Shulman said the American man has given his authority within the family to the woman. "They have gained ascendency through default," he stated, "but women are tickled to death to have decisions made for them."



# Math Dept. Sets New IBM Course

The Mathematics Department is

The Mathematics Department is sponsoring a course designed to instruct University of Kentucky researchers in the proper way to arrange data to be processed by a computer.

"The seminar is designed for personnel who want to learn how to dictate instructions to the IBM 650. Digital Computer," explains Dr. Pignanj leader of the seminar. An IBM computer is to be received in the near future and it is in anticipation of this that the course is being held. The seminar is in its sixth week and expectations are that it will be concluded before the Christmas holidays.

The machine will be made available, through the Mathematics Department, to all University of Kentucky personnel engaged in research and who have collected data that needs to be mathematically processed. The department will confrol the actual operation of the computer and, in the event that difficulties occur, will aid the user to reorganize his data to solve his particular problem.

The Kentucky Research Founda-tion is a corporation through which funds may be received, invested, and expended in the interests of certain legitimate activities of the University.



#### A Chance To Help

The University of Kentucky's annual fund-raising drive for the World University Service will end officially Sunday. The goal this year is the same as it was last year: \$1,000. With more than 8,000 students enrolled at the University, that goal would be met if each student contributed a few cents. A little more than a dime each would put the drive over the top.

Miss Connie Goldberg who is chairman of the drive tells us that during the past few years UK has failed to reach the goal that has been set. Present contributions indicate thatunless something unusual happens-the goal will not be reached this year either.

One thousand dollars is not a very large sum of money for thousands of students to raise. A small contribution from each of us would do it. But the question is, do we want to do it? Is this a worthy organization? Let us see.

WUS was started after World War I. Since that time, it has helped students in countries all over the world, including Germany, Austria, Greece, Japan, Spain, Finland, Poland, Switzerland and many others.

This aid has been in the form of money, textbooks, printing equipment, health clinics, medical centers, housing, andvastly important-understanding.

In 1957-58, WUS will grant scholarships amounting to one million dollars to Hungarian refugee students in this country. Another quarter-million in cash subsidies will be distributed. Many more thousands of dollars will be spent in Europe Asia, the Middle East, Africa, Latin America and the United States

These are a few of the things WUS is doing.

In view of the world situation today, these programs are of incalculable value. There are few loftier motives than that of helping-in any way possible-to prepare people for leadership in the world of tomorrow. The students of the world will be these leaders and we have a chance to help them now.

There is a barrel in the Student Union Building where contributions can be placed. This barrel will also be near the entrance of the football stadium when UK plays Xavier this weekend. The opportunity to help is present.

We must find the desire to do so in our own hearts.

# Students' Party Chairman Explains Functions Of SGA

During the early days of orientation this year the new student at UK heard many references to SGA or the Student Government Association. Though explanations were given on this subject, there were also numerous other lengthy discussions and orations on a large group of varying subjects and, in this instance, the real meaning of SGA becomes lost.

The Student Government Association was founded in 1939 and has operated continuously since that time. Its function is to be a representative and responsible legislative authority. It acts on matters which directly effect the daily lives of a vast majority of the students while they are an active part of the university community.

To the students, SGA should be something through which the opinion of the students is heard. It exists as the only organization on campus which is designed expressly for that purpose.

The structure of the organization is quite simple. All the representatives as well as the president and vice-president are elected for terms of one year in an all-campus election. Elections are held twice a year. Ten

representatives are elected early in December while the president, vice-president, and twenty representatives are selected in early May. The Student Government Association holds its meetings every other Monday at 7 p.m. in room 128 of the Student Union Building. All of the students are urged to attend SGA meetings when they are able to do so.

The organization functions somewhat like any other democratic governing body. Its powers are by no means absolute, but it would be wrong to say that SGA is purely a recommending body. The governing group uses the committee system to a large measure. The most important committee is the judiciary committee.

This group, appointed by the president of SGA, settless many of the disciplinary questions which arise from time to time. The judiciary committee also settles special cases when certain freshmen and sophomores request permission to have cars at school.

