That could be higher education's anthem for a least the next four years no matter who is elected governor.
Gubernatorial candidates Larry Forgy, and Paul Patton gave the first glimpses of their agendas for higher education to about 3000 university and college leaders at a luncheon in Lexington yesterday.
And neither vision promises a 7 percent budget increase — or roughly \$1000 million — for higher education, as requested by the luncheon's hosts, the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education.
Each candidate acknowledged that Kentucky's higher education system has taken unfair budget cuts during the last decade.
Tax revenues and college Incomplement of the state of the support for higher education has dropped.

# **NATION Scientists may** offer designer breasts

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — While lawyers battle over the dangers of silicone breasts, scientists are exploring a procedure that uses a woman's own cells to create tsuse inside the breasts — in effect, a "grow-your-own" alternative.

The experimentation is years behind other substitutes that use vegetable fats and oils, but supporters note that this technique doesn't personance that the schemique doesn't personance that the procedure is personance to the procedure is still available for cancer and other medical reasons.

If early work on laboratory animals succeeds, the researchers, within three to five years, will remove a tissue sample from somewhere in a woman's body, use it to grow additional cells in the lab, then implant the cells in the woman's breast. There they should multiply and mature into real breast tissue.

## FBI crimes to be put under scrutiny

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department is asking top forensic scientists to review the FBI crime lab's work, now that a chemist there has accused the lab of producing biased evidence to help prosecutors.

The Justice Department investigation grew out of allegations by an FBI special agent. His allegations of bias and even manufacturing of evidence have called into question several high-profile government cases, from the Oklahoma City and World Trade Center bombings to a Georgia mail bombing scheme against federal judges.

# Senate Council wants more input on study period proposals

The University Senate Council wants a breakdown of what effect two proposed eademic breaks
will have on the campus before it will approve them.
The two proposed breaks — a fall midterm break
and a reading period during each semester — are
being investigated by the council and will be decided
on at its Monday meeting.
The council wants opinions and approvals from
the registar's office, Food Services, Residence Life
and U.K. President Charles Wethington. Council
members said since the breaks could possibly alter

told student representatives who took the proposals
to the council.

Both breaks were endorsed by the Student Government Association Senate and the student body in an election referendum last semester.

If approved, the midterm break would be held on the first Monday and Tuesday of October.

The student representatives that presented the

proposal asked the council to notice that a break of this kind is necessary to students because the fall semester already has three more teaching days than the spring and because students have 12 continuous weeks of classes in the fall without a break.

"A midterm break would provide students with adequate time to study for their midterns," said former SGA Executive Director of Academic Affairs Avi Weitzman.

"Two days in the weekend before midterms is not adequate time for anyone to study. A break would help students manage their stress levels."

The reading period would call for classes to cancelled during the last two days of Dead Week. This would give students a four-day study break before finals. To make up for the lost days, classes would begin on Monday of each semester instead of Wednesday.

Other than questioning the overall effects a break would have on the University system, members of the council also asked of the merits of such proposals. Michael Nietzel, a council member, asked the student representatives why they do not believe weekends are adequate enough breaks.

Enid Waldhart, another member, said students at her daughter's university that has similar breaks do not take them as serious cademic breaks.

"Be very much prepared to see these breaks be nothing more than a holiday." Waldhart said. "To think that a whole student body will study sin't probably the best way to approach this:

The council did not agree. And said really there is no urgency to immediately vote on either proposal. One reason is that the full Senate does not meet until next month.



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

UK's Chandler Medical Center officially opened a new transplant clinic on the fourth floor of the UK Hospital last week to accommodate kidney, heart, lung, liver, pancreas and pancreas/kidney transplant patients in a more centralized locale.

A total of 138 solid orgat ransplant procedures were performed at UK last year. It is anticipated that this total will increase to 150 in 1995.

"The new clinic is more convenient to our patients," said Barbara Greider, a medical center spokeswoman." Before, they connel on the hospital side and then cross the street over to the Kentucky Clinic side to see someone else."
