SisterSound invites everyone to their Fifth Anniversary Concert on Saturday, May 19, 8 pm at the Singletary Center Recital Hall. Reverend James Lawson

The Reverend James Lawson, Jr. will be speaking at the Unitarian Universalist Church (3546 Clays Mill Rd.) on Thursday, May 10 at 7:30 pm as part of the Republican Meeting House Series of progressive speakers. A Methodist Minister, Rev. Lawson has been called "the teacher of the civil rights movement." He is also an active member of Soulforce, a group that challanges the anti-gay rhetoric of conservative churches (see page 6).

Rev. Lawson studied Gandhi's techniques of nonviolent resistance in Nagpur, India, and later joined forces with Martin Luther King Jr. to become a principal architect of the African-American civil rights struggle. His reputation as a leader and role model of nonviolent action began with his imprisonment for resisting the draft during the Korean War. In the sixties, his workshops on techniques and strategies of nonviolence prepared activists for the civil rights sit-ins and boycotts.

Until recently, Rev. Lawson was pastor of the Holman United ...continued on page 2

GLSO Pride Center Nears Grand Opening

Mark you calendars for Saturday, June 2nd to drop in for the Grand Opening of the new GLSO Pride Center of the Bluegrass. An open house is being planned to show off our community's new facility. We would especially like to invite the many visionary members of our community who have been involved with the Pride Center over the years, including the Stonewall Network, previous GLSO board members, and those who have made generously contributions.

As part of the Grand Opening we would like to display the art and craft works of local GLBT artists and crafts people. If you would like to exhibit your work please call 253-3233.

The finishing touches are being made to the space itself. Our volunteer carpenters, painters, cleaners and gophers have been working around the many individuals and groups that are already using the space -- and that has not been easy.

In April the Pride Center was used for 26 scheduled events and activities, including a full day workshop on fundraising provided by GLSO and attended by 20 people representing many local GLBT organizations.

We are still in search of a good plumber to convert our restroom to accessible status. If you have ever used the restrooms at the Center, you know just how inaccessible they are.

This is not a small job and the estimates we have received so far run from "frighteningly low" to "amazingly high" which has left us concerned about hiring someone who

can't handle the job or being ripped off. If you know a reliable, reasonably priced plumber, or can provide any advice for choosing a capable person, please give us a call as soon as possible at 253-3233.

In May, we hope to begin having regular daytime office hours at the Pride Center. Having a person at the Center to handle day to day activities, greet visitors, and provide information and assistance has long been a major goal of GLSO. We are already considering ways to provide evening hours including the use of volunteers. If you are interested in volunteering there are many ways you can help. You can find information on volunteering, scheduling, and programs on the Pride Center web site at www.bluegrasspride.org.

Our vision of a Pride Center that serves the GLBT community by providing a welcoming, accessible, safe, and useful space, and functions as a reliable and friendly information center is coming to pass. 

Soulforce

Soulforce is a national network of people committed to nonviolence, seeking justice for God's Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgendered Children. Their goal is to help change the minds and hearts of religious leaders whose anti-homosexual campaigns lead directly and indirectly to suffering. They work to bring hope and healing to our society and to find redirection and renewal for our minds and spirits.

Soulforce plans actions that are intended to be confrontational and simultaneously to be guided by the principles of relentless nonviolent resistance. They base their work on the teachings and lives of nonviolent practitioners such as M.K. Gandhi and Martin Luther King, Jr. James Lawson, Methodist Minister and teacher of non-violence, is a current activist with Soulforce. He will be speaking at the UU Church on Thursday, May 10 at 7:30.

Soulforce is planning several demonstrations; on June 10-13 they will be in New Orleans for a non-violent direct action at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Local Soulforce groups around the country are planning to have simultaneous silent prayer vigil on Wednesday, June 13. The one is Lexington will most likely be outside Immanuel Baptist Church.




