

BASKETBALL FACTS

WILDCATS FIRST TO REACH 1,000

The cover pictures on this season's Basketball Facts capture two historic moments in the history of the University of Kentucky and collegiate basketball.

First, the front cover contains a picture of a Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame plaque presented Wildcat coach Adolph Rupp during induction ceremonies last April in Springfield, Mass.

The "Baron of Basketball" has forged an amazing record of 810 victories and only 175 defeats during 39 years as head coach of the Wildcats and ranks as undisputed winning coach of all time.

His victories form the bulk of the cause for cake-blowing as displayed on the back cover.

The Wildcats, fresh from an 88-67 victory over Florida Jan. 11, 1969, in Memorial Coliseum, were feted for becoming the first collegiate basketball team to reach the magic Victory No. 1,000 mark.

According to UK count, the feat had been accomplished five days earlier, when Rupp's forces blasted Mississippi State, 91-72, at Starkville.

A small cake ceremony was held in the Wildcats' motel headquarters after that game, but the big blowout came after the Florida game, when players representing the different century victory milestones were special guests of honor.

The Wildcat claim to 1,000 games against "legitimate" competition had one drawback. The National Collegiate Athletic Association, which had sent Rupp's forces to an International Tournament in Tel Aviv in August, 1966, refused to recognize the Wildcats' five victories en route to the championship.

There was no argument about who was first to hit 1,000, however, after the Wildcats defeated Georgia, 104-73, Jan. 15, 1969, in the Coliseum, to satisfy the NCAA.

Victory No. 1,000 had its beginning 67 years ago, when physical education instructor Walter W. H. Mustaine called together some State College students, took up a collection totaling \$3 for a ball, told them to elect a captain and start playing.

Thompson G. Bryant, now 85 and retired after an esteemed career with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, recalls that basketball didn't cause much of a stir on the Lexington sports scene.

Bryant was a member of the 1904-05-06 squads and played on the prep team during the first two years of basketball (1902-03) at State College, the forerunner of UK.

"We all chipped in and bought a ball," he recalls. "One of those you inflated with a foot pump and then laced. If something had happened to that ball, we couldn't have played."

Games were played on the Buell Armory floor. Spectators sat on a circular mezzanine track containing three rows of chairs.

Old newspaper files indicate basketball was a hit-and-miss proposition, with games being canceled if a couple of players were too ill to participate. Press reports of the games also are scanty, with practically no reference to records of games played. The 1906 schedule, for instance, listed 20 games. But records show a 5-9 won-lost record.

The explanation is simple, says W. B. Wendt of Louisville, who, as manager, ran a one-man operation in those days. . . . "You made the schedule and hoped to fill it."

Wendt not only made the schedule but also printed tickets, collected money, paid bills and was in charge of the team on the road.

Extensive research has filled most of the gaps in the illustrious Wildcat basket-ball history and the results are detailed in this 1969-70 edition of Basketball Facts.

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

. . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 140,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution which celebrated its centennial year in 1965.

The present school, which this fall enrolled 27,920 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a Community College system of 14 centers, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706 acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the ajor professional societies and educational organizations.

President of the University if Dr. Otis A. Singletary, 47, who came to Lexington this year from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Dr. Singletary, who is eighth president of the University, served a total of eight years at Texas, progressing during seven (1954-61) of those years from instructor to professor, associate dean of Arts and Sciences and assistant to the president. Then for five years (1961-66), he was chancellor of the University of North Carolina, although he was on leave from October 1964 to January 1966 to serve as director of the Job Corps, Office of Economic Opportunity.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is Athletic Director Harry C. Lancaster.

HARRY C. LANCASTER Director of Athletics

The University of Kentucky basketball team starts a season for the first time in more than two decades without the familiar figure of Harry C. Lancaster on the bench.

After stepping up to athletic director late last season, the long time assistant to Coach Adolph Rupp handed over his coaching duties to concentrate on the complex job of running the entire Wildcat athletic program.

Basketball's loss was the University's gain over-all as Lancaster quickly moved to pick up the reins of leadership which has been relegated in an "acting" capacity first to Robert L. Johnson and then to Lancaster since the death of Bernie A. Shively Dec. 10, 1967.

