Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky,
Tuesday, December 9, 1997.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 4:00 p.m. (Lexington time) on Tuesday, December 9, 1997 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

A. Meeting Opened

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 4:17 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Dr. W. Grady Stumbo.

B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Ted Bates, Mrs. Kay Shropshire Bell, Governor Edward T. Breathitt (Chairperson), Mr. Paul W. Chellgren, Ms. Melanie Cruz, Mr. Merwin Grayson, Mr. John "Jack" Guthrie, Mr. James F. Hardyman, Professor Loys L. Mather, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Mr. Billy Joe Miles, Mr. Steven S. Reed, Professor Daniel R. Reedy, Mr. C. Frank Shoop, Dr. W. Grady Stumbo, Mr. Martin Welenken, Ms. JoEtta Y. Wickliffe, and Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson. Absent from the meeting was Dr. Elissa Plattner. The University administration was represented by President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors Ben W. Carr, James W. Holsinger, and Elisabeth Zinser; Vice Presidents Joseph T. Burch, Fitzgerald Bramwell, Edward A. Carter, George DeBin and Eugene Williams; Dr. Juanita Fleming, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; Mr. C. M. Newton, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Richard E. Plymale, General Counsel.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairperson declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 4:20 p.m.

C. Approval of Minutes

Governor Breathitt said that the Minutes of the Board meeting on Tuesday, October 21, 1997 had been distributed and asked for any additions or corrections. Mr. Miles moved that the Minutes be approved as distributed. Mr. Guthrie seconded the motion, and it carried.

D. President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)

President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

1. Medical Center electrophysiologists are the first in the country to implant a new heart defibrillator that is smaller than other defibrillators. This is a technological breakthrough for the University's Medical Center.
2. The Guignol Theatre Restoration Fund has raised more than \$100,000. They have a campaign underway to put new seats in the theater, naming seats for those contributing \$350 or more.
3. The University Hospital has completed its review and been re-accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, the nations premier healthcare accreditation entity.

President Wethington asked the members to read the other items in the report at their leisure.

E. The College of Engineering Report

President Wethington said that Tom Lester, Dean of the College of Engineering, would give a report on the College of Engineering, its present and its future. He called on Dean Lester to give his report.

Dean Thomas W. Lester presented an overview of the historical development, current status, and future possibilities for engineering and computer science at the University of Kentucky. Although the bulk of engineering activity resides within the College of Engineering, significant engineering instructional, research, and public service initiatives are carried out by units administratively outside the College. UK offers 8 bachelors degrees, 11 masters degrees, and 8 doctoral degrees in engineering and computer science. Since its first graduate in 1890, the University has awarded over 16,000 engineering and computer science degrees. The institution's importance to the Commonwealth is underscored by the percentage of engineering and computer science degrees produced at UK. During the 1995-96 academic year, the University produced 85.5% of the accredited engineering degrees in Kentucky, as well as 75.7% of the MS degrees, and 76.7% of the doctoral degrees in engineering and computer science.

Consistent with its Land-grant mission, UK is extending its engineering and computer science programs state wide through its individualized masters of engineering program offered via compressed video and to the Purchase Region through its new extended campus undergraduate engineering programs in Paducah.

Engineering and computer science attracts the most outstanding group of students of any academic program in the Commonwealth. Not only does the average ACT score for entering freshmen consistently rank from 26 to 27, but one-quarter of the national merit scholars who attend the University of Kentucky choose engineering and computer science as their initial major. The University has bucked a national downturn in engineering and computer science enrollment over the past five years, and currently, both enrollment and graduation rates are at historical highs. The College supports a comprehensive array of professional and honorary societies and uses the proceeds of the annual phonathon to sponsor this aspect of the professional development of its students. Many of these groups, including the Society of Women Engineers, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, and the Engineering Student Council, have received national recognition for the excellence of their programs.

UK's engineering and computer science faculty numbers 138, one third of which have been hired since 1990. Among this group are a substantial number of individuals who have been accorded the status of Fellow in one or more professional societies, eight assistant professors who have been recognized by the National Science Foundation as Presidential Young Investigators, six who have received campus or university wide teaching awards over the past seven years, and five who have served as president or vice-president of a national professional society. Eleven percent of the faculty are female, one of the highest percentages of any engineering program nationally. The prominence that UK's engineering and computer science faculty enjoy nationally is corroborated by the number who have been hired by other institutions for top level administrative or distinguished faculty positions. Over the past decade, 12 individuals have gone on to positions as chairs, deans, vice presidents, and even president. UK's engineering and computer science faculty rank 55th nationally among all institutions, and 41st nationally among public universities, in their research productivity, among nearly 200 institutions ranked by the National Science Foundation.

The University's engineering and computer science programs are well positioned to assume even greater prominence in the future. The College has merged departments, suspended low-enrollment programs, and transferred the Department of Computer Science to the College of Engineering in order to focus resources on the most critical academic initiatives. It has adopted an ambitious continuous quality improvement program, at the request of the College's Advisory Board, to facilitate the success of these initiatives. The Commonwealth and the University have also invested heavily in the development of a world-class infrastructure in which its engineering and computer science faculty can carry out their critical work. The completion of the Mechanical Engineering Building, whose funding is anticipated by the 1998 General Assembly, will conclude an investment over 14 years of approximately \$105 million in engineering and computer science facilities.

The College has also initiated a capital campaign called "Design for Excellence", that has an internal working goal of \$18 million, to support faculty chairs and professorships, scholarships, and other program enhancements. Thus far, approximately \$12.5 million has been secured or is in process.

These initiatives have enabled UK's engineering and computer science programs to assume national leadership in an increasing array of areas. For instance, UK was selected as one of the first 15 engineering schools nationally to undergo accreditation under the newly created Engineering Criteria 2000, of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology. And, it has been invited to join approximately 15 other engineering schools in the National Coalition for Manufacturing Leadership, which is headquartered at MIT, and which includes such renowned engineering programs as those at Cornell, Georgia Tech, Purdue, Penn State, and Michigan.

At the request of Mr. Guthrie, Dean Lester briefly reviewed his personal credentials.

President Wethington said that the College of Engineering is an excellent College and continues to get better. The slides presented by Dean Lester illustrates the progress that has been made in the College the past several years, and this kind of progress does not happen without leadership in the College. He commended Dean Lester and his faculty for their leadership and the progress made in the College.

F. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or other staff changes which require Board action; and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted. Mrs. Bell moved approval. The motion, seconded by Mr. Chellgren, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

President Wethington called attention to the appointment of Lloyd E. Axelrod, Director of Public Relations, in PR 2. He said that Mr. Axelrod would succeed Bernie Vonderheide and his appointment was effective December 1, 1997. He asked Mr. Axelrod to stand and be recognized, following which he received a round of applause.

G. Delegation of Management Responsibilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System to the Board of Regents of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (PR 3A)

President Wethington explained that PR 3A relates to the delegation of management responsibilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System to the Board of Regents of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System

(KCTCS) pursuant to the mandate of HB 1 of the First Extraordinary Session of the Kentucky General Assembly. PR 3A contains three important provisions:

1. that the Board of Trustees delegate to the new KCTCS Board the management responsibilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System not later than July 1, 1998 but as early as January 1, 1998 if the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools approves the substantive change process.
2. that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to execute a Memorandum of Agreement on Delegation and Assumption relating to community college bonds. This document which has been negotiated by the University's Treasurer with officials associated with state government and KCTCS. This document has previously been approved by the KCTCS Board and now needs UK Board approval.
3. that the Board authorize the administration to negotiate and enter into an agreement with KCTCS in connection with the services which the University will continue to provide to the Community College System.

Section 19 of House Bill 1 requires the Board of Trustees to delegate the management of this system, except for Lexington Community College, to the new KCTCS Board. The agreement relating to bonds is necessary to protect the rights of the holders of the bonds. Section 24 of House Bill 1 indicates that certain services shall continue to be provided to the Community College System by the University of Kentucky if the KCTCS Board asks the University to provide those services.

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve PR 3A, which would delegate the management responsibilities of the University of Kentucky Community College System, except for Lexington Community College, to the KCTCS Board effective upon affirmative completion of the Southern Association substantive change process but not later than July 1, 1998.

On motion made by Mr. Miles and seconded by Mr. Welcken, PR 3A was approved. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

Governor Breathitt thanked Paul Chellgren, Chairman of the Board's transition oversight committee, and the transition staff appointed by President Wethington. He commended Ben Carr, Henry Clay Owen, and Paul Van Booven for their outstanding job in bringing about an effective transition to KCTCS management.

President Wethington stated that he anticipated hearing officially from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools within the next few days. Everyone is

operating on the assumption that the substantive change process will be approved but that there will be certain issues that are identified which the UK Board and the KCTCS Board must address. UK will be prepared to proceed with the delegation of management of the UK Community College System as early as January 1, 1998 if appropriate.

H. Candidates for Degrees - Community College System (PR 4A)

President Wethington said that PR 4A is a routine action item. He recommended that the degrees specified on the list attached to PR 4A be awarded to the persons named, upon certification that the requirements for those degrees have been satisfactorily completed. Mr. Bates moved approval. Ms. Cruz seconded the motion, and it passed. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Associate Degree Program in the Community College System - Hopkinsville Community College (PR 4B)

President Wethington recommended that the Board authorize for submission to the Council on Postsecondary Education a new degree program, Associate Degree in Applied Science, Agricultural Technology, for the Hopkinsville Community College. He reminded the Board that the Council on Postsecondary Education is empowered to define and approve all degree programs, including associate degree programs. Approval by the Board of Trustees is required prior to submission to the Council for consideration for final approval. Mr. Chellgren moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Hardyman, passed. (See PR 4B at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Associate Degree Program in the Community College System - Owensboro Community College (PR 4C)

President Wethington said that PR 4C is a recommendation that the Board authorize for submission to the Council on Postsecondary Education a new degree program, Associate Degree in Applied Science, Nursing, for the Owensboro Community College. He stated that the same qualifications apply. The Council must approve all degree programs, including associate degree programs, and approval by the Board of Trustees is required prior to submission to the Council for consideration. On motion made by Mr. Guthrie, and seconded by Mr. Welenken, PR 4C was approved. (See PR 4C at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Qualitative Waiver for a Proposed Associate Degree Program at Prestonsburg Community College (PR 4D)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the resolution that the proposed Law Enforcement Technology Program from Prestonsburg Community College be considered for a qualitative waiver. He noted that the Board approved this

proposed new degree program at its May 6, 1997 meeting for submission to the Council on Postsecondary Education.

The Council requires the Board's approval of resolutions for qualitative waivers for universities that have not met Senate Bill 398 goals in order to be eligible for new degree programs. Prestonsburg Community College has made progress toward meeting its affirmative action goals; however, it has not met its goals to the extent that it can proceed without a waiver. The Board action must occur before the Council will act on the program proposal. Mr. Chellgren moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Guthrie, passed. (See PR 4D at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Candidates for Degrees - University System (PR 5A)

President Wethington said PR 5A is a recommendation that the President be authorized to confer upon each individual whose name appears on the attached list the degree to which he or she is entitled upon certification by the University Registrar that the individual has satisfactorily completed all requirements for the degree for which application has been made and as approved by the University Senate. On motion made by Mr. Chellgren, seconded by Mr. Guthrie and carried, PR 5A was approved. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Appointments/Reappointment to University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation (PR 5B)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments of Luther Deaton, Jr. and JoEtta Y. Wickliffe and the reappointment of Alan F. Bloomfield to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation for four-year terms beginning immediately and extending through the Fall 2001 Board meeting. He provided information on each of the individuals. He noted that the Business Partnership Foundation Board calls for there to be two members of the Board of Trustees. He said he was pleased to recommend approval of the appointments and particularly that JoEtta Y. Wickliffe be approved for appointment to the Business Partnership Foundation Board. Mr. Wilcoxson moved approval. The motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, carried. (See PR 5B at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Information Item

President Wethington called upon Professors Loys Mather and Daniel Reedy to extend the invitation to the Board from the University Senate to their holiday social.

Professor Mather invited the Board to the University Senate's annual holiday social at the Singletary Center immediately following the Board meeting. He said the

members of the University Senate look forward to the opportunity to meet the Board. President Wethington encouraged the members of the Board to attend the social.

