

It is understood that this proxy is to be used only for this meeting and covering the objects as outlined in the call, and you are invited to express your views in the matter and your instructions will be carried out.

At the above time and place the business usually transacted at the annual meeting will also be considered.

In spite of the general despression owing to the presidential year and a shortage of the corn crop in some sections of the country, the business of the American Berkshire Association for the last year has been very satisfactory and the reports of the officers will show a material increase over previous years.

The stockholders of the American Berkshire Association are hereby notified that a special meeting of said Association will be held at the Live Stock Record Building, Union Stock Yards, Chicago, Ill., on the 29th day of November, 1904, at 7 o'clock p. m., for the transaction of such business as might properly come before any regular meeting and to consider amendments to the Constitution of said Association to be voted upon as follows:

To change Article III, Section 2, so as to read as follows:

years. Each year an election shall be held to fill such vacancy or

of the three classes or otherwise. Each certificate of stock entitles
the holder thereof to one vote.

Add a section to Article III to read as follows:

Sec. 6. The Annual meeting of the Association shall be held at such time and at such place in the State of Illinois as may be fixed by the President and Secretary with the approval of a majority of the members of the Executive Committee, a notice of such meeting being sent to each member by the Secretary at least thirty days in advance thereof.

Said special meeting will be held at the time and place above named.




