MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE, JANUARY 12, 1970

The Senate granted permission to Nancy Clarke, a reporter for WLAP and WHAS, to attend and report.

The minutes of the Senate meetings of December 1 and December 8, 1969, were approved as circulated.

On behalf of the College of Dentistry, Dr. Harold Laswell presented the following Resolution on the death of Dr. Arthur W. Aplin. The Senators stood for a moment of silence in respect to Dr. Aplin and in acceptance of the Resolution.

At the age of 41 and in his thirteenth year in dental education, Dr. Arthur W. Aplin, Associate Professor in the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry, was killed in an auto accident on Friday night, December 12. He is survived by his wife, Sydney, and three children, Allen, 8; Tracey, 7; and Amy, 2.

Formerly of the Northwest, Dr. Aplin received his B.S., D.M.D., and M.S.D. degrees at the University of Oregon. He was Associate Professor of Operative Dentistry at the University of Oregon before coming to the University of Kentucky in 1964.

His research and teaching activities were extensive. A publisher of many articles and abstracts, his expertise in the area of fixed prosthodontics and occlusion was nationally recognized. Although he achieved excellence as a clinician, his basic approach was to seek answers to technical problems from scientific sources. Besides directorships and participation in many dental courses both at an undergraduate and at a post-graduate level, Dr. Aplin was President of Omicron Kappa Upsilon (the dental honor society), a member of the Admissions Committee, the Professional Conduct Code Advisory Committee, and supervised the treatment of patients requiring extensive restorative care.

However, only those who knew him well can understand the loss that the University of Kentucky and the dental profession has suffered. His zest for accomplishment in the field of dentistry can best be acknowledged by the great amount of time that he spent at the University and his constant willingness to be available any day of the week, any hour of the day for the benefit of the student. Nothing had higher priority in his career than an individual relationship with a student.

The sincerity and excitement for dentistry with which he influenced both colleague and student has made a great impression and will always be remembered. His genuineness, honesty, and unselfish dedication to his profession make his replacement an almost impossible task.

May the Senate accept this resolution in respect for a life devoted to teaching and in deepest sympathy with his wife and friends for whom his loss is truly irreplaceable.

Chairman Plucknett presented the newly elected members of the Senate Council to the Senate. These are: Staley F. Adams, College of Engineering; Sheldon Rovin, College of Dentistry; and Timothy H. Taylor, College of Agriculture.

The Chairman announced the new officers of the Senate Council. These are William K. Plucknett, Chairman; Nicholas J. Pisacano, Vice Chairman; and Thomas R. Ford, Secretary.

On behalf of the Senate Council, Dr. Ford, its Secretary, presented a recommendation of the Rules Committee that the University's requirement for the collection of mid-semester grades (Rules of the University Senate, Revised and Updated July, 1969) be suspended for the period January 1, 1970 through May 8, 1971; that the Undergraduate Council study the effect of this suspension of the practice; and that the results of this study be reported to the University Senate by the Chairman of the Undergraduate Council no later than September, 1971. (This recommendation had been circulated to the teaching faculty under date of December 19, 1969.)

Following discussion, motion was made and seconded to amend the recommendation to insert between the words "suspended" and "for" the phrase "except for students with freshman classification". By a vote of 81 to 44 the Senate defeated this amendment.

The Senate then approved the original recommendation as presented.

On behalf of the Department of Mathematics, Professor Raymond Cox requested a waiver of the Rules of the University Senate involving circulation and processing procedures to the University faculty and the appropriate Councils in order to allow consideration by the University Senate of the proposed revision in the Major in Mathematics for incorporation into the University Catalogue for 1970-71. (This proposed revision was circulated to the teaching faculty under date of January 5, 1970.) The Senate voted to set aside the Rules.

Professor Cox then presented a recommendation that the proposed change in the Department of Mathematics major as described in the memorandum of January 5, 1970 be approved.

Motion was made to amend this recommendation to accept the program conditionally for one year and that acceptance beyond one year depend on approval of the program through the normal channels. The Senate defeated this amendment.