Lancaster remained with the squad until season's end, but relinquished his freshman coaching duties to Joe Hall and silently began giving up other coaching duties.

The Rupp-Lancaster association, begun after the latter was discharged from the Navy as a lieutenant (s.g.) in 1946, has been one of mutual respect and harmony. Rupp, who always prides himself as one who "surrounds myself with the best people for the job at hand," made Lancaster a full assistant in 1948. During the two previous years, the youthful Navy veteran had busied himself by serving as part-time assistant while carrying on teaching duties and studying for a master's degree.

The dual duties, plus extra studies, were second nature to Lancaster, who had served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High School (1936-42) and physical education instructor at UK in 1942. He was to continue that trend of carrying extra loads, serving as UK's baseball coach for 17 seasons prior to relinquishing the post following the 1965 campaign and teaching a physical education class during the past 18 years.

Basketball was his forte, however, and he became recognized as one of the game's master strategists and designer of offenses and defenses to fit certain situations. In addition to coaching Rupp's freshman teams, he has always been at the side of the "baron" during the heat of battle. In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a single honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A six-week tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.

Traveled To Greece In 1951

Lancaster had traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U.S. State Department. The mission called for him to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials in Olympic procedures and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics and coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport. During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theater and worked with Rupp on the team's Middle East Tour in 1966 and a clinic in Germany in the summer of 1967.

It is ironic that Lancaster gained greatest fame in basketball, since he always considered himself a better football player. He was an all-conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons at Georgetown College and also played semi-pro ball in Louisville and Cincinnati. His success on the basketball court was equally great, however, as he earned three all-conference nominations and two team captaincies. As a coach, he has guided Kentucky yearlings to 204 victories, against only 57 losses, against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and top-notch service teams during the past 18 seasons. He posted respectable records as a baseball coach and gave the school its winningest seasons in history by posting identical 18-8 marks in 1959-1960.

A native of Paris, Ky., Lancaster attended Paris High School, where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball under Coach Blanton Collier. At Georgetown College, he was president of Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity and the Student Body during his senior year. He is one of four persons named honorary life members by the organization of sports letter winners at the University.

He was married to the late Mrs. Katherine Louise Wright of Christiansburg. A daughter, Mrs. Dan Spain Jr. and two grandchildren, Kevin, 6, and Dana, 4, live in Rockville, Md. His father, U. F. Lancaster, resides at Richmond, Ky.

UK RECORD 20-GAME WINNERS

Kentucky lives up completely to its billing as the all-time champion of major college basketball with its run of 14 straight 20-victory seasons beginning in 1945, according to Boston sports authority Bill Mokray. The Wildcats were not permitted to field a team in 1953, but made up for it with a perfect record (25-0) the following season and continued their streak through 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's warriors also achieved the magic circle with a 20-3 record in 1933 and posted a 23-3 mark in 1962, 21-6 in 1964, 32-2 in 1965, 22-5 in 1968 and 23-5 in 1969. Only other major teams to boast of as many as ten straight 20-victory campaigns are North Carolina State and Western Kentucky—each showing 10-year runs.

ADOLPH FREDERICK RUPP

"Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach"

39 Years — Won 810, Lost 175 — 82.2%

The induction of Adolph Rupp into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame last spring in Springfield, Mass., was fitting tribute to a man whose name is synonymous with college basketball.

Known as Der Baron of Basketball, "The Man in a Brown Suit," and various other names of distinction, Rupp has reaped honor upon honor during 39 years as

coach of the world famed Wildcat cage teams.

He is the undisputed winningest coach of all time with 810 victories against only 175 defeats and is one of basketball's most popular clinic and after-dinner speakers.

The name of Rupp, feared and respected in opponents' hearts and beloved by the millions who have witnessed the remarkable success of his Wildcat cage teams, has

become synonymous with the game of basketball.

