frances; his brother, Jim; and sister, Eloise.

UK began the Cawood Ledford Scholarship Fund to assist former student-athletes who had completed their eligibility but had not completed a degree. The Ledford family has asked that donations be made to either the Cawood Ledford Scholarship Fund at UK or the Cawood Ledford Endowed Scholarship at Cumberland College.

Funeral arrangements and a Lexington memorial service are pending.

## Ledford an 'ambassador' for UK

Former UK guard Richie Farmer: 'For years and years he was the eyes and ears for the fans'

More than any other University of Kentucky personality or image — alumnus, athlete, coach, president or even governor — Cawood Ledford's voice epitomized UK and brought to life the university and athletic events many never had the chance to witness.

The legendary UK play-by-play announcer did more than just call basketball and football games for 39 years. He was an ambassador for the university, despite never attending UK. And he was the most recognizable link to not only UK athletics, but the entire university for most of the state.

"For years and years he was the eyes and ears for the fans," said Richie Farmer, a former UK guard who grew up in Clay County. "To them, he was Kentucky basketball, especially for those in eastern Kentucky, who couldn't afford to go to games."

Patricia in Paducah or the Parkers in Pikeville might not know who former UK presidents Otis A. Singletary or Charles Wethington were, but by God, everybody knew Cawood.

In many respects, Ledford had

as much influence on the rapid popularity growth of basketball in the Bluegrass as the Wildcats did.

"When you talk about Kentucky sports, Adolph Rupp is a legend, but Cawood was right up there with him," said Kyle Macy, Morehead State basketball coach, former UK point guard and broadcaster.

Farmer said Ledford lived up to the expectations of those who idolized him.

"I was a kid who grew up in Kentucky and got to live out a dream," Farmer said. "I listened to Cawood and turned down the sound on the television."

"Cawood was a hero of mine. The best compliment I could give him is that sometimes you meet a hero and they disappoint you, but he was still my hero once I got to know him."

Former Lexington Herald-Leader and Louisville Courier-Journal columnist Billy Reed, who with Ledford wrote a book called *Hello Everybody: This is Cawood Ledford*, said fans flocked to book-signings to finally get a glimpse of the legendary man behind the dial.

"Many didn't even buy a book," Reed said. "They just wanted to shake his hand and meet him

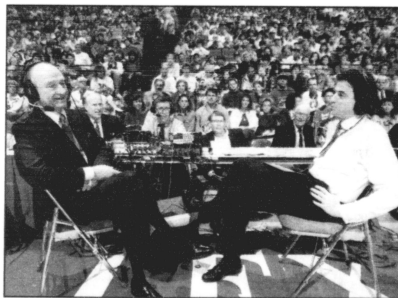

or get an autograph on a piece of paper."

Kentuckians grew up listening to his UK radio broadcasts. Macy said even Bob Knight, the former "enemy" and Indiana coach, told stories of listening to Ledford's broadcasts as a child.

In fact, few people outside of the state didn't know Ledford, or at least his voice. He called the Kentucky Derby 22 times and the NCAA Final Four 17, including UK's championship seasons of 1958 and 1978.

After his last UK broadcast in the quarter-finals of the NCAA Tournament, Ledford was congratulated for a distinguished ca-

reer by a humble Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski, who instead could have been celebrating a last-second win and a trip to the Final Four that ended Ledford's career.

Ralph Hacker had the unenviable task of replacing a living legend who fans still longed for.

"I couldn't replace Cawood Ledford," Hacker said in an interview with WKYT. "No one could replace Cawood."

"Without question, he was a great ambassador for not only UK sports, but the University of Kentucky. His reach was far beyond the bounds of UK and the state's borders."

## UK, church join to fight Alzheimer's

LOUISVILLE — A church that is housing people suffering from Alzheimer's disease and related ailments will combine their efforts with the University of Kentucky. The \$7 million, 52-bed home that will sit adjacent to the Episcopal Church Home is scheduled to open in late 2002. When the home opens, doctoral students from UK's Sanders-Brown Center on Aging will begin studying whether the building's special design and the staff's care-giving concepts make a difference for people who have a disease with no known cure. About half of all people over 85 have Alzheimer's disease, a form of dementia, according to the national Alzheimer's Association.

