Safe Schools?

Safe Schools, a Washington statewide coalition of 90 organizations, released a study recently revealing the profound failure of many adults in schools to address the antigay harassment faced by students. In the past 4 years, 91 incidents were reported, including 8 gang rapes, 19 physical assaults, 14 cases of physical harassment and/or sexual abuse short of rape and 34 cases of ongoing verbal or physical harassment.

Eight of the cases involved adults who were approached for help, but who then offended the youth or actively contributed to their harassment. One teacher told a young man, after his classmates spit on him, "Maybe you should do more push-ups. What's the matter, don't you like girls?"

In incidents where teens or children were targets, about one-fourth had adult witnesses. According to Beth Reis, from the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health and author of the report, "In half of those cases, the adults stood by in silence. What young people are telling us, loudly and clearly, is that they feel abandoned by the very adults whose job it is to protect them."

The state of Massachusetts also conducts a survey of students every two years in which they ask specifically for information about sexual orientation, sexual behavior, and behaviors related to health and well being. Students who describe themselves as gay, lesbian, or bisexual and/or who report same sex sexual contact

Two of the films we will be showing were made particularly for religious groups.and are inspiring even if religious issues are not a personal concern. Straight From the Heart portrays parents of gay children talking about their spiritual beliefs and, for some, their struggles to accept and love their gay children. All God's Children is

reported being significantly more likely than their peers to face threats, attempt suicide, or abuse drugs. Only 4.4% of the students in this survey describe themselves as lesbigay or as having same sex sexual contact. Because over four thousand high school students are randomly surveyed, the results of this study are considered to be representative of Massachusetts students in general.

Taken together, these surveys indicated that lesbigay youth are on the front lines of homophobic abuse. As the adult queer community has become more out, and as our lives are increasingly portrayed on TV and in movies, teenagers, particularly the more obvious ones, have been put in a vulnerable position. It is more difficult for them to stay in denial, or to pass as straight even if they want

to. Often adults in the schools do not do enough to support them by stoping harassment when they see it or by offering them safe space to talk about their concerns. I know it is particularly difficult for lesbigaytrans teachers and administrators to know how to make helpful interventions while maintaining job security.

There are things we can do to make a difference. We have a youth group and we could work on increasing referrals to this group.(pager# 222-1919) We could do outreach to school counselors and social workers. We could also do outreach to area churches and hope to reach adults who influence these young people's lives.

The GLSO Speakers Bureau is interested in increasing its numbers and in developing strategies for working with schools and churches. As a starting point, come to the films at the Pride Center on Jan. 24th at 2 PM and discuss possible alternatives (see page 1)

So many women I know didn't like Chasing Amy that I've been reluctant to review it. Kevin Smith, who wrote and directed Clerks, also wrote and directed this comedy about a young man who falls in love with a lesbian. If you've seen Clerks, you are familiar with Smith's dialogue which is filled with lots of cursing and explicit sexual descriptions.

Chasing Amy is no exception. I believe this language which includes "sexist" and "homophobic" terms may have been offensive to some women. In most cases, however, Smith offers a counterpoint to this language. The supporting character Banky is very sexist and homophobic, but his best friend does not condone this behavior. In fact latent homesexuality and jealousy are explored as possible explanations for Banky's words and actions.

Another complaint I heard regarded Alyssa Jones, the lesbian character played by Joey Lauren Adams. Many women did not like her representation of lesbians.

I personally liked the character of Alyssa. At first glance, she seems very feminine with Jewel-like looks and a Jennifer Tilly-voice. But viewers soon learn she is a strong woman who lives life on her own terms.

She works in the predominantly male field of comic book writing, creating and selling a comic book which is described as "touchy/feely" and "personal." She is also very secure with her sexuality and sex in general. This is clearly exhibited when she and Banky share stories about "permanent injuries" they have sustained while having sex.

The thing I liked most about Alyssa is that she does not fit into some stereotype.

She is a complex woman, who is secure enough to explore who she is without making excuses for her choices. As the story progresses, we see that she has learned from her life experiences. She tries to remain true to herself and refuses to let anyone make her something she isn't. That includes men and the lesbian community.

For me, this became the underlying message of *Chasing Amy*. Everyone needs to be true to themselves, and we need to love and accept people for who they are. We can't put people in a particular category because of their gender, ethnic background or sexuality.

In exploring this theme, Smith has created a fresh and funny film. The characters are complex and interesting, and the plot is unpredictable. Smith remains true to his story offering an ending which felt realistic. If you can get past Smith's language and let go of your own stereotypes, I think you'll enjoy *Chasing Amy*.

FROM TOP TO BOTTOM

What a versatile title that is! What a versatile film *Butch Camp* is! This movie manages to be both a slapstick comedy and a slap in the face. It's the kind of slap that wakes you up to reality. What writer-director Alessandro de Gaetano has fashioned is a fine, funny flick that is full of itself. It's filled with wonderful contradictions; familiar yet original situations, cartoonish yet cool characters and padded with predictably unpredictable predicaments.

That's a lot of...diction, but *Butch Camp* is the little pink comedy that could and does deliver the goods by being both campy and insightful. It's like Paul Rudnick (author of In & Out) on a budget.

Butch Camp tells the story most gay people would like to tell. It appeals to the

majority of us who:

- a) Don't fall into any particular gay stereotype
- b) Don't want to play games in bars
- c) Do very much dream of falling in love

It also appeals to the rest us thanks to a fine cast. Stand-up comedian Judy Tenuta delivers a hilarious performance as the camp's whip-cracking commandant. The Butch Camp of the title is a place somewhere over the rainbow where blue boys fly and learn to defend themselves against some straight and narrow minds. To tell more would rob you of the many surprises the film holds.

Butch Camp recently played at the Kentucky Theater. It may turn up there again soon. Look for it coming out on video sometime in the near future. That's an order. Now, drop and give me ten... Butch!

National Black Lesbian & Gay Leadership Forum

During their Holiday Concert, the Men's Chorus honored Tim for his work in support of LMC to which he gave financially, emotionally, and spiritually.

The GLSO Board was greatly appreciative of Tim's work with us. Not only did he take on the management of increasing financial responsibility as we added the Pride Center to our projects, he was a delightful person to work with. Tim will be remembered for his thoughtful comments, his ability to notice and express appreciation to those working with him, and for his warmth and kindness.

Tim is survived by his partner of over

twenty years, Jim Slaline. He is also survived by his mother, three brothers, a sister and their families all living in the central Ky. area.

The Rev. Steven Banks, Tim's brother and the minister of a Lexington Baptist Church, delivered the eulogy at his funeral. It was particularly touching to hear of Tim's life from a family member. Rev. Banks spoke warmly of Tim and Jim's long term relationship. He acknowledged that Tim's extended family had to struggle at times with the reality of Tim's life but it was obvious that this family worked to maintain and cherish their loving bonds.

Tim Banks loved well and was well loved. He will be deeply missed.