Such unprecedented recognition for the fabulous mentor is only natural since his success in the past 39 years as head man of the fabled Kentucky cage thoroughbreds has been nothing short of phenomenal. It would take a book longer than his own technical best-seller, "Championship Basketball," to recite the record completely. Briefly, however, that record, in addition to Hall of Fame membership, includes:

- —An amazing 810 victories out of 985 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of better than 82.2 percent against major competition.
- —Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- —Selection as the unanimous national "Coach of the Year" in 1966 for the fourth time in his career and runner-up for the 1957 and 1964 seasons.
- —Honored in 1967 by Columbus (Ohio) Touchdown Club as "Coach of the Century."
- —Four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his Wildcats who hold the all-time record of 17 appearances in the national classic and can claim more victories in NCAA play (28) than any other team.
- —Coach of the International Universities Tournament champions in 1966.
- —A nominal world championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.
- —Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.
- —An all-time record total of 24 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- —Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1946) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive Hall of Fame.
- —Trustee and member of selection and honors committees of Basketball Hall of Fame. Also chairman NABC Hall of Fame Committee and heads the group that selects players to appear in East-West All-Star Game benefitting the Hall of Fame.
- —Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U.S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).

- —Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1945), outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans. Enrolled in the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 1965.
- —Chosen "Deltasig of the Year" for 1966 by the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Phi, professional fraternity in commerce and business administration.
- —Development of more All-Americans (25 players honored 36 times) and more material for the pro ranks (26) than any other coach.
- —Five Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and 11 trophies from the 16 previous UK Invitational Tournaments.
- -Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.
- —More overseas clinic trips (seven to Europe, three to the Far East, and one to the Near East) for U.S. Government than any other coach. Also visited Alaska in 1968.
- —Selected as an official goodwill ambassador to the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City representing the National Association of Basketball Coaches.
- -Election to Kansas Hall of Fame.
- —SEC coach-of-the-year again in 1968.
- —Honored as Outstanding Kentuckian by Southeastern Kentucky Homecoming Committee at Booneville, Ky., in 1969.

Rupp's Teams Play In Most Tournaments

Tournament invitations in pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of—Kentucky played in only eight sectional eliminations. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have the distinction of playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team. All told, his Blue Grass fives have achieved the unequalled feat of 149 victories against only 36 defeats, covering action in 35 national classics plus 21 conference meets, the '48 Olympics and the International Universities Tournament of 1966.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a highly-successful 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch were 13 in 1966-67. The remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is four and he can boast of never having a losing season.

Rupp's teams have finished as national champion in the press association polls six times in the last 21 years. They were unranked in the top 20 only in the 1952-53 campaign, when they were idle, and in three other seasons. Possibly his greatest achievement came in the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-record unit in all basketball history up to that time.

Rivaling that achievement, in the opinion of the sportswriters and broadcasters, is the tremendous coaching jobs turned in by the basketball miracle man in more recent seasons. In 1956, Rupp guided a moderately talented club to an eighteenth SEC title, third place in the polls and a ninth NCAA Tournament appearance while achieving a 23-5 record. The surprised experts, who had predicted UK would not win its own conference, voted Coach Rupp the runner-up spot as 1957 "Coach of the Year."

Even that effort went by the boards in 1958, however, as Kentucky's talentless wonders copped the NCAA title for an unprecedented fourth time. The Wildcats were unsung and almost unknown except by reputation and heritage. Not a single man had been honored on the All-Conference fives selected before tournament time and they had lost more games (6) in regular season play than any UK team in 17 years.

If the experts thought that was tops in miracles, they reckoned without the amazing drive of this man Rupp. With four-fifths of his starting lineup gone, he re-built shattered foundations in such an astonishing fashion that the Wildcats rolled through the 1959 season almost unchecked. Although they failed to win the title in

their increasingly-tough Southeastern Conference for only the third time since 1943, UK was generally conceded to be the nation's top team. Most experts agreed that the Kentuckians, who finished with a 24-3 record and ranked second nationally, missed a golden opportunity to pick up a fifth NCAA crown as they were upset by Louisville in the tourney opener. This feeling was given meaning as Rupp was accorded "Coach of the Year" honor by United Press International.