Motion was then made to amend the original motion to add at the end of paragraph II. C. the additional fields of Engineering and Agriculture. The Senate approved this amendment.

The Senate then approved the original recommendation as presented by Professor Cox, and amended, with the understanding that it will become effective with the 1970 Spring Semester but will be applicable only to those students who are beginning their junior year in the 1970 spring semester. The change in the Department of Mathematics major, as amended, and approved, reads as follows:

> Proposed Major for the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science Degrees with a Major in Mathematics

- General Studies Requirements: Same as College requirements. In Area IV, French, German, or Russian are recommended.
- II. Major Requirements:
 - A. MA 113-114, 213, 214 or equivalent
 - B. A minimum of 18 credits in upper division courses in mathematics, to include a semester of at least four of the following five sequences, and a year of at least one sequence:
 - 1. MA 351, 352 (Topology)
 - 2. MA 361, 362 (Algebra)
 - 3. MA 441, 442 (Geometry) 4. MA 471, 472 (Analysis)

 - 5. MA 481, 482 (Applied Mathematics)
 - C. Field of Concentration requirements: 14 credits of nonfreshman courses outside mathematics but in related fields. Any field to which mathematics has been significantly applied is acceptable. Examples: physics, chemistry, biology, philosophy, economics, statistics, computer science, political science, engineering and agriculture.
- III. Recommended courses for students with special interests.
 - A. Teaching in secondary schools: MA 361, MA 341 or 441, MA 471, MA 472, MA 371, MA 261.
 - B. Work in industry or government: MA 421, MA 471, MA 472, MA 481, MA 482, STA 421, STA 423, MA 433, plus work in computer science.
 - C. Preparation for graduate work: MA 352, MA 362, MA 442, MA 472, MA 433.

The Dean of Admissions and Registrar presented the list of candidates for degrees at the December 20, 1969 Commencement, which had been made available to the Senators as they entered the meeting, and certified that they had completed all requirements with the exception of candidates for the degree of Juris Doctor; that candidates for this degree had been recommended by the College of Law, subject to successful completion of all course work for which they were registered in the Fall Semester, 1969. He recommended that the candidates be approved by the Senate with the exception as noted, and that the Senate recommend approval to the Board of Trustees. The Senate approved the recommendation as presented.

Dr. William K. Plucknett, as the new Chairman of the University Senate Council, presented the following remarks to the Senators:

The coming year will be a critical one in the history of the University and the University Senate will be tested as it has not been for many years. Great strides have been made in the past few years. It is inevitable that such a period of expansion be followed by a pause for consolidation. It would be a great mistake, however, to equate such a pause with status quo. As the needs of society change, the University must adjust its programs to meet these needs. New programs must be initiated, but by the same token some older programs must be dropped. Review of existing programs becomes imperative and can no longer be postponed.

What is the role of the Faculty in such reviews? The Senate is charged with setting the broad academic policies of the institution and academic programs are certainly the most basic ingredients of such policies. It therefore behooves the Senate, through its Committees or Councils, to determine quite specific criteria to be used in evaluating relative merits of existing programs and proposed programs. There are some who say the Faculty cannot be objective enough to perform this task. I do not accept this premise. I believe the vast majority of the Faculty, if given this responsibility, will exercise statesmanship.

Shortly, the Program Planning Committee, through the Senate Council, will petition the Faculty for suggestions as to broad areas of interest to the University where a study by an ad hoc committee might be profitable. It is important for the Senate to keep in mind the authority, and the limitation on the authority, vested in it by the Board of Trustees. On purely academic matters, the Senate may legislate—examples are, procedures for initiating and changing courses, changes in programs, marking system, etc.; on some matters the Senate must approve and has a veto over—examples are: approval of degree candidates, initiation of new programs, etc.; on all other matters the Senate may make recommendations, but it must be clearly understood that such recommendations are only advisory.

With these limitations on the authority of the Senate clearly in mind, all factors affecting education at the University of Kentucky are appropriate for study by the Senate.

