FOREWORD

The Inventory of the County Archives of Arkansas is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on Historical Records Survey projects of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Monroe County, is number 48 of the Arkansas series.


The Historical Records Survey program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment for needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen, and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey projects attempt to do more than give morely a list of records—they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives. Up to the present time more than 1,500 Survey publications have been issued in the country as a whole.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey projects, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public efficials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized by Luther H. Evans, who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child. The Survey operates as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Community Service Programs, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

PREFACE

The Historical Records Survey was initiated in Arkansas in March 1936 as a branch of the Federal Writers' Project. In November of the same year the Survey became an independent unit of Federal Project No. 1, and functioned under Federal sponsorship until. September 1, 1939. On September 5, 1939, the unit became a State-wide locally sponsored project under the supervision of Howard H. Jacoway. Mr. Jacoway resigned on September 5, 1940 to become State Chief of the Research and Records Programs and was succeeded by Raymond Foster who has served on the supervisory staff of the Survey since December 1938.

The Survey is sponsored in Arkansas by the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of Arkansas and co-sponsored by the county judges of the State. It operates under the jurisdiction of Research and Records Programs of the Division of Community Service Programs of the Work Projects Administration. The Arkansas unit is under the technical and editorial supervision of the Central office in Washington, D.C.

The Arkansas Survey has had as its chief objective the publication of county inventories, but at present is also making a survey of State, municipal, and church archives, early American imprints, manuscript depositories and collections, and is preparing a guide to Arkansas newspapers. A list of former publications will be found on the last page of this volume.

The Survey is preparing a volume which will include detailed discussions of the organization, structure, and evolution of county government in Arkansas. The material for this volume will be assembled from the State's constitution, codes, and acts of the General Assembly. The material will consist of all those laws and constitutional provisions that are governing and have governed county offices. It is believed that the publication of this volume will make it unnecessary to repeat certain items of general information in forthcoming county inventories: pending issuance of the general volume on county government, it is suggested that the reader consult the Inventory of the County Archivos of Arkansas, No. 23. Faulkner County(Conway) for more detailed discussions than those found in this inventory.

A consulation of the table of contents of this volume will indicate that the inventory is divided into two parts. In the first, or general section of the volume will be found a historical sketch of the county, and an essay on the housing, care, and accessibility of the records. In the second section of the volume will be found a listing of the records of county offices. The arrangement of offices by functions is as follows: General administration; recording; administration of justice; finance; elections; education; health and welfare, and miscellaneous. The records are segregated under subject headings, according to office of origin or final deposit, unless other classification is directed by law. Under agencies, records have been classified, so far as possible, according to the subjects with which they deal. They are described in entries whose style is formalized to give the follow-

is directed by law. Under agencies, records have been classified, so far as possible, according to the subjects with which they deal. They are described in entries whose style is formalized to give the following information: Title of record, dates for which available, quantity, labeling of volumes or containers, variant titles, description of record contents, manner of arrangement, indexing, nature of recording, size of volumes or containers, and location.

The inventory of the Monroe County Archives was begun during the latter part of 1938 and completed in 1941. The original field workers were: Dorothy Henderson and Annie M. Smith who worked under the supervision of Wilbur Jett, District Supervisor.

The work in the State office included the editing of forms, writing of entries, historical and legal research, writing and editing of essays and publication of the volume. Persons in the State editorial office to whom credit is due are: Albert A. Condray, forms editor; Mary H. Winburne and Jennie Birkhead, entry editors; Gladys Lynn and W. Jett final editors; Irene Thibault, writer who prepared the material for publication: Frances Kennedy, who directed the mimeographing and publication. Mabelle Neighbors, Avis Crawford and Flossie Blassingame, complete the unit responsible in the final publication of this volume, Carl E. Ott prepared and directed the indexing.

The editorial criticisms of Mabel S. Brodie, editor in charge of public records inventories in the central office, and Guy P. Timboe, assistant editor, has been invaluable to the Arkansas staff in preparing this volume for publication. The administrative personnel of Work Projects Administration, of the Division of Community Service Programs, and of Research and Records Programs have cooperated with the Survey in all phases of its program. The helpful suggestions and friendly counsel of John C. L. Andreassen, Regional Supervisor of Historical Records Survey, is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey's official sponsor, its State-wide Advisory Board, and the Community Advisory Board of Monroe County each contributed valuable assistance to the project in the compilation and publication of this volume. Other contributing agencies were: The Arkansas History Commission; Arkansas Writers' Project, WPA; and the county officials of Monroe County.

Explanatory Notes

Titles of Records

Exact titles of records are written in solid capitals without parentheses as in entry 2. In the absence of titles, descriptive titles have been assigned, which are written in solid capitals and enclosed in brackets as in entry 1. If a record title is not descriptive of the contents of the ix

record, an assigned explanatory title (or explanatory words), written with initial capitals and enclosed in parentheses, has been added as in entry 39.

