WASHINGTON — House Majority Leader Dick Armey said yesterday he could accept a welfare reform compromise that allowed cash grants to teenagers who have babies, but only if the states pay for it.

"If some state wants to be foolish and give cash grants to young girls for illegitimate births, I think we could probably see some latitude," the Texas Republican said on CBS" "Face the Nation."

Armey also said Republican leaders are willing to allow the president to pay the government's bills and avoid a financial melt-down. ### Blacks receive longer prison terms

Blacks receive longer prison terms

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Blacks get prison sentences about 10 percent longer than whites for similar federal crimes, according to a computer analysis published yesterday.

Whites in 1992-93 received an average sentence of 33 months, while blacks got 36 months, The Tennessean reported. The computer study examined all 80,000 federal court convictions during the two years, comparing cases where the seriousness of the crime and criminal histories were equal.

The study found the highest black/white seriousness reneing disparity — 13 percent — in the west. The South had the lowest regional disparity, with 3 percent. Sentences for blacks were 12 percent higher in the Milgwest and 10 percent in the northeast.

Hispatics received sentences comparable to whites. Too few Asians and other minorities were convicted of federal crimes for a statistically valid comparison, the newspaper said.

UK jumped on top 14-0 before two turnovers — an interception and fumble by

turnovers — an interception and fumble by quarterback Billy Jack Haskins — allowed the Gamecocks to tie the game. "I really liked the way we came out after them," UK coach Bill Curry said. "But a

The Cats took momentum into the second half, though, thanks to a two-yard touchdown run by Williams, set up by a 26-yard pass from Haskins to Kio Sanford.

"It thought that was probably the most critical part of the game," Curry said.

South Carolina quarterback Steet Taneyhill brought the Gamecooks back to life in the third quarter with a 92-yard touchdown pass to Stanley Pritchett, but Williams took a lateral 76 yards on UK's next possession to put UK back in control.

After relying on the defense to bail them out last week, the Cats woke up on offense on Saturday, racking up a season-high 447 yards of total offense.

"If we take care of business and don't make turnovers," Curry said, "we can roll."

Taneyhill had USC rolling with 304 yards through the air. But the UK defense stepped up when it had to, sacking Taneyhill four times and intercepting two of his passes.

The Cats' biggest defensive play



UK's best defense against Taneyhill was the South Carolina OB's receivers. In one stretch during the second quarter, USC dropped five of six passes.



After co-writing several songs and recording them live in the forest, Cradick took the tracks back to London where they were over-dubbed with violin, some synthesizer and various other instruments such as didgeridoo.

Many might scream that the music produced is compromised by the overdubbing process, but the basis of all the compositions is the rhythms and melodies of the Baka.

The overdubbing process allows for trans-global participation unconfined by the limits of time and geography.

The purity of Baka Beyond is evident in the presentation, since its claim is to be mere music, as opposed to groups like Deep Forest.

These groups assign to a period.

These groups aspire to a newage spirituality but merely stripmine the foreign nature of the music without bringing along the rhythmic beauty of unmetered approach.

Therefore, the created music is pure in essence without pretension.

It slides in and out of moods, expresses emotion and does all the other things good music is supposed to do.

Dr. Didg is a group comprising former Outback didgeridoo player Graham Wiggins, drummer Ian Campbell and guitarist Mark Revell.

The whole of this group is based around Wiggins' innovative playing, which involves a form didgeridoo playing, which involves a form freeview and the playing which involves a form freeview of rhythmic breath control and a technique called live sampling. The whole of this album is based around the idea of Graham creating a groove and then allowing the rest of the band to improvise around it, pulling the improvised melodies and rhythms into a coherent song.

The end product is amazing.

The end product is amazing. From variations in the breathing cycle involved in playing the didgeridoo, great amounts of diversity have emerged. Happy sambas, hard funk tunes, ravelike throbs, head-banging thrashes and aboriginal trances snake and sinew intricately across the recording.

The songs also maintain a certain amount of rawness that makes listening to the CD as pleasurable an experience as a live performance.

What makes this record so listenable is that while it is musically intricate it doesn't demand that you pay close attention to every interlocking groove.

The intellectual aspects do not overpower the emotional ones.

If you wanted, you could sim-If you wanted, you could simply grind to the music, completely giving over to the tempo and nodding your head in rapt agreement with the rhythm.

he recent tragic death of 4-year-old Stephanic Kuhen was something we should all be very sad about. In a vehicle sur-rounded by Hispanic gang mem-bers in a "bad" neighborhood, she was shot in the back, and her 2-year-old brother was shot in the foot.

She and her family were simply at the wrong place at the wrong time.

This tragedy is frightening, but it is nothing new. Hundreds of innocent children across the nation are killed each year, yet Stephanie is one of the few cases that made national news. Why is that?

We would like to think that our nation would suffer the same amount of grief over the death of another 4-year-old who happened to not have blonde hair and blue eyes, but this is not the case. In Cabrini Green, another "bad" neighborhood in Chicago, children in nearby day cares play behind bullet-proof glass because kids are shot at on a regular basis. However, these are cases you'll never see on CNN.

The fact is, throughout our nation's history, minorities have been told in more than a million implicit and explicit ways that they are less important than other Americans. A major reason for much of the black-on-black crime We would like to think that

is that a criminal who robs or kills a black person is much less likely to be caught and/or severely pun-ished than a criminal who attacks a white victim. The violence that finally