The Student Government Association handles the registration of automobiles as well as the collection of parking fines. The organization also handles the sale of parking permits. The task of regulating automobiles requires

the employment of a full time secretary who is paid by SGA funds. This will give you some idea of the magnitude of this program of automobile registration.

The operations of SGA are not limited to automobile registration alone. The governing body also publishes the student directory which contains the phone numbers and addresses of all the students.

The entire student body is an integral part of SGA. When each student pays his registration fee, fifty cents goes into the Student Government treasury. This enables the organization to perform numerous services for its membership—the students of the University of Kentucky, I have tried to show some of the highlights of the functions of your SGA. There are many others too numerous to mention, but each of them is quite significant in relation to the daily lives of the student body. The goal of SGA is to bring progressive government to our campus, Learn more about your SGA by attending meetings. It is your SGA and it is your privilege and duty to take part in its deliberations.

# Parts Of Clay's Work To Be Published In '58

Next year may be the time when Henry Clay will come of age in his home state. The first two volumes in a proposed series of ten volumes on Clay's letters, speeches, and personal papers will be published in 1958.

Dr. James F. Hopkins, professor of history at the University of Kentucky, is editor of the Clay Papers Project, assisted by Mary Hargreaves as associate editor. More than five years has already been spent in compiling a complete resume of the papers of the famed Kentuckian and politician.

The present volumes notwithstanding, the most complete work on Henry Clay was compiled by Colton more than one hundred years ago. The work of compiling such a series is compared by Dr. Hopkins to detective work. The process is both a laborious and costly one. Source of funds for the project is primarily the Kentucky Research Fund Committee on the University campus.

Scattered throughout the country, the best source of Henry Clay's papers proved to be the Library of Congress, which boasts the largest collection. Altogether the material has come from more than 100 various sources. Papers have come from all over the United States and many other countries. Information has been received from Switzerland to Hawaii and from Canada to Colombia.

In describing the process of compiling the volumes, Dr. Hopkins explained the means by which the letters and speeches are found, proof-read, and put into publication form. A great many of the manuscripts are housed in the Library of Congress. Others were secured by advertising in historical magazines and newspapers for individuals who owned papers dealing with Henry Clay. Additional personal papers are owned by members of the Clay family, descendants of the orator and statesman, who consented to their use in the volumes. After finding the sources of material, the work has only begun. Dr. Hopkins continued. Each paper which has been preserved on film or the film and the illegibility of the writing, this is often the hardest task in publishing the work. Associate Edit

In explaining the purpose of publishing a full report of Clay's letters and papers, Dr. Hopkins emphasized the importance of the project to the historian in the further understanding of Clay. Although no startling evidence has been discovered, the value of the project is in interpreting Henry Clay as the great American statesman that he was.

After publication of the first two volumes next year, two volumes will be published annually.



Edmund Burke, whose political philosophy has recently experienced a revival in America, is the subject of a new biography to be published tomorrow by the University of Kentucky Press.

Author of "Burke and the Nature of Politics: The Age of the American Revolution," is Dr. Carl B. Cone, professor of history at the University. The book deals with the career of the eighteentheaching English statesman up to the year 1782.

Burke's philosophy provides a basis for the thinking of a new group in America, known as "neoconservatives," who have been the center—of much discussion in books and periodicals. In this book Cone shows Burke to have been greatly influential in the development of the political party system in England.

The events of Burke's early years dealt chiefly with the Amer.

ment of the political party system in England.

The events of Burke's early years dealt chiefly with the American Revolution. After the repeal of the Stamp Act in 1766, Burke and his colleagues struggled against British government policy toward America, India and Ireland. Burke saw the revolution as the fulfillment of predictions he had voiced in eloquent debates in Parliament.

Based on Burke papers only recently opened to historians, this book contains much new information which prompts a re-evaluation of Burke's early political career.



"The United States and Great Britain must travel the same path, not because of blood ties and sentiment, but because together they form a greater bulwark for the free world than any other combination of countries," an American-born resident of England told UK students last week. 

