Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, November 8, 1958.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 9:10 a.m., CST, Saturday, November 8, 1958, with the following members present: R. P. Hobson, Chairman; Harper Gatton, Louis Cox, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci and J. Stephen Watkins. President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson met with the Committee.

## A. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Executive Committee of July 31, 1958, were approved as published.

## B. Financial Report.

Financial report for the four-months period ended October 31, 1958, was submitted and reviewed. The report consisted of balance sheet and related financial statements which represented a complete financial picture of the period for all funds of the University.

Members of the Executive Committee being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was received and ordered filed.

## C. Purchases Approved.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

Mr. Peterson stated that the documents were available for examination and that all purchases made were against appropriated funds.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the requisitions and orders listed above were approved and ratified.

## D. Army R.O.T.C. Flight Training Contract.

Mr. Peterson submitted contract for the Army R.O.T.C. Flight Training program for the fiscal year 1958-59. He stated that this contract was a renewal of an existing program approved for the fiscal year 1957-58, with the exception of a slight modification of indirect costs. He stated that the contract provided that the Government would pay all costs incidental to the program, and recommended that it be approved.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, Army R.O.T.C. Flight Training contract for the fiscal year 1958-59 was approved and authorized executed.

## E. Air Force R.O. T.C. Flight Training Contract AF 01/611)-544.

Mr. Peterson submitted Contract AF 01(611)-544 for the Air Force R.O.T.C. Flight Training program for the fiscal year 1958-59. He stated that this contract was a renewal of an existing program approved for the fiscal year 1957-58, with the exception of a slight modification of indirect costs. He stated that the contract provided that the Government would pay all costs incidental to the program, and recommended that it be approved.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, Air Force R.O.T.C. Flight Training Contract AF 01(611)-544 for the fiscal year 1958-59 was approved and authorized executed.

## F. Subcontract with Bohmer Flying Service, Inc.

Mr. <u>Peterson</u> submitted subcontract between the University of Kentucky and Bohmer Flying Service for flight training for Air Force R.O.T.C. students for the period October 8, 1958, through June 30, 1959. He stated that this contract was similar to the one that the University operated under during the fiscal year 1957-58. He felt that the University was amply protected by the contract and by insurance and recommended its approval.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract with the Air Force R.O.T.C., for flight training as provided by the Bohmer Flying Service, was authorized approved and executed.

## G. Subcontract with Bohmer Flying Service, Inc.

Mr. Peterson submitted subcontract between the University of Kentucky and Bohmer Flying Service for flight training for Army R.O. T.C. students for the period October 16, 1958, through June 30, 1959. He stated that this contract was similar to the one that the University operated under during the fiscal year 1957-58. He felt that the University was amply protected by the contract and by insurance, and recommended its approval.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract with the Army R.O.T.C., for flight training as provided by the Bohmer Flying Service, was authorized approved and executed.

# H. Contract, Department of Economic Development, Swine Testing Station.

Mr. Peterson submitted contract between the Department of Economic Development and the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station whereby the Department of Economic Development would furnish the amount of \$12,500 during the fiscal year to complete the Public Swine Testing Station at the Coldstream Farm. This contract is similar to the one made for the fiscal year 1957-58. It has been approved by Commissioner Hubley, of the Department of Economic Development. Mr. Reterson further stated that the Kentucky farmers are earnestly seeking new sources of farm income to offset losses from reduced acreage of tobacco, and authorities agree that

the production of both feeder pigs, performance-tested purebred breeding stock and slaughter hogs of acceptable meat type constitutes a potential source of new farm income of up to \$30,000,000 annually. He was glad to recommend approval of the contract.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

# I. Contract with Lexington City Schools.

Mr. Peterson submitted contract between the Lexington Board of Education and the University of Kentucky whereby the Lexington City Schools would take a number of students from the College of Education for practice teaching. He stated that this contract was similar to ones we have made several times and recommended that the contract be approved.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract between the Lexington Board of Education and the University of Kentucky for the training of students of the College of Education in practice teaching, for the fiscal year 1958-59, was approved and authorized executed.