## Prosecutors seek tougher gun laws

LEXINGTON — Federal and state prosecutors are promising they will get tougher on criminals who use guns. New Lexington police Chief Anthony Beatty said his department has already confiscated 189 weapons believed to be used in crimes this year. Acting U.S. Attorney Frances Catron said her office is cooperating with state prosecutors to ensure that criminals who use guns face the harshest penalty possible in either state or federal courts. Thus far, only Fayette County among the areas in the eastern district of Kentucky has obtained a federal grant to hire additional prosecutors.

## Parents arrested for team's party

NEW CASTLE, N.Y. — The parents of a high school football player were arrested for allegedly holding a team party with beer, marijuana and a stripper who let students as young as 15 lick whipped cream off her body. Robert and Rochelle Wien were charged with endangering the welfare of a child and unlawfully dealing with a child. The offenses carry up to a year in jail. Police said they were responding to a noise complaint Saturday when they found the naked woman on the Wiens' patio. Officers said 30 to 40 students, including some girls, were at the party. Detective Sgt. James Carroll said the stripper was about halfway through an hour-long act when officers arrived. An officer said the stripper apparently was hired by some students. The woman was not charged. The party marked the end of summer training camp for the team from Horace Greeley High School in Chappaqua.

## Lawsuit says ecampus guilty of fraud

LEXINGTON — A lawsuit filed in Tennessee alleges that a group of investors in former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's ecampus.com Internet bookseller were the victims of securities fraud when they bought stock in the company in 1999. The 21 investors are seeking damages of at least \$100 million from nine defendants, including Wendy's restaurants founder Dave Thomas, Hazard busi-

nessman L.D. Gorman, Lexington banker Elmer Whitaker and the law firm of Frost Brown Todd LLC. The lawsuit is similar to one filed against Thomas in June by 17 Tennessee investors, said Martin B. Bailey, attorney for the 21 investors. New allegations and defendants were added after lawyers investigated the case, Bailey said. Florida investors have made similar claims in a separate lawsuit. ecampus.com is a Lexington Internet bookseller launched by Wilkinson, who fled for bankruptcy protection in February along with his flagship business, Wallace's Bookstores.

## Transsexual sues United Airlines

CHICAGO — A transsexual is suing United Airlines, claiming he was ordered to get off an airplane and change into men's clothing before re-boarding. Richard Ward, also known as Sarah West, was on a flight from Omaha, Neb., to Chicago, where he was scheduled to take a connecting flight home to London. When Ward showed United staff his British passport, identifying him as a man, United employees told him to get off the plane and change into men's clothing, according to the lawsuit filed Tuesday in Cook County Circuit Court. Ward says he showed United staff a letter from his doctor that explained it was normal for him to dress as a woman because he was undergoing treatment for "male to female transsexualism." But Ward claims he was told he would not be able to fly until he looked more like his passport photo. United spokesman Joe Hopkins on Wednesday said the airline would not comment on the lawsuit. The lawsuit seeks more than \$50,000 in damages.

## Senate seeking to import medicine

WASHINGTON — Pharmacists and drug distributors should be allowed to obtain U.S.-made medicines from Canada, where they are cheaper, and resell them to American consumers at a reduced price, senators said Wednesday. They said they would pursue legislation despite contentions by the Bush administration that it cannot guarantee the safety of drugs brought back into United States from other nations. Legislation enacted last fall allows drugstores and medical distributors to buy U.S.-made and approved drugs in certain countries where they are sold more cheaply and then resell them here. However, officials with the Food and Drug Administration have declined to carry out the measure, arguing that counterfeit or altered medicines could slip through U.S. borders. An FDA deputy told Congress Wednesday that even limiting the exchange to Canada would not protect Americans from worldwide counterfeiters willing to sell harmful or ineffective medicines to a lucrative U.S. market. He even brought bags of fake drugs seized from a Washington-area airport and a Chicago drugstore.

## Terry Nichols may get death penalty

OKLAHOMA CITY — The new district attorney in Oklahoma City said Wednesday that he will prosecute bombing conspirator Terry Nichols on state murder charges that could bring the death penalty. Speaking at the site of the Oklahoma City

## Racially charged fliers spark debate

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Black student leaders at Penn State want an apology from a retired professor who distributed fliers with a racist epithet, which the professor says was just an attempt to show that students are treated poorly. The incident comes just a few months after black student leaders reported receiving death threats and students staged a sit-in to protest the university's racial climate. The 300 fliers, for Julian Heicklen's campaign for Centre County jury commissioner, noted that very few students serve on county juries. "The students are being treated here the exact way the blacks were in the 1950s except for the lynching," said Heicklen, who is white. The 300 fliers contained the headline "PSU Student As Nigger." Heicklen said he has long championed the rights of Penn State students and insisted the use of the word was logical.

