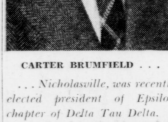
HAROLD DAUGHTERTY ... Palomoth, has been chosen as the outstanding pledge of Delta Tau Delta fraternity.

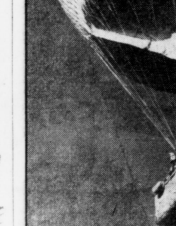
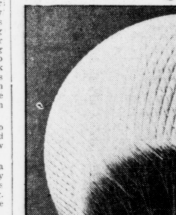

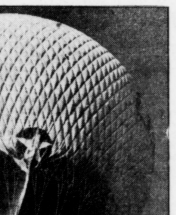

There the Baron sat in a solemn mood, something not so common for him, perhaps reminiscing over other tournaments and basketball memories. On the morrow he and his team were to leave for the meet site. Things hadn't been going so well lately, after an unusual streak of good fortune. His "pore ill boys" made Tech, Tennessee, and "Bama—the SEC's best—look like Church league members. Then the trouble started.

Then Along Came De Paul

Along came a De Paul quintet and trimmed the Kentuckians, 53-44, thanks chiefly to the losers' attitude. Out of four centers at the season's start, he only had one left, and that one had been very limited service. Ed Lander had broken his leg, Carl Althaus had been called into military service, and now Mel Brewer, starter, was able to use his right arm hardly at all because of a torn muscle.

Suddenly the agriculture-minded coach ended his soliloquy, turned to Paul McBrayer, his assistant, and murmured, "If I had all my centers back, there'd be nothing to worry about. As it is—only time can tell."

Then we asked the Baron the traditional "Whaddye think of the tournament, Coach?" And, as usual, Rupp began a rational analysis of the things most likely to happen in Louisville's Jefferson county Army before another Sabbath rolls around.

Star Eppes Gets Army Call

Kentucky's fencing team will leave Lexington Saturday morning for Cincinnati, where it will engage the University of Cincinnati fencers Saturday afternoon. Ohio State will probably participate to make the meet a triangular affair.

Both Kentucky and Ohio State have defeated the University of Cincinnati earlier in the season. The Wildcats came out on top, 10-6, while Ohio State trounced the Cincinnatians, 14-3. Dr. Knapp, who will accompany the team to the Queen City, declared that the Buckeyes are reported to have a veteran team and should furnish plenty of opposition.

For the Wildcats, Swift, Thompson and Hubbard will fence in fols, Carroll and Wharton will fence in saber, and Paddling and D. Akers will fence in epee.

The 'Cats, who lost their second start of the season last week-end to Georgia Tech, 11-6, will be trying for their third win of the season when they tangle with the Cincinnati swordsmen.

Kentucky Cagers Ranked Eighth For Entire Nation

Kentucky's Wildcats rank eighth among the nation's collegiate basketball aggregations, according to figures released earlier this week, Dick Dunkel, sports authority, made the calculations.

Oddly enough, one of the teams that top the 'Cats in the ratings, Notre Dame, has fallen prey to Rupp's Riveters this year. The Irish bowed, 40-35, in Louisville last month.

Illinois leads the pace, according to Dunkel, and that team was defeated by Kentucky in last year's southern division of the National Inter-Collegiate basketball tournament. Annually on top of near there in Big Ten standings, Illinois leads the Kentuckians by only 5.2 points.

Western, with which fans are continually trying to match Kentucky isn't even mentioned in the list. In the South and Southwest the Hilltoppers are rated second to the Wildcats.

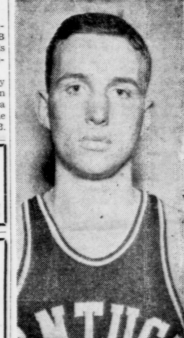
Kernel Presses Roll Too Early For Game Story