# J. Contract for the Purchase of Lambs with Producers Livestock Marketing Association.

Mr. Peterson-submitted contract between the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station and the Producers Livestock Marketing Association. The contract provides that the Producers Livestock Marketing Association will make available to the Agricultural Experiment Station 500 choice western crossbred ewe lambs for experimental use for a period of nine months. These lambs will be cared for by the University and sold at the end of the test period. This will enable the Department of Animal Industry to carry out research in the feeding of lambs without having to be out the money involved. The net gain when the lambs are sold will be given to the University as a gift. Mr. Peterson recommended that the contract be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract as presented was approved and authorized executed.

## K. Contract for Instruction of Military Personnel.

Mr. Peterson submitted renewal of Contract DA 15-014 concerning the cost of instruction of military personnel of Fort Knox, Ky. He stated that the contract is of a routine nature since it provides for the regular fees to be paid for instruction given to military personnel of Fort Knox. He recommended that the contract be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was authorized approved and executed.

# L. Contract with National Association of Artificial Breeders of Columbia, Missouri.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the University and the National Association of Artificial Breeders of Columbia, Missouri. He stated that the object of the research contract was to study "the uses of fluorescent dyes in determining early fertilization of ova." The National Association will provide \$1,200.00 to cover cost of the project. Mr. Peterson recommended that the contract be approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed on receipt of payment of \$1,200.00.

# M. Agreement as to Ownership of T.R. Zato Heir 181, Reg. No. 6944721.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between J. D. Gay, Brookview Farms, Pine Grove, Ky.; Brownell Combs, Myrtlewood Farm, Fayette County; University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, Lexington, Fayette County, Ky.; and Salmon Corporation, Mereworth Farm, Fayette County. He explained that the four parties listed above own the registered Hereford bull, T.R. Zato Heir 181, Reg. No. 6944721. The Agreement stipulates the conditions under which the owners of the bull will care for and make use of the animal. Mr. Peterson further stated that, since the bull is owned by individuals and corporations, it seemed highly desirable to reduce the Agreement to writing. He further stated that the Salmon Corporation had purchased one—third interest in the bull for the sum of \$10,000, indicating that the animal is very valuable. He recommended approval of the Agreement.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed.

## N. Sale of Surplus Property.

Mr. Peterson reported that the Testing Service has an obsolete Dictaphone which is surplus to its needs; the Radio Arts Department has an old organ and an old player piano which are surplus to its needs; and the Student Union has an old ping pong table which is surplus to its needs. He recommended that this property be disposed of by taking bids.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Vice President, Business Administration, was authorized to sell surplus property referred to above.

# O. Metallic Pole Telephone Line Accepted.

Mr. Peterson reported that the Southern Bell Telephone Company had placed on the Robinson Forest land owned by the University a metallic pole telephone line from the Robinson Lookout Tower to the Southern Bell tiein, some seven miles in length. The Southern Bell Telephone Company desires to relinquish its ownership to the line, since it no longer has need for same.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the University accept the line in accordance with the agreement.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the metallic pole telephone line on the Robinson Forest land was accepted.

## P. Injuries.

Mr. Peterson reported the following injuries:

James Casada. Mr. Casada, an employee of the Agricultural Experiment Station, was injured on June 19, 1958. He was drilling a hole in a piece of angle iron with a drill press. The drill bit caught the piece of angle iron, spinning it around and cutting the left index finger of Mr. Casada. The doctors were out of town, and the nurse on duty arranged for treatment at the Good Samaritan Hospital. Dr. Thomson R. Bryant, Jr., rendered service and has submitted a bill for \$10.00 for treatment given to Mr. Casada in the Good Samaritan emergency room.