O. Acceptance of Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for the Four Months Ended October 31, 1997 (FCR 1)

Mr. Hardymon, Chairperson of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee met prior to the Board meeting and reviewed 14 items for consideration. He complimented the Finance Committee for their involvement in discussions about the items. He said FCR 1 is a recommendation that the Board accept the University of Kentucky consolidated financial report for the four months ended October 31, 1997. He reported that the realized income is 41% of the 1997-98 estimate, and the expenditures and commitments are 35% of the approved budget. The University has a strong balance sheet, and the Committee feels very comfortable with the report. He moved approval of FCR 1. Mr. Shoop seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Report of Lease (FCR 2)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 2 is a report of a lease that is less than \$30,000 per year. It involves the renewal of a lease between the University of Kentucky (Hazard Community College) and Breathitt County Farm Bureau for the use of 2,726 square feet of office space. He moved approval of FCR 2. His motion, seconded by Mr. Miles, carried. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Approval of Lease (FCR 3)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 3 involves a lease that has an annual value greater than \$30,000 per year. He recommended that the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs be authorized to negotiate and execute an addendum of a lease between the University of Kentucky (Pharmacy Continuing Education) and Norma Curless for the renovation of 1,100 square feet of existing space at an annual rate of \$1,845 bringing the total amount to \$50,320.45. He moved approval of FCR 3. Mr. Reed seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Capital Construction Report (FCR 4)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 4 is a quarterly capital construction report for the three months ending September 30, 1997. The report reflects the activity of the consultants' work as well as the construction work for that quarter. He said that the Finance Committee reviewed the report and moved approval of FCR 4. Mr. Shoop seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Disposition of Property (FCR 5)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the administration be authorized to sell, through an auction, personal property, residential property at 407 Elm Street, a 143 acre farm on Wagoner's Ferry Road, and a 108 acre farm on Hayes Station Road, Falmouth, Kentucky. He noted that this property was a gift to the University of Kentucky Medical School from Margaret Logan Colvin. The proceeds from the sale are to be used for the research of emphysema and other lung diseases. The appraised value is \$331,000. Mrs. Bell seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

T. 1997-98 Budget Revisions (FCR 6)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 6 is a quarterly report on the revisions to the 1997-98 budget. The report is self-explanatory and represents added income and expenditures. He reviewed the larger items in the report and noted that it was a little unusual that the University received an additional state appropriation of \$350,000. He explained that the Council on Postsecondary Education approved this additional appropriation to the University for which \$50,000 is to be used for the Paducah Engineering academic program operations and \$300,000 is to be used for building maintenance and operations for the new engineering building in Paducah. He moved approval of FCR 6. His motion, seconded by Mr. Wilcoxson, carried. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Renewal of Lease with Spindletop Hall, Inc. (FCR 7)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 7 is a renewal of a lease with Spindletop Hall, Inc. The ten-year lease is identical to those in the past. He noted that the University does have certain obligations, many of which are for the maintenance of the property in which the University receives a fee. He moved approval of FCR 7. Mrs. Bell seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Bracco Diagnostics, Inc., Gift and Pledge (FCR 8)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$75,000 and a pledge of \$375,000 from Bracco Diagnostics, Inc. of Princeton, New Jersey, to the College of Medicine to support the research of Val M. Runge, M.D., a faculty member in the Department of Diagnostic Radiology. Bracco Diagnostics is a worldwide leader in the manufacture and sale of diagnostic imaging materials. The \$450,000 award is payable over a three-year period. Mr. Wilcoxson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

W. Central Baptist Hospital Gift and Pledge (FCR 9)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept gifts and pledges totaling \$100,000 from Central Baptist Hospital, Lexington, Kentucky, to support Lexington Community College's Equipment and Technology Fund and Endowment for Excellence Fund. The gift has two components. One establishes the Central Baptist Hospital Endowed Scholarship with a gift of \$44,200. The second is a pledge of \$55,800 in equipment and technology to the nursing and radiography programs. The pledge is payable over five years. His motion, seconded by Ms. Wickliffe, carried. (See FCR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Geraldine L. Cosby Scholarship Quasi-Endowment (FCR 10)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve the establishment of the Geraldine L. Cosby Scholarship quasi-Endowment with \$45,000 received from the estate of Ms. Cosby. Ms. Cosby graduated from the University of Kentucky and worked 42 years for the Chicago Tribune. She died in 1995. Income from the endowment will provide scholarships for students in the College of Medicine. His motion, seconded by Mr. Reed, passed. (See FCR 10 at the end of the Minutes.)

Y. Kentucky Medical Services Foundation Gift (FCR 11)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$100,000 from the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation of Lexington, Kentucky, for the College of Medicine Department of Surgery to create an endowed professorship in the department's Division of Urology. Income from the endowment will supplement the salary of a professor in the Division of Urology and support the professor's education and research initiatives. The motion, seconded by Ms. Wickliffe, carried. (See FCR 11 at the end of the Minutes.)

Z. Authorization to Implement a Compliance Program for the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center (FCR 12)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 12 is Authorization to Implement a Compliance Program for the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center. He hastened to point out that the University has had ongoing compliance. This item is to expand the program and have the Board of Trustees go on record. This is a formal corporate compliance program to prevent fraud and abuse and to assure compliance with the laws and regulations regulating the billing and business practices of health care organizations. He moved approval of FCR 12. Ms. Wickliffe seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 12 at the end of the Minutes.)

AA. Authorization to Transfer Ownership of the Harry L. Crisp Higher Education Center to Murray State University (FCR 13)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 13 is for authorization to transfer ownership of the Harry L. Crisp Higher Education Center to Murray State University. This property was conveyed to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky in December 1993. The gift from the Marion Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company was to be used for educational purposes of the University of Kentucky. A consensus has been reached by Murray State University and the University of Kentucky regarding the development of a lease/purchase agreement that will allow the University to go forward with the construction of a new building on the Paducah campus for their educational needs. The lease/purchase agreement will be based on an appraised value of \$2.2 million to be paid to the University in annual installments over twenty years with interest on the balance to be based on the interest rate for state bonds. The funds are to be utilized for debt service on \$2.2 million in bonds to be sold to construct a new facility on the Paducah campus. This property will transfer as of January 1, 1998 with the Board's approval and the payments will begin. He moved approval of FCR 13. His motion, seconded by Mr. Miles, carried. (See FCR 13 at the end of the Minutes.)

BB. A Resolution Authorizing the University's Participation in the Continued Funding and Support of the CHA Integrated Delivery System (FCR 14)

Mr. Hardymon reminded the Board that in December 1996 they approved the University's participation in the development of an integrated delivery system and its related corporate body. This system was funded 60% UK Hospital and 40% outside investors. After two and one-half years of operation, the level of covered lives is two times more than initial expectation. This business is generating approximately \$250,000,000 of revenues a year. The system has grown so fast that additional expenditures are necessary to expand it. The system now provides health benefits to over 80,000 people and has the potential of an additional 80,000 people. He said this is an extremely fast growing program, and the Finance Committee has approved the additional \$6 million. The Board will be kept informed on this subject. He moved approval of FCR 14. Mr. Chellgren seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 14 at the end of the Minutes.)