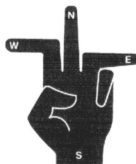

# Donations to help future Cawood Ledford scholars

Upon his retirement, UK sports commentator Cawood Ledford announced the birth of a scholarship in his name, one that will continue to live on even after his death Wednesday at age 75.

The Cawood Ledford Scholarship Fund began in 1992 with the proceeds Ledford had from his lifetime activities. The scholarship aids athletes who have finished their athletic eligibility but have not received a degree.

The athletes can return after pursuing a sports career, and have the option to work to pay for schooling until a degree is achieved. Common work projects include working for UK Athletics and community outreach projects.

The scholarship is an endowment fund and its interest is used to help the athletes, said Bob Bradley of UK Athletics. He said the fund is the only of its kind for UK sports.

The amount of money assessed to students depends on their needs, and athletes from any sport are eligible. James Blackburn, Sonny Collins and Steve Hricenak were all UK athletes who were able to attain their degrees under the scholarship.

Kathy DeBoer, a Senior Associate Athletic Director, said Ledford cared deeply about UK and the students.

"Cawood was very, very close to our program and not only tremendously interested in what kids were doing on the court, but how they were doing in the classroom," DeBoer said.

Friends of Ledford confirmed he started radiation and chemotherapy treatment for cancer last December. Within that time, DeBoer said Ledford spoke with his wife, Frances, and decided any donations after his death would go toward the scholarship fund.

DeBoer said Ledford worked to gain support for the scholarship whenever possible.

"He felt that the athletes who competed here (at UK) gave a tremendous amount to the university," she said. "Ledford decided to give back to them."

Donations made will go directly to the scholarship fund. DeBoer said her office and other offices on campus are already receiving a number of interested donors.

Most of the donations, she said, have come from individuals who had relationships with Ledford. One donor, a man from Michigan, began making donations after listening to Ledford during UK basketball games on the radio.

DeBoer was a long-time friend of Ledford, a man she said was one of a kind.

"We've lost a Kentucky hero today," she said.

# Students shocked by Ledford's death

Reflecting: Many students were kids when Ledford was calling games, but they know his legend

His voice still rings in the heads of many students. Cawood Ledford, "the Voice of the Wildcats," died Wednesday morning after a long struggle with cancer.

As students learned of his death, they had varied responses, but most seemed saddened.

When Chad Schwalbach, an integrated strategic communication senior, learned of Ledford's death he bowed his head, drew in a deep breath, hesitated and whispered that he was shocked.

Schwalbach recalled game days when he was a kid. His father would turn down the volume of the television and turn up the radio to hear Ledford's voice.

"My dad said Cawood told it like it is," he said. Most who recalled Ledford did so with distant looks on their faces. They were seemingly transported to living rooms, garages or cars packed with family and friends intently listening to the radio, with Ledford's voice ringing out plays by Rex Chapman, Richie Farmer or Travis Ford.

Zack Moxley, a computer science senior, said his family used to do the same thing as Schwalbach's.

Moxley said he's glad Ledford lived as long as he did.

"It's kind of better he retired several years ago, rather than (dying) during his career," he said. "It would have been a lot more tragic."

Although some students were too young to remember listening to Ledford, or weren't from Kentucky, they did understand the great admiration so many hold for him.

"I don't really know a lot, but everyone looked up to him because he knew a lot about sports," said Christy Congleton, a family studies senior. "People respected him because of that."

"I know he announced something," said Dominique Myrick, a social work senior. "That's all I know about him. The man really worked hard."

Ledford did work hard, and because of that, he will not soon be forgotten.

"He is definitely a legend around here," said Justin Capel, a business sophomore. "I'm shocked ... I didn't even know he was sick."

Other students seemed to have been ready for the blow.

"He's been sick for a long time, (I) kind of expected it," said Can Kenimer, a plant and soil science senior. "It's sad to see him go."

The Ledford era is over, but his legend lives on in the hearts and minds of his devoted fans.