Loftus Green. Mr. Green is an employee of the Department of Maintenance and Operations. He was injured on September 4, 1958. While Mr. Green was working on a Kentucky Rehabilitation station wagon, a puff of wind blew a piece of metal into his right eye. He reported to the University Dispensary and was later sent to Dr. Claude Wilkes Trapp. Doctor Trapp rendered service and has submitted a bill for \$5.00 for services rendered.

J. M. Spalding. Mr. Spalding, an employee of Maintenance and Operations, was injured on September 15, 1958, in the University of Kentucky Central Heating Plant. Mr. Spalding was helping to unload extra heavy 6" pipe with five other men. Three of the men let go of the pipe and it fell from the truck, hit another piece of pipe and then bounced on Mr. Spalding's toes. Two of the toes on the left foot were broken. No doctors or nurses being on duty at the University Infirmary, Mr. Spalding was referred to Dr. Thomas D. Yocum who, in the emergency room of the Good Samaritan Hospital, rendered service to the fractured left foot, first and second toes, and continued to render service until the patient was dismissed. Doctor Yocum has submitted a bill for \$36.00 for services rendered and the Good Samaritan Hospital has submitted bill for \$12.00 for use of their emergency room.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the bills in connection with the injuries to James Casada, Loftus Green and J. M. Spalding be approved and paid, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence nor assume any liability in connection with the injuries to James Casada, Loftus Green and/or J. M. Spalding.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Executive Committee concurred in the above recommendation, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence nor assume any liability in connection with the injuries to James Casada, Loftus Green and/or J. M. Spalding.

## Q. Purchase of House and Lot at 443 Clifton Avenue.

Mr. Peterson submitted a sale and purchase contract for house and lot at 443 Clifton Avenue. He stated that the lot was 50 feet by 137 feet and contained thereon a nice, weatherboarded house in good condition. He said the house was heated by a floor furnace and had a bath and four rooms, with steps leading to the attic room for storage purposes. The house has been recently re-wired, re-roofed, insulated and painted. Mr. Peterson stated that the house could be purchased for the sum of \$13,000 and he recommended that the purchase contract be authorized.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract for the purchase of house and lot at 443 Clifton Avenue was approved and authorized executed, and the purchase price paid from the Haggin Fund.

## R. Purchase of House and Lot at 805 South Limestone Street.

Mr. Peterson submitted sale and purchase contract for a house and lot at 805 South Limestone Street, Lexington, Ky. The lot is 40 feet wide and 150 feet deep. The house is of brick construction, with composition roof, and contains two apartments. It is heated by a gas furnace. This property is zoned for business and faces the Medical Center. Mr. Peterson stated that the house is currently rented for a total of \$155,00 per month. He recommended that the property be purchased since it would provide accommodations for two families, either students or staff members.

The Committee discussed the desirability of acquiring property to relieve the housing situation at the University and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sale and purchase contract was approved and authorized executed, and the house paid for from the Haggin Fund.

## S. George R. Kayanaugh Authorized to Make Bond.

President Dickey submitted recommendation of Mr. Peterson that:

- (1) George R. Kawanaugh be designated as Custodian of Military Property for such duration as assigned by the Vice President, Business Administration; and
- (2) the Institutional Bond for Mr. George R. Kavanaugh be approved and authorized executed with the Corporate Seal attached thereto and attested by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee.

President Dickey further explained that the University has, for a number of years, given the Federal Government a bond for safekeeping of military property assigned to the R.O. I.C. units at the University of Kentucky.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Mr. George R. Kavanaugh was designated custodian of military property for such duration as assigned by the Vice President, Business Administration, and Institutional

Bond was approved and authorized executed with the Corporate Seal attached and attested by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee.

