Inspection, Certification, and Transportation of Nursery Stock in Kentucky with a Brief Report for the Year Ended June 30, 1940

It is generally recognized that we have to contend with many more insects and diseases injurious to plants today than we did fifty years ago. Species that formerly were confined to limited areas are becoming widely spread. The chief factors contributing to this condition are the ease and extent of modern transportation.

Most of the insects and diseases which we consider new in this section of the country were known to be established in other sections or in foreign countries a few decades ago. Examples of such are the Mexican bean beetle, Hessian fly, Colorado potato beetle, and Oriental fruit moth; chestnut blight, phony peach, and Dutch elm disease. However desirable it is to have rapid transportation and trade between states and countries, it must be remembered that as these facilities are developed the problem of pest introduction and spread becomes greater. We are approaching the time when more and more attention on the part of the plant inspectors will be directed necessarily to the danger from this new source. This problem

has been recognized and in order to check more effectively the introduction and spread of plant pests, federal and state legislation has been enacted empowering properly designated officials to take such action as is necessary to protect our plants and their products. The federal plant quarantine act became effective in 1912 and the Kentucky Nursery Inspection Law in 1926. By authority of these laws, regulations have been devised which have helped to check introduction and spread of injurious insects and plant diseases. Their effectiveness depends on the proper understanding of the problem and complete cooperation of everyone interested in the production and use of agricultural and horticultural products.

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It is the policy of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station thru its Entomologist to publish each year an informal bulletin containing information regarding the production and movement of nursery stock; the requirements for interstate shipment of plants; the securing of nursery inspection certificates and nursery dealer's and agent's permits; a brief discussion of some of the most recently introduced insect pests and diseases; and a list of licensed nurserymen, dealers, and agents.

# INSPECTION OF NURSERIES AND TREATMENT OF AFFECTED STOCK

"All nurseries in Kentucky where trees, vines, plants or other nursery stock are grown and offered for sale, shall be inspected by the Entomologist and Botanist of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, or by his assistant, once each year at such times as he may elect, and he shall notify in writing the owners of such nurseries of the presence of any San Jose scale or other dangerous pests on the stock of such nurseries, and shall also notify in writing, the owner of any affected stock, that he is required, on, or before, a certain day to take such measures for the destruction of such insects or fungus enemies of nursery stock as have been shown to be effectual for this purpose."

The above quotation is from the Kentucky Nursery Inspection Law, passed by the General Assembly of Kentucky in 1926, a copy of which may be secured by writing the Office of the State Entomologist, Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, Lexington, Kentucky.

## UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS FOR INSECT AND DISEASE CONTROL

All states now have laws and regulations providing for inspection of nursery stock and other plant products, designed to lessen the danger of spreading serious pests. In order that these laws may serve more efficiently and cause the least handicap to the free flow of trade, officials in charge of plant pest regulations have formed regional plant boards, and from these regional boards representatives are selected to form a national Kentucky belongs to the Central Plant Board plant board. which is made up of plant regulatory officials in thirteen of the North Central states. Already this board has issued uniform inspection methods and tolerance limits covering the most common insects and plant diseases of nursery stock. working toward a system of uniform plant quarantine regulations for all states. When adopted, this policy will tend to lessen the confusion of shipping agricultural products interstate without increasing the danger of spreading plant pests.

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## PERMITS REQUIRED FOR NURSERYMEN, DEALERS AND AGENTS

The Kentucky law requires that "Each resident nursery or agency selling nursery stock in Kentucky shall annually file credentials with the office of the Kentucky State Entomologist and if these credentials are satisfactory shall, on payment of a fee of five dollars (\$5.00), be issued a permit authorizing said nursery or agency to do business in the state. Each dealer or seller of nursery stock, representing non-resident nurseries or sellers, shall be required to file annually with the State Entomologist satisfactory credentials, including names of nurseries, nurserymen, or persons represented; and on payment of a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) shall be issued a permit. If, however, the credentials in any case are not satisfactory it shall be the duty of the State Entomologist, the Director of the

Experiment Station and the State Commissioner of Agriculture concurring, to refuse to issue said permit. Any person soliciting orders for or delivering trees or plants in Kentucky shall be required to carry with him a copy of his Kentucky permit, to be shown to prospective buyers, purchasers, county officials or agents of the State Entomologist on demand." Kentucky nurserymen should bring these requirements to the attention of those interested in securing plants so that buyers may avoid the disappointment resulting from the purchase of worthless stock. There are several plant pests which are not readily detected on dormant nursery stock.

### DEFINITION OF NURSERY STOCK

All trees, shrubs, and vines, including ornamentals and evergreens, whether nursery grown or native; roses; strawberry, raspberry and blackberry plants; herbaceous perennial plants and roots; ornamental bulbs, corms and tubers; and any other plants which may serve as a means for disseminating injurious insects and plant diseases are classed as nursery stock. Because of the comparatively little pest risk, annual flowering plants, greenhouse and household potted plants and garden vegetable plants are not usually classed as nursery stock.