Governor Breathitt thanked Mr. Hardymon and the Finance Committee for the thorough discussions of the Finance Committee items. These are very important matters for the University.

CC. Minute of Silence

Dr. Meriwether asked that the Board reserve a minute of silence for the three students that were killed in Paducah the past week at Heath High School. He said that

there are no words to describe the tragedy. Governor Breathitt called for a minute of silence in memory of the students.

DD. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Chairperson adjourned the meeting at 5:16 p.m.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. UK Doctors Achieve Surgical Breakthroughs

Medical Center electrophysiologists are the first in the country to implant a new heart defibrillator that is smaller than other defibrillators. The defibrillator automatically senses potentially dangerous rapid heart beats and slows them by delivering a carefully-measured electric shock to the heart. The smallness of the device means less pain for the patient and less risk of long-term complications. With another first, specialists from the Comprehensive Epilepsy Program at the Medical Center are the first in Kentucky to implant a new device that may help control seizures in some epilepsy patients. Called a "pacemaker for the brain," it is the first surgical device approved for the treatment of epilepsy.

Also, Simon Abraham, cardiothoracic surgery, performed a rare surgery November 3 to save the life of a four-day-old infant from Lancaster. The seven-hour surgery was a rare combination of two technically demanding surgeries, one enlarging the aorta as it comes from the heart and the other creating a tunnel inside the heart to allow the blood to reach the reconstructed aorta. The baby was released from the UK Children's Hospital November 22 with a good prognosis.

2. Plan for New University Career Center Announced

Plans for a new career center adjacent to King Alumni House were announced October 30. Half of the cost for the estimated \$2 million project will be provided by the Athletic Association and the National Alumni Association from revenue received from a recent credit card agreement with First USA. The building will provide space for career counseling and corporate recruiters conducting interviews. Counseling and other services also will be available to alumni.

3. Corporation to Use Tobacco and Health Research Institute's Technology

Technology developed at the Tobacco and Health Research Institute will be used by private industry to help develop new crop varieties. United Agri Products, a subsidiary of Texas-based ConAgra Inc., has entered into a commercial licensing agreement with the UK Research Foundation to use this new technology. The company will use a genetic promoter developed by Indu Maiti and R.J. Shepherd, plant pathologists. Maiti and Shepherd developed the promoter from a virus that affects peanut plants. The genetic promoter can be used to ensure that new genes introduced into plants function properly.

4. UK and Community College Officials Travel to Vietnam Universities

Seven officials from UK and the Community College System conducted educational seminars in November at two Vietnamese universities. The group, which left Lexington on November 20 and returned December 1, held seminars at the Vietnam National University in Ho Chi Minh City and Hanoi University of Technology. The Vietnamese hope to establish "sister institution" partnerships between the community colleges and community and technical colleges in Vietnam. The delegation was led by Michael Reed, international affairs, and G.T. Lineberry, engineering.

5. Dentistry Brings Dental Care to East and West With New Programs

UK dental professionals and community dentists visited Mount Vernon Elementary School on October 16 to apply dental sealants to children's teeth. Plastic sealants are painted on the surface of back teeth in the form of a white liquid. That substance then hardens, preventing decay in crevices, where 80 to 90 percent of decay occurs. It was the kick-off of the Seal Kentucky Program, which is funded by the E.O. Robinson Trust. The College of Dentistry administers the program throughout the 29 counties in the Robinson Forest.

Meanwhile in Western Kentucky, an open house was held on October 14 at Jonathan Creek Elementary School in Benton, to kick off the school's dental clinic sponsored by the College of Dentistry's West Kentucky Dental Program. The clinic is funded by a combination of local and state funds, and administered by the college. For several years, the clinic has conducted a school-based dental outreach program in Eastern Kentucky using a mobile dental van to provide care to underserved children.

6. Survey Finds Most Welfare Recipients Feel They Will Find Work

A UK survey of 173 Lexington welfare recipients indicates that while most respondents are confident they will find work, they are pessimistic about others in similar situations. Sixty-two percent believe that they will be able to get a job that will pay well. However, only 16 percent feel that other recipients will find jobs. Claudia Peck-Heath, human environmental sciences, announced results of the survey at a news conference in November. The results will be used as a baseline to study how welfare reform affects recipients. The survey looked at basic needs, quality of life, well-being of children and resources such as benefits, training, child care and transportation.

The data will be used as a benchmark for annual evaluations over the next five years. The UK research team involved Peck-Heath; Mary Secret, Social Work; Teri Wood, Fayette County Health Department and Jo Ann Ewalt, a Martin School of Public Policy and Administration student. Funding came from the Community Action Council, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and several UK sources.

7. U.S. Military Selects Madisonville Community College as a Teaching Site

U.S. military personnel soon will have the opportunity to earn an associate degree in biomedical equipment technology from Madisonville Community College. Students can enroll in a 36-week training course at the Army's Medical Equipment and Optical Training School at Fort Sam Houston in Texas, and can complete the associate degree requirements at Madisonville Community College via distance learning. There are about 11,000 graduates from the Army school who are potential candidates for associate degrees in applied science. Madisonville officials plan to begin the cooperative effort during the 1998 fall semester.

8. Guignol Theatre Restoration Fund Raises More Than \$100,000

A fund-raising campaign to renovate the Guignol Theatre in the College of Fine Arts has raised \$107,000. The campaign includes the opportunity for anyone giving at least \$350 to name a seat in the theater. The college will conclude the campaign with a gala opening in 1999, its 50th anniversary year. More than half a million patrons have attended performances in the theater since it opened in 1949.

9. Two Community Leaders Honored by Maysville Community College

Maysville Community College honored two long-time supporters of the college by naming the library and the auditorium in their memory. The college library was named the James M. Finch Jr. Library, in honor of the former president of the Bank of Maysville. The college auditorium was named the Crockett Auditorium, in memory of John Crockett, professor and retired dean of academic affairs, who served the college from 1968 to 1990.

10. Hospital Accredited by Commission Seeking Improved Health Care

A commission dedicated to improving the quality of the nation's health care recently re-accredited the UK Hospital. The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations was formed in 1951 to improve quality through voluntary accreditation.

11. Patterson School Students Study New Role for Oak Ridge Laboratory

The Patterson School of Diplomacy and International Commerce scored a first for universities when it led seminar students to the Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Tennessee for a study of the post-Cold War role of American National Science Laboratories. The seminar students, who met with the lab's key personnel, are charged with understanding what such a laboratory does in the 1990s and how it impacts, and is impacted by, the political economy of science and technology. A national security internship at Oak Ridge for a Patterson School student next summer is also a likely outcome of the trip.

