this world.

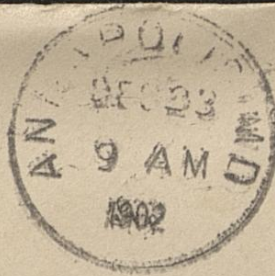
Brit, I am sorry to

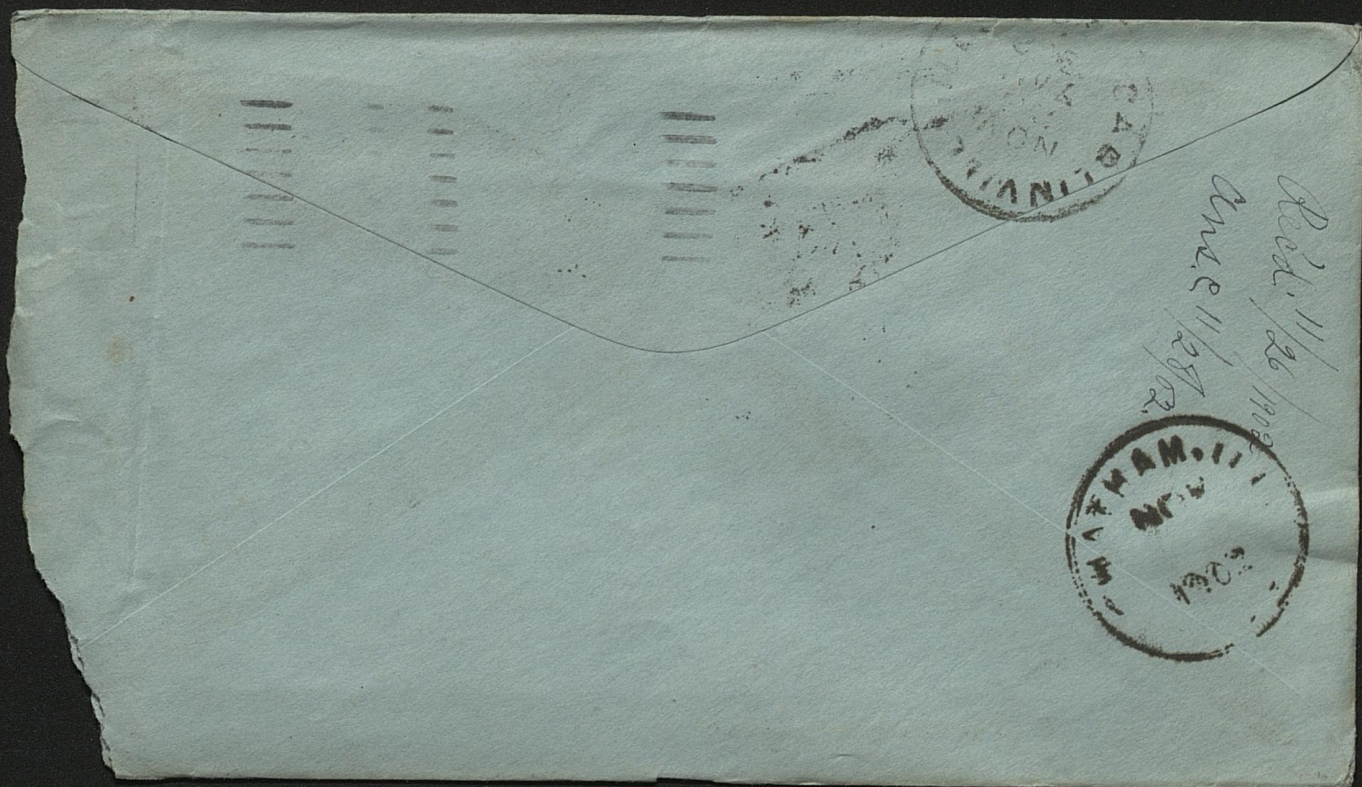

My Dear Son,

Will Stoddard asked me last night if I thought you would take the Presidency of the Farmers' Institute, as he said Otwell wanted to get out and he wanted to get out as Secretary. I said I did not know, but that I would be very much opposed to your doing so, on account of your having so much to do and that you could not possibly attend to that and not neglect some of your farm work. So I write you this to say that I do not wish you to entertain the proposition for a moment. You have already, this year, in running around, taken two or three weeks from the farm, and your correspondence even in running our business, and the writing you have to do, is as great a tax as you ought to impose upon yourself. Remember that these positions are mostly honorary with no pay except a little advertisement that a man gets in running around, and no man ought to take them until he has first established his own business in such a manner that he can afford to neglect some part of it. This can not be done so far as you and I are concerned because every day is a great evidence of the fact that so far as making the farm produce what it ought, and in keeping things up, you have a greater tax than you are equal to. So I trust this will be sufficient influence to cause you to refrain from taking any further responsibilities upon yourself. In fact, I will not submit to it at all.

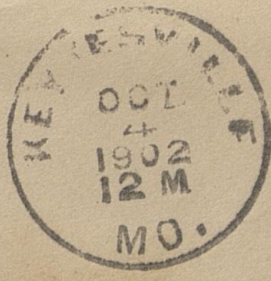

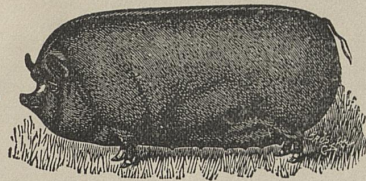