Dates

All dates used are inclusive. Missing records are indicated by broken dates.

Quantity

When two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order, in so far as possible.

Lebeling

Figures or letters in parentheses, following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other type of container, indicate the labeling. If no labeling is indicated, it may be assumed that there is none.

Discontinuance

Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could be definitely established that such was the case. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, subsequent or intermediate records, no definite information could be obtained.

Description of Records

The description of the contents of a record applies only to the ourrent or most recent record unless change in contents is actually shown in a record entry.

Indexing

All index records, unless otherwise stated, are self-contained.

Condition of Records

Records are in good condition unless otherwise indicated.

Dimensions

Dimensions are always given in inches, unless otherwise indicated, and therefore, the symbols for inches (") is omitted.

Location of Records

All records are in the county courthouse unless otherwise noted. They are kept in their respective offices unless otherwise indicated in the entries.

Abbreviations, Symbols and Explanatory Notes

Cross References


Title-Time cross references are used to show the continuity of a record series which has been kept separately for a period of time and with other records for different periods of time. An example is that in entry 40: "1843 in Deed Record, entry 12; 1859-1907 in Marriage Record, entry 149." They are also used in all artificial entries, those set up to cover records which must be shown separately under their proper office even though they are kept in files or records appearing elsewhere in the inventory, as, for example, the title-line reference in entry 45: "1874 in Chattel Mortgage Record, entry 34; 1930-37 in Miscellaneous Record, entry 30." The description of the entry shows the title and entry number of the record from which the cross reference is made, as, for example, these words in entry 81: "Also contains: Administraturs' Bonds and Letters, 1830-55, entry 83. Dates shown in the description of the master entry or entry of miscellaneous contents are used only for the part or parts of the record contained therein, and are shown only when they vary from these of the master entry.

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
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




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1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Physical Characteristics

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Monroe County, in the Mississippi Alluvial Plain in east-central Arkansas, is bounded on the north by Woodruff County, on the east by St. Francis, Lee, and Phillips, on the south by Phillips and Arkansas, and on the west by Prairie. (1) It has an area of 617 square miles. (2)

The sinuous White River, no longer clear in its lower reaches flows into the county in the west-central part and forms the south-western boundary. The Cache River, fed by Bayou De View, flows south into the county and empties into the White River near Clarendon. Within 15 miles of its southeast corner is the Mississippi River. (3) Numerous bayous, lakes, and lowlands have made necessary the formation of drainage districts which have successfully drained many acres and rendered them tillable. (4) The general character of the soil in Monroe County is sandy loam mixed with alluvium in the bottoms and sandy loam in the uplands. In the southwestern part of the county are 15 square miles of typical Arkansas prairies. (5) The average elevation is 187 feet; (6) the altitude ranges from 175.6 feet at Clarendon to 209.5 feet at Roe. (7)

The climate of Monroe County is moderate, with an average growing season of 216 days. (8) The first killing frost occurs about October 30. (9) The average temperature is 61.9 degrees; the annual precipitation, 51.84 inches and the average annual snowfall, 4.2 inches. Heavy rainfall in the watershed of White River often floods this section of the basin. (10)

Early History

De Soto's men traversed "a prairie, where the wild cattle roamed and prevented its inhabitants from raising corn"; the prairie referred to is believed to be the country around Wheatly and Brinkley. The explorers report that they continued west and in two days reached the River of Casqui. The De Soto Commission states that they crossed either at Cassor or Roc Roc. (11)

Very early settlers in what is now Monroe County were Peter Burwell and John B. DePlace, who were living on Cache River in 1791. (12) Peter LaFevre settled on Cache River in 1800. (13) The nucleus of the first community in what is now Monroe County was formed about 1819, when a group of veterans of the War of 1812 settled on an inlet of White River which was once the site of an Indian village. (14) These veterans had received land bounty warrants for services in the war, and in some instances had purchased warrants from other soldiers. It was necessary for a second survey to be made of lands in the territory since many Spanish grants had been declared void by Edward Bates, recorder of land titles. (15) For this reason the United States Government in 1815 sent William Rector, Surveyor-General, to Arkansas Post to make what was called the "Purchase Survey". (16) The survey began at the intersection of the base line and the fifth principal meridian where the present countiess of Monroe, Phillips, and Lee join, at that time a point in Arkansas coun-

ty. A tree was notched as a marker but its identity was lost when bark grew over the notches. In 1922 surveyors located the tree and a permanent marker of stone was placed on the spot by the Marianna Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. (17) Immigrants from other southern states were ferried across the river at Memphis to Hopefield, the landing on the Arkansas shore, where the Military Road became their highway. (18) This road ran near the northern boundary of Monroe County. Indian tribes in great numbers passed through Monroe in 1832, landing at Roc Roe, marching overland to their destination. (19)