It is just as essential to secure inspection of nursery stock to be given away or sold locally as of that which is to be offered for sale and shipment to distant points.

## INFORMATION FOR SHIPPING NURSERY STOCK

All packages of nursery stock offered for shipment by common carrier must have a copy of a valid certificate of inspection. This is in accord with the U. S. postal regulations as well as state regulations. In addition to attaching a certificate to each package, it is necessary to file a copy of the inspection certificate with the proper authorities when shipping into the following states:

Nevada requires a special certificate, stating stock was inspected immediately prior to shipment.

Virginia requires nurseryman's registration fee only when agents are operating within the state.

Arkansas has reciprocal provisions except when agents representing non-resident nurserymen are working within the state, in which case a \$5.00 nurseryman's registration fee is required.

To secure permit tags, some of which are without cost, and to secure information regarding quarantine regulations of the various states, it will be necessary to correspond with the officers in charge of inspection and regulation in the various states, names of whom are given below.

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### JAPANESE BEETLE

Traps have been used at different places in the state since 1936 to determine the presence and spread of the Japanese beetle. To date, the insect has been found only at Louisville and

Lexington. The trapping records by years for these localities follows:

- 1936. Two beetles in Louisville and one in Lexington.
- 1937. Ten beetles in Louisville and one in Lexington.
- 1938. Sixty-two beetles in Louisville and one in Lexington.
- 1939. Thirteen beetles in Louisville and none in Lexington.

The record shows a marked reduction in numbers in both areas where trapping was conducted. The reduction in Louisville is significant since that area was treated with lead arsenate in 1938 (See Kentucky Regulatory Series Bulletin No. 19, 1939). Not only was a smaller number of beetles taken in the traps in 1939 but all those captured were in the area which had been treated. These facts indicate that the spread in 1939 was stopped and that the soil treatment in Louisville was rather effective.

Plants should be examined during late June, July and early August for Japanese beetles. One of their favorite food plants is the rose, in the flower of which they may be found early in the morning. All captured insects resembling the Japanese beetle should be sent directly to the office of the State Entomologist, Agricultural Experiment Station, Lexington, or taken to the local county agent for positive identification.

#### PHONY PEACH DISEASE

Since the discovery of the first trees infected with phony peach disease in Kentucky in 1935, an intensive inspection program has been carried out with the hope of completely ridding Kentucky of the disease. We are confident this goal is near. Of the six counties in which diseased trees have been found, only two, Graves and Webster, remain as infected counties. No infected trees were found in 1938 and only one in 1939.

Since the disease has an incubation period of two years, it is necessary to inspect orchards, with negative results, for three years in succession before they are considered free. It has also been the practice to inspect all peach trees within a radius of one mile of nurseries growing peach trees for sale. The

environs inspection will be continued for nurseries in counties where phony diseased trees are found.

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#### WHITE FRINGED BEETLE

Another of our potential pests is the white fringed beetle, a native of South America, first found in this country in northern Florida in 1936. By the prompt action of the regulatory officials in the four southern states where the beetle was found, namely, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, and Mississippi, with the aid of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, there has been comparatively little spread of the insect in the four years since its first discovery. Before the complete limits of infestation were known, a few nurseries later found to be infested had made shipments of plants into Kentucky. Approximately forty such shipments were reported by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. The property of each recipient in Kentucky has been carefully inspected for the presence of the white fringed beetle and, to date, none has been found.

#### BLACK VINE WEEVIL

Early in 1940, an infestation of this destructive insect was found in Kentucky for the first time. Approximately 100 plants were killed by the pest in a block of Taxus recently imported from Connecticut. A light infestation was found in a shipment of Taxus from Long Island, New York. Both lots were of balled stock and accompanied by inspection certificates.

Steps were taken immediately to eradicate the insect to prevent its establishment in the state. The area of heaviest infestation was plowed repeatedly and steamed. To kill any surviving adults, adjacent areas were baited with an apple-sodium fluosilicate bait and all the Taxus in the area were sprayed with lead arsenate.

The insect in the adult stage is a black weevil about ½ inch in length. The weevil cannot fly and males are unknown. Each female is capable of producing over 800 eggs. The larva of the insect is a curved, white to yellowish, legless grub. The grubs injure plants by eating off and girdling the roots and

stems, while the adults feed on the leaves and blossoms. There is one generation a year.

The black vine weevil is especially injurious in the northeastern states and in Europe. It is known to feed on over 80 different plants and is a serious pest both in the field and in the greenhouses. In the greenhouse, it is especially injurious to cyclamen and primrose. In the field, it is a serious pest of grape vines, strawberries, and yews.