# T. College of Engineering to Do Special Work for IBM Electric Type-writer Plant.

President <u>Dickey</u> submitted a request from Dean Shaver, College of Engineering, that the Engineering Machine Shop be permitted to alter the size of 20 to 25 bolster plates for punch presses for the IBM Electric Typewriter Plant, Lexington, Ky. President <u>Dickey</u> reported that the work could be carried out without interference to the instructional program at the College of Engineering and that the work would be performed under the direction of Mr. Mangelsen by paid student labor. He further stated that the IBM Corporation would pay charges, including indirect costs.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, permission was given to accept the work assigned and to bill the IBM Electric Typewriter Corporation for services rendered.

# U. 635 Maxwelton Court Cooperative House Named for Miss Myrtle Weldon.

President Dickey stated that the new cooperative house at 635 Maxwelton Court is used to house women students at the University who are willing to live cooperatively, doing their own housework and cooking. He stated that the students living at 635 Maxwelton Court and Dean of Women Doris M. Seward concurred in the recommendation that Miss Myrtle Weldon, retired State leader of home demonstration agents of Kentucky, be honored by designation of this house as "The Myrtle Weldon Cooperative House". President Dickey said that he wished to concur in the recommendation, and so recommended same to the Executive Committee.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the house at 635 Maxwelton Court was officially named "The Myrtle Weldon Cooperative House" in honor of Miss Myrtle Weldon who, for such a long period of time, gave unstintingly of her time and talent to the Home Demonstration Extension program in Kentucky.

# V. Free Fees for Gyula Virag.

President <u>Dickey</u> presented request from the Acting Foreign Student Adviser that free-fee scholarship be given to Gyula Virag for the fall semester of 1958-59. President <u>Dickey</u> stated that there was some feeling that Mr. Virag had previously been granted the scholarship but there did not seem to be any record. He concurred in the request and so recommended.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Mr. Gyula Virag was granted a free-fee scholarship for the fall semester of 1958-59.

## W. Dempewolf Plaque--Henderson Center.

President <u>Dickey</u> recalled Mr. Car! A. Dempewolf's service to the University as member of the Board of Trustees and reported that the College Foundation, Inc., Henderson, Ky., had adopted a Resolution as follows:

Mr. Carl A. Dempewolf, a very active member of your board for quite a number of years, passed away, and this committee feels that his services to your board and the efforts he has put forth toward the establishment of a University Center here in Henderson should be rewarded. Mr. Dempewolf was an outstanding citizen of the City of Henderson, Henderson County, and the State of Kentucky, and a person whose untiring efforts toward education will not only be missed here in Henderson, but by the entire State of Kentucky.

The College Foundation requests that the University honor Mr. Dempewolf by placing a plaque in some permanent place after the new building for the University Henderson Center is completed. President <u>Dickey</u> stated that he felt that this was appropriate and recommended that a plaque be put in some permanent place in the new Henderson Center building, honoring Mr. Carl A. Dempewolf, as recommended. It was further stated that this had nothing to do with the naming of the Center.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, President <u>Dickey</u> was authorized to have an appropriate plaque designed, made and placed in the Henderson Center building, honoring Mr. Carl A. Dempewolf.

#### X. Resolution on Death of Ezra L Gillis,

President <u>Dickey</u> reported the death of Professor Ezra L Gillis and submitted the following Resolution, with recommendation that it be approved and spread upon the minutes and that a copy be sent to members of the family.

#### Ezra L Gillis

Ezra L Gillis was born near Glensboro, Anderson County, Kentucky, January 1, 1867. His father, Hugh Gillis, was a Civil War veteran; his mother was Ellen Petty Gillis. His early education was secured in the public schools of Anderson County. Later, he attended Transylvania University and Indiana Central Teachers College, from which institution he was graduated. For a number of years he taught school in Anderson County.

In 1902, he was appointed president of Minerva College, Mason County, Kentucky, where he served with distinction for five years.

In 1907, Professor Gillis became a member of the faculty of the Normal Department of the University of Kentucky. Three years later he was made Registrar of the University in which position he served for 27 years. In his capacity as Registrar, he gained national recognition as an authority on problems of college registration. Many young men and women came to the University of Kentucky to gain a knowledge of the work of the registrar, and from among this group there are scores of university and college registrars serving many of the institutions of learning of this country.

