TO SHOW AWARD WINNING

SisterSound, the Lexington Woman's Chorus, will treat you to a fresh look at music while applauding the camaraderie of being women in their "Believe in the Music" concert.

The concert, at 7:30 pm. May 17th and again at 2:30 pm. May 18th at the Park United Methodist Church (corner of Clay and High) focuses upon the emergence of women. The music of the concert recognizes who we are as women with songs from our heritage. "Appalachian Round"; songs of our ties to the earth, "In Time of Silver Rain"; songs of our love, "A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square"; and songs of our loss of love, "Letting Go."

"Singing is the 'undersong' of women's lives," says Nancy Ward, director of SisterSound. "It allows each of us to attend to our own needs and to join in an inner community of support and love." SisterSound and the music of this concert exemplify this concept.

SisterSound has organized a small ensemble which will premiere at this concert. Their music has been either written or arranged by members of the chorus. Also featured will be the Spirit Drummers, who will perform as a group in addition to joining the chorus on "Change of Heart." Be prepared for a surprise as well! Sometimes even the chorus does not know what may happen!

Out On Video by Davina Warner

A couple of outstanding queer films are scheduled for video release later this month—Stonewall, the story of a fictional character who participates in the pivotal gay uprising of the 1960's, and Beautiful Thing, a critically acclaimed gay love story. Blockbuster Video (Richmond Rd. and Saron Dr.) and Video Hits (Tates Creek Rd.) are planning to have both titles on the shelf by the end of the month. Cut Corner will get Beautiful Thing in June.

But while you're waiting for these films, check out the just released *Set It Off.* This film stars Jada Pinkett, Queen Latifah, Vivica A. Fox and Kimberly Elise as four women who become outraged by a system that keeps them down and turn to crime as their way out. The film's female bonding and social commentary add a powerful dimension to what could have easily become a "four chicks rob bank" movie.

There is plenty of drama, action and violence, but the highlight is Queen Latifah as the very butch Cleo. Although I was dismayed to see Cleo's friends turn their heads in disgust when she first kisses her girlfriend (you'll be spared the movie audience's "Yuck"), I liked the angry, wild, unapologetic, tough, brave, loyal and very sexual portrayal of a lesbian.

Queen ("I only play a lesbian in the movies") Latifah delivers a convincing, multi-dimensional character as do the other women. These women aren't perfect, and they don't pretend to be. Perhaps, more than anything, that's what sets this movie off for me-the realness of the characters. They are not cold-blooded criminals. but insecure women who are trying to take control of their lives.

In another recent video about women controlling their lives, The First Wives Club, look for lesbian comedian Lea DeLaria's cameo. When the first wives visit a lesbian bar, DeLaria steals the scene as an adoring fan of Goldie Hawn's insecure "older" actress, Elise. Hawn and DeLaria hit the dance floor until Bette Midler drags Hawn away yelling "She's going

home with me!"

Q: When did you decide to become Miss Gay Lexington (MGL)?

A: Its been an ongoing process for about three years. I've been preparing myself, planning for it, entering the contest. Not placing the first time, first runner-up the second and won the third. The third time's the charm. Because I feel like if your not ready, its not your time.

Q: What's involved in holding the title of MGL?

A: Representing your community (Lex-Fayette Co), other female impersonators, and former MGL's. But one of the best things is that I am asked to help a lot for charity. I have lost friends and have friends suffering. Getting to do my part to help makes all the sore feet and late nights worth while, and just warms your heart.

Q: How do you identify yourself in terms of your sexuality?

A: A gay male. A SINGLE gay male.

Q: How would you address yourself to the ignorance of those that believe that because you do drag you are a transsexual person?

A: I would tell them to just spend some time with me. They'll see that I'm not. I enjoy being a boy and I also enjoy being Tracy Taylor. It's an escape.

Q: Is becoming MGL an experience you have shared with your family?

A: Yes, I am planning on pursuing other titles. One of the reasons I started doing drag was not to work inside a bar every weekend, be a regular somewhere and be there forever. I love the pageants, pageant season is my time in drag. Come pageant season, look out! One of these days, I want to be in a Miss Gay U.S.A. or Miss. Gay America pageant ... and win, of course!

According to several recent studies, hate violence against lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered people increased nationally. A survey by the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs (NCAVP) found that hate crimes against gay people increased six per cent nationally, with sharp rises in Virginia (206%), Cleveland (64%), and Los Angeles (55%). Some cities experienced a decline, such as Phoenix (60%), and San Francisco (3%). In the Bay Area, however, attacks against transgendered people more than doubled and 40 percent of the perpetrators were law officials.

The report also notes that attacks in 1996 were more violent and caused more serious injuries than in 1995, with the most common weapons shifting from hurled objects to bats and clubs. Another study, conducted by the San Diego City and County Hate Crimes Registry, revealed that all hate crimes in that county are on the rise, increasing 47 percent. Locally, GLSO began gathering hate crimes/discrimination reports in 1993. Interestingly, 1993 saw the highest number of reported incidents. The coordinator of the project, Jeff Jones speculates that the number of incidents hasn't declined so much as that the victims aren't reporting the; most usually don't.

The most common type of incident here in Kentucky involves harassment or threats...often by phone or even E-Mail. As far as other categories, the most commonly reported besides threats involve threats by police and public officials.

In 1996 there were seventeen plus separate incidents reported to GLSO, Lexington Fairness, KFA, and Jeff Jones via Lambdanet. "Plus" because some of the incidents are reports of on-going problems. These seventeen involve both violence, threat of violence, and discrimination and involve twenty-nine individual types of offenses. Thus, one caller reported on-going harassment, pets poisoned, threats to his and his partner's lives, and refusal of police to assist.

Here are some profiles of anti-gay violence and discrimination reported to Kentucky Fairness Alliance. Many thanks to Maria Price for providing this much needed documentation and reporting. The individuals names are withheld for their privacy.

Boone County,KY (reported in April, 1996)—A gay disables gay, white male who lives in a rural area has been repeatedly threatened by his neighbors at the end of his lane. They told his African American lover that they are with the Klan and once stopped his car on the road and told him, "get out of the car and we'll bash your brains in." He was able to speed away. The Victim's Advocate worker told the man not to call the police anymore, because "They are sick of him." He had called them only three times in the past eleven years.

Sebree, KY A woman who was being recruited for a job in the city of Henderson was accused by a woman at a competing company who also wanted the job of being a lesbian. When the job was reclassified from temp to full time, she was not offered the job.

Whitley County, KY A man who had worked as a substitute teacher while completing his certification, was hired at the Whitley Co. High School upon finishing. Six days later, the Superintendent met with him, and fired him, telling him "You;'re and endangerment to children" and "Parents don't want you in the classroom." The Kentucky Education Association said they would not get involved.