The 1959-60 season admittedly was not a great one as the UKats chalked up only an 18-7 mark—second worst season of the Rupp Era. However, many experts considered the outcome to be a tribute to one of the greatest coaching efforts ever turned in. Plagued from the beginning of the season to the end by adversity (sickness, injuries, eligibility difficulties and personnel problems), complete disaster was always imminent and avoided only by masterful juggling (16 different starting combos) and artful strategy moves.

It was a similar story of great coaching technique against the heavy odds of personnel and schedule in 1960-61. Although the final record read only 19-9, a closer look reveals the touch of Rupp was there for the Wildcats were regrouped into a fear-some outfit after early troubles and rolled to 11 wins in their last 12 starts. En route they conquered eventual SEC champ Mississippi State on the road and demolished Vanderbilt in an SEC Playoff for an NCAA berth. They never ran out of gas until stopped by Ohio State in regional finals.

Tremendous Season Envolves In 1961-62

There was no way of anticipating the tremendous season that evolved in 1961-62 except to depend on the proven touch of master rebuilder Rupp. Minus four starters off the 19-9 outfit of the year before, Rupp guided his "Fearless Five" to victory in the UK Invitational and cornered a share of the league title for the 20th time. Finally, lack of bench strength and superior height caused the UKats' downfall in the NCAA regional finals and they stowed away their gear with a surprising 23-3 mark.

Not much could be said for 1962-63, which resulted in the posting of the poorest record (16-9) of the Rupp Era up to that time. except that it easily could have been worse without a dedicated coaching effort. Although their surge fell disappointedly short in quest for a fifth NCAA title, the 1963-64 Ruppmen blazed a torrid path that led to high national ranking all season long. Before a critical lack of height and too demanding a schedule caught up with them, the Wildcats waltzed to titles in two major seasonal tournaments (UKIT and Sugar Bowl) and copped an unprecedented 21st SEC Championship. Again lacking the vital height to control the boards and missing bench strength, the 1964-65 Kentuckians suffered through the worst season in Rupp's 35 years of coaching—a 15-10 mark. The record failed to reflect that the 'Cats threw scares into a lot of good outfits and wound up strong, taking decisions in seven of their last 10 starts.

The 1965-66 season demanded that Rupp pull more miracles out of his seemingly bottomless "bag of tricks" and he did just that—guiding a rebound from the worst season of his career (15-10 in '65) to the second best. Without a starter taller than 6-5, Rupp's Runts astounded the cage world by rolling to a near-perfect season. En route to attaining runaway recognition by both polls as regular season National Champions, the Ruppmen were edged only once in 25 tests. Only the strain of battling a height disadvantage and sickness prevented a successful claim to a fifth NCAA title—which escaped them in the championship game.

For his obviously amazing coaching job, Rupp was chosen as national "Coach of the Year." The vote was a rare unanimous choice of the man whose critics only a year before had decided the "old man" was finally slipping.

The season of 1966-67 goes into the record books as the poorest in Coach Rupp's great career. Despite the presence of two returning All-Americans (one with an

ailing back), some vital ingredients were missing and the 'Cats floundered to a 13-13 record.

Not one to be kept down, Coach Rupp molded a predominantly sophomore group in 1967-68 into a big winner which copped the SEC crown and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Regional. The Wildcats repeated as conference champions in 1968-69 as Rupp's bombers almost completely rewrote the record books.

Rupp is recognized by sports authorities with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern that has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

As Baron Rupp begins his 40th year at the helm of Kentucky's heralded cage force, he is able to look back proudly over a success story that is not likely to be surpassed for many a season to come. Few major goals of the coaching profession have escaped his grasp down through the years and, as he approaches the twilight of a fabulous career, even former adversaries are readily attesting to his greatness. The "Man In The Brown Suit" is finally being given his due credit for building the game of basketball into the crowd-pleasing sport it is today.

In his own backyard (the Southeastern Conference) particularly, it is generally acknowledged that Rupp is the prime benefactor of Dixie basketball—having goaded loop schools into providing better places to play, recruiting better boys and giving more emphasis to the sport.

In the summer of 1966, Rupp took his Wildcats on a five-week tour of the Middle East (Greece, Israel and Iran) at the request of the U.S. State Department. The Kentucky good will ambassadors won the International Universities Tournament in Tel Aviv.