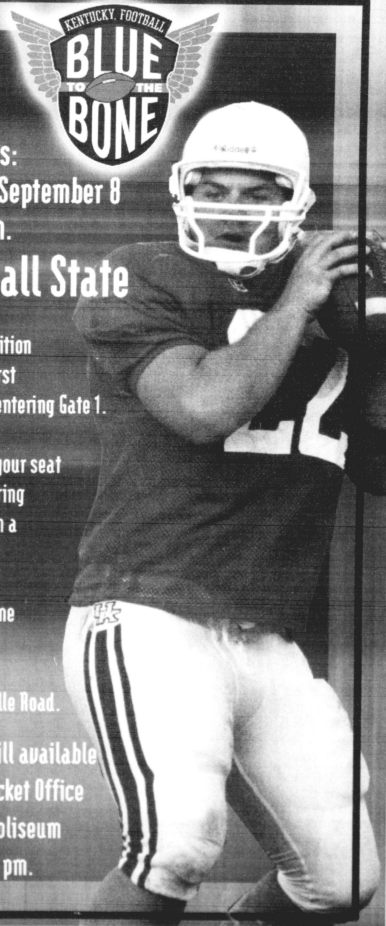

# SGA unofficially changes name

**Alterations:** Student Government Association representatives say new name is a symbol of improvement, and many changes to come

The Student Government Association, commonly referred to as SGA, has unofficially altered its name to Student Government.

The new name, which is featured on this year's logo design, was a decision made by President Tim Robinson and other members who want to transform the student representative body.

"We think that the SGA has

some negative connotations from the past few years," said Robinson, who calls the new name a symbol of the improvement the organization is making this year.

"We really just want students to see that there are changes coming," said Robinson, who plans to rebuild the government with a direct focus on unity, service and advocacy.

Robinson said that referring to the organization as Student Government will help identify them because few stu-

dents know what SGA stands for.

The Student Government has also remodeled its office, adding seven work stations, and changed the colors from baby blue and black to blue and yellow.

Zach Webb, a senator for the College of Arts and Sciences, said that while the name change may be considered a symbol it is not the most important issue. "The focus this year is not about the name change," he said. "The students care

about what kind of representation they're getting. I think what we're really going to be judged on is not so much a name change but what we'll get done this year."

Webb said that if the Student Government has a lot of potential this year, then "the ball is in Tim's court" as far as how the rest of the year will go. "We've got a lot of dedicated people who really care," he said.

Robinson has high hopes for this year and plans to focus as much as possible on the students. "You say student when you say Student Government," he said. "It puts the student back into it."

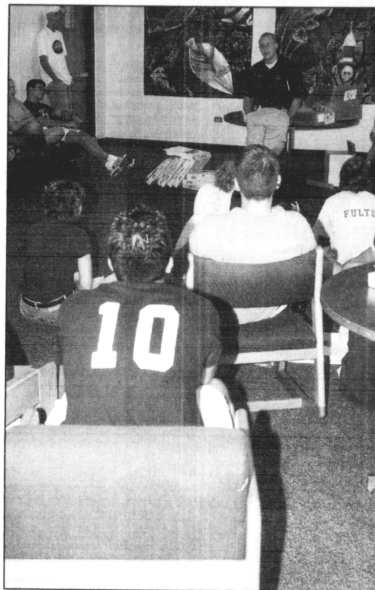

# Dorms adopt cops to teach campus safety

## Breaking down the walls: Officers attempt to lessen stereotypes about campus police

UK Police are out on campus — to meet students. Each fall semester, meetings are arranged for dorm residents to meet their assigned Adopt-a-Cop.

Officers such as Jonathon Sizemore are assigned dorms. This is his second year working at Kirwan Tower.

Throughout the semester, adopt-a-cops visit UK dorms, usually while on duty, but also when they are off. Officers first go into dorms out of uniform to speak with residents and attempt to lessen stereotypes about the police, Sizemore said.

Sizemore informs students

of the many different safety programs available to them. He encouraged female students to take the classes UK Police offer on Rape Aggression Defense.

"You'll come out of the class feeling like you can defend yourself," Sizemore said.

He also explained the SafeCats escort service and encouraged students to make use of it. When called, SafeCats sends escorts to walk people to where they need to go on campus.

"If you're going to be out late at night, don't be by yourself," he said.

Another tip he offered was to make personal property identifiable. Students should write down the serial numbers of valuables, or UK Police can in-

scribe their names or Social Security numbers on them. The inscriptions ensure that stolen objects taken to be sold can be identified as stolen property.

He also warned residents about the consequences of using drugs and alcohol.

He told students that if they drink, they should be sure to have someone with them. Even if they won't be driving, they need to make sure they don't inadvertently cause a public disturbance or walk into the street where they could be hit.

Students at Kirwan Tower appreciate Sizemore's advice.

