In working with our youth, Rev. Smith has dedicated much of his time and energies in directing a well rounded youth program at the church and inspired many programs for the youth in the community. The Six-State Youth Conference, a creation of First Baptist was designed to bring outstanding youth to our church community. With all of these activities, he still finds the time to conduct seminars annually on Family Relations, church schools; missions Bible study and weekly Teacher-training program.

With all of these accomplishments, our minister finds time to do the following:

Has served as President of Huntington Ministerial Association; President of Huntington Baptist Ministerial Association; He presently serves as chairman of Mayor's Commission on Human Rights; chairman of Trustee Board of W. Va. Baptist Convention; Member of Executive Board of W. Va. Baptist Convention; Co-chairman of the summer camp sponsored by this organization, and Secretary of Community Minister's Group; member of Stella Fuller Board, and Cabell County Heart Association. Mr. Smith has been in constant demand as a public speaker. This year alone he has traveled more than 30,000 miles speaking to ten colleges and a host of seminars and camps.

Certainly, the most recent and perhaps the most historic achievement since Rev. Smith's pastorate began, was the burning of the mortgage on the new parsonage. With his great vision and dedication to the service of God and the church, we were able to retire this mortgage of \$30,000 on November 22, 1964.

The newest and latest project is the plan to build a new church on the present site to satisfy the needs of an expanding church and to renew the present facilities of the church.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH of REV. CHARLES H. SMITH

The Rev. Charles H. Smith was born in Georgetown, Kentucky, the son of Rev. and Mrs. Thomas E. Smith on April 12, 1931 in the parsonage of Zion Baptist Church. Three months later, his Father assumed the pastorate of Shiloh Baptist Church, Lexington, Kentucky.