In the hope of stimulating other ideas, I would like to suggest several areas of study which might profitably be undertaken by Senate ad hoc committees, standing committees or its Councils:

- 1. The aforementioned problem of criteria for program evaluation.
- 2. Class scheduling. Is our present fifty-minute classes once a week for fifteen weeks for each hour of credit the best arrangement? How about a more general use of two seventy-five minute classes twice a week for three hours credit? By such scheduling, and perhaps starting at 7:30 a.m. and running to 5:30 or 6:00 p.m., we could quite possibly eliminate classes on Wednesdays and Saturdays, freeing such time for study, committee and faculty

meetings, and research. Enough institutions have tried this for a sufficient length of time to provide the basis for a sound study.

- 3. Desirability of a combination of work and study, as prerequisite for degrees in many areas. Does the present usual four-years of concentrated study without work experience in the field provide the best education? It would seem possible and perhaps desirable to require internships in some areas of study.
- 4. Establishing an Academic (Senate) Advisory Committee on the budget. Can one make appropriate educational policies without awareness of budgetary conditions reflected in the fact that the American Association for Higher Education indicates about 50% of the institutions now have such committees.

I'm sure you can think of many other areas which should receive faculty study.

One continuing problem faced by the Senate is that of violations of Senate Rules. Much of this is due to lack of knowledge of the Rules, but some is certainly due to contempt of them. What should we do when such violations by faculty or administrators become apparent? The Senate neither has nor wants any administrative function, nor does it desire to assume a policing role. The current practice of the Senate Council is to bring the violation to the attention of the perpetrator and ask for correction. In the event the situation is not improved, the matter is brought to the attention of the department chairman or the next higher administrative officer. All are informed that any decision of the Council may be appealed to the Senate which has final authority. If any rules are unworkable or undesirable, they should be changed by the Senate. We can have only chaos if the rules are ignored. Before preaching law and order to our students, let us set the good example.

If the Faculty wishes to continue having a participating role in the academic governance of the University, the Senate must continue to accept governance responsibility and exercise its authority with firmness but discretion. I firmly believe that one year from now we will be able to point to significant contributions by the Senate in the continued improvement of the University.

It is my sincere desire as the new Chairman of the Senate Council to facilitate the work of your Senate Council as it in turn assists you in the development of a continuously maturing University. I hope and trust that this, too, is your goal and that you will use the Office of the Senate Council freely and that you will have no hesitancy in bringing matters to the Council or to the Senate itself.

The Chairman announced that the next meeting of the Senate will be a special meeting to be held on January 26, 1970 and that an item on the agenda will be the Report of the Ad Hoc Committee on Appropriate Balance Among Teaching, Research and Service Functions in the University.

The Senate adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

The University Senate adopted in 1967 the policy that three (3) unexplained absences from Senate meetings by a Senator in an academic year automatically call for purgation by the Secretary, University Senate.

If an elected member of the Senate cannot attend a particular meeting, will be on academic leave for a specified period of time, wishes to resign from the Senate, resigns from the University, changes status which makes him ineligible for service in the Senate, retires, or is unable to attend a meeting for any reason, it is his responsibility to so notify Ext. 3433, the Recording Secretary of the Senate. If the Senator is physically unable to provide proper notification, the responsibility rests with the Dean of his College.

Rosters are provided at each meeting of the Senate. Senators must sign a roster, if present, in order to receive credit for attendance.

MA 113-114, 213, 214 or equivalent A minimum of 18 credits in upper division courses in mathematics, to include a semester of at least four of the following five sequences, and a year of at least one sequence: 1. MA 351, 352 (Topology) 2. MA 361, 362 (Algebra) 3. MA 441, 442 (Geometry) 4. MA 471, 472 (Analysis) 5. MA 481, 482 (Applied Mathematics) C. Field of Concentration requirements: 14 credits of nonfreshman courses outside mathematics but in related fields. Any field to which mathematics has been significantly applied is acceptable. Examples: physics, chemistry, biology, philosophy, economics, statistics, computer science, political science. III. Recommended courses for students with special interests. A.