Many early settlers were French who came from as far north as Detroit, others from New Orleans. (20) With so much French background in the history of colonization in the region now embraced in Monroe County, it is not surprising that so many place names, as well as family names, are French. Cache River was Faux Cache, Bayou DeView was DeVue, LeFever River, shown on old maps, takes its name from the family, originally LeFevre. (21)

To the settlement in 1819 came Thomas Maddox, for whom the White river inlet bay was later named, with John Maddox, J. C. Montgomery, Lafayette Jones, James and William Eagan. The settlement was later called Lawrenceville in honor of Captain James Lawrence of the famous "don't give up the ship"admonition. About the same time Samuel Martin, William, John and N. T. Haverick, Alfred Mullins and Henry C. Thomas formed a settlement farther up the White River at the mouth of Cache, which grew later into the town of Clarendon. (22)

In 1836 Samuel Martin was operating a trading post and a ferry at the mouth of Cache River, one of the principal crossings for emigrants to Texas. James T. Harris who was instrumental in surveying the settlement at the mouth of Cache in 1857 named it Clarendon. (23) Simon P. Hughes, who later became fifteenth Governor of the State of Arkansas (24) came to Monroe County in the fall of 1849. In 1854 he was elected sheriff of the county and was the first sheriff to occupy the courthouse at Lawrenceville in 1856.(25) In 1857 he was admitted to the bar and practiced law at Clarendon until the beginning of the Civil War, when he enlisted in the Twenty-third Regiment and was soon promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel. In 1866 he was elected to represent Monroe C unty in the legislature. He became county delegate to the constitutional convention in 1874, and was elected first Attorney General under the new constitution. When his term closed he resumed his professional and agricultural interests at Clarendon until elected governor in 1885. (26)

Much of the wealth of Monroe County, owing to its agricultural acttivities, was invested in slaves. The tax lists for 1850 give a total
of 268 slaves between the ages of 5 and 60, valued at \$120,370. In 1850
Jordan B. Lambert assessed his 34 slaves at \$14,810. The largest property owner for 1860 was F. P. Redmond, whose 96 slaves were valued at
\$76,800. J. B. Lambert owned 67 slaves. Other large slave-owners were
the Mayo family, A. J. Rushing, Dawson, William Price, J. L. Shackleford
and E. F. Mitchell. (27)

Civil War

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When the War Between the States began, Monroe County was southern in sentiment. Several companies were mustered into service, the first of which were "The Harris Guards", "The Arkansas Tooth Picks", and "The Monroe County Blues". The residents of the entire county were active in supplying money, provisions, horses, clothing, and ammunition for the Confederate Army. (28) A military fund was established to provide for the needs of families of enlisted men. (29) In 1863 two other companies were organized under the commands of Captains George Washington and W. J. F. Jones, respectively. (30)

The Federals burned and destroyed the greater part of Clarendon in 1863, and camped there for some time. In 1864 Gen. Joe Shelby, with a Confederate force, sank two Federal gunboats in the White River at Clarendon.' The following day a detachment of the Federal army came down from DeVall's Bluff and drove Shelby's forces several miles out of the town to a point from which they made their escape. Aside from this, there were only a few skirmishes in the county. Federal soldiers took the foundation of the new court house from Clarendon. All the bricks salvaged from the court house were loaded on boats and used to build chimneys and blocks for Federal barracks. (31)

Creation

Monroe County was formed by an act of the Territorial Legislature on November 22, 1829. (32) Governor John Pope approved the act. (33) The county was named in honor of James Monroe, fifth president of the United States, who with Robert Livingston negotiated the Louisiana Purchase. (34)

Organization and Development of the County

The first seat of justice was "The house of the widow of the late Thomas Maddox". (35) The Maddox home remained the seat of justice until 1833, when the General Assembly directed that the house of Joseph Jacobs serve as temporary seat of justice.(36) Two years later, the Assembly authorized the election of five commissioners to locate a permanent county seat. (37) The location was not made, however, until 1836 when the General Assembly established the permanent seat of justice on land owned by Joseph Jacobs, "being the northeast fractional quarter of section twenty-three, in township two south, of range two west." The act provided that the county seat be called Lawrenceville, and that Andrew D. Nance, John R. Dye and Martin Guest serve as commissioners to receive donations and superintend the building of a jail at Lawrenceville.(38)

Courts were held at Lawrenceville in the original building designated by the General Assembly until 1845, when Samuel B. Goodwin was named commissioner to superintend the building of a courthouse which was to be "a frame house, 20 feet square, one-story high, weather-boarded but not coiled, with two doors and two 8 x 10 windows. (39) Later specifications called for a building 42 feet long and 24 feet wide. (40) An effort was

was made to raise the construction cost to \$1,900, but it was retained at \$1,500, the original sum appropriated. (41)

