WASHINGTON — NATO stepped up its "surgical" air strikes against Yugoslavia yesterday, and President Clinton said the United States and NATO are "determined to stay united and to persist until we prevail." Pentagon officials cast the military campaign as a success in shaking Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic and hurting morale among his armed forces, which are strugging with fuel and ammunition shortages and bombed-out command centers. Air Force Maj. Gen. Charles Wald said yesterday the low- and slow-flying "tank killer" A-10 aircraft hit Serb forces in Kosovo Tuesday night, the first time the Warthogs struck enemy targets in the war.

Texas — A former Texas A&M student is one of three American soldiers who was captured last Wednesday near the Yugoslavia-Macedonia border and is being held by Serbian forces.

U.S. Army Spec. Steven Gonzales was a mechanical engineering major and lived in Lechner Hall when he attended A&M in the 1995-1996 school year on an academic scholarship.

Gonzales graduated in the top 10 percent of his class from Palestine High School in 1995, where he lettered in soccer and track.



Many students have never used a washing machine before coming to col-lege, so it's no surprise that many have never dealt with paying bills either.

UK undergraduate housing is easy for those who find managing money difficult. Everything but long-distance telephone service and cable is lumped together in one sum paid at the beginning of every semester.

Students who live in residence halls don't even have to worry about grocery shopping. Every resident must open a Diner Account for at least \$675 a semester. This money does not carry on from semester to semester. Including the Diner Account, residence halls cost about \$440 a month.

Biology senior Andrea McCool has
lived in residence halls all of her four
years at UK. She lived in Boyd Hall for
one year and Patterson Hall for three
years. The only thing she does not like
about the residence halls is the Diner
Account. She sees it as cost-inefficient,
because the money does not carry over

each semester.

But for McCool, the good outweighs the bad.
"I don't have to worry about cleaning," said McCool. "It's safe, close to campus and I don't have to worry about parking."

Undergraduate housing also includes Greg Page Apartments. UK owns and runs these apartments, along with Cooperstown Village. Like residence halls, everything but long-distance telephone service and cable is lumped into one sum. All people living in campus housing that is not considered a residence hall are not required to open a dining account.

Landing a good landlord a 50-50 chance

Many reasons: Unregulated business, University contributing to the number of bad landlords in city

Landlords: They have the power to strike fear in even the hardlest of students seeking off-campus housing.

Ike Lawrence, a local landlord who owns several residences near UK, said that by his estimation, about 50 percent of landlords are "good to pretty good," while the oth-

Lawrence suggested that one rea-son for such a high level of bad land-lords is that the business is not regu-lated. There is no licensing or training to be a landlord.

"Licensing is a form of pro-active-ness," Lawrence said. "You get rid of the bad people ahead of time." Lawrence also cited UK as indi-

Her response "I have always been black and a woman."
Fulani says the political arena has niches for blacks and women.
"Our niche is the democratic party," Fulani said. "When it comes to the independent party which itself is a challenge to politics, there are no niches for blacks and woman."

Fulani wants to teach others what it would be like to be an independent party running for an office, she said. The experience is like being a second class citizen, she said. "I relate being on the ballot for an independent party or being a part of an independent party to how blacks were treated prior to and during the civil rights movement," Fulani said. The First Amendment gives Americans the right to free speech and freedom of association, but Republicans and Democrats are favored by laws governing bolt access, voter registration, campaign finance and candidate debates, she said.

For example, Fulani was unable to

participate in candidate debates in her first campaign.

"This issue raises the 14th Amendment with the equal protection of law because independent parties are not getting the same kind of protection as the Democrat and Republican are getting." Pulani said.

Fulani said she has seen changes in electing independent parties since she first ran.

"The major change is the participation of the youth identifying themselves as independent."

She said 65 percent of youth identify as independent and 44 percent of the black community ages 18-29 want a third party.

valid until the appeal has been
heard.

Law professor Peter Mag-gs said the reason behind the petition was Native Ameri-

cans felt the term "redskin" has a negative connotation. "The word 'redskin' is particularly offensive, 'Maggs said. "There's always some kind of littigation going on about a scandalous trademark."

Even though the federal protection would no longer exist, state laws will still let the team use the Redskin logo, Maggs said. The main problem is losing out on the strong protection at the federal level against other groups using the trademark, he said.
"A guy selling T-shirts

"A guy selling T-shirts could now sell T-shirts with the logo and not have to pay royalties," Maggs said. "It simply weakens their protection."