Professor Gillis was a leader in establishing the American Association of Collegiate Registrars. He was regarded as the mentor of this professional organization that has done so much to standardize the work of colleges and universities. Professor Gillis was Secretary-Treasurer of the Association from 1914 to 1919, and served as its President in 1920. On several occasions he was given special recognition by the Association, and for years he has been regarded as the "Dean of American Registrars and Admissions Officials".

In 1937, Professor Gillis established the Bureau of Source Materials in Higher Education, and during the years since that time, he built up a remarkable collection of records and books. These probably represent the best collection of historical material of the kind to be found in any library in Kentucky or in the Nation.

In 1956, at the age of 89, Professor Gillis published a biography of Henry Stites Barker: A Selection of Speeches and Other Writings by the Second President of the University of Kentucky. In the publishing of this volume he has rescued the forgotten president of the University from oblivion.

The University twice bestowed its highest honors upon Professor Gillis, giving him its first Meritorious Service Award in 1945, and, in 1950, presenting him with the Sullivan Medallion as the State's outstanding citizen of the year.

This great educator actually had two distinguished careers at the University of Kentucky. He was often referred to as the campus philosopher, the college humorist, the keeper of the records, the great humanitarian, the counselor of students, and the most beloved man who ever served the University. He was an able scholar, a gifted administrator, a man possessing great wisdom, and a Christian gentleman. Through all the years of his life he went about doing good and sharing his wisdom and knowledge with others. His name will live in the memory, as well as in the Archives of the University of Kentucky, so long as this institution exists.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Resolution was approved and ordered put to record and a copy sent to the family.

# Y. Professor J. W. Martin Reports on Consultive Services.

President <u>Dickey</u> submitted report from Professor James W. Martin through Dean Cecil C. Carpenter, College of Commerce, on his work with the Department of Finance during the first quarter of the current fiscal year.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was received and ordered filed.

#### Z. Permission to Do Outside Work.

## Dr. William D. Ehmann

President Dickey reported that Doctor Ehmann had been requested to do consulting work for the Argonne National Laboratory at Lemont, Illinois. He stated that Doctor Ehmann would be paid about \$50.00 per month and travelling expenses. Dean M. M. White reported that the few days Doctor Ehmann would be absent from the campus would not conflict with his assigned duties, and that the fact that Doctor Ehmann would be consultant to the Argonne National Laboratory would be quite an honor to the University Department of Chemistry. President Dickey recommended that the request be granted.

## Dr. B. D. Kern

President Dickey stated that Dr. B. D. Kern, professor in the Department of Physics, had been asked to serve as consultant to the Nucleonics Division of the United States Naval Radiological Defense Laboratory, San Francisco, California. Doctor Kern would receive a fee of \$110.00 per month and would probably visit the Laboratory on one occasion. The visit would be arranged in such a way that it would not interfere with Doctor Kern's teaching duties. Dean M. M. White, of the College of Arts and Sciences, expressed the thought that it was an honor to be asked to do this consultive work and recommended the request be granted. President Dickey concurred in the request.

## Dr. Frank A. Pattie

President <u>Dickey</u> reported that Dr. Frank A. Pattie had been requested to do consultive work for the Veterans Administration for a period of four hours per month during the current year. He stated that Doctor Pattie would receive about \$50.00 per month for his services and the time given would be so spaced as not to interfere with his work at the University. President Dickey recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the requests of Doctor Ehmann, Doctor Kern and Doctor Pattie were approved.

## A-1. Temporary Employment of Relatives Considered and Approved.

President Dickey reported that Dr. Morris Scherago had received a grant from the B.F. Goodrich Company to make certain tests and that he had not found a capable technician to do the technical work with the exception of Mrs. Lucile N. Edwards, who is the wife of Dr. O.F. Edwards, professor in the Department of Bacteriology. He recommended the employment of Mrs. Edwards as Electron Microscope Technician on a part-time basis at a salary of \$200.00 per month for a three-months period beginning October 1 and ending December 31, 1958. President Dickey concurred in the request.