In 1856 Clarendon was selected as the county seat, (42) but the records were not moved until 1857 when the necessary buildings were in readiness. (43) In the October term, 1859, the court appropriated \$10,000 for the purpose of building a brick courthouse according to the plans of M. D. Cheek. The funds were to be raised from a special tax of \$2, 500 and from the sale of county property in Lawrenceville and Clarendon. Ezekiel Black served as commissioner to superintend the construction, (44) which proceeded during the early sixties. Before the building was entirely completed, it was demolished by Federal forces. When the court reconvened in 1865, it voted a special tax to build a onestory frame courthouse, 18 by 36 feet. (45) This small building was used until 1872 when a two-story brick courthouse was completed at a cost to the county of approximately \$13, 441. (46) This courthouse was burned in 1895. (47) The next year it was replaced by private subscription solicited by a committee composed of H. B. Bateman, Parker C. Ewan and Isaac Halperno. (48) The building served the county's needs until 1911 when a contract was let for a handsome structure costing \$118,000. It was completed in 1912 under H. B. Bateman, building commissioner, Charles L. Thompson, architect, and W. A. Prather, contractor. (49)

Early court proceedings included settling claims of various individuals for wolf scalps; (50) adjudging certain persons as paupers; appropriating money for building bridges; (51) licensing persons as peddlers; granting licenses to keep dram shops and to operate ferries. (52) By act of the General Assembly in 1825 a patrol was appointed in each township of each county the duties of which were to visit Negro quarters and other places suspected of unlawful assemblies of slaves; where plots of insurrection or illegal possession of guns were found, the slaves were taken before magistrates. (53) Men serving on the patrol received \$1.00 for every twelve hours service, and were exempt from military service. Records of the county show instances of runaway slaves being apprehended by this patrol. (54)

In accordance with a State law providing for care of orphans and indenturing of children of indigent parents, the probate judge in 1854 required "of Elizabeth Haney that she faithfully instruct the said orphan, Andrew Wilson Glen, in the art and trade of farming" and that she "constantly supply" him with "suitable and sufficient food, lodging and clothing and all things necessary in sickness and in health". She was required also to teach him "reading, writing and arithmetic in the rule of three, inclusive". (55) Other unfortunates, including the blind, deaf, dumb, and the physically handicapped were declared paupers and boarded out in private homes by the county court. A pauper fund accrued from a tax of $4\frac{1}{2}$ mills on the dollar. Included in the care provided for unfortunates were board, washing, clothing, school for minors, medical attention and burial expense. (56)

Because of numerous boundary changes giving territory to surrounding counties and chiefly involving Prairie and Woodruff, the original size of Monroe has been greatly reduced. (57) In 1873 a portion of

Monroe was taken to form Lee County. (58)

Jackson, Montgomery, Cache, and Surrounded Hill were the original townships in Monroe County. In 1842 Roc Roe township, lying on the west side of the main channel of White River, was created. The house of Albert G. Evans was designated as the place for holding elections. (59) In 1845 Hampton township was created and elections were to be held in the dwelling house of David Killian, with Richard Hardin, Thomas Wall and Daniel Killian as judges. (60) Wattensaw township was created in November, 1850 and the residence of Jonathan Wright was specified as the place for holding elections. (61). Cypress township was created in 1852, the home of John Brown being the "voting percinque". (62) Hickory Ridge, the house of Richard Scott, was the voting precinct in 1853. (63) At present the townships are Brinkley, Brown, Cache, Cleburne, Cypress Ridge, Dixon, Duncan, Greenfield, Hendman, Jackson, Keevil, Montgomery, Pine Ridge, Raymond, Richland, RockRoe, and Smalley. (64)

Newspapers

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Monroe County has had many periodicals. In 1860, The Democratic Standard was established at Clarendon by M. Nichols, but suspended operations in 1862 when the editor joined the Confederate army. After the war of 1868, John S. Greene issued a campaign newspaper called The Democrat, at Clarendon. The Clarendon Age was started in 1874, by T. T. Pitts, who sold it the same year to B. F. Lightle. The new owner moved the paper to Brinkley, changing the name to The Time. The Monroe County Sun was established at Clarendon in 1877 by George W. Christie, who sold it six months later to Judge T. W. Hooper. The paper continued operations under this ownership until July 1878, when it was purchased by Parker C, Ewan and Grant Green. The publication changed hands a number of times. (65)

In 1884 J. Hector Harris established The Peoples' Choice at Clarendon. It suspended operations after a short time. Holly Grove has had several papers, one of which was The Holly Grove Star. Another, the Holly Grove Deader, was started in 1915. The Brinkley Argus, founded in 1886, has continued through the years to the present day. The Monroe County Citizen, begun in 1876, is still in operation at Brinkley. (66)