Most recent bid for the NFL's Washington Redskins withdrawn yesterday after debates

Heated emotions and cold cash doomed Howard Milstein's bid for the Washington Red-skins. Now the search is on —again — for a new owner of the NFL team.

Milstein, saying he wanted to get out before the process got "protracted" and "contentious" when it already was both, withdrew his group's \$800 million bid to buy the Redskins yesterday when it became clear he lacked the necessary support from NFL owners.

"We have withdrawn with great sadness. ... In the end we compiled with all the league's stated requirements and agreed to all of the league's sadditional conditions," Milstein said in a state ment released at a special owners meeting. "Butwing the same of the same state of the same sta

about Milstein's confrontational stewardship of the Islanders, who are involved in multiple law-usits in a fight for a new arena.

"Emotion may have gotten involved in it to some degree," said Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, who supported the bid. "They did have past experience, and I think some of those issues were perceived negatively, fairly or unfairly."

Finance committee chairman Bob Kraft, owner of the New England Partriots and another supporter of the bid, said a number of owners found the concept of the \$50 million deposit 'quite offensive,' because it almost boxed the league into a corner the trustees used to sell the team sort of picked our owner for us." Kraft said. "The owners want to feel that we're picking who our new partner is."

There will now be a new round of bidding conducted by the trustees. Milstein's minority partner, Washington-area communications executive Daniel Snyder, intends to be first in line — this time as the person leading the group.

Snyder, who would become

Snyder, who would become the league's youngest owner at age 34, has more than \$150 million cash available to mount a bid and left a positive impression with many NFL

owners.





City too late in preventing growth

Urban sprawl is an issue facing many cities throughout the country.

And it's no different here in the Bluegrass,

And it's no different here in the Bluegrass, where Lexington is on pace to overtake Louisville and become the largest city in the Commonwealth in the next 20 years.

When Lexington was founded in the late 1800s, city planners never expected the city to support a quarter of a million people. They probably never imagined the city would contain not one, but two Wal-Mart Superstores. And they certainly never fathomed using taxpayer dollars to entice people not to develop their land. That's the latest proposal up for consideration by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government. And today at 1 p.m., in the council chambers, the plan will be released. The plan is in its infant stages, but we've obtained the following pertinent details about the Purchase Rights of Development program as used in Connecticut, California and Pennsylvania.

The program, to be implemented over 30 years or so, will take \$100 million of Fayette County taxpayer money and pay owners of green space

payer money and pay owners of green space (horse farms, tobacco farms, etc.) within the coun-try not to develop their land. The idea is to prevent the rise of unwanted development in greenspace.

The plan signifies nothing but poor planning The plan signifies nothing but poor planning by the city. Because Lexington's rapid growth has taken place "too quickly," according to many bumper stickers, city officials have granted zoning variances in no particular pattern. This has led to angry, wealthy land owners, some of whom (Anita Madden, for one) have threatened lawsuits against the city if their land is not granted a zoning variance for new development.

One-hundred million dollars of taxpayer mony? Their's a hung chunk of change that could

One-hundred million dollars of taxpayer more ey? That's a huge chunk of change that could probably be better spent if the city had come up with a better plan several years ago. We can't see how the city could justify giving more money to a group of people who aren't exactly hurting for money in the first place.

If the city is growing, then we need to enact a plan that will do more with less money.

The PRD program is like putting a Band-Aid

Taylor knows a lot of people like to drink, but he urges
them not to drink untreated water without a purification device or tablets.

There aren't many water
sources left that haven't been
polluted in some way, he said.

While the water purification devices are optional, one
safety must is a first aid kit,
said Jamie Wisseman, a dietetics
junior at the University of
Louisville and Girl Scout
leader.

"You never know when

"You never know when someone's going to bust their knee or get a blister," she said. "Snakebite kits are a good idea,

"Snakebite kits are a good idea, too."

While animal attacks are infrequent, Wiseman and Tay-lor warn against feeding the wildlife.

wildlife.
"That's what makes them mean or unafraid of humans," Taylor said. "Once a bear at-tacks someone, most likely it

will be destroyed."

Overall caution with food is a good idea, as most animals have a keen sense of smell and will find a way into your tent or backpack to get the goods, Wiseman said. The best way to keep food is to hang it from a tree, far from the trunk and ground, and to take all trash out of the woods, she said.

When enjoying the great outdoors, just remember: Mind your manners and watch your step.