"He was realistic in the sense that he didn't say there will be no drinking," Lindsey Shubitowski, a political science freshman, said.

Amy Callihan, Kirwan Tower hall director and social work graduate, said Sizemore is continuously helpful. "He was

doing rounds in the buildings (on the first weekend of school) with RA's to make sure everything was OK," she said.

Sizemore is not someone who only protects the dorm.

"He hangs out all of the time," said Natascha Polk, an accounting senior and Kirwan Tower RA. Polk said last week Sizemore attended the birthday party of a staff member.

The feelings of appreciation are reciprocal, as Sizemore said he works with the best dorm and RA staff on campus.

"If there is anything I can do to help, don't hesitate to ask," he told his residents. "Just because you see me doesn't mean you are in trouble."

Alan Hersh tickles the keys

If you're looking for entertainment this evening, head over to the Singletary Center, where pianist and UK professor Alan Hersh will perform "The Pianist's Songbook," a recital consisting of well-known classics written for piano.

"It's kind of a greatest hits program," Hersh said. The program includes some of the most popular pieces written for solo piano, including pieces by composers Debussy, Schubert, and Joplin as well as Chopin's "Fantasy Impromptu" and Mozart's "Turkish Rondo."

Vocalists' programs frequently follow the style of including pieces from these countries, Hersh said.

"I thought I'd do the same thing but without words," Hersh said.

The recital previews Hersh's third CD, the second volume of "The Pianist's Songbook," which will be released this fall. Hersh also plans to release another CD, Goldberg's "Variations of Bach," in the fall.

He describes a musical career as "a labor of love."

Hersh's musical career be-

gan when he was 2 years old, and by the age of 5, he was practiced enough to be able to give public performances.

"I've been (playing the piano) as long as I can remember and even before that," Hersh said.

The choice to pursue a career in music came to Hersh during his high school years; he also played football. Hersh remembers his father telling him, "You're serious about music and about sports... you can do one or the other, but not both."

Music is an integral part of Hersh's family. His mother's family includes several professional musicians, and many members of that family have played piano or violin. Additionally, a second cousin of Hersh's formed a rock group called Brooklyn Bridge.

Hersh's wife, who he calls "a very talented pianist," is a member of the music faculty at Lexington Community College. The couple's children studied piano and violin throughout high school. They also have a granddaughter who shows a strong aptitude for music.

Hersh extends a special invitation to students who would not normally attend a piano concert.

"Give it a try," he said. "It's good to broaden your experiences a little bit, especially at a university."

Vigilantes of Love Summershine

Have you ever heard of the Vigilantes of Love? Even though you may not have heard of them, they have been around as members of the underground music scene for nearly a decade. Although the band has gone through some member changes throughout the years, singer/songwriter and guitarist Bill Mallonee being the only original member left, their style has been fairly consistent, yielding a roots rock, alternative country sound...until now.

Summershine, the group's new album, takes a detour from their old sound. Clean electric guitars replace the overdriven guitars, and the old roots rock sound is abandoned for a more pop-rock style.

The first two songs capture VOL's familiar energy that has been evident all these years. But this rock energy is quick-

ly transformed into a form of lounge music, new to the band, by the third track, "Galaxy."

The rest of the album goes on to include a combination of both mellow songs and upbeat pop tunes.

"Along For the Ride," with a couple of other tracks on the album, probably marks one of the first times VOL has used orchestra sounds, namely strings, in their tunes.

The best track on the album is probably "Happy Being Lonely, Lonely Being Happy," a smooth ballad that shows off Mallonee's clever use of words and phrases, which is evident in the title.

With lines like, "So you trace your world in blue/And every voice is loud and long/Except the one inside of you," we are reminded that Mallonee hasn't lost his lyrical touch.

It is obvious through Summershine that Mallonee's endeavors have done quite a bit of musical exploring. And even though their sound has changed, the overall quality of their releases hasn't.

This product is intended to prevent pregnancy. It does not protect against HIV infection (AIDS) and other sexually transmitted diseases.

What is DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection? DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection is a form of birth control that is given as a regular intramuscular injection (a shot) in the buttock or upper arm once every 3 months (13 weeks). To control your pregnancy prevention, you must return for your next injection by the 13th week (13 weeks) of the 3 months (13 weeks). DEPO-PROVERA contains medroxyprogesterone acetate, a chemical similar to that used in the oral birth control pills. It is a synthetic progestin that works during the second half of your menstrual cycle. DEPO-PROVERA acts by preventing your egg cells from maturing. If an egg is not released from the ovaries during your menstrual cycle, you cannot become fertilized by sperm and result in pregnancy. DEPO-PROVERA also causes changes in the lining of the uterus that make it less likely for pregnancy to occur.