12. Injury Prevention Center to Study Burns on the Job

The Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center will work with Kentucky Employers' Mutual Insurance to study burns as an occupational injury in the state. KIPRC, a joint center of the Chandler Medical Center and Kentucky Department for Public Health, has received \$104,345 over five years from the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health in order to conduct the study. The goal is to identify the incidence of occupational burns, identify trends in burn cases, develop and implement interventions to reduce their incidence, and evaluate the effects of interventions in terms of economic savings.

13. Effort to Save the Lives of Children Receives More Funding

The Kentucky Emergency Medical Services for Children project received an additional \$250,000 grant to further its efforts to save the lives of Kentucky's injured and seriously ill children. The grant from the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration will be administered through the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center, a joint center of the Chandler Medical Center and the Kentucky Department for Public Health.

14. UK Hospital Auxiliary Receives Philanthropy Award

On November 19, the Lexington chapter of the National Society of Fund-Raising Executives named the UK Hospital Auxiliary the Outstanding Philanthropic Organization. The award was part of the society's celebration of National Philanthropy Day and recognized the \$2,070,000 donated to the UK Hospital and UK Children's Hospital for equipment and enhancements.

15. Center for Applied Energy Research Hosts International Symposium

Three-hundred-thirteen people from 20 countries attended the International Ash Utilization Symposium in October in Lexington. The Center for Applied Energy Research organized the symposium along with the journal FUEL and the U.S. Department of Energy. The symposium included as one of its sessions the Dry Separation Technology Development Workshop, chaired by John Stencil, CAER.

16. Pharmacy Leadership Council Formed

The College of Pharmacy, Kentucky Pharmacists Association, Kentucky Society of Health-System Pharmacists, Kentucky Board of Pharmacy and pharmaceutical industry representatives have formed the Kentucky Pharmacy Leadership Council. The council will work to enhance communication among pharmacy constituencies, identify key issues related to pharmacy practice and education and health care in general, and develop agreement on important issues.

17. Student Awards and Honors

Angelique Clay, music, was one of three winners in district auditions for the Metropolitan Opera Company's National Council Auditions.

Anthony DiLuna, Eileen A. Eliason, Craig P. Keathley, Brian A. Kunkel and Bryan G. Spohn, entomology, won five of six awards presented to graduate students at the Forum for Student Paper Competition, sponsored by the Ohio Valley Entomological Association.

Robert Harmon, animal sciences, was elected first vice president of the National Mastitis Council.

James Jackson, animal sciences, received the Outstanding Student Affiliate Advisor Award from the American Dairy Science Association.

Susan Mains, geography, received the Royal Geographical Society-Institute of British Geographers Young Researcher Award. She will attend the association's meeting this January at Kingston University in Great Britain.

Charles R. O'Neal, Madisonville Community College, became the first student elected to serve on the newly-created board of regents for the Kentucky Community and Technical College System. O'Neal is president of Madisonville's student body.

Aileen Walthers, Somerset Community College, was invited to enter the costume design category of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival.

18. Significant Faculty and Staff Activities

Sharon Barton, Teresa Chase and Becky Gaffney, children's hospital, and Maggie Morris, aeromedical service, received the Dorothy Brockhopp Nursing Research Award from the Chandler Medical Center. Gaffney, principal investigator, and her co-investigators Barton and Chase were recognized for their proposal, "Pediatric Temperature Measurement and Child/Parent/Nurse Preference Using Three Temperature Measurement Instruments." Morris was recognized for her proposal, "Emergent Airway Management: An Investigation of Indication, Technique, Complications, and Outcomes."

Linda Elisabeth Beattie, Elizabethtown Community College, was appointed a state judge for the Program to Recognize Excellence in Student Literary Magazines.

Tim Burcham, community college chancellor's office, was elected to fill a three-year term on the board of directors of the National Society of Fund-Raising Executives. Burcham also was appointed to serve as chair of the Government Relations Committee.

Tracy Casada, Somerset Community College, was elected president-elect of the Kentucky Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.

William J. Hailey, Madisonville Community College, was elected president of the Kentucky Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel.

Jim Hower, Center for Applied Energy Research, won the Distinguished Service Award October 21 from the Geological Society of America coal geology division.

funding over five years and allows Landfield to apply for a three- to five-year extension without competition.

DELEGATION OF MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES
FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM
TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE KENTUCKY COMMUNITY
AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM

Recommendation: (1) that the Board of Trustees delegate to the Board of Regents of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System the management responsibilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System, except for the Lexington Community College, effective upon affirmative completion of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools's substantive change process, but not later than July 1, 1998. These responsibilities include, but are not limited to, management of facilities and grounds, assets, liabilities, revenues, personnel, programs, financial and accounting services, and support services.

(2) that the Chairman of the Board of Trustees be authorized to execute the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, a Memorandum of Agreement on Delegation and Assumption between the Board of Trustees of the University Of Kentucky and the Board of Regents of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System relating to Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds.

(3) that the University administration be authorized to negotiate and enter into an agreement with the Kentucky Community and Technical College System in connection with services which the University will continue to provide to the Community College System and other administrative and legal issues related to the delegation of managerial responsibility, and that the agreement be reported to the Board.

Background: Section 19 of House Bill 1 of the First 1997 Extraordinary Session of the Kentucky General Assembly (the Kentucky Postsecondary Improvement Act of 1997) requires the Board of Trustees to delegate to the Board of Regents the management responsibilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System, except for the Lexington Community College.

The agreement relating to bonds is necessary to establish the respective duties and obligations of the University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Community and Technical College System with respect to the University of Kentucky Community College System in a manner consistent with the Postsecondary Education Act of 1997 in order to maintain, protect and secure the rights of the holders of the Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds issued by the University of Kentucky.