Economic Development

Farming and timber lands are good investments in Monroe County. The Cypress Drainage District, formed many years ago, drains about 150, 000 acres of lowland in Monroe County. This project drained almost every acre that needed it and threw vast tracts of fertile soil open to settlers. Drainage is of almost incalculable value to Monroe County. Drainage districts embrace the territory including Brinkley, Keevil, Glenwood, Blackton, Pine City, Palmer, Raymond, Holly Grove, and some territory adjacent to Clarendon. (67) The supply of fuel in the county is abundant, and lumber is relatively very cheap. (68)

In 1840 Monroe county produced lumber valued at \$1,000 and furs valued at \$430. (69) In 1870 the county had 31 manufacturing estab-

lishments. There were 7 steam engines developing 304 horsepower. The plants employed 100 males, 98 of whom were over 16; no female employees were reported. The capital was \$52,745; wages paid, \$15,000; cost of materials, \$30,993; value of products, \$77,307.36. (70) In 1900 there were 61 establishments employing 554 wage earners, of whom 539 were men 16 years of age and over, 8 were women and 7 were children under 16. Capital invested was \$636,774. Wages paid totaled \$163,334. The Materials cost \$399,897, miscellaneous expense was \$27,221, and the value of products was \$757,667. (71) In 1939, 17 establishments employed 220 persons who were paid \$111,419 as wages. The value of materials used was \$270,674 and the value of products \$667, 591. (72)

Monroe County with its numerous streams and vast forests has always abounded in wildlife the sale of which had economic value. As the population increased and hunters acquired modern fire-arms it became evident that the game supply would be destroyed unless further conservation efforts were made. Controlled by the State Game and Fish Commission, the Roc Roe Game Refuge in Monroe County consists of 13,000 acros on White River. The White River Migratory Materfowl Refuge, a Federal Game Preserve of 110,000 acres, extends into the southern part of Monroe County. The refuge includes a 62 mile strip along the White River, varying in width from 3 to 9 miles. The area embraces a large number of small lakes and bayous and is forested by oak and other hardwood trees and cypress. The sanctuary, to which in season come migratory water fowls, is also a favorite haunt of fur-bearing animals, door, and fish. (73)

Poarl fishing on White River assumed its greatest proportions during the period from 1895 to 1905. Since then the industry has declined owing to the scarcity of mussels in which the pearls are found. Pearls found in White River and its tributaries are exceptional in form and color. A by-product of the pearl fishing industry is the manufacture of button blanks from mussel shells. Refuse from button factories is sold for chicken feed and for road surfacing material. (74)

An important source of revenue for Menroe County is its forests. Ash grown in the county is madé into ours which supply many of the navies of the world. (75)

Much of the industry of the county is centered in Clarendon, the county seat, which is a manufacturing city in the heart of a rich and diversified farming section. (76)

Agriculture

Monroe County, in the rich, alluvial section of the State, with climatic conditions warranting a long growing season, has always been considered one of the State's best agricultural counties. (77) The prairie lands (15 square mile area in the southwestern part of the county) are well adapted to rice. Many varieties of fruits and vegatables are raised.

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In 1838 proporty in the county included 126,704 acres of land valued at \$492,232; 22 town lots, together with improvements, valued at \$2,300; 33 slaves valued at \$23,550; 208 horses and mules, \$11,990; 546 cattle, \$7,588. (79) In 1940, out of a total of approximately 394,880 acres in the county, 47.5 per dent or 187,477 acres were in farms. There were 2,633 farms averaging 71.2 acres, valued at \$5,109,223. White operators numbered 1,044 with 121,975 acres valued at \$3,234,907 while 1,589 non-white operators farmed 80,387 acres valued at \$1,874,316. (80) There were 211 farms of less than 10 acres each and 10 farms each with more than 1,000 acres. (81) The following yield in major agricultural products was reported for 1939; cotton, 21,221 bales; corn, 250,616 bushels; sorghum 12,536 gallons; oats, 45,313 bushels; 48,367 bushels; Irish potatoes, 20,595 bushels; sweet potatoes, 21,023 bushels; honey, 1,027 pounds. The 1940 census showed the following livestock and poultry in the county: horses, 722; mules, 1,686; cattle, 1,825; hogs, 1,916; sheep, 19; chickens, 68,060; turkeys, 301; ducks, 1,286; geose, 1,309; guineas, 1,050. (82)

Where once the large plantation system was the rule in the county, the farms are now mainly representative of subdivision, plantations operated by tenants. Of these, the average cutten farm of 41 acres includes 27 acres in crops, (83) one acre in plowable pasture, 13 acres in woods.