Internationally recognized for his avocation as a registered Hereford breeder-enthusiast, Rupp is currently in his 16th term as president of the Kentucky Hereford Assn. He owns and operates a Blue Grass farm and serves as a director of the Central District Warehousing Corp., world's largest tobacco marketing organization. The coach in 1962 was named to a five-year term on the Board of Governors of the Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Agricultural Center.

Coach Rupp is active in Shrine affairs, being chosen in 1950 as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation and holding honorary memberships in temples throughout the country. He is a Past Potentate of the Oleika (Lexington) Temple and serves as vice-chairman of the board for the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Lexington.

He has his own television and radio shows during the season, has produced two film shorts ("Basketball: Individual Offense" for Coca-Cola Co. and "Parade to National Championship") and written books on virtually every phase of the game.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp attended University of Kansas where he played guard under Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, Iowa, and then at Freeport, III., four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930. His fame as "The Man in the Brown Suit" stems from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.

The outstanding success of this man as a basketball coach is matched only by the personal fame he has attained off the court.

The masterful story-teller is equally renowned on the banquet and coaching clinic circuit and is in constant demand as a speaker in the off season. He annually appears in more than a dozen states to make speaking engagements. In 1968, he appeared in Alaska for the Army and went to Mexico City for the Olympics. Rupp undoubtedly has conducted more coaching clinics than any other tutor. Overseas assignments for the Army and Air Force have taken him in recent years to Europe seven times (last, Germany 1967) and three times to Hawaii and the Far East. Several foreign olympic coaches have studied under Rupp at UK.

JOE B. HALL

Assistant Coach

Former Wildcat basketeer Joe B. Hall enters his fifth season on the staff of Coach Adolph Rupp and is destined to play a strong role in the Wildcat program,

present and future.



The 40-year-old native of Cynthiana, who has turned in one of the finest recruiting jobs in the nation during the past four years, took over the freshman team late last season when Harry C. Lancaster moved up to athletic director and began easing out of the coaching scene. In addition to the frosh, Hall inherits the position of good, strong right hand to Rupp, the world's winningest basketball coach.

A successful coach for nine years prior to joining the Rupp staff in July, 1965, as coach, scout and recruiter, Hall transferred from Central Missouri State, where he spent the 1964-65 season as head coach—posting a 19-6 record and gaining CMS's first MIAA Conference championship since 1951. Hall, who was a 6-1 guard on the 1949 Wild-

cat team, entered coaching following graduation from UK in 1955. He spent two years at Shephardsville High, achieving Coach of the Year honor in the Mid-Kentucky Conference in both 1957 and 1958. Moving into the collegiate field, he served one season as freshman coach and then five years as head coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo. Among the team's top victories in his final season of 1963-64 were decisions over Denver University, Oklahoma State and Air Force Academy.

Hall, in 1964, also coached the Capital Federal Denver team in the AAU Tournament and later was honored by selection as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic Trials at Jamaica, N. Y. Joe is married to the former Katherine Dennis of Harrison County and they have three children—Judy 14; Kathy 13, and Stephen 10. In addition to his A.B. degree from UK, Hall holds a master's degree from Colorado State.

T. L. PLAIN Assistant Coach

The newest member of the Wildcat staff, Plain joined Coach Rupp in July and is no stranger to the UK scene, having served as a graduate assistant here after



leaving Kentucky Wesleyan College to work on an advance degree here in 1963-64. At Wesleyan, the 43-year-old Navy veteran compiled a 63-34 won-loss record while serving as athletic director, coach and associate professor of physical education from 1959-63.

A native of Sacramento, Ky., he received his B.S. at Western Kentucky University and later attended Murray State, Indiana University and UK. He was athletic director, teacher and coach at Breckinridge County High from 1949-53; teacher, athletic director and coach at Henderson City High from 1953-57, and teacher and coach at Lincoln High in Vincennes, Ind., from 1957-59.

Plain returned to Vincennes in 1964 as director of physical education for the Community School Corp. and

basketball coach at Lincoln High. He left there in 1967 to become assistant basket-ball coach and assistant coordinator of the student teaching program at the University of Louisville. Mr. and Mrs. Plain have three children. He is married to the former Ann Blalock of Murray. They have three children, Tom, 16, Bob, 12, and Patrick, 9.