The effects of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection last for 3 months following the recommended intramuscular injection. After your DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection your first period may be irregular. DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection is not intended for use in the first 5 days after the end of your last menstrual period. • Kidney disease

• Bleeding from your vagina

• High blood pressure

• Migraine headaches

• Asthma

• Seizure (convulsions or convulsions)

• A history of depression

• If you are taking any medicine or use the natural method

This product is intended to prevent pregnancy. It does not protect against transmission of HIV (AIDS) and other sexually transmitted diseases such as chlamydia, genital herpes, genital warts, gonorrhea, hepatitis B, and syphilis.

What if I want to become pregnant after using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?

DEPO-PROVERA is a long acting birth control method. It takes some time after your last injection for it to wear off. Based on the results from a large study done in the United States for women who stop using DEPO-PROVERA in order to become pregnant, it is estimated that about half of those who become pregnant will do so in about 10 months after their last injection and about 80% of those who become pregnant will do so in about 18 months after their last injection. The length of time you use DEPO-PROVERA will affect how long it takes you to become pregnant after you stop using it.

What are the risks of using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?

The side effect reported most frequently by women who use DEPO-PROVERA is irregular bleeding. This is a change in or decrease in menstrual bleeding or no bleeding at all. Usually, heavy or continuous bleeding however is not a usual effect of DEPO-PROVERA and if this happens you should see your health-care provider right away. With continued use of DEPO-PROVERA, bleeding usually stops. About 15% of women studied reported no menstrual bleeding after 2 years of use. The reason that your periods stop is because DEPO-PROVERA causes a resting state in your ovaries. When you stop using DEPO-PROVERA, the regular monthly growth of the lining of your uterus does not stop and therefore the bleeding that comes with your normal menstrual cycle does not stop. After you stop using DEPO-PROVERA, your menstrual cycle usually returns to its normal cycle.

Weight gain may be associated with a decrease in the amount of stored stored in all of your bones. This could increase your risk of developing bone fractures. The rate of bone mineral density of age-related bone mineral loss.

Some women who have used different forms of contraception found that women who used DEPO-PROVERA for contraception had no increased overall risk of developing cancer of the uterus. DEPO-PROVERA was within the present 1 to 5 years may have a slightly increased risk with your health-care provider.

Because DEPO-PROVERA is such an effective contraceptive method the risk of accidental pregnancy for women who stop using DEPO-PROVERA 3 months (13 weeks) is very low. While there has been reports of an increased risk of low birth weight and neonatal death or stillbirth problems in infants conceived close to the time of injection, such pregnancies are rare. See your health-care provider as soon as possible.

Some women using DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection have reported severe and potentially life-threatening allergic reactions known as anaphylaxis, and anaphylactic reactions. Symptoms include the sudden onset of hives or swelling and itching of the skin, breathing difficulty, and a drop in blood pressure.

Other Risk: Women who use hormone based contraceptives may have an increased risk of blood clots or stroke. Also, if a contraceptive method fails there is a possibility that you may get pregnant. While these events are rare, you should see your health-care provider if you have any of the problems listed in the next section.

Contraceptive Injection? Signal problems while using DEPO-PROVERA

Get medical attention immediately if any of these problems occur following an injection of DEPO-PROVERA:

• Sudden severe headache or vomiting, diarrhea or flu-like symptoms, problems with your weight or speech, weakness or numbness in an arm or leg (indicating a possible stroke)

• Sudden pain or swelling in the calf (indicating a possible clot in the leg)

• Unusual breast, nipple, or genital discharge

• Severe pain or tenderness in the lower abdominal area

• Any other signs of possible pregnancy

What are the possible side effects of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?

You may experience a weight gain while you are using DEPO-PROVERA. About two thirds of the women who used DEPO-PROVERA in a clinical trial reported a weight gain of about 5 pounds. Large study who used DEPO-PROVERA for 2 years gained an average total of 8.1 pounds over an average total of 13.8 pounds over those 4 years or approximately 13 pounds per year. Women who continued for 6 years gained an average total of 14.3 pounds over those 6 years or approximately 2.4 pounds per year.

