Cincinnati mayor advocates stun gun use

Mayor says stun guns are good police equipment; e-mail comes after death of black man in custody

CINCINNATI — Mayor Charlie Luken on Sunday urged the city to buy stun guns for its police force in re-sponse to the death of a man following a struggle with six officers a week ago.

"I am looking for any avenue to avoid another strug-gle," Luken wrote in an e-mail to City Council mem-

bers Sunday that asked them
to find \$I million in the 2004
budget to pay for the nonlethal weapons.

"While it is unclear
whether the incident would
have changed if our officers
had the latest technology in
Tasers, I believe we must
equip our police with the
very best equipment, "Luken
wrote.

The money could come

from not filling 34 middle management city vacancies that Luken expects within the coming year, he said at City Hall on Sunday He said the money should be enough for 1,000 stun guns for the 1,050-officer department. Nathaniel, Jones, 41 died

Nathaniel Jones, 41, died

Nov. 30 after the scuffle in a restaurant parking lot. A cruiser videotage showed the 350-pound man lunging at one officer before he was brought down and struck repeatedly with metal night-sticks.

The coroner ruled Jones' death a homicide but cau-tioned it did not imply that police used excessive force. The direct cause of death was the struggle, the autopsy showed, but Jones had an en-

showed, but Jones had an en-larged heart, obesity and drugs in his blood.

Jones' family and ac-tivist groups have said they will commission indepen-dent investigations, adding to probes by police, prosecutors and a citizens' panel. The

Professionals say simple tips can improve moods; students say finals, holiday demands are depressing

With the holidays fast approaching, many students are sucked in by the winter blues.

"The holidays can be a sad time for some students, particularly if they have recent losses such as the death of a loved one, or parents divorcing or a move away from the family home," said Mary Bolin-Rece, director of the UK Counseling and Testing Center.

Depression is a very serious illness that can page a some

Depression is a very serious illness that can cause a person to struggle in his or her social activities, work or daily life. The National Institute of Mental Health states that there are nearly 18.8 million Americans over 18 years old who suffer from major depression.

The traditions surrounding the holiday season can also place undue pressure on students. Bolin-Reece said.

"Our culture places so much value also on purchasing our celving the perfect gift, which places quite a financial and time resources," dhe said. "Some students may worry about disappointing someone, or about being disappointed."







UK's 27 percent shooting still enough to beat UCLA in John Wooden Classic

Even storied basketball schools like UK and UCLA can play a clunker occasion-

Senior guard Erik Daniels scored 14 points and the No. 9 Wildcats defeated UCLA 52-50 in the John Wooden Classic on Saturday in a game marked by intense defense but terrible shoot-

UK shot 27 percent to 34 percent for UCLA, surprisingly low percentages for the two schools with the most NCAA basketball titles between them.

"That just shows defense comes through when you're down," junior forward Chuck Hayes said. "If we don't play no defense, the game is going to be ugly."

"Falling down 23-6 was really a tough hole to dig ourselves out of," first-year UCLA head coach Ben Howland said. "I'm proud of how we fought back. We've just got to get a lot better."

Senjor guard Cliff.

Senior guard Cliff Hawkins added 12 points for UK despite fighting the flu and Hayes had 13 rebounds in front of family and friends who drove six hours from his hometown of Modesto, Calif.

"It wasn't one of our better games, but it was a win," head coach Tubby Smith said. "Coming out here was an adjustment, the travel, the tournament-type atmosphere. If we had made some shots, we'd feel better, but we feel good."

The Bruins limited Gerald Fitch to 1-of-10 shooting.
He twisted his knee Friday and couldn't finish practice.
Other than Daniels, Kentucky's starters combined to

"Their press was very tough, but we were just miss-ing easy baskets," Thompson said.

Fey was called for his third and fourth fouls barely two minutes into the second half.



UK's law school has dramatically increased its enrollment of women over the last three decades, the Kernel reported on Monday Last year, a record number of women entered the school, with women making up about 52 percent of the freshman class. This year, the female portion of the incoming class decreased to about 38 percent.

Carolyn Bratt, a professor in the school, said that 30 years ago women were outsiders in the college But nowadays women are 42 to 47 percent of the college's overall enrollment. Bratt said she hopes the decrease this year is only an anomaly and won't become part of a pattern.

A 350-pound man died after Cincinnati police clubbe him repeatedly in a videotaped incident that stoked racia tensions nearly three years after riots rocked the city, the Associated Press reported. Charlle Luken, the city's mayor, said the videotaps showed that the nightstick-wielding officers were defending themselves.

UK has declined to rent out University Commons on Red Mile Road for the 2004-2005, management for the apartment complex said. The university has not yet released plans to make up for the housing shortage.

Rob Howland, president of University Commons' parent company Capstone Properties, was not able to speculate on the university's reasoning for canceling the contract.

Officials at UK were unable to comment on what properties they may have been negotiating to lease in the future. Students will still be able to lease privately from University Commons beginning in the summer, said Phyllis Bertran, manager of the complex.

THURSDAY

UK Hospital can't be sued for medical malpractice after surgeons left a surgical towel inside a patient for two years following a kidney operation, a Fayette Circuit judge ruled Tuesday the Kernel reported.

The ruling was based on a 1997 Kentucky Supreme Court decision that granted UK "sovereign immunity" defining the university as a government entity free from lawsuits by private citizens.

Judge Pamela Goodwine said in court that she had misgivings about the law but felt it must be followed.

FRIDAY

With the help of Student Government, UK Parking and Transportation Services is providing free rides for students who want to get in their Christmas shopping before going home for the holidays, the Kernel reported. Though they normally remain parked on sundays, two CATS buses will Mall Dec. 7 and 14.

Director of UK parking Don Thornton, who planned on cunning the holiday shuttle with or without SG, brought the proposal to SG President Rachel Watts several months ago, and they jumped at the idea, leaders in the organization said. According to a UK survey last year, 41 percent of freshmen have not registered cars with the university.

As part of their involvement, SG has agreed to pay the hourly wage for shuttle drivers at a cost of \$400 to \$500 total. UK parking is paying the remainder of the expenses.

The current U.S. marijuana policy is extreme-

ly costly, acts as a detriment to society and great-ly exaggerates marijuana's effects. The policy's discernible social benefits are few. The benefits of legalizing marijuana would be enormous.

Enforcing marijuana laws costs taxpayers \$12 Entorcing marijuana laws costs taxpayers siz billion annually. Legal marijuana could be taxed and become a revenue stream to fight more dangerous drugs. According to the Office of National Drug Policy, more than 1.5 million arrests were made for drug violations last year. Fortyfive percent of those were for marijuana-related offenses. Rather than breaking up families and ruining lives, prisons could be emptied and court backlog could be cleared if marijuana is legal-

The health effects of marijuana are not positive, but they are not nearly as lethal as ciga-

rettes of as dangerous as alcohol. Marijuana has been demonized as a gateway to harder drugs. However, if marijuana were legalized, the association with illegal drugs would probably lessen substantially. The illegality of marijuana has fostered the link to crime circles. Marijuana should not be considered in the same category as heroin not be considered in the same category as heroin and cocaine.

Not to be mistaken, if marijuana is legalized, it would have to be restricted. Marijuana laws should be restructured to mimic those of alcohol and cigarettes and be made illegal for minors

Legalizing marijuana makes economic, social and common sense. Canada, our progressive neighbor, has al-ready eased many of its marijuana laws. In addition, 10 states have laws allowing medical use of

marijuana. This is not enough.