DICKIE PARSONS, Assistant Coach—A former Wildcat baseball All-America, Parsons had the distinction of serving as captain of both the UK basketball and baseball teams in 1961. He returned for post-graduate studies last winter and helped scout basketball foes. He joined UK as baseball coach in the summer and was added to Rupp's basketball staff with recruiting and scouting duties.

DR. CLAUDE VAUGHAN, Trainer and Academic Supervisor—Named two years ago to the Wildcat staff was 35-year-old native Kentuckian Claude Vaughan, who took on the vital responsibilities of caring for the mental and physical health of UK players. Dr. Vaughan teaches economics, was born in Paris, Ky., and received all of his academic degrees from University of Kentucky.

GEORGE HUKLE, Basketball Equip. Mgr. and Statistician—An invaluable aide to the Kentucky basketball team for longer than most people can remember, George Hukle has served as official statistician for the Wildcats for a great many years and is in his sixth year as cage equipment manager . . . Regarded as the dean of Southeastern Conference statisticians and one of the nation's veterans, Hukle has been keeping charts for Coach Rupp since 1933 . . . He is credited with popularizing the statistic of field goal attempts in collegiate basketball.

RUSSELL RICE, Sports Information Director—After two years as an assistant under veteran SID Ken Kuhn, Rice took over the publicity post last spring when Kuhn

became attached to the office of the Athletic Director. A native of Paintsville, Rice is a graduate of Van Lear High School and UK ('51). He spent 1½ years each as news editor of the Whitesburg Mountain Eagle and Hazard Herald before joining The Lexington Leader in 1953. He was sports editor of The Leader five years before transferring to UK. An avid fisherman he is a past president of the Kentucky Casting Association, a Marine Corps veteran of World War II and currently vice president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Information Directors Association. He is married to the former Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children, Mrs. Sandy Morris of Louisville; Russell James, a freshman at UK; Judith, a sophomore at Tates Creek, and Kim, 4.

KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK — 1969-70

A bonafide All-America (Dan Issel), an All-Southeastern Conference first team choice (Mike Pratt) and an SEC All-Sophomore selection (Larry Steele) return to give the Wildcats a solid nucleus for defense of their conference crown.

Gone are starters Phil Argento, who graduated, and Mike Casey, an All-SEC choice who received a broken leg in an automobile accident last August. Casey, who has one year eligibility remaining, teamed with Argento at guard on a squad which added many records to the book (see inside back cover).

The 1968-69 Wildcats set such records as most points (2,542), highest scoring average (90.8), highest field goal percentage (49.0) and most wins in conference (16)

while compiling a 23-5 record.

Issel, a 6-8 center, scored 746 points in 28 games to break Alex Groza's mark of 698 in 34 games (1948-49) and scored 697 points in 26 games to break Cotton Nash's record of 615 in a regular season (1963-64).

Issel's average of 26.6 in 28 games eclipsed Nash's record of 24.0 points a game set in 1963-64. Issel also broke the field goal record by scoring 285 as compared to Pat Riley's 265 in 29 games in 1965-66.

Mike Pratt, hitting on 54.7 per cent of his shots in 28 games, broke Louie Dampier's season field goal percentage record of 51.2 set in 25 games in 1964-65.

Casey scored 129 assists to break Larry Conley's record of 112 set in 27 games in 1963-64.

Also falling by the wayside were such records as most points, home floor (115 vs. Xavier to tie 115 vs. Auburn in 1960); most points in losing game (99 vs. Vanderbilt 101) and best free throw percentage, single game (9 of 9 vs. Mississippi).

Issel and Casey both joined the Wildcat 1,000 Point Club, with 1,190 and 1,075 points, respectively. Issel now ranks 12th and Casey 15th among all-time Wildcat scorers.

Steele, lone sophomore on the starting team, finished as fifth leading scorer (8.6 a game) and fourth rebounder (7.6 a game). Casey scored 19.1, Pratt 16.9 and Argento 10.0 points a game. Issel led both scoring (26.6) and rebounding (13.6). Pratt averaged 8.8 and Casey 7.3 rebounds a game.