Other Side Effects:

• In a clinical study of over 1,500 women who used DEPO-PROVERA for up to 2 years, some women reported the following effects that may or may not have been related to their use of DEPO-PROVERA: irregular menstrual bleeding, headache, dizziness, weakness or fatigue, depression, nervousness, abdominal pain, weight gain, changes in appetite, changes in sexual desire, changes in libido, changes in breast size, depression, nervousness, acne, pain, no hair growth for sensitive hair loss, rash, hot flashes, and joint pain. Other problems were reported for very few of the women in the clinical trial, but some of these could be serious. These include convulsions, paralysis, urinary tract infections, allergic reactions, hearing problems, osteoporosis, lack of return to fertility, deep vein thrombosis, abnormal uterine bleeding, breast cancer, or cervical cancer. If these or any other problems occur during your use of DEPO-PROVERA, discuss them with your health-care provider.

Contraceptive Injection? Should my prescriptions be followed during use of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?

During the time you are using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception, you may skip a period or your periods may stop completely. If you have been receiving your DEPO-PROVERA injections regularly every 3 months (13 weeks), then you are probably not pregnant. However, if you think that you may be pregnant, see your health-care provider.

How often do I get my shot of DEPO-PROVERA Contraceptive Injection?

If you are scheduled for any laboratory tests, tell your health-care provider that you are using DEPO-PROVERA for contraception. Certain blood tests are affected by hormones such as DEPO-PROVERA.

Drug Interactions: Certain drugs may decrease the effectiveness of DEPO-PROVERA. The two drug are given during the same time.

Warning: DEPO-PROVERA can be passed to the nursing infant in the breast milk, however, although it is not expected to be harmful to the infant. However, to prevent the breast milk from being passed to the infant, you should stop breastfeeding your infant until 2 weeks after your last injection of DEPO-PROVERA for contraception.

Recommended dose of DEPO-PROVERA is 150 mg every 3 months (13 weeks) given as a single intramuscular injection in the buttock or upper arm. To make sure that you get the first 5 days of a normal menstrual period, it is essential that the injection be given ONLY during the first 5 days of a normal menstrual period. 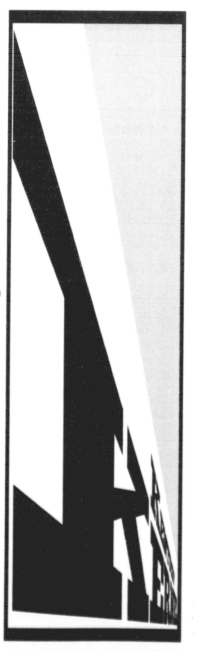

## Circling into the past for the future's sake

Friday night finds me with some of my friends in a small sweat lodge in the country. A few hours earlier my girlfriend and I had built a powerful fire that encompassed 28 lava rocks.

I use a pitchfork to get the stones, one at a time, out of the fire. There are traditionally four rounds with seven stones used in each round.

I push the glowing stones through the narrow portal of the blanket-covered lodge. A hole has been dug in the center of the lodge and is ready to accept the stones. Once all seven of the stones have been placed in the lodge, the four of us enter, close the door, then sprinkle cedar and sage on the stones to bless the rocks and give the dirt-floored structure a more pleasantly pungent aroma.

I dip a cup into a bucket of water that I had collected from the creek earlier that day and begin to pour the cool liquid onto the luminous stones. Steam leaps from the rocks and out of the hole with an overriding sense of urgency and wraps itself around our limbs as our pores seem to instantly become yawning chasms, sweat pours from our skin in little streams.

With the rapidity of modernity it's easy for me to become disconnected from nature, the earth and the psycho-

logical rapture of a mythological understanding of the planet and my place on it. We are given no rituals in which to help us better understand our environment and the condition of our existence. While some people do manage to reach a level of serenity through religious understanding, many of us do not. Many people who claim to have a substantial understanding of a religious mythology that provides ritual and purpose to their lives are often just being defensive and, poker-faced and frightened, try to convince themselves of the lie that they would have you believe. A new mythology is needed.

Technology has been moving too fast to allow a solid new mythology to be constructed on any space in this environment. Our culture needs a new mythology that can work to weave our multicultural understanding of the modern, or perhaps even postmodern, world together into a conceptual mandala.

Sometimes the only way to continue the leap into the future is to return to the psychological foundations of past mythological understanding. We have a past that is very much embedded in mythology. Our modernity is resting on a baked brick and marble pillared foundation of Greek mythology. The Greek's in turn had borrowed heavily from Egyptian mythology and art as an archetypal framework for their own cultural myth making.

