Dear Children,

Time goes by so fast seems I can't get a letter off to you. Received your nice card and see was mailed the 6<sup>th</sup> - 10 days ago. I know I was trying to get a letter off to Helen last Sunday thinking would write you Monday. Also Cliff as his letter was dated Nov. 2<sup>nd</sup>. And another whole week has passed & neither written so will begin with yours. You see we get up early 6.30 in order to get kids off to school 7.30 as their school begins at 7.15 - Then dad, Ethel, Joan & I eat. Then do dishes while Ethel gives baby a bath & maybe if I go to store dad does dishes as Monday went down town early right after breakfast for advertised stuff. Got back at noon ate lunch & straighten, rested a little and have supper early so kids can get to bed 6.30. Read paper and am too sleepy to write - so go to bed. Usually relieve Ethel of feeding baby around 3 or 4 a.m. But he

usually goes back to sleep so get a surge  
before 6.30 - Tuesday we washed baby-  
clothes and usual routine. Wednesday  
I took him to doctor for circumcision  
as doctor said he was too young when  
he left hospital. (Which don't know if  
I wrote you was just 4 days. Was born  
Friday 1.30 - Oct. 31<sup>st</sup> and they sent her  
home Tuesday noon. But was to go to  
bed and not go out for 3 weeks. But she  
has been up around most of the time  
tending to baby etc.) - Thursday, dad & I  
went downtown after groceries and  
Friday we washed again & straightened  
yesterday. Have time to write in afternoon  
but about time get ready kids come from  
school or company comes so gets put  
off. Have written Ma Duncan and  
dad's brother Lewis today. The 3 kids and  
I went to Sunday School this morning.  
They seem to have a good S. S. - Our adult  
Class seem very spiritual and friendly.  
I have been every Sunday so far. Ethel  
tried nursing him from breast but now

have him on Carnation milk and he  
sleeps better at night. Are expecting  
Murdock home in about 3 weeks and  
by then Ethel will be stronger. Dad has  
had a cold but much better now and  
I am ok. Can't realize will soon be  
Thanksgiving. I know you are better  
situated than last Thanksgiving. Any-  
way hope you are not moring and  
laid up as thow. Even with our daily  
crosses now we can see how our God  
hath led us and have much to thank  
& praise Him for. Hope with a little  
school vacation you can rest a bit.  
How does the furnice go? The weather  
here is so changeable and lots of  
rain. Last Sunday was quite cold  
yet not freezing. And today was like  
summer. Or quite cool at night and  
by noon sun hot and then maybe a  
thundershower the next night. Don't  
suspose you have heard from Helen or

Cliff. They keep so busy. Had a card from Helen Saturday. They are ok. but Iris & she did have colds. Here you heard the news of Cliff & Ila. He writes they expect a little one in the spring. I know they are happy yet not so well financially but they will have to make it. Ila is now working and he says his studies are very hard and had an exam a short time ago. They like the Baptist Church there and Ila is directing the choir & preparing the Christmas music. I hasn't heard from Uncle Jay since we left but should write them. I'm now getting my bed time so better sign off for now. Hoping this finds all well and write us a line or card soon. Lots love - Mother & dad.

Dear Mrs. Woodruff,

I feel I must write and tell you that I have at last met your little daughter-in-law, -- but first it would perhaps be best if I explain who I am.

In 1938 I was taken ill when my husband and I were crossing to Canada and on arrival in Montreal I had rather a nasty operation, done excellently by Dr. John Armour, at the Royal Victoria Hospital. Gordon was then one of the internes and came to do my dressings, etc. He was very kind and in the early days after the operation when I could not sleep he would often stay and chat with me when he was on his night round. He talked a good deal about his home and family and about books. I was very ill at the time and his voice and kindly manner and general outlook on life were very soothing to me. The last week or so I was in the hospital Herbert Fidler took Gordon's place and he, too, often talked to me. At the beginning of the war when both the boys were in England we met several times when they happened to be in London. Unfortunately I was still not well and was unable to get about a great deal, but I did enjoy seeing them. Herbert Fidler was terribly upset when he heard of Gordon's death. He was in the Middle East for a long time, and he writes to me fairly often.

Now to return to your daughter-in-law. I had letters from her occasionally and she had promised to come and see me if she was in London again. Last week I had a phone message telling me that she was in London with her brother, the one who had been missing for so long in the East. He was on leave and wanted her to go to London with him. They both came to tea with me on Thursday. Unfortunately I was engaged on Friday and Saturday and they

returned to Wales on Saturday evening, so I had no other chance of seeing her.

I hope you will not mind my writing, but I thought you might like to hear the opinion of an outsider who was very fond of Gordon and interested in him and his career. Your daughter-in-law gave me your address.


I am praying with all my


Dear mom,

two white, size 32, bras. I know




You think I'm crazy


Dear Mother and Dad,

I was very cheered to get your wires and letters and Mammy's letter, and am so glad to know you are all well.

We sailed at 1:30 a.m. standard time and dropped the pilot at Father Point in the gulf about 8 a.m. So am writing you just a line. Sailing was rather gloomy and depressing, the

port holes are all painted black; there were no visitors and no gaiety. We shall send no wireless messages at all even to acknowledging instructions and shall sail away from the usual steamer lanes.

Quebec City was very beautiful as we steamed past from Wolfe's Cove. Beautiful moonlit night and the Chateau and Citadel were very fine up on the bluff. There were a few northern lights in the sky

place in the country where I could raise fruit  
chickens & Rabbits have a garden etc. but all these  
things remain to be seen.

Ezra write me some time. I will all-way  
appreciate a few lines from you. will all-way be  
glad to hear how you & family are. You know I  
have all-way thought of you as a brother.  
and as I stated before you & family made a trip  
out here. the High-ways are fine all the way.  
I left Chicago wednesday A.M. and arrived in  
Long Beach Saturday nite about 9 P.M. (4 days)  
did all the driving my-self. stopped every night  
some where. did no night driving.

So Come on hoping this will find all of  
you enjoying the best of health and with  
best wishes for you.