Top reserves returning are guard Bob McCowan, who logged 200 minutes in 20 games, and Randy Pool, who saw 190 minutes action in 22 games. McCowan averaged 3.8 points and 1.4 rebounds, Pool 2.7 points and 2.2 rebounds.

Other returning '69 lettermen are Jim Dinwiddie and Terry Mills. Bill Busey and Art Laib lettered two years ago.

Although Issel-Casey-Steele are a familiar trio around the Wildcat varsity camp, there will be no room for complacency, thanks to six fine sophomores who compiled an 18-4 record as freshmen.

Tom Parker, 6-6 forward from Collinsville, III., led the Kittens with 20.3 points and 11.3 rebounds a game. His teammate at forward, Randy Noll, 6-8, of Covington Catholic High School, averaged 16.9 points and 12.3 rebounds.

Mark Soderberg, 6-8 center from Huntington Beach, Calif., averaged 15.9 points and 12.3 rebounds.

The freshman guard combination consisted of Kent Hollenbeck, 6-4, from Bearden High in Knoxville, Tenn., and Stan Key, 6-3, of Calloway County High.

Hollenbeck averaged an even 20 points and 4.9 rebounds a game. Key averaged 11.9 points and 3.8 rebounds.

Coach Adolph Rupp has vowed to substitute liberally in an effort to utilize all available talent as the Wildcats push for their third-straight conference crown.

His '69 squad surpassed such marks as Kentucky's 1,000th basketball victory and Rupp's 800th victory.

The big challenge is a fifth NCAA championship.

FOUR TELEVISION APPEARANCES SCHEDULED FOR UK IN SOUTHEASTERN SERIES

Once again, paying tribute to the magic name of the University of Kentucky in basketball, the Southeastern Conference television "Game of the Week" series will feature Adolph Rupp's Wildcats four times this season.

The eight-week series over a regional network has been set up by TV Sports, Inc., of Paterson, N. J. Producer Eddie Einhorn announced that all games to be televised will be played on Saturday afternoons to avoid interference with non-televised conference games.

Kentucky's appearances before the live television cameras will come against three different foes this year, with two of the four meetings taking place on the road. In order, the TV opponents will be Tennessee, Louisiana State, Vanderbilt and Tennessee.

The Wildcats, who have been particularly tough when parading before the TV cameras, won all four TV games in 1965-66, two out of four in both 1966-67 and 1967-68 seasons, and three of five in 1968-69.

ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams, UK has annexed a record of 414 victories and lost only 71 — a winning average of over 85 per cent. The 'Cats have won 24 league championships and own over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. Only Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Florida can boast of beating the Wildcats two in a row in the same season and only Mississippi State and Alabama are added to the exclusive club when the basis is widened to consecutive wins over two or more seasons. 

Former champion Dayton returns to the University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament Dec. 19-20 for the fifth time while Duke will make its second and the Naval Academy a first appearance in the event.



Coach Adolph Rupp's Wildcats will be seeking their 12th UKIT title, and defending championships won the past four years.

Dayton first appeared in the tournament in 1955 and defeated Utah in the first round and Kentucky (89-74) in the final. The Flyers appeared again in 1956, '64 and '67 and have a 3-5 record for tournament play.

Duke's lone appearance was in 1953, when the Blue Devils lost to Kentucky and UCLA.

Navy has appeared once in the Coliseum, losing 82-69 to the Wildcats in a regular season game Dec. 29, 1958. The Midshipmen and Wildcats have met one other time, with Navy winning, 32-26, at home Jan. 18, 1928.

Dayton's 1955 UKIT victory over Kentucky is the only Flyer win in four games played since 1947. The Wildcats won the series opener, 70-29, at home. "Rupp's Runts" defeated Don Donoher's Flyers, 86-79, in the Mideast Regional March 11, 1966, in lowa City, Iowa, and won again, 88-85 in the 1967 UKIT.

The Wildcats defeated Duke, 83-79, in their last meeting—the finals of the 1966 NCAA Regional—to gain an 8-2 series edge over the Blue Devils.

Kentucky has won 27 and lost five games in 16 previous tournaments.