"Before standing armies, before slavery and property, before warfare and phonetic alphabets and monotheism, before, before, before. And this is where the future is tak-

# Soccer Cats host No. 13 Buckeyes

After a semi-successful weekend road trip, the UK men's soccer team will play its home opener Friday night against Ohio State.

The road trip was only semi-successful in that UK went 1-1, defeating Butler, 2-1, and losing to Indiana, 1-0 in double overtime.

"We were very happy with the weekend, just disappointed with the result," Collins said. "The guys deserved better, they deserved to get a result in that game."

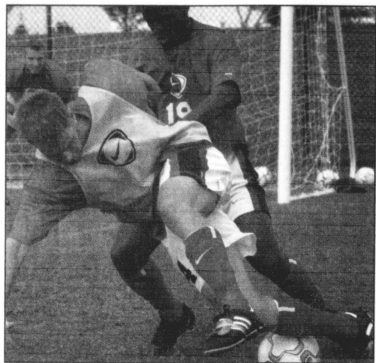
Collins is hoping that the emotional sting left over from the IU game can carry over into this Friday's contest with OSU.

UK got to where they are by playing excellent defense, including goal keeper Brad Samelko started both games last weekend and played well. Collins has Samelko listed as the starter for Friday, but added that it's not in stone.

"Brad will play Friday," Collins said. "But it is an ongoing evaluation. Brad made some great saves last weekend, and is starting to look confident, but it is an open fight as it is with every position."

Collins is keeping the main

goal in mind with every positional move he makes.

"You know where we're trying to get to is a national championship," Collins said. "And to get there you have to have players that are constantly battling each other, that's the only way you get better and that's where we're at."

OSU (2-0, 1-0) comes into Lexington ranked No. 13 and brings some incentive for UK to do well against them.

"It's our home opener," Collins said. "There will be a big crowd here. Ohio State and Kentucky are a big rivalry in soccer. So all those factors will cause a lot of adrenaline."

"We just need to make sure

we play aggressive and hard, but also smart and intelligent and not get too carried away with what's going on."

Collins sees a few things in OSU that he feels are areas for some concern.

"Ohio State is very talented," Collins said. "They have a lot of good individual players, so our individual defenders got to be very good."

He added that he still feels good about their chances saying, "I think we'll have a lot of opportunities to score."

Friday's game starts at 7:30 p.m. The Cats will also face UNC-Asheville at 2 p.m. Sunday. Both games will be played at the UK Soccer Complex.

# Student remembers greatness of Ledford

My first memory watching Kentucky basketball was during the 1978 championship game against Duke.

I was 7, I remember my Dad turning down the volume of the television and turning up the radio to listen to Cawood.

It took me about five years before I realized UK games were televised with sound.

Growing up it didn't matter where I watched the game; it was Cawood's voice I heard. Everyone listened to him; Cawood was the voice of the Wildcats.

Cawood was never afraid to tell it like it was. When other people would blame the referees, he would tell us the Cats just didn't come to play tonight.

He praised the Cats when they played well and he admitted when they played bad. But he always called it straight down the middle.

He began almost every game with his trademark "The Wildcats will be moving left to right on your radio dial."

No one could paint a picture of what was happening on the court or on the field better than him. From the opening tip or kickoff you seemed to know where players were and what they were doing.

The thing that most impressed me about Cawood was what people who really knew him would say about him. They wouldn't talk about how he was a great broadcaster; they would talk about how great of a person he was.

Fourteen years after my first UK basketball experience, I found myself once again listening to Cawood calling a UK-Duke game.

I was on my knees in a dorm room watching the greatest game ever played. I was too nervous to watch it in a group so I locked myself in my room and watched the television and listened to Cawood.

My superstitions led me to believe that listening to him call the game assisted the players on the court.

As the game grew more and more intense

My emotions flowed with the sound of his voice. When I was too nervous to watch, he talked me through the rough times.

When Christian Laettner hit the shot, it was Cawood that comforted UK fans and told them that it was all right. Kentucky basketball had made it back to the big time.

Not 'til then did I realize it would be the last time I was going to ever hear the legend call a game.

That's when I cried.

Out of all the people I have talked to today, nobody put it better than my Dad: "Nobody was better than Cawood. Before I had a television I could see the game through his eyes."

Dwayne Chambers was attending UK when Cawood Ledford called his last game. He joined the military in 1993 and then returned to UK - to learn sports broadcasting.

Kashmir was good; now it's gotten better.
