ACTOUT PLAY CHOSEN TRYOUTS SCHEDULED

ActOut has been very fortunate to land the rights to a very powerful, relatively new play, *Elegies, Stories from the Quilt.* This play celebrates the lives of those who have died from AIDS. The show encompasses humor and sorrow, harmony and discord, tragedy and hope.

Elegies was inspired by the AIDS Memorial Quilt and has a cast of 33 actors and four singers. Each character recounts his own story to the accompaniment of an original score of blues, jazz, and gospel. Elegies has been performed in New York, Los Angeles, London, and most recently ,St. Louis as part of the World AIDS Day celebration.

Auditions will be held. Tuesday, May 5th and Wednesday, May 6th at the Pride Center starting at 6:00 each evening. With a need for 33 actors and actresses, we hope a lot of you will be .interested in showcasing your thespian talents. Don't be afraid to try out. All the parts are small, so rehearsal commitments will be as minimal as possible.

In addition to actors, we will need volunteers to form a stage crew.

We plan to present *Elegies* near the end of our Pride celebration on Thursday, June 18th at the State Theater. Proceeds from play admission will benefit the Pride Center, so please consider getting involved with this production. If you would like more information, call Bill at 255-5469.

Coronation

Mark June 7, 1998 on your calendar. On that date the Royal Sovereign Imperial Court of All Kentucky will hold its 17th annual Coronation Ball in the Grand Ballroom of the Radisson Plaza Hotel in downtown Lexington. This event is always one of the most spectacular evenings in the Lexington gay community, as Monarchs and other dignitaries from across the continent descend onto the Bluegrass for a full week of festivities.

The theme of the Coronation Ball this year is *On Their Majesties' Secret Service:* An Evening of Intrigue at the Royal Masquerade Ball. So, don't forget your mask and spying abilities as you join Empress 16, Chanda Lier, and Emperor 16, Elvin Harkins, to celebrate their fund raising successes of the past year.

The Court, as it is called, was formed seventeen years ago by Greg Butler and Marlon Austin, who were seeking an innovative way to provide charitable assistance to the Lexington gay community. From the Coronation of Empress I, Julie Vaughn, the Court has been an active member of this community by donating thousands of dollars to local charities and providing social events for the community.

One of the most recognizable characteristics of the Court is its extensive use of royal titles, which are bestowed by the reigning Emperor and Empress upon members of the community who give their time to fund raising efforts and who comprise

the male and female lines of descent. The controlling body of the organization is its Board of Directors, made up of high ranking past title-holders and past Monarchs. The day to day operations are overseen by the reigning Monarchs (the Emperor and Empress) and their Council.

The most important activity of the Coronation week takes place during the Coronation Ball, when the public elects new Monarchs and Council members. The results of the election are announced at the end of the evening, and the new Emperor and Empress are crowned. In order to vote, one must possess a valid Kentucky identification, a valid Coronation ticket and be at least 18 years old.

This year, three candidates are seeking the office of Empress (Leigh Angelique, LaToya BaCal, and Mika Milano), and one candidate (John Moses) is seeking the office of Emperor. Dig into your closets and pull out your beaded gowns, high heels and tuxedos and join Empress 16, Chanda Lier and Emperor 16, Elvin Harkins for a memorable and exciting conclusion to Reign 16!

Tammy, my partner, and I made plans on a Wednesday to have a picnic lunch the following Sunday out at the farm where I work and ride. Afterwards, Tam was going to read and study while I rode for about an hour. We called our friends who live at the farm and left a message for them to join us for the picnic.

When we hadn't heard from them by Sunday morning, we decided to have breakfast at Denny's around 9:30. On the way home, we agreed to meander out to the farm around 1:00 or 2:00. But, when we returned home, there was a message on our machine that our friends would love to join us for a picnic lunch.

Two things happened after we heard that message: Tam went into "I'm not changing my plans now" mode and I went into "let's pack that picnic and stick to our original plans" mode. We met and butted heads at the kitchen table.

Tam had the audacity to say that I was doing what I always do, changing our plans because I was afraid someone would be mad at me. I told her that wasn't true, and we weren't *really* changing our plans; we could still meander out there, just an hour or two earlier. After a few minutes of total disagreement, I walked to the porch and shut the door between us.

I'd been reading *Conversations with God, Book II* earlier that morning. I slowed my breathing as I turned back to the page whereI'd left off. I wondered if she'd come out to the porch to find me. She didn't. Then, I wondered if I'd read something the next few pages that would speak to me. I did.