The Wildcats defeated Michigan, 112-104, in the first round and Army, 80-65, in the championship game last year.

Wildcats Mike Pratt, Mike Casey and Dan Issel made the All-UKIT team with Rudy Tomjanovich of Michigan, Dick Simmons of Army and L. C. Bowen of Bradley. Issel was named most valuable player. Issel and Pratt, each an All-SEC first team choice, are back this season.

SUCCESSOR TO A 'WHITE ELEPHANT'

Only a little more than a quarter century ago, the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than an innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowd-pleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.


In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentucky heroes who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as numerous physical education classes and conventions.


In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the present hall plays host to approximately 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearances of the famous Wildcat cage teams alone and interest is increasing with such strides, as evidenced by sellout crowds throughout the past five seasons, that even this splendid arena is rapidly becoming too small.

THE NCAA IN MEMORIAL COLISEUM

University of Kentucky's spacious Memorial Coliseum has been the site of portions of the NCAA Tournament eight times since its completion in 1950. First round playoffs were staged in the UK Coliseum in 1955, 1959, 1960 and 1962 while regional tournaments were held in the building in 1957, 1958, 1965, and 1968. The Wildcats played in three regional eliminations, being eliminated by Michigan State in '57; defeating Miami (Ohio) and Notre Dame in '58 en route to their fourth and last National Championship, and dropping a one-point decision to Ohio State in 1968.



'THAT WAS NO ZONE DEFENSE!'-RUPP

Always ready with a colorful quip for doting members of the press-radio-TV corps, Kentucky Coach Adolph Rupp sent his listeners rushing to their dictionaries in 1963-64 when he came up with a colorful description of a new defense installed in early season. Sportswriters who witnessed the special 1-3-1 point defense for the first time against Tennessee in January were inclined to refer to it as a "zone." But Baron Rupp, to whom the term "zone defense" had long been one of the most abhorred in his vocabulary and a pattern never used by his Wildcats, cagily denied this. "We never have used the zone at Kentucky and never intend to," he declared with tongue in cheek. "That was no zone. It was simply a stratified, transitional, hyperbolic paraboloid." STHP or zone, whatever you called it, it carried the UKats to a successful quest of the conference title and an NCAA berth. They lost only once in regular season play using the special defense—that coming in the final game with St. Louis. In an earlier upset at the hands of Alabama, the UK defense had reverted to the familiar "Man-for-Man."

KENTUCKY'S COLORS

The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2.

WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed—including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel"—only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat.

WILDCAT OFFENSE-DEFENSE

The University of Kentucky will enter the 1969-70 basketball season with virtually the same offense and defense brought to Wildcatland four decades ago by Adolph Rupp, the nation's winningest coach.

The offense is basically set on 10 plays centered around the pivot-post. Rupp has made only two changes in the offense which he brought here in 1930.

One is a play he designed 10 years ago to provide more shooting opportunities for Johnny Cox, lone returnee from the "Fiddlin" Five" which won the 1958 NCAA championship.

The other innovation was a combination of the single post and shuffle offenses. Wildcat fans this season can again look for the tricky shuffle, copied from some other teams which employed it successfully. Rupp added very little to the shuffle; in fact, his version isn't as elaborate as that of most teams employing the system.

He will also utilize the shuffle to take advantage of the fine speed of the Wildcat guard corps.

In 1966, Rupp also personally put in what was known as the "Stack" offense, which he didn't use at all that season. He explained the offense was installed for use against one team whose defense seemed less adaptable to the Stack.

Rupp will not use the Stack much this year, preferring to rely primarily on the other two offenses due to the fact he has excellent material—"Possibly our best in years"—to go with the Pivot-Post offense.

The Wildcat defense will be changed slightly from the man-to-man which has been so good to Rupp in his previous 39 seasons at UK. The original defense left the burden strictly up to individual defensive men with no switching permitted; however, Rupp changed the defense in recent years to permit some switching due to tight screens.

Rupp promises to work harder on defense, utilizing his time-honored system, because of "disappointment with some of our other defenses last season."

"We're going back to man-to-man as near as possible to that employed some 10 years ago," he said.