Transportation

Monroe county had adequate facilities for transportation; all the larger markets are easily reached. The most important railroads are the Rock Island, Missouri Pacific, and Cotton Belt. (84)

The first stream to navigated was White River, called "Unica" by the Cherokee Indians and "La Riviere au Blanc" by early French traders. Both names mean White River. When the river reaches Monroe County it has lost the crystal clarity which inspired its name owing to the fact that Black River empties into it in Jackson county just above Monroe. White River was navigated in 1831 by the steamer Bob Handy and in 1832 by Captain Pennywit and the Waverly. Finding the White a good river for steamboating, other boats engaged in river traffic. (85)

To supplement the streams the pioneers had Indian trails, important among which was one reforred to in the records as "The Old Trace" (86) This trail led from Arkansas Post across Grand Prairie (Monroe County) to points in Conway County. (87) Another trail was known as "Munn's Trail". (88) In 1824 Congress appropriated \$15,000 for a military road from Memphis to Little Rock, completed in March, 1823. That road, which crossed Monroe county, was the route of settlers going to the southwest, of soldiers en route to the Mexican War, of the covered wagons of the "Forty-Niners", and of Indian tribes moved from east of the Mississippi to the Indian Torritory during the administration of President Jackson. Today, U. S. Highway No. 70, Broadway of American, follows practically the same route. (89) The Phillips and Monroe Turnpike Company was incorporated by the General Assembly in 1849 to build

a road from Helena across Monroe County to intersect with the Little Rock-Memphis road. (90) The Clarendon Turnpike Company was grarted a charter to construct a plank toll road 4 miles in length from the east bank of White River in Monroe County. (91) In 1859 James Harris was granted a charter by the General Assembly, in session at that time to construct a toll turnpike, plank road or causeway through White River and Roc Roe Bayou. (92) By 1936 the county road system had grown until it embraced a total of 425 miles of roads of all classes besides roads included in the State highway system. (93) By 1941 the county had 128.9 miles of State and Federal highways of which 16.9 miles were Portland cement concrete pavement. (94) Roads in the State highway system were U. S. Highway No. 70 between Wheatley and Brassfield, U. S. Highway No. 79 between Monroe and Roe, and State Highway No. 1, 17, 20 and 86. (95)

Funds for construction and maintenance of early day roads in Monroe County were materially increased by fees paid for ferry privileges.
Since the county is a network of rivers, creeks and bayous, numerous ferries were required. Permits to operate them were \$10 to \$20 each.
Among the first ferries mentioned in the records are Maddox Ferry on Indian Bay. (96) Anderson's Ferry on White River; James T. Harris' Ferry
on White River; the ferries at Pecan Point, White River, and Anderson's
Bluff on the route between Helena and Arkansas Post; (97) Roc Roe, Bushy
Lake, and Cane Ridge ferries; Boat Gunnell Ford; Pickens Bluff Ferry,
White River. (98)

Supplanting ferries of the early days were bridges, construction and maintenance of which came under the jurisdiction of the supervisor of roads. (99) Toll charges were assessed at the crossings. In 1854 the court appropriated money for a bridge "at a place called Walnut Point, at the mouth of Glass Bayou". (100) From these bridges to the structure which now spans White River at Clarendon is a long step. This bridge, completed in May 1931, lacks but 205 feet of having a total length of logical miles. It is constructed of concrete and steel at a cost of \$1,560,549.88. (101) The structure was built as a toll bridge by the State Highway Department, (102) and was made toll-free, along with other State-owned bridges in 1938. (103)

In 1857 construction was begun on the Memphis and Little Rock Rail-road, Arkansas: first railroad, now a part of the Rock Island lines. The work was started at both ends of the line, at the Mississippi river on the Arkansas side and the Arkansas River at Little Rock. At the beginning of the Civil War and for several years thereafter there was an incompleted 45-mile gap through the overflow bottom lands in Prairie, Monroe and St. Francis counties. Meanwhile Little Rock passengers, en route to Memphis, traveled by rail to DeVall's Bluff, thence by boat to Clarendon, back by stage to the rails at Madison, and on the Mississippi River terminal. Thirty-two hours were required to make the trip. (104)

It was not until 1871 that the Memphis and Little Rock, was completed across Menroe County. The last spike was driven at DeValls Bluff, April 11, 1871. (105) The Texas and St. Louis Railroad (now Cotton Belt) was completed to Clarendon in 1882 and south of Clarendon the following year. (106) Besides these lines, the county is served by the

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Missouri and Arkansas across the northeast corner and the Missouri Pacific which operates a branch from Helena to Clarendon and another branch between Pine City and Brinkley. (107)

The route of the Dallas-Louisville Division, American Airlines, passes over Monroe County. No service for points in the county has, been established, but there is an emergency landing field $\frac{1}{2}$ mile east of Brinkley. (108)