These are the words I read: "When you re-act, what you do is assess the incoming data, search your memory bank for the same

or nearly the same experience, and act the way you did before... Your soul would have you search its "memory" to see how you might create a truly genuine experience of You in the Now Moment. (p.13)

I had to admit, I had simply reacted-again! I wanted desperately, in that moment, to create a "truly genuine experience." So, I returned to the kitchen table, bent down, kissed Tam and asked if we could try again. She said she loved me, and we started over. I ended up back on the porch, the door shut between us. But we had tried.

A moment later, I heard the porch door opening and Tam was joining me. We tried again. This time, we came to a beautiful agreement. I shared with her what I had read iin the book and confirmed her earlier analysis that my first reaction had been fear. She said that her first reaction had been inflexibility.

A little while later, our friends called and said they couldn't make the picnic after all. I noticed I did not feel any anger toward them. Tam and I looked at each other and laughed and appreciated the wonderful gift we'd received.

We took snacks to the farm that day; I rode while she lounged in the sun. I love having her with me, even though she's terrified of horses. We don't get to go to the farm together very often, so going without her was not something either of us wanted to do that day. She loves watching me ride.

Later that evening, we were sitting at the kitchen table again, but this time laughing as we tried to blow the insides out of eggs for an Easter wreath Tam wanted to make. She'd never blown eggs before and I hadn't in years, so this was a treat for both of us. I love watching her make wreaths/

Now, Tam's doing aerobics for the first time and I"m making LifeMap Packets for the first time. We love telling one another about our day and sharing in "each other's interests and hobbies."

Thank goodness maturity is about progress, not perfection.

Cindy's sister died of a fast spreading infection last summer just as Cindy was receiving her Ph.D. As part of the Acknowledgements in her dissertation, Cindy reflected on her love for her sister and closed with these words: "Go now and tell someone you love how important they are to you. Life is over in a heartbeat."

We will miss you, Cindy.



About a year ago, mama asked me not to visit her for a while. She needed some time to think about how she really felt about my being gay. I met mama and my sister, Kim in Houston for a vacation recently. One of the tours we took was of the Texas Stadium. While we were waiting for the tour to begin, mama and Kim struck up conversations with two men from San Francisco. I was listening to Kim's conversation and heard her ask him if he liked San Francisco.

"If I were you, I wouldn't go to San Francisco," he began, and I thought to myself probably because of the weather. "There's nothing there but," he hesitates, "there's nothing but a bunch of fags out there! That's the only way I now how to put it. They're everywhere!"

They were talking but I wasn't hearing their words. The only thing I heard was a four-word prayer going up from my body: "Please be with him." If I had known what he was going to say, I would have been able to keep the words from getting inside so deep. I walked into the gift shop and fought back tears.

Kim joined me after a few moments. She commented on some souvenirs until we looked at one another and she saw the tears welling up in my eyes. "Kelly, don't let what he said bother you."

"It hurts, Kim."

"Well, don't let him ruin your day."

I wasn't willing to give him or his words that much power.

After we entered the stadium gates, I saw Kim talking with mama and knew, after 36 years of being her sister, what she was saying. Within seconds, mama was at my side with her arm around my shoulders, squeezing me and commenting on how huge the stadium was. I agreed and knew, after 36 years of being her daughter, what she was saying.

About halfway through the tour, mama and I were standing alone and she said that Kim had told her what had happened. "I want you to know that I went over to that man and I said, 'I don't appreciate what you said earlier about gays. My daughter's gay and your comment hurt her.' He said he was really sorry; that he didn't mean to offend me, and I told hem that you were the one he needed to apologize to, not me."

For the last several months, mama has made her decision from a year ago clear to me - she sees Tammy and me as not only a couple, but one of the happiest couples she has in her life right now. And in that moment, I was reminded of all the other times my mama has stood here ground for me and I put my arms around her shoulders and squeezed her tight.

When I got in the car, mama told me that the man had apologized to her again while I was getting directions, and had said

that his brother was gay. That didn't surprise me.

I called mama this morning to say "Thank you," out loud. She said, "I've decided that you have as much right to live your life the way you want to as I do mine, and no one should be able to take that away from you. A lot of our friends know that you're gay, and none of them has said anything negative to me about it. You know Kelly, if people can't accept you, then they can't accept me - you're my daughter. I just never realized, until that happened in Texas, how easily you could be hurt." And then she reminded me, " You know, that man was really nice to respond the way he did."

And again I say "Thank you, mama."