# Irish Author **Speaks Here**

Seumas MacManus, "dean of Irish literature," delivered a lec-ture and readings from some of his works Wednesday night at Guignol Theatre. MacManus describes the back-ground that guided him to become a poet and a shanachie in an auto-biographical sketch he sent to UK Professor of English, Thomas B. Stroup.

"At night I rambled from cottage to cottage among the hills, sitting in the circle around the blazing turf-fire, listening to the old men telling the fairly tales and the ancient folk tales, and the old women singing the ancient songs—"

women singing the ancient sobgs—"
"When I was seven I was myself a shanachie—could tell a hundred old tales, as I had learned them by a hundred firesides," said the Trish talespinner, second speaker this season in the English Lecture Series

this season in the English Lecture Series.

A native of County Donegal in northwest Ireland, he calls himself "one of the mountain people" and describes his birthplace as "the wildest, most remote, most rugged and mountainous, the most barren and the most beautiful, as well as the most Irish, corner of Ireland."

As a barefoot boy, he said, he herded catile and sheep on the hills, labored on the farms, and attended the mountain school, where he received "the little education that is mine."

"I was passionately fond of books, and during my boyhood devoured every book that was to be found among our hills, altogether as many as thirteen or fourteen or fifteen."

Drawing on his store of tales, at the age of 16 he began making poems, "made them while I herded, (Continued on Page 11)



**Five New Rule Changes** Set For Cage Season:





Nine days after the season's closing football game with Tennessee Kentucky's Wildcats will open their 1957-58 basketball season with 3-0 record. Duke University. In that opening contest, fans will note that five

Duke University. In that opening contest, fans will note that five major rule changes have been made this year.

Probably the most significant change involves the bonus free throw rule. The change is that the first six common fouls in each first six, then revert to the old rule of awarding a second charity toos if the first one is made.

Another change has been made concerning the double foul. This season no free throws will be awarded when such a foul has occurred.

Instead, a center jump has been installed as a substitute with each team being permitted to choose its jumpers.

Last year's rule prohibiting an in-bounds pass from a 12 foot area under the basket has been revised. The ball now may be put into converted to make the score 7-0.

under the basket has been revised. The ball now may be put into play from any position at the end of the court.

The goal-tending rule of last season has been strengthened so that can touch the ball while it is on the rim or in the area directly above the basket. The rule, however, does not prevent the dunking of the ball.

The final major rule change involves a revision of the five-second rule. This season officials are permitted to call a technical foul against any team whose play may be termed actionless. The team must first be warned, however, before a technical can be called.

The new rule changes should speed up play this season. Additionally, the new change in the one-and-one free throw rule should make basketball a little more interesting, especially from the specta-

All-Conference-An unjust act will be committed this year if Bob Cravens doesn't make the All-Southeastern Conference team. Coach Blanton Collier has called Cravens one of the best backs in the South. With the type of play he has shown this season, it appears that Coach Collier's statement is quite true. Cravens has led the Cats all season in rushing yardage and has been among the leaders in the Conference in that department. The Owensboro halfback currently leads Kentucky's backfield men in the number of rushes, 99; in the net vardage gained, 518 yards; and in average gain, 5.2 yards per carry.

The Panthers won the meet by placing a man in each of the next six positions. Whelan ran the 4.3 mile course in 23:23. Plummer was clocked six seconds under Whelan's time at 23:29.

The following harriers rounded out the top 10: Rush (P), Walters (P), Christof (P), Goldstein (P), Grisciotti (P), Wojnar (P), Jasper Creech (K), and Alan Lips (K).

Coach Don Cash Seaton'said, "It was a fine meet and one of the toughest courses I have ever seen." He said that Buddy Gum ran a high temperature before the meet got underway and was not in top shape. The coach said "Had Gum been feeling well we may have turned that loss into a win."

The loss put UK's record at 3-2.

Tomorrow the Wildcats will participate in the Dayton AAU in Dayton, Ohio. All schools under the jurisdiction of the NCAA are eligible and well over 100 harriers are expected to compete.