Education

Although the General Assembly of 1843 passed an act to "establish a system of common schools for Arkansas", growth of the public school system was slow owing to the widely scattered settlers and the prevalent idea that parents were responsible for their children's education. Many families employed private tutors, and there are instances of several families combining funds to employ a teacher for the children of their group. That school houses were not entirely unknown to Monroe County in early days is shown by reference to them in census reports and in court records. (109) The census of 1870 shows that 635 white children attended school in Monroe County. (110) In 1900, 2,009 white and 3,950 Negro children were enrolled, and there were 54 school houses in the county, 6 of log and all others of frame construction. (111) By 1920 there were 32 white and 43 Negro schools in the county. The enrollment was 2,347 white and 3,307 Negro children. (112)

In 1940 there were 2,467 white children enrolled in school, or 77.4 percent of the enumerates; 2, 474 Negros were enrolled, or 75 percent of the possible attendance. The number of districts had been consolidated to 19 and the length of the school term had been lengthened to nearly 9 months for white children and to $6\frac{1}{2}$ months for Negroes. The valuation of the property taxable for school purposes was \$4,723, 969. (113) Standard high schools are maintained at Brinkley, Clarendon, and Holly Grove, and the largest Negro high schools in the county is at Fargo. These school receive Smith Hughes Aid. (114)

Population

The consus of 1830, the first subsequent to creation of Monroe County, reported a population of 461. (115) In 1838 there were 567 people in the county, of which 85 were slaves. (116) Thereafter the population figure almost doubled itself each decade until 1870, reaching 8, 336 in that year. (117) The largest increase during any one decade was reported in 1850, when the gain was more than 150 percent. (118) A steady increase was shown by each succeeding census until the 1930 census showed 20,651, a decrease from the 1920 figure. (119) This was due to an exodus from low areas along the White River during and following the flood of 1927. (120) In 1940 the population was 21,133, an increase of 2.3 percent over 1930. During this period, urban population of the county increased 95.7 percent while rural population showed a docrease of 13.8 percent. (121)



HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

The Monroe County courthouse at Clarendon, located at Madison and Second streets, was completed in 1912 at a cost of \$118,000. It is a three story brick structure with entrances on four sides. The roof is tiled. On the north side is a square center tower equipped with four-faced clock and belfry. On each corner of the building is a smaller tower, octagonal in shape. Outside dimensions of the building are 70' x 100'

The main entrance is on the north side, beneath a porch supporting a second floor balcony.

The interior walls and ceilings of the building are plaster; the floors are concrete, in good condition. The building is lighted by electricity. Ventilation and atmospheric conditions are generally good. Most of the rooms are 16' high. FSA offices occupy the east side of the third floor. Current justice of the peace records are kept in the respective offices of the justices serving in the several townships of the county.

The records of all county agencies are housed in the courthouse with the exception of the County Agent, Home Demonstration Agent and Agricultural Adjustment Administration. These offices were housed in the courthouse until April 1940, when they were moved to the new Post Office Building basement, built especially for them. The building is red brick and granite concrete, one story with basement, constructed in 1939-40. Records are contained in steel filing cabinets. There is also a storage room 13'4" x 11'2" next to the office of the Home Demonstration Agent, which contains records of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

For the arrangement of the various offices in the courthouse and their relationship to each other, consult the floor plans, pages 21-26.

Facilities are provided for the various county agencies as follows:

County Court. On the west side of the first floor of the courthouse is the office of the county judge. No records are kept in this office. The county clerk is custodian of all court records. They consist of 20 volumes occupying approximately 30 linear feet, and 6.8 cubic feet of unbound records in 19 steel file drawers in the clerk's vault.

County Highway Commission. This agency holds its meetings in the office of the county judge. No records were found in this inventory.

Circuit Clerk as Recorder. The recorder's office is on the southeast corner of the first floor of the courthouse. His records consist of 206 volumes occupying approximately 309 linear feet and 17.6 cubic feet of unbound records in 49 steel file drawers in his vault; and 1 volume occupying 1.5 linear feet in the office of the county supervisor of schools.

Circuit Clerk's Vault. This vault is located on the south side of

the first floor of the courthouse. It has two windows, one steel door, plaster walls and ceiling. Its dimensions, arrangement, and temperature are comparable to the county clerk's vault. The shelving is steel, and there is direct overhead lighting. The records consist of 311 volumes occupying 466.5 linear feet of steel shelving, and approximately 125.3 cubic feet of unbound records in 348 steel file drawers.

Notary Public. The county does not provide office space for notaries public.