President Dickey reported that Dr. W. A. Seay, Acting Dean and Director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and the Experiment Station had requested the employment of Miss Mary Nash Cox as assistant publications editor in the Cooperative Agricultural Extension Service, effective October 20. Miss Cox is the daughter of Mr. Louis Cox of Frankfort, Ky., presently member of the Board of Trustees of the University. His term expires December I of this year. President Dickey recommended that an exception be made and the request granted.

President <u>Dickey</u> submitted a request of Dean Cecil C. <u>Carpenter</u>. College of Commerce, that Mrs. Martha A. Smith, wife of Dr. Eldon D. Smith, Department of Agricultural Economics, be employed on a part-time temporary basis to do statistical computations relative to income estimates. The President recommended that the request be granted.

President Dickey reported that Dr. W. A. Seay, Acting Dean and Director, College of Agriculture and Home Economics and the Experiment Station had requested the employment of Mrs. Mabel L. Brandon as acting librarian for the Experiment Station. Mrs. Brandon is the wife of Mr. Alfred Brandon, Librarian of the Medical Center. Her salary would be \$3,900 per annum for the time of service. President Dickey recommended that the request be granted.

President <u>Dickey</u> reported that Dean Lyman V. Ginger, College of Education, had requested temporary employment of Mrs. Margaret Moore, wife of Dr. James T. Moore, member of the staff of the College of Education. He stated that, after school had commenced, the third-grade teacher became ill and was forced to take leave of absence for the remainder of the current school year. No substitute teachers were available. President Dickey recommended that the request be granted.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the temporary employment of Mrs. Lucile N. Edwards, Miss Mary Nash Cox, Mrs. Martha A. Smith, Mrs. Mabel L. Brandon and Mrs. Margaret Moore was approved.

## B-1. Employment of Personnel for Indonesian Contract.

President Dickey reported recommendation to employ Dr. Harry E. Nelson for the Indonesian Project to serve during the time his services are approved by ICA on the Indonesian Project.

President <u>Dickey</u> also recommended the employment of Dr. F. L. Underwood as a staff member on the Indonesian Project for such time as his services are approved by the ICA.

President <u>Dickey</u> recommended the employment of Dr. Milo M. Wolff to the staff of the Kentucky Contract Team on the Indonesian Contract at Bandung to serve during the period for which his services are needed.

President <u>Dickey</u> recommended employment of Professor James B, T. Downs to the staff of the Indonesian University at Bandung for the period for which his services are needed.

President <u>Dickey</u> recommended the employment of Professor Walter R. Hunziker to the staff working on the Indonesian Contract at Bandung for such period of service as he may be needed.

President Dickey recommended the employment of Professor Louis S. Salter to the staff of the team working on the Indonesian Contract at Bandung for such time as his services may be needed.

President <u>Dickey</u> further explained that, under the new contract made with the International Cooperation Administration, the University had been asked to add to the staff now stationed in Indonesia and that these people would be assigned to the Indonesian Project. They are not recognized as regular employees of the University except in so far as they can be used on the Indonesian Project.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the employment of Dr. Harry E. Nelson, Dr. F. L. Underwood, Dr. Milo M. Wolff, Professor James B. T. Downs, Associate Professor John A. Feyk, Professor Walter R. Hunziker and Professor Louis S. Salter was approved.

#### C-1. Budget Adjustments.

President <u>Dickey</u> recommended that the sum of \$700.00 be appropriated from the unappropriated surplus to the Department of Botany. He further recommended that the sum of \$675.00 be appropriated from unappropriated surplus to the Alumni Association to publish a bulletin containing addresses of prominent alumni made at the recent Alumni Seminar. The President recommended that the sum of \$400.00 be appropriated from unappropriated surplus to the Placement Service.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendations were concurred in and the Director of Accounts and Budgetary Control was authorized to make the necessary budget adjustments.