Section 24 of House Bill 1 relates to certain services which UK may provide to the Kentucky Community and Technical College System to help administer the University of Kentucky Community College System, including but not limited to library services and processing scholarships and student loans and other financial aid services; a memorandum of agreement relating to these services is necessary to specifically define the terms, conditions, expectations and understandings relating to these services.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT ON DELEGATION AND ASSUMPTION

This Memorandum of Agreement on Delegation and Assumption (the "Agreement"), made and entered into as of this ____ day of _____, 1997, by and between the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, a public body corporate and a postsecondary educational institution and agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky ("UK"), and the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE KENTUCKY COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM, a public body corporate and a postsecondary educational institution and agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Community and Technical College System");

W I T N E S S E T H

WHEREAS, pursuant to a resolution adopted by UK on May 6, 1969, as amended and supplemented on May 5, 1970 and November 17, 1970 (collectively, the "Basic Resolution"), there were issued by UK and there are presently outstanding certain Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A (Second Series), Series B, Series C (Second Series), Series E, Series F, Series F (Second Series), Series G, Series H, Series H (Second Series), Series I and Series J (Refunding) (collectively, the "Outstanding System Bonds"), the proceeds of which were used to finance the acquisition, construction, installation and equipping of educational buildings and appurtenant facilities (the "Project") for community colleges, other than Lexington Community College, located within the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "University of Kentucky Community College System"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Basic Resolution, there are authorized to be issued from time to time by UK additional bonds to rank on a basis of parity as to security and source of payment with the Outstanding System Bonds ("Additional System Bonds", and together with the Outstanding System Bonds, the "System Bonds") for the purpose of financing additional educational facilities and appurtenant facilities for the University of Kentucky Community College System; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to House Bill No. 1 of the 1997 First Extraordinary Session of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997"), the Community and Technical College System was created and established to, inter alia, perform certain functions with respect to the University of Kentucky Community College System; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997 it is necessary and desirable that UK and the Community and Technical College System enter into this Agreement for the purpose of establishing the respective duties and obligations of UK and the Community and Technical College System with respect to the University of Kentucky Community College System in a manner consistent with the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997 in order to maintain, protect and secure the rights of the holders from time to time of the System Bonds.

NOW THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE FOREGOING, UK AND THE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM DO HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Definitions. Unless the context clearly indicates some other meaning, the following words and terms shall, for all purposes of this Agreement, have the meanings ascribed to such terms below. Terms capitalized herein and not defined herein shall have the meanings ascribed to such terms in the Basic Resolution and the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997.

"*Additional System Bonds*" shall mean revenue bonds issued from time to time by UK pursuant to the Basic Resolution, a Series Resolution and this Agreement and ranking on a basis of parity as to security and source of payment with the Outstanding System Bonds.

"*Agreement*" shall mean this Memorandum of Agreement on Delegation and Assumption dated as of _____, 1997 between UK and the Community and Technical College System, as the same may be amended or supplemented from time to time.

"*Basic Resolution*" shall mean the resolution adopted by UK on May 6, 1969, as amended and supplemented on May 5, 1970 and November 17, 1970, authorizing the issuance of System Bonds for the University of Kentucky Community College System.

"*Board of Regents*" shall mean the Board of Regents of the Community and Technical College System.

"*Board of Trustees*" shall mean the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky.

"*Commonwealth*" shall mean the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

"*Community and Technical College System*" shall mean the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, a body corporate and a postsecondary educational institution of the Commonwealth.

"*Outstanding System Bonds*" shall mean the revenue bonds heretofore issued by UK pursuant to the Basic Resolution and subsequent series resolutions.

"*Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997*" shall mean House Bill No. 1 of the 1997 First Extraordinary Session of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

"*Project*" shall mean all buildings and appurtenant facilities erected or otherwise acquired for the University of Kentucky Community College System and which have heretofore been designated and made a part of the Project in accordance with the Basic Resolution, together with all buildings and appurtenant facilities which may hereafter be erected or acquired by the Board of Regents from funds appropriated to the Board of Regents or from the proceeds of Additional System Bonds, but excluding therefrom all housing buildings and facilities and all buildings and facilities used exclusively for athletic activities.

"*Revenues*" shall mean all revenues derived from the Project which are derived from student registration fees collected or to be collected from students attending the University of Kentucky Community College System, and the amounts of any and all payments made by the United States of America pursuant to a government grant with reference to the System Bonds.

"*Series Resolution*" shall mean (i) with respect to the Board of Trustees, the resolution of the Board of Trustees authorizing a series of System Bonds pursuant to the Basic Resolution on or after the date of this Agreement and (ii) with respect to the Board of Regents, the corresponding resolution by the Board of Regents adopted on or after the date of this Agreement and requesting and directing UK to issue such series of System Bonds on behalf of the Community and Technical College System pursuant to the provisions of the Basic Resolution and this Agreement.

"*System Bonds*" shall mean, collectively, the Outstanding System Bonds and any Additional System

Bonds.

"UK" shall mean the University of Kentucky, a public body corporate and a postsecondary educational institution of the Commonwealth.

"*University of Kentucky Community College System*" shall mean community colleges within the meaning of the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, other than Lexington Community College.

SECTION 2. Terms of Basic Resolution Incorporated. UK and the Community and Technical College System, through their execution and delivery of this Agreement, hereby acknowledge and agree to be bound by the provisions of the Basic Resolution, the terms of which are incorporated by reference herein to the same extent as if set forth in full herein, to the same degree and extent as if the Basic Resolution had been adopted simultaneously by the Board of Regents and the Board of Trustees, it being recognized and agreed that this Agreement shall serve to interpret the Basic Resolution only to the extent necessary to specifically set forth the respective duties and obligations of the Board of Regents and Board of Trustees, respectively, under the Basic Resolution, as a result of the enactment of the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997.

SECTION 3. Issuance of Additional System Bonds. The issuance of Additional System Bonds pursuant to Section 2.03 of the Basic Resolution shall be undertaken in accordance with Sections 2.03 and 7.10 of the Basic Resolution. It is understood and agreed that Additional System Bonds for a Project shall be issued by UK, as the bond issuing agency for the Community and Technical College System, upon the written request of the Board of Regents duly tendered to the Board of Trustees, which written request shall be accompanied by a Series Resolution adopted by the Board of Regents setting forth each of the matters required to be set forth in a Series Resolution in accordance with Section 2.03 of the Basic Resolution, together with such additional documents as may be required pursuant to Section 7.10 of the Basic Resolution. The Board of Trustees shall, upon receipt from the Board of Regents of the documents and supporting evidence complying with the requirements of the preceding sentence of this Section 3 and satisfaction of each of the conditions precedent to the issuance of Additional System Bonds set forth in the Basic Resolution, forthwith adopt a Series Resolution containing the matters required pursuant to Section 2.03 of the Basic Resolution and reciting that request for the issuance of Additional System Bonds, together with each of the items required to be provided pursuant to Section 7.10 of the Basic Resolution, has been duly received from the Board of Regents in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

The parties hereto acknowledge that in connection with the issuance and sale of Additional System Bonds in accordance with the terms of the Basic Resolution and any Series Resolution, it shall be necessary from time to time to prepare official statements and other documents for dissemination to prospective purchasers of such Additional System Bonds (collectively, "Offering Documents") upon the advice of the fiscal agent or financial advisor appointed from time to time in connection with the issuance of such Additional System Bonds. In recognition of the foregoing, each of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents agree to prepare, with the assistance of the financial advisor or fiscal agent for such Additional System Bonds, Offering Documents in the customary forms, which Offering Documents shall be approved by each of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents prior to their distribution in connection with the sale of the Additional System Bonds.