Circuit Court. The courtroom occupies the south side of the second floor of the courthouse. No records are kept here. The records of the court are kept by the circuit clerk. They consist of 60 volumes occupying approximately 90 linear feet and 59.4 cubic feet of unbound records in 165 steel file drawers in the circuit clerk's vault, and 16 volumes occupying 24 linear feet in the storage room on the second floor.

Jury Commission. A room in the southeast corner of the second floor of the courthouse is used as a jury room. Records made by the jury commission form a part of the circuit court records. See entries 64-67.

Chancery Court. One central courtroom is used by all courts. The records of the chancery court are in the custody of the circuit clerk. They consist of 34 volumes occupying approximately 51 linear feet and 48.2 cubic feet of unbound records in his vault.

Probate Court. Probate court is held in the general court room. The records are in the custody of the county clerk. They consist of 52 volumes occupying 78 linear feet and 28.8 cubic feet of unbound records in 80 steel file drawers in the county clerk's vault.

Juvenile Court. Juvenile proceedings are usually held in the county Judge's office. The county clerk is custodian of the records, which consist of 1 volume occupying 1.5 linear feet and .36 cubic feet of unbound records in 1 steel file drawer.

Court of Common Pleas. This court meets in the general courtroom. Its records, in the custody of the circuit clerk, consist of 15 volumes occupying 22.5 linear feet in his vault, and 1 volume, occupying 1.5 linear feet, in the storage room on the second floor.

Justices of the Peace. Sessions of the justice of the peace courts are held within the boundaries of the townships served by the respective courts. Quarters for the Justice of the Peace for Cache Township are provided in the office of the Tax Assessor, on the west side of the first floor of the courthouse. Non-current records are returned to the county clerk. They consist of 1 volume occupying 1.5 linear feet in the tax assessor's office and 13 volumes occupying approximately 19.5 linear feet in the storage room.

Prosecuting Attorney. This official has no office in the Monroe county courthouse and keeps no records.

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Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records

Sheriff. The sheriff's office is on the northeast corner of the first floor of the courthouse. His records consist of 2 volumes occupying approximately 3 linear feet in his office and 6 volumes occupying approximately 9 linear feet in the courthouse attic.

Coroner. No office space is furnished the coroner. His inquisition records become a part of the circuit court records and are delivered to the circuit clerk.

Constable. The constables have no offices in the courthouse. They keep no records.

Quorum Court. Sessions of the quorum court are held in the general room. Its records consist of 6 volumes occupying approximately 9 linear feet and 1.4 cubic feet in 4 steel file drawers.

County Clerk. The county clerk's effice is in the southwest corner of the first floor. His records consist of 227 volumes occupying approximately 331.5 linear feet and 19 steel file drawers and 1 pasteboard box of unbound records occupying approximately 7 cubic feet, kept in his vault, and 64 volumes occupying 96 linear feet in the storage room on the second floor.

County Clerk's Vault. The county clerk's vault is located on the south side of the first floor of the courthouse. Its dimensions are 15' x $22\frac{1}{8}$ x 16'. The walls, 20 inches thick, and the ceilings are plaster; the floor is concrete in good condition. Temperature is even and dry, with good ventilation. The records contained in this vault consist of 302 volumes occupying 453 linear feet of steel shelving, and approximately 44.8 cubic feet of unbound records in 453 steel file drawers.

Tax Assessor. The assessor's office is in the northwest corner of the first floor, and contains 41.4 cubic feet of unbound records in 115 steel file drawers. The remaining records are placed in the custody of the county clerk. See entries 122 and 125.

Board of Equalization. This agency has no office in the courthouse. Space is provided for its meetings. Its records consist of 2 volumes occupying 3 linear feet in the county clerk's vault.

Tax Collector. The sheriff is ex-officio collector and the records made by him are kept in his office. See entries 123, 124, and 126.

County Treasurer. The office of the treasurer is on the north side of the first floor of the courthouse. His records, consisting of 24 volumes occupying 36 linear feet and 3.2 cubic feet of unbound records in 9 steel file drawers, are in his office.

Director of County Audits. There are no regular quarters in the courthouse for this official. opies of the auditor's reports are in the custody of the county clerk. See entry 116. ome records of the commissioner of accounts, predecessor of the director of county audits, are in the county clerk's vault. They consist of 14 volumes occupying 36 linear feet.

County Supervisor of Schools. This official occupies an office in the northwest corner of the second floor. The records consist of 168 volumes occupying 252 linear feet and 53.4 cubic feet of unbound records in 12 steel file drawers, 2 folders, and 128 bundles.

Health Unit. This agency occupies three offices on the east side of the second floor. In its offices are 4.3 cubic feet of unbound records in 12 steel file drawers.




Confederate Pension Board. This agency, while inactive, has never been abolished by law. Its records are kept in the custody of the county clerk, See entry 156


County Surveyor. No office space is furnished for the surveyor of Monroe County. No records were found in this inventory.





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