# D-1. Budget of Journal of Southern History Approved and Appropriation Made.

President <u>Dickey</u> submitted the budget of the Journal of Southern History and stated that this had been an oversight on the part of administrators handling the work in not submitting the budget at the time budgets were considered. He also recommended that the sum of \$2,500 be appropriated from the Haggin Fund and placed to the credit of Account 3745 to carry on the work. The budget was examined, the items of expenditure were noted and, on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budget was approved and \$2,500 was appropriated from the Haggin Fund to care for the expense of the Journal of Southern History.

He recommended that this very generous and valuable gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Executive Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President and asked him to convey to Professor Kelley their appreciation of his thoughtfulness.

## F-1. Resolution on Death of Dr. Daniel C. Elkin.

President Dickey reported the death of Dr. Daniel C. Elkin, a member of the Board of Trustees and eminent surgeon. He submitted the following Resolution with recommendation that same be placed of record and a copy sent to the family.

#### RESOLUTION ON THE DEATH OF DANIEL COLLIER ELKIN, M. D.

Daniel Collier Elkin was born in Louisville, Kentucky, in March, 1893, of pioneer families on both sides of the house. He was graduated from the Lancaster High School in 1912 and then his native State was not to have him as a resident for more than 40 years. In this time he made a lasting mark on medical education in the country. He received an A.B. degree from Yale in 1916 where his scholarship, many activities and popularity foretold a distinguished career. In 1920 Emory University graduated him in medicine, and then followed what he, himself, considered the most important ten years of his life, spent in postgraduate work in internships, residencies and instructorships in the field of surgery in Boston, Massachusetts.

In 1929 he returned to Atlanta as an assistant in the Department of Surgery in the Emory University School of Medicine and in 1934 became full Whitehead Professor of Surgery in the school. The next 20 years of his life were filled with extraordinary activities in reorganizing and running the department of surgery, writing and publishing many papers on surgery, teaching undergraduates, training residents in surgery, and raising large sums of money for the growth of his department. During this time he became interested in surgery of the heart and great blood vessels. In this field he was a pioneer in this country.

When World War II came, Dr. Elkin was commissioned as a colonel in the Medical Reserve Corps and put at the head of Ashford General Hospital where men were collected who had survived crippling wounds of the heart and great blood vessels. This great surgical vascular center was known before and since the War as The Greenbrier at White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia.

To say that Dr. Dan C. Elkin belonged to, and at various times was president of, the elect surgical societies in the United States and abroad, to say that he was a distinguished professor, a leader in surgical thought, a daring and skillful operator, and an inspiring trainer of men would be stating the simple truth

but it would be far from giving a complete picture of Dan Elkin, the man, the friend. As a person he had a discerning and sincere simplicity, an extraordinary capacity of making people love him. His keen humor, his modesty and unassuming manner endeared him to all.

Because of ill health he retired from Emory in 1954 and came back to "Elkin Place" to live. Instead of really retiring he continued to make frequent trips to Atlanta to advise and help his former colleagues and gave freely of his strength to all the enterprises in his native State where he thought he might be of any assistance.

We in Kentucky are glad that he served on the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky from 1955 until his death; that he was vitally interested in the University of Kentucky Medical Center and the Kentucky Medical Foundation and that he took an active and effective part. His home was a source of strength and encouragement to the many who came to visit him.

The life of Dr. Elkin showed that it is possible to achieve the bright ambitions of youth without wounding others in the struggle to the top; that it is possible to live at the top level with modesty, humor and a due respect for the opinions and personalities of others.

"He is truly great that is little in himself, and that maketh no account of any height of honors."

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Resolution was adopted and ordered put to record and a copy sent to Mrs. Daniel C. Elkin.