SECTION 4. Pledge of Revenues to Payment of System Bonds; Application of Revenues; Funds and Accounts. The Board of Regents, as statutory delegee of the Board of Trustees pursuant to the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, hereby acknowledges, agrees and covenants to be bound by the pledges of the Revenues contained in the Basic Resolution and further covenants that it shall, as delegee of the Board of Trustees, account for, and apply, all Revenues in the manner and subject to the limitations contained in the Basic Resolution, it being agreed and understood that the references to the "Board" in Sections 4.01, 7.02, 7.07, 7.08 and 7.10 of the Basic Resolution shall mean the Board of Regents in addition to the Board of Trustees and that all references to the "Board" in Sections 4.02 through 4.09, inclusive, Section 7.01, Sections 7.03 through 7.06, inclusive, and Section 7.09 of the Basic Resolution shall be deemed to mean the Board of Regents, as the delegee of the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 5. Covenant Against Arbitrage. The Board of Regents, as statutory delegee of the Board of Trustees, covenants that it shall at all times do and perform all acts and things permitted by law and necessary or desirable in order to assure that interest paid on the System Bonds shall, for the purposes of Federal income taxation, be exempt from income taxation under any valid provision of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and the treasury regulations promulgated thereunder (the "Code"). The Board of Regents shall not permit at any time or times any of the proceeds of the System Bonds to be used directly or indirectly to acquire any securities or obligations the acquisition of which would cause any such System Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" as defined in Sections 103(b)(2) and 148 of the Code, as then in effect. In order to assure compliance with this Section 5, thereby better securing and protecting the holders of the System Bonds, the Board of Regents covenants that it will not purchase any obligation or invest the proceeds of the System Bonds in any obligations that produce a yield in excess of the maximum yield as may be permitted to be earned on such investments under the Code.

Each of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents covenants that prior to the issuance of any Additional System Bonds, and as a condition precedent to such issuance, to certify by issuance of a certificate of an authorized officer, that on the basis of the facts, estimates and circumstances in existence on the date of issue of the Additional System Bonds, it is not expected that the proceeds of the Additional System Bonds will be used in a manner which would cause such Additional System Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" under the Code. The Board of Trustees further covenants that it will cause to be filed with the Internal Revenue Service the reporting statements required by the Code.

SECTION 6. Additional Requirements for Series Resolutions, Supplemental Resolutions and Amendatory Resolutions. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary, the rights and privileges granted to the Board of Trustees in the Basic Resolution to adopt Series Resolutions, Supplemental Resolutions and Amendatory Resolutions shall in each case be subject to the condition precedent that the Board of Regents shall have theretofore adopted a resolution authorizing and requesting the Board of Trustees to adopt the Series Resolution, Supplemental Resolution or Amendatory Resolution, as the case may be. In any such case where the Board of Regents shall have adopted a resolution authorizing and requesting the Board of Trustees to adopt a Series Resolution, Supplemental Resolution or Amendatory Resolution authorized pursuant to the Basic Resolution, the Board of Trustees shall forthwith proceed to adopt the Series Resolution, Supplemental Resolution or Amendatory Resolution, as the case may be, and proceed to take such other actions as may be requested or authorized in the resolution of the Board of Regents authorizing the same; provided however that each of the conditions precedent to the adoption thereof pursuant to the Basic Resolution have been satisfied and provided further that nothing herein shall be construed to require the Board of Trustees to take any action requiring the Board of Trustees or UK to assume additional obligations beyond those contemplated by this Agreement and the Basic Resolution.

SECTION 7. Redemption of System Bonds. The Board of Trustees' rights to call any Outstanding System Bonds shall be exercised in accordance with the provisions of the resolution or resolutions authorizing such Outstanding System Bonds only upon the express written instructions of the Board of Regents, it being recognized and agreed that the responsibility for the management and operation of the University of Kentucky Community College System has been delegated and assumed by the Board of Regents. In connection with the issuance of Additional System Bonds, it is hereby agreed that each Series Resolution shall provide that any privilege or right granted to the Board of Trustees to redeem Additional System Bonds shall be exercised only upon receipt by the Board of Trustees the express written request and direction of the Board of Regents accompanied by such additional documentation or proofs as may be required pursuant to the applicable Series Resolution to effect such redemption. The Board of Trustees shall, upon receipt of such written request and additional documentation and proofs required by the applicable Series Resolution, including the receipt of sufficient funds to effect such redemption and pay costs in connection therewith, proceed to redeem such Additional System Bonds, or portions thereof, as may be set forth in the written request of the Board of Regents, in the manner provided in the applicable Series Resolution.

SECTION 8. Events of Default Pursuant to Basic Resolution. It is hereby recognized by the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents that the Basic Resolution prescribes that certain events constitute events of default with respect to the System Bonds, including, inter alia, the failure to comply with certain agreements, covenants and conditions set forth in the Basic Resolution. In recognition of the foregoing and the delegation to the Board of Regents of certain obligations of the Board of Trustees in accordance with the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, the references in Section 9.02(c) and (f) of the Basic Resolution to the "Board" shall mean the Board of Regents and the Board of Trustees with respect to their respective obligations under the Basic Resolution and this Agreement, and the reference in Section 9.02(e) of the Basic Resolution to the "Board" shall mean the Board of Regents.

SECTION 9. Amendments. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the parties hereto may at any time and from time to time supplement or make any amendment or change herein (i) in order to cure any formal defect or ambiguity as permitted by the Basic Resolution, (ii) to conform the provisions of this Agreement to any amended provisions of the Basic Resolution, or (iii) to achieve compliance with the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997.

SECTION 10. Procedure in Event of Conflict between Board of Regents and Board of Trustees. The parties hereto agree that in the event of any conflict between the Board of Trustees and the Board of Regents with respect to the interpretation or implementation of this Agreement which is not resolved within 15 days of the date that either party has provided the other party with written notice that a conflict appears to exist, the conflict shall be submitted for resolution to the Council on Postsecondary Education (as defined in the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997) by the party that provided notice of the apparent conflict. Any provision of this Section 10 to the contrary notwithstanding, any interpretation of the Basic Resolution shall be undertaken solely in the manner provided for in the Basic Resolution and nothing herein shall be construed to provide for interpretation of the Basic Resolution by the Council on Postsecondary Education.

