Don't drop now, because you get this letter, for I imagine you think I do not intend to write to you any more, but when I got your letter I just made up my mind that I would see Mrs. Thompson before I answered, and so I have, I spent a very pleasant evening with her Monday. She has a very nice home. I went all

over it, a splended bath, gas hot water
and best of all a big jnd of land.
The house is between the fire station and
the little colored church, you know the
fire station where Mr Burke is, she is
anxious for you to come home and live
with her, did you know she had
gone into Christian Science, and she
has changed so much so considerate
and charitable minded.

Well Mrs Beale we are all well but oh
this terrible war, and the high cost of
living is driving us crazy butter is 48^c
potatoes 90^c a bushel sugar 10^c eggs 50^c
flour 12 dollars, but lots of folks think
it is not going to last long.

Am sorry you were sick, you ought to be
more careful, Mr Chase is at the school
and Ralph is painting. Mrs Yellard folks
are all well she is doing lots for the
stricken boys Lew says you ought to
give you land in Medford to some one
for a garden, as every piece of land is
being plowed up for food, we have been
giving a piece across the street.