SECTION 11. Third Party Beneficiary. This Agreement is made for the benefit of the parties hereto, the Trustee and the holders of the System Bonds. No person other than a party hereto, the Trustee and the holders of the System Bonds shall have any right, remedy or claim under or by reason of this Agreement or otherwise be a third party beneficiary of any rights, agreements or covenants hereunder. The parties hereto acknowledge and agree that the Trustee and the holders of the System Bonds will be third party beneficiaries of all rights,

agreements and covenants hereunder, with the right to enforce the same in the same manner as provided in the Basic Resolution and with the same effect as though the Trustee and the holders of the System Bonds were a party hereto.

SECTION 12. Effective Date. This Agreement shall be effective upon the affirmative completion of the regional accrediting agency's substantive change process, but in any event not later than July 1, 1998.

3. Comments - The Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) approved an additional appropriation of \$350,000 to the University of Kentucky for which \$50,000 is to be used for the Paducah Engineering academic program operations and \$300,000 is to be used for building maintenance and operations for the Regional Higher Education Center.

The increase in summer session fees for the University System will support the summer programs. The noncredit fees will support computer related courses and community service programs in Ashland and Somerset community colleges, international and campus programs in the College of Business and Economics International Business and Management Center, and an Aging Symposium in the Center on Aging. The additional income in mandatory fees will support technology programs in Somerset Community College.

The county appropriations increase will support the field programs in the Agricultural Cooperative Extension Service. The increase in other gifts and grants will support student activities in Ashland, Elizabethtown, Henderson, Paducah and Somerset community colleges and programs in Pathology and Laboratory Medicine and the Risk Management Division in the Medical Center.

Programs to be supported by increased departmental sales and services include testing services at Somerset Community College; student activities at Jefferson Community College; programs in the College of Business and Economics and in the College of Medicine; and in parking and security in the Medical Center.

AUTHORIZATION TO IMPLEMENT A COMPLIANCE PROGRAM FOR THE
UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY CHANDLER MEDICAL CENTER

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees authorize the Chancellor for the Medical Center to develop and implement a compliance program for the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center to assure conformity with applicable federal/state and other laws, rules and regulations applicable to the business and billing practices of health care providers.

Background: The University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center is committed to complete compliance with all applicable healthcare laws and regulations. With passage of The Sentencing Reform Act of 1984 (Title II of the Comprehensive Crime Control Act, 28 USC Section 994) the federal government has recognized the importance of formal corporate compliance programs in preventing fraud and abuse and in assuring compliance with the laws and regulations regarding the billing and business practices of healthcare organizations. Specifically, under federal sentencing guidelines, organizations with compliance programs can receive reduced sanctions in the event of audit or investigation revealing violations of applicable laws and regulations. Several medical centers across the country have been audited and cited for various failures to comply with applicable laws and regulations and have received significant sanctions. All medical providers who receive federal payments are subject to The Sentencing Reform Act and an expectation of the federal government is that healthcare providers will take a proactive stance in assuring conformity with applicable laws. To that end, development of a corporate compliance program and effective implementation of same is an expectation of the government. In the absence of a corporate compliance program, sanctioned healthcare providers face the imposition of a federally mandated compliance program and more severe sanctions as

part of the sentencing and/or resolution process when irregularities in billing or business practices are discovered.

Development of a compliance program for billing and business practices of the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center is an essential ingredient for assuring compliance with federal and other laws. Such a program will demonstrate the University of Kentucky's commitment to self enforcement of applicable laws and regulations.

AUTHORIZATION TO TRANSFER OWNERSHIP OF THE HARRY L. CRISP
HIGHER EDUCATION CENTER TO MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY

Recommendation: that the Vice President for Fiscal Affairs be authorized and directed to enter into a twenty (20) year lease/purchase agreement with Murray State University for the transfer of ownership of the Harry L. Crisp Higher Education Center located at Bethel Street and Irvin Cobb Drive, Paducah, Kentucky.

Background: The Harry L. Crisp Higher Education Center (formerly known as the Marion Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company property) was conveyed to the Commonwealth of Kentucky, for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky, on December 16, 1993, by Marion Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company, Inc., a Missouri Corporation, as a gift to further its corporate purposes in promoting the general welfare of the University. The University of Kentucky Board of Trustees accepted this gift on January 25, 1994, to provide much needed space for Paducah Community College and to house University of Kentucky activities in Paducah. The property is to be used for educational purposes only.

Consensus has been reached by Murray State University and the University of Kentucky regarding the development of a lease/purchase agreement to transfer ownership of this property by January 1, 1998.

The lease/purchase agreement will be based on an appraised value of \$2.2 million to be paid to the University of Kentucky beginning on January 1, 1998, in annual installments amortized over twenty (20) years with interest on the balance to be based on the interest rate for state bonds as of June 17, 1996. These funds are to be utilized for debt service on \$2.2 million in bonds to be sold to construct a new educational facility on the Paducah Community College campus.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE UNIVERSITY'S PARTICIPATION
IN THE CONTINUED FUNDING AND SUPPORT OF THE CHA
INTEGRATED DELIVERY SYSTEM

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees take the following action:

1. Authorize the expenditure of revenues of University Hospital, not to exceed \$6 million, which will be used along with funds from other qualified investors to provide capitalization for the CHA system through its holding company CHA Service Company.
2. Authorize the President of the University to execute all necessary documents and contracts to facilitate the University's investment in the CHA Service Company.

Background: In December, 1996 the Board of Trustees approved the University's participation in the development of an integrated delivery system and its related corporate bodies. The delivery system developed consists of a Provider Network, the CHA Service Company, and CHA HMO, Inc. These companies, linked together, have formed a provider sponsored health care delivery system made up of over 3,792 physicians, 66 hospitals, and 724 other ancillary providers in Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee, and West Virginia.

The additional funding will be used to support the rapid growth and development of the HMO by adding capital for new product development, infrastructure development, and reserves. Since its development in July, 1995, the system now provides health benefits to over 80,000 people: 46,000 HMO members, 16,000 individuals in self-insured plans, and 20,000 individuals who access the PPO. In addition, the HMO has recently become the HMO partner in the Medicaid Managed Care Partnership for 22 counties in Central Kentucky, covering some additional 71,000 enrollees. After two and one-half years of operation, the level of covered lives is two times more than initial expectation.
